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



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Krambach Garden Lovers News

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

ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps whose soldiers were also referred to as "ANZACs". The ANZACs formed part of an allied army during World War I, whose mission was to capture the Gallipoli peninsula in Turkey, to open a free passage for the Navy in order to capture Constantinople (nowadays Istanbul). objective was to knock the Ottoman Empire, allied to Germany during WW I, out of the war quickly.

The troops landed in Gallipoli on April 25th 1915 on a beach now known as ANZAC Cove. The Allied forces encountered fierce resistance by the Ottomans. Instead of a swift operation, the mission turned in to a lasting battle with heavy casualties for both parties. After 8 months the troops were evacuated from the peninsula.

It was the first time that Australia (8,700 men) and New Zealand (2779 men) lost so many soldiers in an armed conflict. For that reason the news of the Gallipoli campaign had a dramatic impact on the Australian and New Zealand societies and April 25th became quickly the day to remember the fallen.

Although the origin of Australia's remembrance day lies in World War 1, casualties of all conflicts and peace keeping operations are commemorated nowadays. On April 25th dawn ceremonies are held at War memorials and ANZAC Day marches are organised across the nation to honour and remember those who lost their lives in service of their country.



The very welcome rain of the past weeks has given the creek at Lillypilly Bend a good flush and the waterhole is full and looking fresher. The rain, coupled with the continuing warm weather, means that we should have some good recovery in the forest areas, of course, it also means that the weeds will be growing strongly as well. The plus for weeding is that smaller weeds are coming out easily.

Well Irrigation Area

The Landcare team has planted a number of trees and shrubs at Lillypilly Bend filling in gaps that the removal of lantana and privet has created. The plants have been grown by members for that purpose.

Now is a good time to spot weedy cassia (senna). The yellow flowers are shining brightly in the bush and along roads. Hand pull smaller plants, cut and paint or scrape and paint larger specimens. Consult the herbicide label for correct concentrations. Do not use ready mixed Round up or Zero type products for cut and paint. If you grow cassia in your garden please prune to remove seed pods before they mature. The seeds are spread by water and birds and remain viable in the soil for many years. There is a native endangered cassia along the coast, if you live in that area please check what species you have.



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Local History - The Wallamba — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" 1928, by Bob Mann - September, 1928

THE UPPER WALLAMBA RIVER: The weather continues muggy with an occasional cold night and on a couple of mornings there was distinct signs of frost. The farmers are now crying out for rain. Truly, they are a hard lot to please; just a month ago the cry was for sunshine and heat, but that is another story. All the same rain is now needed and its appearance will be more than welcome.

Last Thursday morning a fierce gale of wind struck the valley and raged with great intensity for several hours and did considerable damage, both to houses and property in general and a few head of stock received injuries which in more cases than one proved fatal. Telephone wires, as per usual, came in for attention much to the inconvenience of many subscribers. Cream lorries had a rough passage and more than one tree had to be cleared away ere much progress could be made. Mr *Ernie Milligan* in particular had a stormy endurance trip and is to be commended on the promptness in which he runs the cream to the Dyers's Crossing butter factory from far out Bunyah.

Wireless has its advocates on the Wallamba River (Upper Section) and the latest enthusiast is Mr *Sam Martin* who has placed an order for a six valve set. Recently sets were installed by Mr *Lynch* (Bulby), Mrs *Jane Murray*, J.P., Bunyah P.O. and Mr *William Monk* (jnr) that well known Jersey breeder of Bulby Brush. It is rumoured that two more sets are under order for Bunyah.

Another innovation to the river is the Shave or Hillside plough. Mr Sam Murray has just purchased one of these ploughs, and very fine work indeed it does and is nearly as comfortable to ride on as a modern low priced motor car. Probably the first farmer to use a hillside plough on the North Coast was Mr James Bidner of Kings Creek, Avalon. In fact he is considered an expert on things like Shave ploughs and he has given several demonstrations on its powers of work to intending purchasers. His younger brother Mr Don Bidnor also of Kings Creek, cannot too highly extol its virtues. Other keen enthusiasts are Mr L.O Martin, M.L.A., Mr Allen Croker, Mr Cyril Bowers and Mr Fred Paff of Firefly.

