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
So far May has been without rain which seems to correlate to the negative readings of the SOI. Hopefully by the time this goes to press we will have received some to make the streams flow once again.

have just returned from a wonderful experience, volunteering with Sewaid Australia and Days for Girls in Ba, Fiji.

Days for Girls is an International organisation (Google it for more details) which sponsors 'Days For Girls Kits' in Asia, Oceania and Africa so the girls will not miss out on education because of menstruation. Each kit contains 2 shields, with a special leak-proof layer, 8 liners, 2 pairs of panties, a face washer, cake of soap and 2 zip lock bags, all assembled in a practical drawstring bag. Sewaid donated sewing machines, overlockers and fabrics to make the kits.

Ba has a Women's Forum and the Japanese government has provided the money to construct a large 2 storey centre for the women. It contains classrooms, storage areas a large meeting room, kitchen facilities etc.

The first half of our time was spent teaching the ladies how to sew the kit, then there was a presentation where women from the town and school teachers were invited. It is hoped that the Ba ladies will be able to manufacture the kits - already some of the schools have placed orders. We have left the necessary supplies for about 500 kits.

The second part was more generalised sewing. The ladies were eager to learn to use simple commercial patterns for garment construction. Children's dresses and shorts were popular.

We also taught the ladies how to make bags and purses which hopefully they will be able to sell at the markets. They were keen and eager to learn patchwork, some incorporated the designs into their bags, others made placemats or cushion covers

I left all of my sewing supplies - rulers, threads, etc. to a group of very excited ladies. I have been invited to return and stay with them. In the meantime I will be sending a "Care Package". So if anyone has spare fabrics or threads, simple commercial patterns, zippers etc. please contact me, Jenny Fletcher, on 6554 1201

This turned out to be another very successful day of Country Music, held at the Krambach Hall.


A total of 26 local and visiting artists from as far afield as Kempsey, Port Macquarie, Forster and Bulahdelah sang on the day.

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#### MABIAC BURAL FIRE SERVICE

Well that was a bit of a fizzer. The new emergency services levy has been postponed. A bit of history. At the

moment, NSW emergency services are funded broadly by contributions of 75% from Insurance Companies, and 15% each from state and local government. Of course if you do not have insurance (and there are many who do not), you don't pay the levy but enjoy the same protection as those that do. Evidently the numbers for small to medium businesses do not add up. All other mainland states have a system similar to that which was to be introduced in NSW, so it will probably still happen, and of course relieve local and state governments of their present obligations. ('Ole Smokey just being a cynical old coot here).

Been the quietest month for some time, just four callouts to MVA's two minor and called off on the other two.

Winter is here, and so is the higher incidence of house fires. Get a fire plan from **myrfs** which has heaps of good stuff including what to expect and do in an emergency. If you love your family, this is a must and invaluable.

A good time to get ready or carry out your hazard reduction. Yeah I know, it's early but permits are required from October 1<sup>st</sup> and it can sometimes take time to get the necessary paperwork done through your local F/control centre. Some brigades can help with the actual lighting up if approached but the paperwork must be complete. You must, of course, **notify your neighbours and F/com and as a courtesy, your local Brigade**. #### REPORT FROM NABIAC RSL SUB BRANCH



Water Supply

Another month has gone by and we are still receiving compliments about the ANZAC day service. Once again I would like to thank the community for your support.

Did you know the Returned Services League of Australia was formed on the 6<sup>th</sup> of June, 1916 by troops returning from World War 1; with the aim of continuing the camaraderie, concern and mateship shown amongst the Australian Diggers. The RSL has now grown to 1500 Sub-Branches Australia wide and over 240,000 members, making it the largest organisation of ex-service men and women in Australia.

Another point of interest for June - Newcastle was bombed on the 8<sup>th</sup> of June, 1942; thankfully no one was killed and only two people injured. That attack was on the BHP metal works and the bombs hit

everywhere but their target.

