My thanks also to Buckinghams Real Estate for printing the Front cover again. Hope you all like it.





Local History - The Wallamba – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" August, **1927**, *by Bob Mann*

WANG WAUK: Mr Albert Worth of Wang Wauk while working at Bunyah, had the misfortune to get some steel in his arm. He was conveyed to Nabiac by Mr N. Harwood and has since been under two operations in the Nabiac Hospital being attended by Dr Richard to have the steel removed. He is improving.

NABIAC CHURCH SOCIAL: A highly successful social in aid of Church of England funds was held at the residence of Mr and Mrs *C. Bowers*, "Mountain View", on the 12th Ultimo. Dancing interspersed with musical items was enjoyed by the young folk and a euchre tournament conducted by Mr *William Baulman* was keenly contested by the non dancers. Messrs. *C. Temple* and *C. Tattersal* conducted a ping pong tournament in which keen interest was evinced. The music for the dance was kindly provided by Mrs *Andrews* of Dyers Crossing and Mr *Jack Worth* and Mr *L. Barling*. A feature of the entertainment was the old time dances conducted by Mrs C. Andrews. A very pleasant function concluded with a hearty vote of thanks to Mrs Andrews, Mrs *Worth*, Messrs *A.J. Small* and *Herman Everingham* and also a large number of visitors who contributed towards a highly successful evening. An apology was rendered for the absence of Rev. *C. Saunders* who was called away and was consequently unable to attend.

SCHOOL SOCIAL: A highly successful function in aid of the Koribar School eventuated at the residence of Mr and Mrs *George Paterson* "Terrigong" on the 10th Ultimo. The weather conditions prevailing were good and the trippers of the light fantastic from almost every part of the district were present. An energetic committee left no stone unturned to ensure a full measure of success and the untiring efforts of Mr and Mrs Paterson's whole hearted co-operation, which was highly appreciated, was perhaps the predominant of acts in the financial and social success of a most enjoyable evening . The school funds will benefit to the extent of £12.

WALLAMBA CHURCH OF ENGLAND - VISIT OF BISHOP. September 1927: The Right Reverend the Bishop of Newcastle visited the Parish of Nabiac last week. On Monday evening September 13^{th} he gave a conformation to twelve candidates at St Albans Church, Forster, the church being filled with a congregation of worshippers. The Bishop's address was simple and extremely practicable and was helpful to both confirmees and congregation. While in Forster he was the guest of Mr *G.L. Perkins.* On Tuesday night the Bishop was in Nabiac and gave





conformation to six candidates. Sickness unfortunately prevented some of the candidates from coming in and was also responsible for a smaller congregation than was expected. The Bishop's address was again delightfully simple and extremely instructive and helpful to candidates and people alike. It was noticed that the Bishop used the alternative form of service provided in the preposed revised Prayer Book. At the close of the service the candidates, church, officers and friends were invited by the Women's Guild to partake of refreshments at the Rectory when an opportunity was given to all to meet the Bishop. The Bishop celebrated Holy Communion in St.

MANNING SHIRE COUNCIL - NABIAC BANK'S FOOTPATH: At the council meeting held on Monday 19th October



discussion took place re the footpath in front of the Nabiac bank. Cr. *McKinnon* said the council had raised the footpath in front of the bank at Nabiac and water was deflected under the building. The matter should be remedied to prevent flooding under the building. The President said that the ganger *Dargaville* was to have taken the water across the road but it was not done The engineer would keep it in mind. Cr. McKinnon moved that the engineer carry it out as urgent work . Seconded by Cr. *Bird* and carried.

WALLAMBA GENERAL NEWS: Some fine showers have passed over the district during the week and have helped the supply of water in the tanks for household use besides giving a fillup to the herbage. Probably during the month of September the rainfall off and on has totalled upwards of half an inch. There has been some fairly smart local falls in various parts of the hinterland with hail, but these have been patchy. The temperature accompanying the rain has been mild.