Accidents and sickness are still in evidence. Mr *Athol Murray*, son of Mr *Tom Murray* "Glen Athol", Bunyah, has had the rough luck to severely cut his right foot with a brush hook necessitating medical treatment in Nabiac and Dr. *V.R. Richard* our popular medico had to



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insert 4 stitches in same. Glad to say the wound so far is healing nicely. Had it not been for the prompt first aid treatment rendered by his fellow worker, Mr *James Barry* ex A.I.F. who was a stretcher bearer in the Great War, the consequences might have been more serious

Mrs *Sam Martin* has now recovered from her serious illness and is home again. She speaks in very complimentary terms of the treatment and kindness she experienced whilst an inmate of the Nabiac Hospital. Mr *Veitch Murray* is also on his way to recovery and looks very fit and flourishing. It is to be hoped his broken leg will be alright ere the Nabiac Spring Carnival and that he will be able to step the Highland Fling and sword dance or Ghillie Collum, with the best of them. Mr *Phillip Montague* was also on the sick list, but glad to say he is now able to sit up and take a little nourishment.

Mr *Frank Schneider* is, unfortunately, seriously ill at the present moment, but it is to be hoped that better news will soon be forthcoming.

Herd testing organisations for the forthcoming season is now completed. It is to be regretted that only one director of the local butter factory has supported the movement. One would have thought that all directors would be keen supporters of the scheme, but evidently such is not the case and gives one food for thought. The one keen director who supports the movement is Mr J. Milligan of Bulby Brush; in fact he has been always a keen supporter of the Governments grade herd testing scheme and this is reflected on his very fine herd of 60 cows many which have just recently been registered in the Jersey Pure Bred Society's books. During the last two seasons he has put up records to be proud of and he possesses some of the highest testing cows on the North Coast. In the past Mr E. A. Carey has also been a keen supporter of the movement and has only dropped out for a season or two as he intends going in for pedigree stock only and he has to build up a new herd. 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MINIMBAH MATTERS

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade knows that 1st April is one of those special days on the calendar when we get to play jokes on each other and no-one gets upset. On 1st April *this year* jokes still remain, but, a couple of things change and a few things need attention.



- ▲ Daylight saving ends so we reclaim that hour of sleep we lost last Spring, by winding our clocks back one hour.
- ▲ Smoke Alarms. Now is a perfect time to check the batteries in your smoke detectors. We remind you of this twice each year and almost hear you say "yeah, yeah, I'll do it later", but it is important. Seriously.
- ▲ Chimneys. Before you know it, we will be lighting our inside fires, so it's the perfect time to check out the chimney. Dis-functional smoke detectors and clogged chimneys have claimed more than one life and home, so please, let's not hear about you on the nightly news. They say good news travels fast, but it always seems to be the bad news that leads the news bulletins.
- Fire Permits are no longer required until next fire season. No Joke. Amazing what a difference 14 inches of rain makes! However, there is still the requirement to tread with caution when planning your private burn, and there are a few simple but important rules to follow. Giving 24 hours' notice to your neighbours and your Fire Control Centre are big ticket items. As Peter, Paul and Mary used to sing about ... "Go tell it on a mountain and let those people know". If you are too young to know what we are talking about, ask a senior citizen or "google it", but whatever happens, don't forget to Just Do It.
 - Preparing around the area to be burnt is vital, as is having sufficient equipment and people on hand to ensure the fire does not become uncontrollable and does not leave your property. We repeat ourselves over and over about this, but still we get called to escaped fires, or fires across the road that are unattended and neighbours who "knew nothing about the people across the road planning to light a fire". Just sayin'.



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
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
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
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Show News

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
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Wild Dogs Romancing!

Our nearest neighbour is about 700 metres away & has a truly lovely, very well maintained & highly manicured five acres. 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HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE MANAGEMENT OF PEST ANIMALS IN OUR REGION

Hunter Local Land Services is encouraging interested individuals and organisations to have their say on the draft Hunter Regional Strategic Pest Animal Management Plan.

Hunter Regional Pest Animal Committee Chair, *Art Brown* said the economic impact of wild rabbits, carp, pigs, foxes, dogs, deer, goats and introduced birds has been estimated at \$170 million in NSW.

"The Hunter Regional Strategic Pest Animal Management Plan sets the strategic direction for pest animal management in the region and guides resourcing and investment dedicated to coordinated pest animal management," he said.

"Pest animals pose significant threats to threatened species and ecological communities, with feral pigs alone impacting on 361 species and ecological communities listed as nationally threatened."

