THE LOWER MID NORTH COAST

The Lower Manning Valley surrounding Taree and the Wallis Lake area around Forster / Tuncurry are each a paradise for birdwatchers. Numerous National Parks, State Forests and Nature Reserves contain a variety of natural vegetation types including rainforest, woodland, coastal heath and tidal estuaries hosting many species of birds.

The Lower Mid North Coast is fringed by endless kilometres of white sandy beaches, crystal clear waters and rugged cliffs providing many opportunities to view seabirds as well as dolphins and whales. Visitors will enjoy easy access to most areas by conventional vehicles, with 4 wheel drive(s) tracks available for the more adventurous. Many species of waterbirds, bushbirds and raptors, including nests, can be viewed along the pristine waterways of The Manning River or Wallis Lake. Regular cruises are available and small self-skipped boats can be hired. Accommodation is available to cater for all needs.

The list includes the land and freshwater birds reliably recorded in the Manning Valley and Great Lakes as well as the common seabirds to be seen from the coast. Some have been seen only once or a few times in recent years, or are known now only from a small area while others can be seen any day in appropriate habitat. Any unusual sightings or suggestions regarding this brochure may be forwarded to the address below and would be greatly appreciated.

BIRDING LOCATIONS of the LOWER MID NORTH COAST

It is recommended to read this brochure in conjunction with a more detailed road or tourist map. All references within this brochure are made to either the Manning Valley (Ed 13) and / or Great Lakes (Ed 23) Cartoscope's Tourist Maps (town maps).

Generally locations 1-15 originate from Manning Valley Visitor Information Centre (Taree - G3), locations 16-19 originate from Wingham Brush (Wingham - D3) and locations 20-33 originate from the Great Lakes Visitor Information Centre (Forster - D3).

1 & 2 - Refer Manning Valley map (D2)
Left turn 25.0km northeast along the Pacific Highway into Hannam Vale Road. This scenic drive takes you through the villages of **Stewarts River**, **(1) Hannam Vale** and **Waitui** where the black top ends. Continue along the gravel to Waitui Falls in Comboyne State Forest, and then onto Coorabakh National Park, Lansdowne and **(2) Cooperbrook State Forests** (T,C). Birding can be had all the way up the valley onto the escarpment covering a diverse range of habitat types. Continue along this drive to emerge back on the Pacific Highway at Cooperbrook.

3 - Refer Manning Valley map (D2)
Right turn 17.0km northeast along the Pacific Highway into Spring Hill Road and follow the signs to **(3) Cattai Wetlands** (T). There is a scenic walk around a freshwater wetland surrounded by forest.

4 & 5 - Refer Manning Valley map (D2)
Right turn 16.0km northeast along the Pacific Highway into Harrington Road. Surrounding **(4) Harrington** (T,C) to the west, north and east is **(5) Crowdy Bay National Park** with the township of Crowdy Head (T) to the northeast.

6, 7 & 8 - Refer Manning Valley map (D2)
Cross the Taree Bypass 8.0km south and follow Old Bar Road for 8.0km and turn left towards Manning Point. **(6) Oxley Island** is mainly dominated by farming land and **(7) Mitchells Island** includes Towibakh Nature Reserve and **(8) Manning Point** (T,C).

9, 10 & 11 - Refer Manning Valley map (D2)
Cross the Taree Bypass 8.0km south and follow Old Bar Road to the coast. **(9) Mudbishops Point** (T) is north of **(10) Old Bar** (T,C) along a gravel road. The locality of Wallabi Point and **(11) Saltwater National Park** (T) are south of Old Bar along Saltwater Road.

12 - Refer Manning Valley map (Taree - G3)
Turn left into Lansdowne Road 1.0km north from the Information Centre and left again into **(12) Dawson Cemetery Road** on the banks of the Dawson River.

13 & 14 - Refer Manning Valley map (D2)
Right turn 7.0km west along Wingham Road onto Cedar Party Road for 4.0km. Turn right for **(13) Brimbin Nature Reserve** (T) whilst continuing north arrives at **(14) Yarratt State Forest**.

