

Welcome to the month of March, HAIR Do Shaz

I would like to address the question about Medication as we here in the salon and our team have had a numerous

clients asking the same question over time, so I hope the following, answers some of these concerns!

MEDICATIONS AND YOUR HAIR - For many of us, medications are a daily fact of life. We take prescriptions for blood pressure, diabetes and many other conditions. And let's not forget those who take prescription medications to treat hair loss itself. While these medicines are often life-saving advances in the areas they treat, they can sometimes have side effects that affect our hair. Let's take a look at some common complaints and the medications that are known to cause them.

HAIR Loss - Hair Loss is the most common complaint named when encountered as a side effect to medications. That's not to say that it's the most common side effect to medications, but rather that when a medication causes hair loss as a side effect, it tends to be a major impact on the individual and is listed as most troubling.

TELOGEN EFFLUVIUM - The most common form of hair loss caused by medications is called telogen effluvium. It refers to a diffuse shedding of the hairs over a large area of the head, and is generally the result of stress or some serious systemic shock that causes a percentage of the hair follicles to shift into the dormant phase and then be shed.

Medication types that are known to cause telogen effluvium are retinoids, beta blockers, calcium channel blockers, antidepressants, and NSAIDS (including ibuprofen). (Source: American Osteopathic College of Dermatology) Such an abruptly-occurring diffuse hair loss is often not noted until weeks and months after the event that caused the incident to take place. This can mean that the cause may be overlooked or confused, particularly if there are many things going on with

The good news is that telogen effluvium requires no treatment to correct. The loss of the hair is a result of new growth pushing the old hairs out of the follicle. So, given time, the new hairs will emerge and grow back to return the scalp hopefully to normal.

CAN MEDICATIONS MAKE HAIR NOT TAKE COLOUR?

A: Yes, although the medical reasons concerning the explanations behind this phenomenon are not well researched at all. This field has actually garnered a lot of attention in the past few decades. You can make countless deductions about a person's health, habits and consumption based only on making an analysis on a hair sample of said person.

Countless hairdressers have reported cases where chemical processes do not take or have very different results than it delivered before the client was being treated with specific medications. One of my clients has a light ash-toned natural hair color, and I usually colored her regrowth with an medium/dark blonde color with a cool undertone. A





month after she had a serious and invasive operation, she came to have her hair colored. I used exactly the same formula as always, but this time her roots came out with a very warm undertone. My guess would be that the narcotics that she was prescribed interfered with the results of the color, although it could also be any of the other new medication that she was using.

If you search the web, you'll find that a lot of clients and hairdressers have many stories like mine. Although the medical field has not really looked into this to any satisfactory level; it is undisputable that medication definitely has a huge effect on the appearance and health of hair, as well as the affectivity and all-over results that chemical products and processes have on hair. ©Hairfinder.com








Welcome to our new Kindergarten Students!!!



Work on the way for Wallanbah Road

t's good news for Bucca Wauka locals as MidCoast Council road crews prepare to undertake scheduled maintenance along a 4km gravel stretch of Wallanbah Road.

Commencing at the end of the sealed section and extending approximately 4km west, the scope of works involves full-width gravel resurfacing and grading, aimed at improving road conditions and sustaining the life of the road. Crews will also undertake road side drain maintenance and clearing, shoulder maintenance and slashing, and the renewal of guideposts and signage at the same time, focusing on improving road safety.

"Gravel roads are an important part of our rural road network, and are targeted for maintenance on a cyclical basis", explained Daniel Park, MidCoast Council's Manager, Operations North. "While it makes sense to complement the resheeting work with safety improvements while the crews are on site, it does mean the Wallanbah Road project will impact local traffic over a period of up to 6 weeks".

The maintenance work is scheduled to commence from next Monday 19 March, and continue for 4 - 6 weeks, weather permitting. Reduced speed limits, changing road surfaces and lane closures will be in place, and travellers can expect minor delays of up to 10 minutes at times.

Motorists are asked to observe all roadworks signage, directions from road crews, and reduced speed limits, and to travel with caution through the area.






WHAT'S ON IN WOOTTON

Local History - The Wallamba - Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" 1928, by Bob Mann

MANNING SHIRE COUNCIL MEETING - JUNE, 1928: At the recent meeting of the council Cr. McKinnon said that at a well attended meeting at Nabiac, it was decided to go on with the erection of a War Memorial. Years ago it had been decided that Memorials be erected by the shire of Coopernook and Nabiac, whilst Taree and Wingham people should erect memorials themselves. In the Nabiac area 85 men enlisted, 12 were killed and three more never returned. There was now a sum of about £150 in hand. It seemed that a Nabiac War Memorial would be erected on the triangular piece of land which the council had. He thought they could transfer to the fund the sum of £56 which had been allotted for war comforts. The people got plans and etc. He gave notice that he would move at the next meeting of council that steps be taken to further the movement.

