

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade would like to remind you that the 2018 Bush Fire Danger Period is

Coming.

Are you Ready Or Not?

In fact, it is already here!

Fires throughout the State have already told us that, and so has the Bureau of Meteorology.

As from 1st September, 2018 you will need a free Fire Permit from the NSW Rural Fire Service before you are legally permitted to do any burning. It doesn't matter how large or how small that pile is -a burning pile is a burning pile.

Strict enforceable rules come with this free permit and they will be explained to you when the permit is issued, and also printed on the permit. One of the main rules is to give at least 24 hours' notice to the RFS and to all your neighbours. It is not rocket science, it is just common sense and downright neighbourly.

Don't forget, our Mid Coast District Office now has a single point of contact phone number for things such as Fire Permits.

Getting ready for a bush fire is easier than you think, and to show you what we mean, we are holding a Get Ready Open Day at our Fire Station on Saturday 8th September, 2018 from 10am to 3pm.

We are a **community**-based **Volunteer Rural Fire Brigade**. Our number one priority is the community and their safety. Considerable thought and planning has gone into this Open Day and we would dearly love to have you and your family join us. It won't all be



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serious. There will be giveaways for everyone. Fun fire helmets for the children, and for those whose childhood is a distant memory, there will be information and help with preparing your Bush Fire Survival Plan.

Oh, there will also be a **free sausage sizzle on the go from around 11am to 2pm**. That's for everyone, no-matter your age. Bring your family. Bring your friends.

Having a Bush Fire Survival Plan, and practicing it, is not a sissy idea. It's rather an attempt to protect your family in the event of having to evacuate your property or vehicle in an emergency. Things to consider would include escape routes if you live in a dead-end road; is your vehicle always ready to go? What needs to be in your "grab bag" – personal items, medications and prescriptions, photos, important papers. Don't forget to keep your phone charged up and to take it, and the charger, when you leave.

We have "upped" our preparation for this fire season, with members attending Permit Issuing Officer workshops, Asbestos Awareness workshops and a Rural Fire Driver Course. At our Open Day we may be able to help you "up" yours.

Knowledge is power (so they say). We will be happy to talk to you about all these things so come down to the Minimbah Fire Station on Saturday 8th, and get yourself some more of that knowledge – Free of charge. In these cooler months please take the opportunity to clean out your gutters, shift the rubbish from around buildings, slash the paddocks, especially close to the assets you need to protect. *Handy Hint:* Don't park your vehicle in long grass. The extremely hot exhaust can set everything alight as soon as your back is turned.







Local History - *The Wallamba* – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" 1930, *by Bob Mann*

NABIAC - MARCH, 1930: Mr and Mrs *Maurice Schneider*, who have taken up residence at Bunyah, were entertained by a large circle of friends at the residence of Mr *Fred Schneider* of Firefly Creek on Thursday 20^{th} ult.

FUNERAL: The funeral of Mr *Hugh McKinnon* of Glenora, Wallamba River, will leave Taree this morning the 8th March, catching the ferry at 10:30am for internment in the Failford cemetery.

NABIAC SHOW - BIG ENTRIES, FINE WEATHER: Fine weather favoured the recent Nabiac Show. The attendance on the opening day was not large, but that never is the case, the majority of people waiting for the second and bigger day. Mr A.E. Carey, Secretary, informs us that the number of entries was above the average. For the ring events there were large entries and competition was sure to be keen on the second day. There was a big showing of beef cattle, some of the animals being exceptionally fine. A pen of cows was considered by a butcher being too fat for commercial use. Mr F. Schneider was very successful in this section carrying off most of the prizes. Jerseys and Illawarras chiefly composed the entries in the milking classes. Pigs were fairly well represented. Poultry was only poorly competed for, but for some years this section has not been a strong one. Farm produce was an improvement on that of the preceding show but there is room for improvement before justice will be done to the rich agricultural soil of the Wallamba River District. The absence of Joe Paterson and other well known Wallamba ring horsemen, who were competing at the Maitland Show, made a difference, but nevertheless competition was keen. The various officials carried out their work with the usual attentiveness. Mr J.A. Campbell had his school duties to attend to but on the Friday (public holiday) the President devoted the whole of his time and energy to the work of the show and meeting visitors. Vice Presidents, J.W Breckenridge and J.W. Startin were also very busy. Mr F. Hosking, in the absence of Mr Dane, attended the treasurers work and in this he was assisted by a number of Nabiac Bank officials. Mr A.E. Carey carried out the duties of Secretary in his usual capable manner. To him the "Times" newspaper wishes to convey thanks for the assistance he gave in gathering the material for our report of the show. Mr Clydne Magennis assisted the Secretary very materially in attending to the recording of awards and issuing of