DARAWANK, NOVEMBER, 1927: The Darawank School tennis court is completed and the children have commenced playing. The court has an ideal situation, being built on a lawn bordered with flower gardens. Mr *Arthur Young* has been appointed to the position of Hon Secretary of the official Darawank Parents & Citizens Association. The P & C association are holding a social evening in the local hall on Saturday November 5th in aid of the school picnic fund.



WEED WARRIOR

With the long dry spell and recent rains, Lantana growth will be in full swing – along with all other weeds. With 8 years' experience in weed management on the Central Coast, and specialising in Lantana, my wife and I have now relocated to Dyers Crossing. If Lantana has invaded your creeks, bushland or property, please call for a consultation. Both Lantana and Fireweed have toxins found in all parts of the plants, particularly the red and pink flowering Lantana, that can affect your domestic, but more often farm animals, causing a range of serious symptoms if ingested.



Old Fashioned Glazed Ham

INGREDIENTS

- 3/4 cup Dijon Mustard

- 4. Turn the oven up to 400° f (200° c) .
- 5. Using tooth picks, decoratively adhere the pineapple rings around the ham and put a cherry in the centre of the pineapple ring. Sprinkle the pineapple rings lightly with the brown sugar Return to the oven, uncovered, and bake until the pineapples turn a light golden brown. Remove from the oven to a serving platter and let rest for 15 minutes before serving.


"And what can you tell me about the Baby Jesus?" I asked, as they seemed to have forgotten Him.

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Is your Dog Chewing its way through your things?

I have downloaded this from a web site as I found it informative for new puppy, and older dog, owners. A lot of people, my kid included, have brought home a

puppy for Christmas, and the rest of its life.

As his puppy is teething it is starting to chew whatever its little mouth can latch onto so I sent down to him to see if it helps in training.

Is there anything worse than coming home and finding your clothing or your furniture chewed to a slimy mess by your dog, if only because they were **bored**? It's infuriating and what's even worse is that your dog almost never knows what they did wrong.

Sure, there are some cases where a dog can recognize that they destroyed something you care about, but in most instances of chewing, it has very little to do with malice and much more with a lack of boundaries and a desire to be closer to you.

The Motive Behind Chewing

Dogs chew no matter what. They are born with the urge to chew and it's simply a matter of where and what they chew. That said, they will chew on your possessions for a variety of reasons.

To start with, it could be that *you encouraged that behaviour* when they were little. A lot of owners will witness their puppies teething and get them the nearest thing to chew - often an old shirt or shoe.

The problem being of course that, by giving them those old pieces of clothing, you've just taught your dog that it's okay to chew on your possessions when they need a good gnaw. It's impossible to go back in time and stop a dog from chewing on your stuff, but it can be stopped once it becomes a problem.

Another common chewing issue is that your dog simply misses you and goes to the nearest thing they can find to remind them of you - an object that smells very much like you. Other dogs simply enjoy chewing on things, destroying them in a fun, playful manner, *trying to stay occupied.*

Stopping that Chewing Behaviour

There are many ways to limit chewing behaviour. To start with, you can limit your dog's access to the parts of your home. Don't allow them into your bedroom when you're gone, or if you have to, crate train them and put them in a crate when you're gone.

If this is not an option, you need to lay down the law and show them that your possessions are not chew things. You can spray on bitter apple or cayenne pepper to deter the activity, as *well as providing a replacement chew* in the form of a Kong toy or a rawhide.

You can also consider watching your dog while you are at home to undermine the behaviour. Keep a close eye on what they play with and how they play. If you encourage play with their own toys and



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discourage it with your possessions, they will learn pretty fast that there are boundaries they should not pass.

Most of all set those boundaries and *stick to them*. That means not letting them on your furniture without permission, not allowing them into certain rooms, and setting out a number of command words that they can quickly and easily recognize in a pinch.

Dogs are creatures of habit. If you create a habitual environment for them, they will quickly adapt to it and stop their destructive behaviours. But, you need to be as consistent as you expect them to be. Your dog is going to chew on things no matter what you do. It's impossible to stop them and if you try, you'll only confuse them. But, you can very easily get them to stop chewing on things that are actually important to you.

With careful attention and a big dose of exercise, no dog needs to turn into a piranha in your closet, destroying everything you've ever put on.




