Been a bit more action on our front this month. A total of 10 varied calls which included one very serious MVA at the exit of Dibb St and the Highway. This intersection deserves considerable respect for those using it as there have been several accidents here. Vision is good but highway traffic is entitled to 100kph and could be faster, so one must be certain there is enough time to make the journey across. A stop sign on Dibb would perhaps be a good start to help the situation.

There were other vehicle incidents, a house fire involving asbestos, and an assist ambulance call. Asbestos contamination means that we must leave all of our yellow clothes at the scene to be taken away & treated. The first time this was required in our Brigade, not everyone had the correct underwear available. They do now, particularly the girls.

Hazard reductions are on the agenda and advice is to get them done. Predictions of a dry start to spring may prove to be incorrect but if it remains dry there will be restrictions for certain.

Heard of another vehicle fire (not local) where the hot vehicle exhaust set the long grass alight and the driver had to walk home, plenty of long grass about now.

And please be aware that Councils, as part of the NSW Clean Air Act, do not allow fires in the open for any reason for those that have a green bin. (BBQ's excepted) You are to put all green waste in the bin. This means in the village of course.

And please, please, if you are lighting up, please give your Brigade a call. We need to know, that's all, no trouble. If we know what's going on, chances are we won't turn up with the flashing lights on because someone had phoned in a 000 call. We would appreciate a call





Local History - The Wallamba — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" **November, 1926**, by Bob Mann

NABIAC - NOVEMBER, 1926: Mr V. Lulham, who has been acting as assistant at Nabiac Post Office for a number of years, has been appointed to the charge of Tuncurry Post Office. Mr C. Priestly (jnr.), who has been a resident of the Wallamba for a number of years, has disposed of his interest in Nabiac and proposes to take up residence at Port Stephens at an early date.

Messrs. Goodlet and Smith's punt Log Punt Founders: "Coolongolook", heavily laden with hardwood, foundered at Bullock Wharf, Nabiac at 10pm on November 1st. During the day 29 logs had been loaded under the personal supervision of Mr E. McMahon and the punt was moored below the wharf in readiness for an early start next morning. Messrs. L. Noone and T. Grey, who was in charge of the vessel, had completed an examination of the craft prior to retiring for the night. Apparently some of the planking carried away below the waterline with the result the hold was rapidly flooded and the punt quickly settled on an even keel in about 12 ft of water leaving only the tip of the bow and a portion of the funnel exposed. The logs, with the exception of a few that eluded skillful handling, were recovered and transshipped to the "Queen" for subsequent transportation to Coolongolook. During the week salvage operations were to have commenced.

KITCHEN TEA: On the eve of their approaching marriage Mr *J. Nixon* and Miss W. Croker were tendered a kitchen tea in the School of Arts, Nabiac. Mr *E. McMaster* presided on behalf of their numerous friends and presented the guests of the evening with an extensive array of beautiful and useful presents. Mr Nixon suitably responded. Supper was served by the ladies and a nicely arranged programme of vocal and musical items concluded a happy and enjoyable evening.

<u>Personal</u>: Constable *Turnball* of Nabiac, has entered upon his annual leave. Constable (?sic) is the relieving officer.

Word has been received by the Parochial Council for the Parish of Nabiac that the Rev. A.E. James will not be taking up duties in the centre. A successor to Rev. C.W. Nicholls has not yet been appointed. Wallamba Notes: The effects of drought and bushfires are being severely felt in parts of the district. Mr H. Paterson's property suffered severely from the bush fires. Some owners are losing stock and others are moving their cattle to the swamps about Darawank.

Efforts are being made to have a public hall erected at Dyers Crossing. A committee has been formed to further the object and the ladies are working in the interest of the much needed facility.

MAINLY ABOUT PEOPLE: Mrs George Worth and her son Stanly, of Wang Wauk, were just nearing their home after a drive last Sunday when the horse fell and Mrs Worth fell out and had the misfortune to have her arm broken. The boy escaped injury.







Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade Members are making the most of the lack of fire activity in our neighbourhood. One of our newer Members has just been awarded with his Village Fire Fighter qualification. Also a Minimbah crew recently

joined Nabiac Brigade in a very well run and informative joint training exercise. Winter is not always cold, dull and boring. It can be the best time to do some things.