award tickets in the cattle section, which was a great help to the secretary. The work was carried out in the cattle shed where the judge and stewards were working. The idea is one which all societies could emulate with profit. The rights on the ground were as under:-

Publicans Booth - F. Walden; Fruit and Cordial stall - Mr Andy Foster; Ice-cream and Fruit Salad - Mrs Small; Oysters - Mr L. Ralston. The ladies connected to the Methodist Church had charge of the luncheon room and provided an excellent meal which was served with that promptness so much appreciated by show visitors. Mrs R. Croker was in charge of this with Miss Jean McKinnon as secretary.

BULBY BRUSH PUBLIC SCHOOL - MARCH, 1930: The Hon. *Walter Bennett*, Minister for Gloucester, has received the following communication from Mr *Smith*, the Director of Education:-

Dear Sir, Representation has been made to the Department by Mr J. Sambell, Hon. Secretary Bulby Brush Parents & Citizens Association, relative to the need for the erection of a teachers residence at that centre. In reply thereto, I desire to inform you that the need for a residence at Bulby Brush, has been noted on the building programme, but in view of the heavy demands on the funds available, I regret to advise you that it is not possible to set apart money for this work at the present time.

WANG WAUK - APRIL, 1930: "The Glen Ken" tennis players journeyed to Coolongolook on Saturday 12^{th} April and all enjoyed a very pleasant afternoon. The "Glen Ken" players won by one game. Master *Walter Holden* had the misfortune to have his arm broken last week when he was thrown from a horse and is under treatment by a Nabiac doctor.

The direction boards which have been lately placed at Flaggy Crossing will be a great boon to strangers travelling on these roads.

Nabiac Library History 25th Anniversary

I ho would believe that Nabiac Library has been in its current location for 25 years?

Nabiac Library quietly celebrated its 25th Anniversary on Saturday 4th August, 2018 at its current location in the Showground building. It was only by chance that an astute observer in the Library that day noticed the plaque in the library, stating that it was officially opened by *Mayor Sandra Machin* on the 4th August, 1993. Library volunteers quickly went and purchased a banner and cake to share with our regular Saturday morning clients to celebrate the day.


However, this is not the full story of Nabiac Library. For many years Nabiac Library operated as a Community Library out of the Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre. In 1988 the library declined an offer to join the newly formed Great Lakes Library Service. However, in 1991 talks were held between the Great Lakes Shire's Chief Librarian, Andrew Braybrook, and the Nabiac Library Committee and it was agreed Nabiac would became the 5th branch of the Great Lakes Library Service; thus offering a greater range of books and services. At this stage Nabiac Library was still operating out of the Neighbourhood Centre. Many of you would remember this.

However, in March 1993 a decision was made to move from the Neighbourhood Centre to the old "Supper Room" at the Showground. Previously this building had operated as the kitchen/supper room for the Showground Hall. We still have many local residents that can relate tales about how this 'heritage building' operated as the Showground Kitchen. Poor old building was deemed no longer suitable as a kitchen supper room and a new addition was added to the hall; this being the current kitchen and supper room we have today; albeit with many additional upgrades of these facilities over time.

A letter to the Nabiac Neighbourhood Centre dated 19th March, 1993 indicated that Council was aware of the steady population growth of the Wallamba district and had achieved capital works funding to assist with upgrading public library facilities in Nabiac by modifying the Supper Room to become the new library premises; thus increasing the library space by 100 square metres. This included rewiring of the building, repainting and remodelling (including the removal of the old coppers! That's a story in itself!); installing carpets, shelving, furniture and signage and making the straightening



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the access road. WOW! WHAT AN ASSET!

