

Nabiac Landcare

The recent rains have been both a blessing and a curse in the bush. The weeds are growing well but the damp soil makes the pulling out a lot easier. Wooster's Creek is looking much healthier with a good flow of water giving the creek a flush. Unfortunately the water also brings rubbish that has washed off the streets of Nabiac.

I've been asked by a few people what the Nabiac Landcare Group actually does, so in the next couple of months I'll try to give an overview of what we do and who we are.

We work with the permission and support of the MidCoast Council on the 'bushy' areas of public land and reserves in Nabiac. Our main aim is to improve the condition of these areas so they are favourable habitat for our local flora and fauna. We do this by removing noxious and environmental weeds to allow the natural regeneration of the area. We also work to encourage everyone to enjoy and explore the 'wilder' areas of Nabiac.

Nabiac Landcare Group was formed in 1994 by a group of interested locals. The original project was the Bullock Wharf reserve, a highly degraded former sawmill site. A lot of weeds were removed and quite a few trees were planted. It is now a pleasant place to walk, have a picnic or go fishing. BUT, we can't say our work is done there, we spend several months every year doing follow up to remove those pesky weeds that the birds and floods spread.



Local History - The Wallamba — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" 1929, by Bob Mann

WANG WAUK - AUGUST, 1929: Whilst ploughing his paddock, Mr James Slater (snr.) was knocked unconscious through the plough handle bumping him on his left side.

The most up to date farm in the Wang Wauk Valley is the one owned by Mr George Reaven. It has a large cemented silo machine filling with feeding stalls attached, an up to date shed and milking plant, and all other necessary up to date requirements for a dairy farm as well as a most comfortable homestead advantageously situated on a nice rise. Mrs G. Murray is enjoying a holiday at Glenbrook. Mr Orth, our teacher at Sawyer's Creek, is spending his holidays down south.

On Friday 26th the Royal Bulby Lodge of Manchester Unity Order of Oddfellows held their annual ball at Willina. The hall was decorated by members of the Lodge for the occasion. Visiting members were present from Coolongolook, Wootton, Bunyah and Dyer's Crossing. Messrs *I. Newton* and *G. Griffis* were M. C.^s and music was suppled by Messrs *C. French* and *S. Murray*. £6 was taken at the door and a most enjoyable time was spent.

We are sorry to hear that Mr William Newell is very ill at Stroud suffering from heart trouble and bronchitis. We hope to hear soon of his recovery and being his hale and hearty self again.

BULBY: Since last time writing we have had some good rains and prospects of an early spring look bright. The heavy frosts experienced here have played havoc with the pastures and the cream supply was slipping. Still the winter has been a record as far as butter production goes. The Upper Wallamba factory manufacturing more butter through the winter months than for any year previously. Evidentially the better fed cattle methods is bearing fruit or perhaps I should say butter.

Mr *Gill Paterson*, one of our progressive dairymen, has recently purchased a very well bred bull (Jersey) bred by Mr *Parish* of Berry, whose herd is at present putting up some remarkable good figures as published in "The Live stock Bulletin".

Bulby tennis club is still going strong. They have played Bunyah, Bucca Wauka, and Firefly having a win over Bunyah and losing narrowly to Bucca Wauka, but finding Firefly too strong. Bunyah is improving with every match and will take some beating next season.

Bulby folk are all pleased to see Mr A.A. Clarke back at his job again. Mr Clarke had the misfortune to meet with an accident whilst on holidays in Sydney at Easter breaking his leg and being an inmate in the Sydney hospital for about 4 months. Mr P. Cunningham, relieving herd tester from the Agricultural Department, was in Mr Clarke's place during his absence. Mr Cunningham made himself very popular

He was of a gentle and kindly nature and was held in high esteem by all who knew him. His main idea, in life seemed to be in benefiting mankind generally. Deepest sympathy is felt by all the residents here for Mrs Smith and family and his father and sisters in their sad bereavement.



Been travelling a bit and would like to share some observations.

What a goon show Sydney's "international " airport departure terminal traffic area is. No rules, just barge your way in the best you can with some ineffective flag wavers not accomplishing much.

Looking out the window on pushback at the untidy and unkempt staff and ground equipment one could be forgiven thinking that we are in the 1950's. And what do new arrivals think?

A far cry from Auckland, and later Canada, where there appears to be a greater degree of pride in all operations. A stark contrast.

Spring in Canada and growth everywhere one looks. They have come through a severe winter and home gardens are common in backyards. Our family has some Australian peas on the go as well as some "Manning White" sweet corn. All doing well.

Welfare programs?, nup, some help for extreme cases of hardship but certainly no extensive (and expensive) handouts that exist at home.

Vast majority of housing, both private and multi story apartments, are ALL timber, frames, everything. The country is awash with cedar (not red) and fir with vast exports to the US (now under threat). Electricity is cheap with most coming from hydro and the vast quantity of water available. (both also exported to the US). Far more personal responsibility on worksites. Not uncommon to see single vehicles on the highway doing maintenance and mowing. No multi personnel and vehicles to fill a pothole. Good to witness.