The Japanese Submarine was no more than 9 kilometres off the Newcastle coast at the time of the attack and had come in totally undetected. This followed the attack by the Japanese Midget Submarines on Sydney Harbour on June 1<sup>st</sup> in which the HMAS Kuttabul was sunk killing 21 sailors.


In May, we had four members attend the RSL State Congress in Albury as well as two members going to Laurieton for the local delegates meeting.

# *Local History* - *The Wallamba* – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" March, 1926, by Bob Mann

Nabiac Show - March 31st, 1926: Rain Insurance. There was much speculation on Friday amongst those at the show whether there would be sufficient rain to entitle the association to collect the insurance money. The rain fall during the morning and at 1:00 o'clock it was still fine. The position was that if 10 points of rain fell before 2 pm the association was entitled to £200 from the insurance company which had undertaken to insure the show against rain. The premium paid was £20. At 1:20pm a heavy cloud worked up from the south east and a few minutes later, just as the cattle and horses were being led on to the ground for the grand parade, the flood gates of the heavens were opened and for the space of a few minutes, the rain came down at a good rate. Then it eased off to a mere drizzle and discussions were heard on all sides as to whether the ten points of rain had been registered. One man declared that only about 8 points had fallen as far as he could judge by the amount of water in a kerosene tin that had been left out in the rain. Others asserted that well over the required amount had fallen. At ten minutes to two o'clock the rain ceased all together and a committee man was dispatched post haste to the police station in order to ascertain the official registration. Some minutes later he arrived back breathless with the news that a little over 10 points had been registered. The amount was less than eleven points but sufficient to enable the association to claim the insurance. The grand parade was spoilt to a certain extent by the rain, but many of those present who had bought oilskins, overcoats and umbrellas remained out in the rain to watch it. They were well rewarded, the parade made a most imposing spectacle and it was also responsible for some humorous incidents. The sudden shower of rain made some of the cows and poddies very flighty and instead of being led around the ring there, they led their leaders a merry dance. One cow galloped almost right around the ring with the man on the rope taking great strides to keep up with it.

#### MAY, 1926 News

**MANNING SHIRE MEETING:** At the recent meeting, complaints were received about stagnant water in a gully at Nabiac. Complaints had been received in connection with the matter. After the water stops running it remains stagnant in ponds for months and becomes putrid and a breeding place for mosquitos. It would be a safe guard to public health if the ponds were filled up or the gully graded and drained so that no water will run away.

**THE NABLAC BRIDGE:** The council reported that an error had been made in the plans of the Nabiac Creek Bridge. The error concerns the length of the bridge and as a result work was being held up. # Lyn's Larder

Found this recipe in a very old magazine and it will be on my menu next week. It is a cheaper variation to the one I know.

#### TOAD IN THE HOLE WITH ROASTED TOMATOES AND ROSEMARY

#### INGREDIENTS

¼ cup (60ml)	Olive Oil
8	Pork Sausages (thick)
8	Rashers Bacon
2 cups (300g)	Plain Flour
2	Eggs, lightly beaten
500g	Vine ripened Cherry Tomatoes
2tbsp	Rosemary leaves
350g	Jar Onion Marmalade or Tomato Relish

#### METHOD

1. Preheat the oven to 220°C

2. Add 2 tablespoons of oil to a 3 litre roasting pan, then place in the oven for 10 minutes to heat up.

3. Meanwhile, wrap the sausages in bacon. Heat remaining oil in a large frypan over medium heat and cook the sausages for 10-12 minutes, turning, until browned all over.


4. Sift the flour into a bowl and gradually whisk in egg and 400ml of water until smooth.

5. Arrange the sausages in the preheated pan and pour the batter around them. Scatter with the tomatoes and rosemary, then bake for 20-25 minutes until risen and golden.

6. Warm onion marmalade in a pan over low heat for 5-6 minutes until heated through. Serve the toad in the hole drizzled with the warm onion marmalade.

