

Vacancies



President Iris had also phoned and since the meeting *Pam* has paid her a visit – any members who are able to visit would be much appreciated by Betty.

2017 State Conference delegates, Penny and Merle, both gave reports on their attendance and each area pertaining to their role as Group and Branch International & Handicraft Officers respectively.

Penny congratulated Merle on being winner of the International Handicraft piece with her beaded Mongolian Eagle hanging and also added congratulations to Eungai-Stuart's Point Branch who were placed 2nd with their International Book on Mongolia. Penny is now taking entries at the Group Council Meeting to be held in Harrington on July 31st for this year's Group International work to be judged at Kempsey on August 24th.

Material aid items such as lengths of cotton material, needles, safety pins, nylon zippers and the like are also being collected for overseas aid parcels. Mother & Baby pack requirements were also listed and these will be distributed by the Hospital Committee of HO.

These tiny creatures are a nocturnal insect eating animal with a biological name of SMINTHOPSIS DOUGLASI. Margaret and husband Bruce also visited Lark Quarry Conservation Park 100 klms NE Winton to see the Dinosaur Stampede footprints

Congratulations to Janette Jones who has become a great grand-mother for the first time with the birth of a little girl who has been named Kyla Ann – congratulations Janette.



NABIAC MEMORIAL **NEIGHBOURHOOD CENTRE**



As many in our community are aware the Neighbourhood Centre's Op Shop funds raised

were previously used to support the construction of our Pool. Since the Pool project was completed we've focused spending on some much needed work on our building.

Building Refurbishment

We spent \$45,787.67 (ex-GST) on refurbishing the building between April 2016 and March 2017. There have been further repairs since then and they will be reported at our next meeting on 20th July 2017.

Nabiac War Memorial Park

At present the Neighbourhood Centre is committed to contributing to the cost of the works at the Park. We will be working with MidCoast Council on the fence, an extra footpath across the park and some new signage. The Neighbourhood Centre has a grant from Veterans Affairs for \$1,000 and will contribute around \$4,500 to \$5,000 to this work. Council will also contribute.

Children's Play Area

Requests from the community have involved

a new play area for young children behind the Tennis Courts,

a bike/scooter area suitable for younger children and

a shaded play area.

Taking all this into account, MidCoast Council and the Nabiac Village Futures Group agreed that a new play and bike area for younger kids would be constructed behind the Tennis Courts.

Involved also in this discussion have been the Preschool and Kids Shack, and the Tennis Club. Council have some funds to put towards this project and we expect that the Neighbourhood Centre will be contributing. We should have more information about this in the next

This also will mean that the children's play area at Memorial Park will be removed after the new area is complete.

Mid Coast Quilters

The Neighbourhood Centre is also talking with the Mid Coast Quilters about assisting them in purchase of a quilting machine to assist with the quilts that they make and donate into communities. In 2016 they donated 509 quilts to hospitals, nursing homes, domestic violence **Belbora Mowing and** Maintenance

units, women's refuges, NSW Dept. of Family and Community Services and the Dundaloo Foundation, and 41 quilts were donated to the village of Mualawa in Fiji after Cyclone Winston.

They estimate they need approx \$10,000 to purchase the machine needed. This will be followed up at our meeting on 20th July.

Nabiac Tennis Courts

The Nabiac Village Futures Group (a sub committee of the Neighbourhood Centre) have been approached by the Tennis Club to assist them in works to the court surface. We'll take that request to next meeting on 20th July.

Further projects

We have had some very early discussions with Council regarding the area around Town Creek. We offered to contribute seating, but this is still in very early stages of planning.

We are aware that there is community interest in both exercise stations for fitness and in a community vegetable garden.

Assistance Available

It is heart breaking to read Chriss's account (page 20). Packs of wild dogs are now more prevalent in our area and across the Manning/Great Lakes region. These are feral dogs which are causing havoc to small livestock, pets and wildlife. All landholders have a responsibility to control them on their land and without ongoing control programs the numbers will only increase. Local Land Services can assist and guide landholders and neighbourhoods affected by these unpredictable animals. Report all incidents and sightings to:

Laurie Mullen - laurie.mullen@lls.nsw.gov.au / 0407 785 007 with details of date, time, direction, photos, animals affected Local Landcare Coordinator for the Great Lakes catchments, Joel **Dunn**, based at Nabiac, can assist supporting neighbourhood groups in learning preventative strategies and implementing regular baiting, trapping and even shooting programs. Such groups will work in conjunction with NPWS and State Forests, coordinated by Hunter Local Land Services. Working together we can enable landholders to carry on with their enterprises, more securely.