It then opened with great fanfare on Wednesday 4th August 1993 with Mayor Cr Sandra Machin performing the ceremony. Other speakers included Andrew Braybrook - Chief Librarian Great Lakes Library Service, Member for Myall Lakes - Mr John Turner, Ms Jeanette Wright - Director of Public Libraries State Library of NSW and, Mr Don Miller - Principal Nabiac Public School, along with the students who gave a performance!

No wonder we all love Nabiac Library! It has a long history; it is an integral part of Nabiac's community history and is housed in an historic Showground building! Even better, it has not lost its community spirit!

What's happening now at Nabiac Library?


Memorial Park

Sinonia September Concerts

Great news! Sinfonia MNC is giving a series of concerts in September. These concerts fulfil one of our stated aims, to bring orchestral music to our community's cultural life. They somewhat replace our usual June concerts – but not quite. We were not absent from the music scene in June – we were heavily involved in the Manning Winter Festival – both as a complete orchestra, accompanied by Kantabile and Company of Voices, and also through individual members' performances.

We will be presenting a *Classical Collection* – many of our audience's old favourites. One new piece is Paul Hindemith's 1922 German Christmas musical play, *Tuttifäntchen*. Tuttifant is a wood carver who makes a puppet (a Kasper – a Punch like puppet) which comes to life. Akin to the *Nutcracker Suite*, the music describes the many fantastic adventures which befall the puppet and Tuttifant's daughter and her eventual heroic rescue by Tuttifant's apprentice. We will hear such movements as *Musik zum Kaspertheater* (music for a puppet show) and *Tanz der Holzuppen* (dance of the wooden puppets).

Contrasting to this highly adventurous piece we will hear Johann Sebastien Bach's 1712 *Sheep May Safely Graze*, from *Cantata No 208*, orchestrated by Clark McAllister. This was originally written to celebrate a birthday and was not published until after Bach's death. Everybody's favourite.

Another fantastic piece *Night on the Bare Mountain*, also known as *Night on Bald Mountain*, by Modest Mussorgsky will bring us out of our pleasant reveries. It is based on the Russian legend of the witches' Sabbath which was said to occur on St John's Eve (23rd June). Mussorgsky completed this work on 1867 St John's Eve in 1867. This abridged version was arranged by Gareth Glyn. And of course Walt Disney "borrowed" the work for *Fantasia*.

We are not off the mountain yet, as the next piece will be Edvard Greig's 1875 work, *In the Hall of the Mountain King*, also arranged by Gareth Glyn. This piece musically describes the fury of the mountain king, a Norwegian folk tale troll, because a human – *Peer Gynt* - has seduced his daughter.

The second half of the programme will be much less dramatic, though no less interesting, commencing with the beautiful *Adagio in G Minor* by Remo Giazotti/Tomaso Albinoni, arranged by Alan Arnold. This highly controversial, much loved piece, may well have nothing of Albinoni in it at all, but Giazotti claims he completed Albinoni's 1708 work in 1958. Whatever the truth, it is a much loved piece.

Almost as controversial as to the possible musical references to his friends are Edward Elgar's *Enigma Variations*, composed between 1898 and 1899, arranged by Iain Farrington. All the concert's arrangements by Gareth Glyn, Alan Arnold and Ian Farrington have featured in the latest *London Proms*.

What *Classical Collection* would be complete without something *From a New World*? We will play a piece from Antonín Dvořák 1893



Symphony No 9. We are in good company, Neil Armstrong took a copy with him for the 1969 moon landing. Back to Europe and Georges Bizet's 1867 comic opera *Carmen*, which shocked and scandalised the Parisians. We will hear the music for Escamillo's *Toreador Song*, where he proclaims love awaits him and Carmen's *Habanera*, where she tells of love's capriciousness. Aha! Poor José and poor Micaëla. These pieces were arranged by Gareth Glyn and Andrew J. Smith.