Can substitute the cherry tomatoes with just one of the new type of small tomatoes available nowadays.





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### LOCALS PLAYING LOCALLY IN SINFONIA MNC'S JUNE CONCERTS

infonia MNC, our mid north coast (and hinterland!) region's volunteer orchestra, will be giving a series of concerts titled *Our Orchestra's Offerings*. The venues are Gloucester Primary School Hall at 2pm on Sunday, 18<sup>th</sup> June, St Albans, Forster at 2pm, Sunday, 25th June and the Chapel, Harrington at 2pm, Saturday, 24<sup>th</sup> June, 2017... Tickets - Adults \$25.

Sinfonia MNC aims is to foster music, especially for local young musicians, and to bring to local audiences programmes which cover the spectrum of live acoustic music from classical to modern orchestral and beyond. This year is no exception, but it does vary a little from usual procedure in that, as the title indicates, what will be played are the orchestra's "favourites".

So, what are some of the favourites? What can the audience anticipate hearing?

The principal piece will be the Clarinet Concerto No1 in F Minor by Carl Maria von Weber

Carl Maria von Weber wrote this piece in 1811 for his friend, the clarinettist Heinrich Bärmann.

This will be the showpiece for the 2016 *James Hannah-Sinfonia MNC Scholarship* winner, **Miguel Guthridg**e. Every year Sinfonia MNC awards scholarships to local musicians aged under 25 to further their music studies and to give them the opportunity to play with the orchestra. Miguel's brother **Patrick**, together with **Will Jackson**, were the recipients of Sinfonia MNC's 2016 *Quaver Scholarships* and they too can be heard playing in the June concerts. For all those aspiring young musicians out there – you can find out how to apply for next year's scholarships through the webpage <u>www.sinfoniamnc.com.au</u>.



That's one end of the musical spectrum. Another orchestra favourite is *Under Pressure*, written in 1981 by Freddie Mercury (and the other members of Queen) in collaboration with David Bowie. But is this so very different from von Weber's work? Freddie Mercury and David Bowie were both classically trained musicians before they became world Pop Icons. Both constantly used symphonic backings for their greatest hits. They would feel right at home with Carl Maria von Weber.



Another boy they would all feel right at home with is Franz Schubert. The orchestra will play Schubert's *Unfinished Symphony No 8 (B Minor)*, written in 1822 when he was 25, six years before he died tragically young, like Freddie, from an STD.

The orchestra has also chosen to play music by James Barry from the film *Dances with Wolves*. He has a distinct style, concentrating on lush strings and extensive use of brass. Although fiction, the film loosely illustrates the tragic fate of the Sioux Indians – indeed of all the indigenous tribes of America. James Barry also wrote music for some of the James Bond films, *Midnight Cowboy*, *Out of Africa* and *Born Free*.

What about some joy and triumph? Women? Well Delibe and Mozart feature in the concert so there's certainly joy.

But what about triumph? And women? There will be excerpts from the score for 1965 film *The Sound of Music.* Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II wrote this score to celebrate the life of an heroic woman, aided by other heroic women, and it also foreshadows the ultimate triumph of good over evil on the world stage.

Want some more triumph of good over evil? Then you will enjoy the orchestra playing excerpts from score for *The Lord of the Rings* by Howard Shore. He composed, orchestrated, conducted, and produced the trilogy's music.

But there's more ...

Hopefully this article has whetted your appetite to go to a concert to hear for yourself this wide variety of music, to see and support local musicians, to hear the rising stars, and to just enjoy. 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# Our Grey Ghosts have been out on **THE "WALLABY" AGAIN**

"We leave next week you know" (me)"

"What! but I've got to.....oh!"

So we left. And travelled north through the extensive cotton growing areas of northern NSW and Southern Qld. Evidence is everywhere as small balls of cotton from trucks litter the roadway. Average cotton production grown in this area is 3.9 million bales, involves massive infrastructure but is a big export earner.