Local History - The Wallamba — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" **March**, **1926**, *by Bob Mann*

BENEFIT AT KRAMBACH: The recent benefit arranged at Krambach in aid of Mr *T Berriman*, who had been ill for some weeks, was a great success. Collections and dances here resulted in the committee being able to hand Mr Berriman about £190. Mr *J.T. Payne* was secretary/ treasurer. The committee appreciates the response by the public to the appeal.

BAGGED AT NABIAC: JULY, 1926: Mr Everingham, driver of the service car at Nabiac, had an unenviable experience on Thursday near Nabiac when the wheels of his car sank down in the soft earth and the car refused to budge an inch. Mr Everingham opened the throttle wide in an effort to force the car out of the boggy patch but the wheels only whirred around and around and failed to grip on the greasy soil. To make matters worse the car kept sinking and soon was firmly embedded with mud nearly up to the axle. Chains had to be put on the wheels and boards and brambles placed underneath before the car could be induced to move. The car was delayed over an hour by the unpleasant happening.

FUNERAL OF MRS W.J. EVERINGHAM, JULY, 1926: The funeral of Mrs J. Everingham at the Failford cemetery on Tuesday was one of the largest ever held in the district and was an impressive tribute to the respect and high esteem in which the deceased lady was held. The Rev S.C. Roberts conducted the funeral service assisted by the Rev. C.W. Nicholls (Nabiac) and the Rev. J.W. McCredie (Taree) and Mr C. Eather (Nabiac). The funeral proceeded from the church to the Failford cemetery where the Revs. J.W. McCredie and C.W. Nicholls spoke of the excellency of character of the one who had been called away and expressed sympathy with those who had been bereaved. A memorial service will be conducted by the Rev. S.C. Roberts in the Nabiac Church on Sunday night.

NABIAC POLICE DEPARTMENT, OCTOBER 1926: The Hon. J.J. Fitzgerald, Minister for Local Government, has received the following letter from the Under Secretary, Chief Secretaries Department. Dear Sir, In reply to your representation in relation to the communications received by you from Mr T.D. Gallagher, Secretary Agricultural Bureau, urging that a second constable be stationed at Nabiac, I am directed by the Chief Secretary to inform you that the Commissioner of Police reports that representation made for the appointment of an additional constable have been personally inquired into by the District Superintendent who recently visited the locality. As a result it is considered that the constable stationed at Nabiac should be able to deal with any matters which might arise in his patrol and that there is no necessity to increase the numerical strength of the force at that station at the present time. The Commissioner of Police adds that approval has been given for the police station to be connected by telephone with the local exchange in view of the number of stock that passes through the patrol and the amount of traffic going through

Nabiac Telephone Service, November, 1926: The Hon Earle Page has been advised by the Post Master Generals Department—Sir, With reference to a communication received some time since from Mr H.J. Bowers, Secretary Nabiac Progress Association, relative to the desired provision of an extended service, subject to the post mistress being prepared to provide attendance for additional payment at the rate of £20 per annum. To provide such a service (Sundays, Public Holidays and weekly half holidays excepted) however, additional payment at the rate of £52 per annum is required. Before the service could be provided it would therefore be necessary for the person interested to make good, each year, the additional amount required by the post mistress in excess of £20 and lodge an amount of £32 to cover the first year. The extended service could be provided only during the pleasure of the present post mistress or in the event of a change should her successor agree to carry it on at a suitable rate

NABIAC: Mr *V. Lulham*, who has been acting as assistant at Nabiac Post Office for a number of years, has been appointed to the charge of the Tuncurry Post Office.

Mr *C. Priestly* (jnr) who has been a resident of the Wallamba for a number of years, has disposed of his interest in Nabiac and proposes to take up residence at Port Stephens at an early date.



NEWS FROM BUNYAH



Dads Old Gun.



A fair bits changed round here since I remember as a teenager going to Nancy Frasers shop, buying a packet of chips, 3 slices of devon and a box of .22 bullets.

Whilst we never walked down the street with it over our shoulder, a kid having a slug gun or 22 just wasn't that uncommon.

Attitudes to firearms have changed and it had to change; we lost a lot of our innocence and devil-may-care through visions bought to us on the nightly news and a horrible day in 1996 at Port Arthur.

What happened afterwards was unprecedented in any civilised country when the government created a gun buyback scheme and really put the screws on those that chose to keep their firearms.