Cost of living is similar although petrol is around \$1.50 L.

Vehicles are cheaper, example; a Toyota Tundra, similar to an F150 (V8, auto, fully loaded) both are around \$50k and made in the US or Canada. A smaller, far less equipped Hi Lux made in Thailand is the same price in Oz. No doubt we get dudded.

Being close to the US has SOME advantages as competition in many markets is fierce which does much to keep prices down. Which is probably why there is an staggering amount of American money here.

Many executives from Microsoft, Apple, Coca Cola, TV and celebrities etc., have "weekenders", massive homes with full time caretakers available year round. We drive past the airport every day and there is always an executive jet in the parking bay. Why would the Mormon



Church jet be here for a few days???(\$23m plus) Privately owned islands (some with private golf courses) are here all with full time staff looking after things all year on the off chance the owner might want to spend a few days there.

Of course the exchange rate has a lot to do with it, a good deal for the US Dollar.

Anticlockwise on the roundabouts.

Have to look hard for political news from Oz which is a blessing. Haven't missed that.

As mentioned, summer here, and we go to London today where there is a heatwave on, about 30c for some of the coming week. Will be interesting.

June 30.

In London and have not met any English people yet but live in hope. Heathrow airport does well, passengers from two A380's at the same time (probably 500 people) to process and whilst a wait, no dramas. Some folk would put half a cow in the overhead lockers if they could lift it in.

Ground staff and equipment very tidy when looking out the plane as we arrived at the gate.

Doing the history thing for a few days, the traffic is horrendous and roads very narrow. Bus drivers do a great job.

Hope next week to travel to Essex and meet up with an old UK school friend of *Maurie Cole* (who lives in Dyers Crossing). Dave has been travelling to Oz for many years but can no longer do so, so it will be good to catch up and pass on Maurie's good wishes. Warm weather, wonder what's next?

I went into the confessional box after many years of being away from the Catholic Church.

HONEY & FIG DAMPER (Keeping with the honey theme)

INGREDIENTS

1½ cups Self-raising flour Cold butter, chopped 25g

180ml Buttermilk

Dried figs, chopped finely 1tbsp Honey

1tbsp Self-raising flour, extra

METHOD

- 1. Preheat oven to 220°c/425°f
- 2. Sift flour into a bowl, rub in the butter to form crumbly mixture. Add buttermilk, figs and honey to the flour mixture and mix to a soft dough. Turn the dough onto a floured surface, knead gently until smooth
- 3. Shape dough into 8cm x 24cm (3inch x 9 inch) log, place on greased oven try. Dust log with extra sifted flour, cut slashes into top of log.
- 4. Bake damper 10 minutes. Reduce oven to 180°c/350°f. Bake further 10 minutes. Lift damper onto a wire rack, cover and cool

Serve warm with butter, brie or a soft blue cheese and fresh figs

BEES & HONEY - Ana Martin

Seen and I started beekeeping by chance. The crowd funding campaign for the 'FlowHive' caught our attention and as we dove down the Google rabbit hole we realised that bees were facing serious problems all over the world.

Inspired, we decided to do our bit, put a couple of hives in our yard and help local bee populations.

As it turns out, it is very common for colonies of bees to settle in the most inconvenient of places, like school yard trees, house walls, and Telstra boxes, and some beekeepers think it's too messy to remove those colonies. But not Sven, he thrived on those challenging jobs and he was able to put his experience in the building industry to good use.

And so it came to pass that after 4 months we had 35 hives and Sven had discovered his true calling. Being interested in beekeeping when he was young, but growing up in East Germany, with little opportunity to become an apiarist, Sven had to wait another 35 years to follow his dream.

In September 2017 we took the plunge and decided to make this side gig our full-time job. We started doing markets every weekend, building a network of retailers, increasing our product range and of course we continued rescuing colonies.

From the very beginning we donated 5% of all our sales to *Save the Bees Australia* and we have always looked for ways to make a difference and that's why when we got selected by **ING Dremastarter** to run this crowdfunding campaign we took the opportunity with both hands.

Our aim with this campaign is to put a portable building on our farm to use as an extraction, bottling and training facility for other beekeepers to use.

Small producers not only will save on infrastructure but we can also pool resources to buy jars, stickers etc. in larger numbers at better prices. We will be able to run workshops and work together to make small scale beekeeping more sustainable both for the bees and the beekeepers.

Right now in other parts of the world beekeepers are losing a high percentage of colonies every year due to disease. There have been many incidents of the very destructive *varroa mite* arriving in Australia. (one just a few days ago in Melbourne). So far, the threat has been contained, but the day might come when it will sneak through our defenses.



We believe that the best chance we have for our bees to survive is to have a larger number of small beekeepers who look after strong, healthy colonies.

By supporting this crowdfunding campaign you will be helping both bees and beekeepers have a better future. Every little bit get us closer to making this project a reality.


REAL KULTCHA