Onwards through St George and Roma. Country is dry with not a lot of stock. Little did we know these would be the last we would see for about 2,500kms.

260 kms west to Charleville and meet up with some friends who will be our companions for a while.

A couple of days in Longreach. No, not the Hall of Fame rather a ride in a Cobb & Co stagecoach, with five in hand just as it was 120 years ago. Cobb & Co in their heyday were saddling some 2,000 horses a day in their operations and covering 18,000kms a week. Two pounds (\$4.00) a day was evidently the set fare anywhere you went. The Kinnon & Co family in Longreach have managed to put together an amazing set of attractions that should be a must for every visitor. Very worthwhile.

Onto Winton and a 100km visit S/W to visit part of the "dinosaur stampede" areas that are very well displayed and explained. The new buildings for the Waltzing Matilda Museum (destroyed by fire some three years ago) are under way. We are in the "Channel Country" where all rivers for the next 400kms west to and including Coopers Creek (Bourke& Wills) flow south into Lake Eyre. We will travel over hundreds; yes hundreds, of creeks and rivers without a drop of water in any of them. When it does rain however, rivers can be 10kms wide. 65% of Qld is still in drought. This is evident as we have not seen any wildlife for some time, no road kill or cattle, where on past trips through here, there has been an abundance of both. Outside our van park, triple double deck road trains are bringing cattle from north of Hughenden to Longreach. 120 head per truck and 23 trucks went through in one evening.

Country is as flat as, and, with the exception of the strip of tar we travel on, looks as it could have looked 1,000 years ago, no sign of habitation, fences or towers to the horizon 15kms away in any direction for hours of travel. Not desert, rather dull red dirt with sparse native grasses. Fuel is not a problem, usually at least every 300kms and the most expensive was \$1.38L





We are heading for Mt Isa but stop in at the information Centre at Boulia, where the "Min Min" lights phenomenon is well displayed and "explained". 10km straight stretches are common as are triple trailer road trains, occasionally with 4 trailers (Legal? probably not). One must get completely off the road as the trucks use the, in many areas, single lane of tar. The gravel verges are well maintained to allow for this. Many main roads here run through private cattle stations and are not fenced.

We approach Isa from the south. This large city (pop 22.000) has every amenity. Zinc, silver, lead but mainly copper are the main products from several mines in the area. Water for the city and mines comes from Lake Moondarra on the Leichardt River some 20kms away.

Onwards to Cloncurry, most available water in remote Qld is from the Great Artesian Basin and in most cases, cold water is not required in the shower as it is hot enough. This asset which stretches from the top of Cape York to Dubbo in NSW and northern SA, is 1,800kms wide and covers some 1.7million sq. kms or 1/5th of Australia's land mass. Some deep water in the southern area has been estimated to be millions of years old. It is replenished constantly from the western side of the Great Dividing Range, and without this resource the country would probably not function. Although exploited for a century of bad practices and waste resulting in lower pressures at the surface, it is now far better managed.

Charters Towers is nearly 800kms away, but first Cloncurry (pop2800) where the Flying Doctor Service had its first job in May 1928 and a great display of its history is on show. Nearby Mary Kathleen uranium mine was a major employer early on but now cattle are the mainstay (when it rains). On to Julia Creek (pop 400) which has without doubt the most attractive Information Centre we have seen and is involved in a breeding program for the endangered Dunnart, a small mouse type marsupial native to the area. They have performed miracles with not a lot of funds and is an example to other centres in how to do things. We camp at a waterhole outside of town and are welcomed by Don Northam, butcher, from Tuncurry who is managing it for a few weeks.

Hughenden, (pop 1,200) is another fossil rich area in Qld but cattle are the important industry. It was here that America stored 100's of tons explosives and ammunition during WW2. Unfortunately a badly managed bushfire got amongst it resulting in explosions and craters 6m deep with many buildings in the town destroyed.

Onto Middleton (pop 3) for a great lunch at the very old unique pub on the side of the road.