DO YOU HAVE A BURNING DESIRE?

Well, you are not alone - especially at this time of year. It seems to be the thing to do and the time to do it. As this is being written it is actually raining, so maybe tomorrow is light up day. If you are thinking that tomorrow will be a day to satisfy your Burning Desire, then today is the day to spread the word.

DON'T KEEP IT A SECRET.

You have probably worked very hard to get your property ready for this burn, so why not show off a little - let everyone know about your hard work. Seriously, at least *24 hours in advance*, you are required to advise your neighbours (Across the Fence, across the road and even across the river). As well as those folk, your local Fire Control Centre needs to be advised. If people know what is going on in their district, it may well save an un-necessary response by your local Volunteer Fire Brigade.

THERE CAN BE NO ESCAPE

Your preparation work will of course have included clearing the area around the proposed burn area, and ensuring you will have sufficient help, water and equipment on hand to control and contain the fire. It is an offence to let your fire escape your boundary, so please don't get the Law or your neighbours offside. *Spread the word, not the flames.*

WATCH IT!!

This is no time for the "set and forget" approach. Even the friendliest fires sometimes have a mind of their own and yearn to visit greener pastures, so to speak. The pasture may not necessarily be greener, but it is unlikely you were planning to set fire to it. It is so very important that you do not leave your fire un-attended.

FEELING PRETTY PROUD OF YOURSELF?

If you are now looking at an area of nothing more than scorched earth, and it's the area you were anticipating, then *congratulations* and on behalf of our Brigade, thank you for making our neighbourhood safer.

Did you know?

Gunpowder is supposed to have been first discovered by the Chinese in the 9th century, and this knowledge spread throughout Eurasia. However, the first recorded recipe of charcoal, sulphur and potassium nitrate (from bat droppings) was by an English Friar in 1267

It is commonly known as "Black Powder" because of its colour and the addition of graphite during the manufacturing process and to differentiate it from other explosives.

It is not a powerful explosive but the only one available in construction, mining, quarrying and artillery shells until the mid-1800's. More powerful explosives being developed at this time have been the choice in recent times.

Whilst not difficult to manufacture it can be unstable and as a result, it was common practice in Europe to build & site explosive factories with three substantial walls and the remaining weaker wall facing a river in the event of an explosion.


It is still available and used by those of us who have a fascination for old type (Davy Crocket) shooting matches. There are still many older mid 1800 firearms in use at Wingham Rifle Range on days when we use them in target shooting. The residue after use is highly hydroscopic (attracts moisture) and so careful cleaning is essential, otherwise the steel barrels are quickly destroyed by rust. Lots of fun!

"I married one for the money,... two for the show,... three to get ready ...and four to go."


The Irish Oysters





ROSEMARY AND THYME CHICKEN STEW

Found this on the WEB and it sounds tasty.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 large Carrots, halved lengthways and sliced 4 small Red onions (optional), peeled and quartered
- Leeks, white part only, sliced
- 2 Lemons, guartered
- Garlic cloves
- 370 g Skinless chicken thighs, halved
- 625 ml Chicken stock
- 400 g Tinned diced tomatoes
- **Bay leaves**
- a few thyme sprigs
- a few rosemary sprigs
- drizzle of apple cider vinegar
- Sugar-free wholegrain mustard

Celtic sea salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C (350°F).
- 2. Put the carrots, onions (if using), leeks, lemons and garlic in a large roasting tin. Rest the chicken thighs on top of the vegetables, then pour in the stock and tomatoes and top with the herbs. Drizzle in the apple cider vinegar, then bake for 35-40 minutes, until the vegetables and chicken are cooked through.
- **3.** Remove the chicken and vegetables from the pan and keep warm. Discard the bay leaf (and perhaps the lemon quarters if you prefer) and transfer the juices to a saucepan. Bring the juices to the boil, then add the mustard and boil for 5 minutes, or until slightly thickened. Season with salt and pepper.
- **4.** Pour the sauce over the chicken and vegetables, then serve.

I think I would serve this with either creamy mashed potatoes or rice so you have something to sop up the sauce with and your choice of green vegetables to round it off.

Good loaf of crunchy French bread would also be tasty.