The draft plan has been developed collaboratively with the Hunter Regional Pest Animal Committee and Hunter Local Land Services.

Mr Brown said the plan prioritises pest animals in our region, based on the level of impact and outlines how government agencies, community groups and individual landholders share responsibility and can work together to prevent, eradicate, contain and manage the impacts of pest animals.

"The management of pest animals in the Hunter and Manning Great Lakes is a complex and challenging situation which cannot be ignored. We can only win the fight against pest animals by working in partner-ship," he said.

"The consultation period is an opportunity for stakeholders, organisations and interested community members to provide feedback on the management of pest animals in our region and across the state."

Information sessions are being held across the region to explain how the plan was developed, what it means for the region and how to provide input into the final plan.

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When It Looks Like ADHD But Isn't

Attention deficit disorders are running rampant among today's youth (at least according to the media). Children who can't seem to sit still, have trouble focusing and concentrating, and who are easily distracted are being labelled and given medication left and right. Yet, for as many as 50% the prescribed ADHD medication doesn't work, symptoms don't get better, and kids continue to struggle¹. There isn't any definitive test for diagnosing ADHD, and mental health practitioners often must rely on a combination of observed and reported behaviour as well as family history, and connections with other conditions. ADHD can look different in different kids, in boys and girls, and even in the same kid in different kinds of environments. And, to add to the complication, ADHD isn't a deficit, it is often coupled with desirable characteristics of highly successful people, such as intuition, creativity, thinking outside-the-box, and the ability to hyperfocus when interested in the topic. But, what looks like ADHD may not always be ADHD. Parents should be aware of other conditions that can cause similar symptoms. One such condition is Irlen Syndrome.

At Irlen Clinics around the world, we see lots of individuals who have been diagnosed with ADHD (as kids or adults), who struggle with attention, concentration, focus, and memory, but whose attention issues are actually caused by lighting. These individuals may look like they have ADHD, but in reality they don't. The medications don't seem to help, they tend to have most of their attention issues when under fluorescent lighting (when at school or at work), and can often perform without difficulty in other environments. Irlen Syndrome can result in ADHD-like symptoms in some individuals, but unlike individuals with true ADHD, the environment and lighting conditions are what create over-activity in the brain that leads to difficulties in focus and concentration and even physical symptoms like feeling jittery or anxious. researchers in Australia determined that symptomology didn't differ significantly between individuals with Irlen Syndrome who had not been diagnosed with ADHD and those who had been diagnosed with ADHD by a qualified health professional, suggesting that there is a large amount of overlap in symptoms between ADHD and Irlen Syndrome². Other sources suggest as many as 50% of children with ADHD also have a reading disorder³, and we suspect that at least some of that 50% may actually suffer from Irlen Syndrome instead of ADHD. Of course, it's also possible that a child has both Irlen Syndrome and ADHD, as research shows that in nearly 70% of kids with ADHD there are also other co-existing conditions⁴. In either case, it can make a lot of sense to screen for and address Irlen Syndrome first, then re-asses for ADHD to determine if attention issues are still present.

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2 tbsp. Vegetable oil

Medium sized chicken drumsticks

1 clove Garlic, finely chopped Grated ginger 2 tsp 1 tbsp. Curry powder

500g Potatoes, peeled and cut into 2cm cubes

Granny Smith apple, peeled, cored and cut into 2.5cm cubes

½ cup Water

1 tsp Salt

Freshly ground black pepper

250g Green beans, trimmed and cut into 5cm pieces 500g Tomatoes, peeled and coarsely chopped

½ cup Plain yoghurt 1 tbsp. Mango chutney

METHOD

Heat the oil in a large, shallow saucepan over moderate heat for 1 minute and cook the drumsticks until they have changed colour, turning them over several times - about 10 minutes. Transfer to a plate and set

In the same saucepan, fry the garlic, ginger and curry until the mixture smells aromatic. Add the potatoes and apples and stir until they are coated with spices. Return the chicken, pour in the water, season with salt and pepper, cover and cook for 20 minutes or until the chicken is almost cooked

Mix in the beans and tomatoes, cover and simmer gently until the beans are tender. If the sauce is too thin, remove the lid and simmer for a couple of minutes more until it thickens slightly. Mix in the yoghurt and mango chutney and stir. Don't let the sauce boil once the yoghurt has been added or it will separate.

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
REAL KULTCHA