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Charters Towers (pop 8,300) was an early gold discovery by a young aboriginal horse minder. The place went gangbusters but fizzled out by WW1. Between 1871 & 1917, 200 tonnes of gold was extracted. Gold is again being mined but there are several other industries doing well including advanced education in several colleges and boarding schools. A very large American Air Force base was located here during WW2 and examples of fortified "bomb dumps" are still on display.

We head south and it is a long 380km drive to Clermont with just one possible stop at Belyando Crossing. Nothing to see until close to Clermont where we come across the first cattle since Longreach some 2,500kms ago and cultivated paddocks. Seems like civilisation at last, but certainly great admiration for so many who live, work and make their home in the western areas we have driven through. There are still pioneers about.


Further south and call in at Murgon and a few moments with an old friend of the family who is not well. Tenterfield. We have enjoyed 30 -32' days since we left and the weather is now cooler. Autumn in the New England is so colourful, the reds, greens and brilliant yellows are powerful symbols of nature here but also a reminder winter is about to happen and colder than on the coast. We travel down the range via the Waterfall Way to Dorrigo, where a staggering amount of old railway rolling stock that was supposed to be running tourist trains in the area by now, is rotting away due to big local disagreements and reported legal costs of \$2m. Very sad.

Onto Nambucca Heads and highway traffic. We have been spoilt with not a lot of traffic for the last 6,000kms. A couple of days at the Pelican van park seems like a great idea. The end is in sight, so many nice people and experiences, great country even in drought and the continuing optimism of those we have met is inspiring and more than a little humbling.

matter, the third lady finally says, 'He's not even a member of this golf club'.









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#### IN YOUR PLOT

Winter... and isn't that morning wind getting chilly. Still there is a lot to get done in the garden to keep us active and warm. ③

In the vegie garden or raised bed we need to get those seedling of cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, celery, garlic, kale and onions planted out and new seedlings of peas, sweet peas, parsnips and silver beet sown in trays and kept under cover for planting out in about 4-6 weeks.

Next thing is roses. Love them or hate them now is the time to buy and plant bare rooted ones. A trip to one of our local nurseries will show you what is available and which ones grow well in our neighbourhood. If you are unsure of the colours, garden tags often fade, note the particulars and look up the images on the Internet. This will give you an opportunity to see the plant in maturity as well and enable you to envisage it in your garden.

If that's not enough to keep you warm remember that autumn leaves make great mulch so get raking. Then of course there is the pruning of those deciduous trees. Remember when you are pruning any plant that the direction of the bud you are cutting to is the direction of the new shoot. So if you want your plant to spread prune for the ones pointing out or conversely if the plant needs thickening prune for ones pointing in.

Some pruning allows you to open a plant up to get the sunlight and air in and help combat fungus problems that are more prevalent in winter. It only takes 8 hours of a plant sitting with moisture on it for spores of fungus to take hold. One good home remedy I've used is:

3 T (tablespoons) of baking soda mixed with 3 T of vegetable oil (vegetable, olive or corn) and a few drops of dishwashing liquid in about 3.5 litres of water.


This works quite well for black spot and powdery mildew although you may need to repeat the application a few times to get complete results and it is always a good idea to test any new sprays on a few leaves of the plant first as some plants don't really like the oil.

Hydrangeas need your attention now too. Cut them back to the fat double buds for the best blooms next season. Natives that have finished flowering will also benefit from a light prune but steer clear of pruning any plants that have now set their buds for spring/ summer.

As winter comes in and plants slow their growth or die back you can often get a better view of the basic structures of your garden. Are there any places that would benefit from some landscaping? Do any of the edging or borders need sprucing up or replacing? Any areas that will benefit from a general clean up?

I am sure there are , so get out and start digging.

Ps. Ouick tip: Keep indoor pot plants away from heaters. Mist their foliage daily and stand pots on saucers with moist sand. They tend to dry out quickly with heated rooms.





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