There's arguments on both sides of the fence in regards to all this, but the fact is gun related deaths in Australia fell from 677 in 1987 to 211 in 2015 and it's reasonable to assume that with the new laws and regulations in regards to storage and responsible gun ownership have had an affect there.

Which brings me to the point of this article, starting *July 1st and running through to the 30th of September there is a National Firearms Amnesty*, during that period you can hand in or register any unregistered firearms without penalty or fear of prosecution.

It should be noted that there are some pretty stiff penalties for hanging onto an unlicensed firearm, even if you have a Gun Licence.

So now's the time to do something about dads old gun, it can be handed in to Taree or Forster Police Stations, Boydies Hunting and Camping in Wingham or given to a collector who can register it for his collection.

The registration and safe storage of firearms is an important part of responsible gun ownership.

LAMB & PUMPKIN CURRY WITH COCONUT RICE

INGREDIENTS

1 tbsp. Vegetable Oil

Boneless Mini Lamb Shoulder, cut into 3cm pieces

½ cup (100g) Yellow dried split peas 1 Brown Onion, finely chopped

1 Long Green Chilli, seeded, finely chopped

2 Garlic Cloves, crushed 1 tbsp. Ginger, finely grated 1 Cinnamon Stick or quill

1 tsp Ground Turmeric
2 tsp Ground Cumin
1 tsp Ground Cardamom
1tsp Ground Coriander
400g can Diced Tomatoes
400g can Light Coconut Milk

500g Butternut Pumpkin, peeled & cut into 3cm pieces

METHOD

- Heat half the oil in a large saucepan over medium-high heat. Add half the lamb and cook, turning occasionally, for 5 minutes or until brown all over. Transfer to a slow cooker, Repeat with remaining lamb. Sprinkle the lamb in the slow cooker with the split peas.
- 2. Heat remaining oil in the pan over medium heat. Add the onion, chilli, garlic and ginger and cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until the onion softens. Add the cinnamon, turmeric, cumin, cardamom and coriander and cook, stirring for 1 minute or until aromatic. Add the tomato and coconut milk and stir to combine. Pour over the lamb.
- 3. Cook for 4 hours on high or 6 hours on low or until lamb is tender.

 Add pumpkin and cook for a further 30 minutes or until tender. Taste to season. (Could be done on stove top cooked on very low heat)

COCONUT RICE

1½ cups Basmati Rice, rinsed & drained

½ cup (125ml) Light Coconut Milk

1½ cups Water

METHOD

Combine rice, coconut milk and water to a medium saucepan. Season with salt. Bring to the boil over high heat. Reduce heat to low. Cook covered for 12 minutes or until liquid is absorbed. Set aside, covered, for 5 minutes to rest. Serve with the curry.

Across Aromatherapy

Essential Oils for Winter Chills

One of the best ways to relieve symptoms of respiratory conditions such as coughs, cold, sinusitus, sore throat is by using essential oils in an

inhalation.

When essential oils are diffused into a room they have a number of effects. There is the obvious pleasure of a pleasant scent, and as well unpleasant odours can be replaced by the natural aromas of essential oils. Research has shown that essential oils are highly antibacterial and antiviral, killing up to 90% of air borne microbes within three hours. To diffuse essential oils you can use a candle vaporiser, placing 5-10 drops in water in the oil burner, or you can use an electric diffuser with 10-20 drops in water depending on the size.

Another way to inhale essential oils is to place 5 drops of oil in a bowl of very hot water, place a towel over your head and inhale the fumes, (keeping your eyes closed). This is a very effective way to relieve symptoms of upper respiratory tract infection and congestion. Alternatively place 3-5 drops on a handkerchief and regularly inhale.

Another effective way to relieve symptoms of coughs and congestion is to rub 5 drops of essential oil in 5-10mls oil, (such as grapeseed, almond, coconut or olive oil or whatever you have in the kitchen) and rub it directly onto the patient's chest, front and back.

As we all know, essential oils have specific therapeutic effects creating a sense of well being and relieving physical symptoms. There are many to choose from for use in the treatment of colds and flus. Probably the one that everyone has in their cupboard is eucalyptus and this oil covers a wide range of flu-like symptoms, but the pine smelling oils, such as Atlas cedarwood, are pleasant and effective as are ravensara, rosemary and spike lavender. And remember that lavender (French or true) is very helpful in treating headache.

I am now working from *Earth Body and Soul*, but for an appointment you can reach me on 0419 604 605. An aromatherapy massage costs is therapeutic and very relaxing. The cost is \$60. Allow 1-1.5 hours.