EMPIRE DAY AT FAILFORD was, as is customary, at the Failford Public School and the occasion lacked nothing of its predecessors and even a previous nights downpour did not lessen the ardour and enthusiasm which prevails at such gatherings. During the morning session about twenty adults assembled at the school and with the head teacher presiding over the assemblage, appropriate addresses were delivered by Rev. F. Paton, Mr George Lee and Mr C. H. Cook. These addresses were interspersed with suitable recitations and songs by the pupils all of which were appreciated. During the afternoon the usual vote of thanks and the collective singing of the National Anthem terminated the morning session. During the afternoon, under the auspices of the P & C Association, a picnic ostensively to the children was held and quite fifty adults and seventy or eighty children were present. Over forty competitive athletic events were disposed of, the prizes for which had been obtained previously.

NABIAC: VALEDICTORY - Mr and Mrs Warren Wright of Nabiac were farewelled at the residence of Mr and Mrs C. Bowers of Mountain View on Friday evening last prior to their departure from the locality. The function took the form of a social evening and not withstanding the adverse wet weather conditions, dancing, games and competitions were enjoyed by a large circle of friends and well wishers for several hours, after which supper was served by the ladies. The chairman in detailing the object of the gathering referred to Mr and Mrs Wright as young and energetic citizens whose career of usefulness merited the goodwill and approbation of their fellow citizens who had assembled

for the purpose of wishing them health and happiness. Messrs John Nixon and Dave Hancock of Nabiac also responded in glowing terms to the many excellent qualities and concluded by wishing them future good health and happiness. Mr C. Bowers then presented Mr and Mrs Wright, on behalf of their many friends, a cheque as a small token of the esteem of which they are held by the residents. Mr Wright, who is the son of Mr and Mrs S.G. Wright of Logan Lea, near Nabiac, on rising to respond was received with musical honour. He sincerely thanked the residents for their many expressions of good will and also for their excellent gift with which it was his intention to purchase a memento of the occasion. Excellent music was provided by Miss E. Schlenert and Mrs C. Andrews to whom a hearty vote of hands was accorded. Messrs. C. Andrews and C. Tattersol carried out the duties of M.C.^s, in a capable manner. "Auld Lang Syne" and a vote of thanks to Mr and Mrs Bowers concluded a pleasant evening.

NABIAC: Mrs J. T. McGennis of Nabiac was recently called to Maitland to the sick bed of her father, Mr Angus McFadyen, a highly respected ex-resident of the Upper Wallamba and lately Taree, who is at present an inmate. The genial Mack, although advancing in years, appeared until recently to be hale and hearty as ever, but a recent illness found him to seek medical advice and he was advised to seek hospital treatment. This intrepid Scott is possessed of that courage perseverance that should be important factors in the restoration of his health.

WANG WAUK: A service was held in the Soldiers Memorial Church, Wang Wauk on Sunday 17th June at 2:00pm as a memorial service for Master Arthur Bennett who was killed by the limb of a tree falling on him a few weeks ago. A most impressive and sympathetic service was preached by Rev. C Saunders who took for his subject "Jesus Wept". The hymns "Jesus Lord of My Soul", "Forever Will the Lord", "Rock of Ages" and "Abide With Me" were sung by the congregation during the service. A good congregation was present although the roads were very bad after the recent flood. On Wednesday night steady rain was falling and on Wednesday night it increased with a big southerly wind. The creeks and rivers were flooded. All the farms had trees over fences, pole timber was blown everywhere, the State Forest being strewn with timber. Several cattle were killed.





Lyn's Larder

Something special for an Easter treat which is gluten-free for those with funny



INGREDIENTS

Eggs 3/4 cup Caster sugar Vanilla extract 2tsp 2 cups Gluten-free plain flour 1½ tsp Xanthan gum

Gluten-free baking powder ½ tsp

½ cup Almond meal

Dried figs, roughly chopped 100g

1/3 cup Pistachio kernels Extra flour to dust

METHOD

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°. Line a large oven tray with baking paper. Put eggs sugar and vanilla in a large bowl and beat using an electric mixer, for 5 minutes or until thick and creamy. Sift flour, xanthan gum and baking powder over egg mixture and fold until combined.
- 2. Add almond meal to mixture and stir until combined. Stir through fig and pistachio kernels
- 3. Turn out dough onto a lightly floured surface. Knead for about 2 minutes or until smooth.
- Divide mixture in half and form into two 18cm long logs. Transfer to prepared tray. Bake for 30 minutes or until firm, then turn oven off.
- 5. Set logs aside for 45 minutes to cool
- 6. Preheat oven to 160°. Line 2 oven trays with baking paper. Using a serrated knife, cut logs into 1cm thick slices. Transfer slices to prepared trays and bake for 15-20 minutes or until dry and crisp, then set aside on trays to cool com-

Serve or transfer to an airtight container.