After all this excitement we will end with simple musical passion, an abridged version of Johann Sebastien Bach's pre 1708 *Toccata and Fugue in D Minor*, orchestrated by Clark McAllister. A suitable ending for an exciting afternoon.

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
CELEBRATING THREE "NOUGHTIES" IN 2018

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
I saw a client recently who has reading glasses to help with her reading difficulties. She has a problem with the white on the page, which makes it difficult for her to read without severe discomfort. Her words also appear to move, and they fade away after going blurry. When

f

the words go blurry, if she blinks her eyes, the blurriness is cleared for a few seconds, and then unfortunately, the blurriness recurs.

This is a very basic way of investigating if you or someone you know has Irlen Syndrome, which is a visual processing dysfunction. If you experience words going blurry when reading, but this goes away if you blink, then it is more likely to be a visual processing problem than an optometric problem. If your words go blurry as a result of an eye problem, all the blinking in the world will not make it go away. If however, blinking makes the blurriness go away, even though it might be fleeting, it is a very strong indicator that your problem is not optometric, but rather is a visual processing (Irlen Syndrome) problem. This client today, looked through the Irlen lenses and she took them away from her eyes, looked at them and then put them back to her eyes and asked me if they were magnifying lenses. She said that the Irlen lenses made the words LARGER than her reading glasses! My answer was NO.. but if the words look bigger through them, it indicates that without them, when looking at white paper, the words are actually SHRINKING on the page. This happens because the white on the page becomes the dominant thing in the person's mind, and seems to "swallow up" the words, a bit like the bubbles in a bubble bath make the face washer appear smaller as it floats on the surface of the bathwater.

HUNTER PRODUCERS RISING TO THE CHALLENGE

Hunter Local Land Services wants to pay tribute to the local farming community as the region heads into a second spring severely affected by drought. Drought now affects 100 per cent of New South Wales and in the Upper Hunter Valley in particular the conditions have been very difficult for in excess of 18 months.

Upper Hunter District Vet Jane Bennett said the longevity of this drought has led to many having to make tough decisions.

"The Hunter is traditionally considered a safe region but unfortunately the ongoing dry conditions have led to the worst drought in living memory, forcing many people to have to sell nearly everything, including core breeding stock," said Dr Bennett.

"I want to give credit local producers for the huge effort they have put into maintaining their stock, and the majority of cattle coming through the sale yards locally are in remarkably good health considering the season.

"Given the challenges in sourcing quality feed and the cold, harsh winter we have just faced the fact so many producers are still turning off quality cattle is a sign of how robust local farmers are."

The Hunter Local Land Services team is assisting landholders to make important decisions regarding animal health and nutrition, as feed is becoming increasingly scarce.

"A lot of people who were trying to hold onto stock are now choosing to destock further, often cutting into their core breeding herd or fully destocking and we know this is an incredibly difficult time," said Dr Bennett.

"With many animals now calving and the cows requiring additional nutrition to feed offspring, it is more important than ever to be making those tough decisions early.

"As with last spring we will be advocating for producers maintaining breeding stock to wean early where possible, as it seems we are facing an uncertain forecast in the near future."

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
While the majority of the cattle have been in excellent condition, Hunter Local Land Services have been assisting the RSPCA with some welfare cases in our region. We understand no producers deliberately let stock condition slip away and the high cost and lack of available feed such as hay and silage has led to some difficult situations.

Many producers in the Lower Hunter and Manning Great Lakes are now also implementing their drought plans as the seasonal conditions have again deteriorated during winter.

Hunter Local Land Services district vet team and agricultural extension officers are available to discuss your herd's health and nutrition needs one on one. Regional Livestock Officer Kirstin Bisley is also being supported by independent beef industry expert Bill Hoffman who is available to discuss individual producers situations in light of the ongoing drought. The Upper Hunter team will be holding another round of 'drought drop in sessions' in coming weeks for producers wanting to discuss their weaning and feeding plans for spring. More information about times, dates and locations will be released soon.