15 - Refer Manning Valley map (C1)
From Wingham Brush turn left 38.0km north along Comboyne Road onto Innes View Road. **(15) Boorganna Nature Reserve** (T) is a rainforest remnant providing spectacular views and birding on the Comboyne Plateau.

16, 17, 18 & 19 - Reference Manning Valley map (Wingham - D3) **(16) Wingham Brush** (T) provides several short walks on raised boardwalks. Heading south along the Tinonee Road for 5.5km turn right onto the gravel Bootawa Dam Road. **(17) Bootawa Dam** is the water supply for the Manning and Great Lakes areas and can be viewed from the road. Continuing south to the Bucketts Way turn right and then left onto Hillville Road for 2.5km and **(18) Hillville Dam** is located on private property (but can be viewed from the road) on the left. Hillville Road turns to gravel and links up with Possum Brush Road after 5.0km, which traverses both **(19) Kiwarrak State Forest** and **Talawahl Nature Reserve** and exits onto the Pacific Highway. Also reference Manning Valley map (C3).

20, 21 & 22 - Refer Great Lakes map (E1)
Right turn 19.5km north along The Lakes Way into **(20) Old Soldiers Road**. This gravel road wanders through farming land before reaching **(21) Khappinghat Nature Reserve**. Continuing south brings you to the seaside village of **(22) Black Head** (T,C) offering both bush tracks and a wheelchair accessible concrete path and picnic area beside a saltwater creek.

23 & 24 - Refer Great Lakes map (E1)
Right turn 7.5km north along The Lakes Way into **(23) Tip Road**. This gravel road runs parallel to the coastline with numerous tracks heading east towards the coast offering a variety of coastal vegetation types. 1.0km further along The Lakes Way on the left hand side is the small **(24) Darawank War Memorial Park** (T) on the banks of the Wallamba River.

25 - Reference Tuncurry Forster map (C2)
John Wright Park (T), **(B3) Point Road**, **(B2) Bramble Parade wetland and pedestrian / cycleway** and **(A1) Tuncurry Flora Reserve** provide easy access and walking to fill a couple of hours.

26 - Reference Tuncurry Forster map (E2)
Pebbly Beach (T), **(G3) Bennetts Head** and **(G4) One Mile Beach** (T) provide easy access and walking to fill a couple of hours.

27 - Reference Forster Keys insert (A5)
Pipers Creek (T) and **(B5) Pipers Bay** provides scenic views across shallow lake flats.

28 - Reference Great Lakes map (F2)
Turn left 4.0km south along The Lakes Way onto Cape Hawke Drive and follow this through to **(28) Cape Hawke Lookout**. Apart from the scenic view the hill is covered in littoral rainforest.


29 & 30 - Refer Great Lakes map (E2)
Right turn 9.5km south along The Lakes Way into Green Point Drive and continue through to the end of **(27) Green Point** (T). The vegetation south and east of Green Point is part of **(28) Booti Booti National Park** (T,C) with numerous carparks and walking tracks south of the Green Point turnoff.

31 - Refer Great Lakes map (E3)
Right turn 31.5km south along The Lakes Way into Sugar Creek Road. This gravel road traverses farming land before reaching **Wallingat State Forest and National Park**. Within the area is Sugar Creek Flora Reserve (T) offering several short walks and Wallingat River Picnic and Camping Areas (T,C). For **Whoota Whoota Lookout**, follow Sugar Creek Road past Gur-um-bee and Sugar Creek picnic areas, then right turn onto Whoota Whoota Road. Follow this narrow gravel road with care (slippery when wet) for 5km to the lookout for a breathtaking panoramic view across the Wallis Lake area.

32 & 33 - Refer Great Lakes map (E3)
0.5km south of Bungwahl, along The Lakes Way, turn left into Seal Rocks Road and then left into Horse Point Road. Bird along the road and trails adjacent to **(32) Smiths Lake**. Opposite Horse Point Road is **Neranie Picnic and Camping** areas on the **Myall Lake** with the village of **(33) Seal Rocks** (T,C) 10.0km further east.