No Wild Dogs in Bunyah!!

Very few people have seen a wild dog in Bunyah.

"No, I haven't seen any" says one farmer. "No I haven't seen any in years" says another farmer.

Well just go down to your creek crossings & check out the wild dog paw prints as they traverse the country side in packs or as lone assassins under the cover of darkness.

How many of your new born calves were not accounted for last year? Is a calf missing an ear or tail or has a wound to its back leg? Chances are you will not see the wild dog.

These killers are highly intelligent, very mobile & in some instances possess Olympic athleticism & are able to disappear in a flash!

Quite simply they are ASSASINS or killing machines preying on innocent calves or unsuspecting sheep & goats.

Let me tell you a story of our encounters & the anguish they have caused at Haven Park Bunyah.

A new bull calf was born on Friday afternoon in a paddock behind the cattle yards. What a beauty! We left it undisturbed in the expert care of its magnificent mother, only to return the next day to find a mangled mess of skin, feet & hide. My wife was shocked to say the least. What came out of my mouth, a drunken sailor would not repeat!!!

There was no doubt it was the work of wild dogs, silent assassins, the ISIS of the animal world. Yes I often refer to wild dogs as the ISIS of the animal world because they stir up the same devastating emotional outrage. They prey on the innocent & the unsuspecting in the cruellest manner possible. We were so shocked & outraged that that we decided to leave the calf's remains where it lay mangled.

The very next day I set out to slash a paddock of Seteria not far from where the dead calf lay. As I slashed I noticed a shadow in the distance. You guessed it.....Wild Dog! A big black & tan wild dog strolling past some 150 metres away, stopping to sniff the ground & logs as he passed by them. A second glance revealed a sandy & brindle coloured wild dog not far behind also strolling past heading towards the cattle yards. It was very strange as neither acknowledged my obvious presence! Why did they not feel threatened by my presence? Was it because I was sitting on my tractor or were they on a

mission? I immediately stopped slashing & headed back to the house & grabbed my gun. Despite my frantic searching, they were gone! Bugger!! I missed the chance.

It was Sunday afternoon & we had packed the car ready to go home, when my wife asked me if we had a new calf in the front paddock? "No we don't". What is that in the front paddock she asked? I pulled out the binoculars & saw the black & tan wild dog heading towards the dead calf. YES! I had a second chance!! I knew where he was going so I grabbed my gun & quietly sneaked down into the creek & waited for him. Now I was the stalker!! The wild dog took his time eventually crossing the creek & headed to the dead calf. He lay down over the calf by placing his front legs over the calf & commenced tearing & munching at it. Luckily I was able to control my anger, took in a deep breathe, lowered my gun sights meeting his left ear & dispatched him in one clean shot.

YES, one more wild dog permanently RELOCATED! He can do no

Since that day we have similarly relocated/dispatched three more wild dogs.

In February of this year we formally engaged the services of a Wild Dog Trapper who in four weeks has successfully trapped four wild dogs, much to our delight & surprise. The Wild Dog Trapper achieved the best result in a very short period of time & with little disturbance to our farm routine. Excellent result.

We will continue to bait bi-annually in consultation with the Local Lands Protection Officers & utilise the expert services of the wild dog trapper, all of which are consistent with our Farm Biosecurity Pest Management objectives.

My take home message is that it is everyone's Responsibility to take action, by baiting, trapping, shooting or simply reporting their unwanted presence to the Local Lands Protection Board.

We at Haven Park have taken action against the wild dogs! Remember they are not my wild dogs, they are everyone's problem, because they travel through my property & they travel through your property & yes your property to.

All responsible land holders need to take RESPONSIBILITY.


And speaking of The Super Bowl, I received an e-mail a couple of weeks out from it and I'll repeat it here:



A few years after I was born, my Dad met a stranger who was new to our small town.

From the beginning, Dad was fascinated with this enchanting newcomer and soon invited him to live with our family.

The stranger was quickly accepted and was around from then on.





German Chamomile

While lavender essential oil would be my all time favourite, I find that I am using more and more German chamomile. German chamomile is native to Northern Europe, hence its name. It is a deep inky blue colour and tends to be quite viscous and can be difficult to drop from the bottle. I find it to be a very gentle anti inflammatory oil.

Because it is such a gentle oil it can be used on babies and young children. It can be blended with almond oil or massage cream and used for nappy rash and other rashes, thrush on the skin and eczema. Clean the area and apply regularly or after each nappy change. Always have skin conditions in children assessed by your doctor. As a massage it can also be useful in treating mild colic in babies.
