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Honour their Spirit

Remembrance Day has a special significance in 2018.

Sunday, 11th November, 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of the Armistice which ended the First World War (1914–18).

One hundred years ago, on 11th November, 1918, the guns of the Western Front fell silent after four years of continuous warfare. With their armies retreating and close to collapse, German leaders signed an Armistice, bringing to an end the First World War.

From the summer of 1918, the five divisions of the Australian Corps had been at the forefront of the allied advance to victory. Beginning with their stunning success at the battle of Hamel in July, they helped to turn the tide of the war at Amiens in August, followed by the capture of Mont St Quentin and Pèronne, and the breaching of German defences at the Hindenburg Line in September. By early October the exhausted Australians were withdrawn from battle. They had achieved a fighting reputation out of proportion to their numbers, but victory had come at a heavy cost. They suffered almost **48,000** casualties during 1918, including more than **12,000** dead.

In the four years of the war more than 330,000 Australians had served overseas, and more than **60,000** of them had died. The social effects of these losses cast a long shadow over the postwar decades.

On the first anniversary of the armistice, in 1919, one minute's silence was instituted as part of the main commemorative ceremony. After the end of World War II in 1945, the Australian and British governments changed the name to **Remembrance Day** as an appropriate title for a day which would commemorate all war dead.

Each year on this day Australians observe one minute's silence at 11am, in memory of those who died or suffered in all wars and armed conflicts.

Symbols

Red poppies are worn on blazers, shirts, jumpers and other items of clothing on Remembrance Day to remember those who died during a war. Poppies were among the first plants that came from the battlefields of northern France and Belgium during World War I. Some people believed the popular myth that poppies were rich in their redness because they blossomed from grounds that were saturated with soldiers' blood.

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Local History - The Wallamba — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Northern Champion" 1931 by Bob Mann

OBITUARY: JULY, 1931: The Bunyah district lost a worthy resident on Tuesday last in the person of Mr *Hugh Murray*. Deceased became ill on Tuesday of the last week and was admitted to the Mayo Hospital, Taree and on the following Thursday, despite careful attention he breathed his last at 6:30pm on Tuesday. The late Mr Murray as the son of the late Mr and Mrs John Murray of Bunyah. He was born at Kimbriki 60 years ago and as a child he moved to Bunyah with his parents. In his early life he operated as a teamster in the Coolongolook district but later he selected land adjoining his father's property and remained there for the rest of his life. He engaged in dairying and grazing and was a cattle breeder of some note. The late Mr Murray was of a quiet disposition and although he was not actively associated with public life many district movements had his ready cooperation. He was kind and sympathetic by nature and leaves a wide circle of friends on the Wallamba. He was married to Miss Arnold, daughter of the late Mr and Mrs Chas. Arnold of Queensland and formerly of Bunyah. In addition to his widow he is survived by the following children. Messrs Hugh (Browns Creek), John, James and George, at home. Misses Jean, Eileen and Isabel also at home. Surviving brothers and sisters are Messrs Jas Murray (Bunyah), A.B. Murray (Tipperary), J.A. Murray (Bunyah), Samuel and George Murray (Bunyah), Mrs T. Newell (Upper Myall) and Mrs R. Paterson snr. (Bunyah), Mrs J. Willis (Bunyah) and Miss Nellie Murray

The funeral moved from S.W. Bridges at 1pm on Wednesday for the Krambach cemetery where the remains were interred in the presence of a large and representative gathering which exemplified the high esteem and respect in which the deceased and his family are held. An impressive gravesite service was conducted by the Rev. *N. Macleod* assisted by the Rev. *S.P. Stewart*.

NABIAC, NOVEMBER, 1931: The weather during last week was about ideal, showery conditions prevailing for most of the time and although

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more rain would have been generally excepted, we heard one man complaining and hoping the weather would soon pick up. We are wondering how such an individual will get on in heaven if he ever gets there. On Sunday night we experienced a very heavy thunder storm, the sky being continuously lit up by flashes of lightening. Locally the rain was not very heavy, but following the rain of the previous week, would do a great amount of good. Already the pastures are responding to the showers and if similar conditions prevail for a week or two "cows" should be in clover.

Snakes are rather numerous this year and we hear quite a lot of snake yarns, some of the snakes being killed being of enormous size. In fact one wonders if they are black snakes or boa constrictors. The tale is told, and your correspondent can vouch for the truth of the story, of a local resident who was harrowing and feeling a pull on hi trousers looked down to see a black snake with his fangs fastened on the leg of his trousers and unable to free itself. The chap shook his trousers off and when pulling them over his boots they turned inside out with the snake inside, but a gibber of some kind was soon procured and the snake dispatched while still in his pants. He was in an unfortunate positon as he did not like pulling on his trousers after the snake had been killed in them, so it was necessary for him to walk home minus the nether garment in order to get another.

Nabiac: The cream supply at the local butter factory has increased considerably, but generally speaking the increase is due to the new cows coming in rather than to good pasturage.

On Saturday a working bee was held at the local cemetery when quite a number turned up to help make a neater appearance of Gods acre and a great deal of credit is due to Mr *J.H. Dunn*, who organized the working bee.

Mr *Arthur Barber*. of Firefly, is a patient in the Mayo Hospital. He just underwent an operation and is making good progress towards recovery.

We are pleased to hear that the mill at Failford is at work again after installing a new boiler. Whilst waiting for the sawmill it reminds me that I saw some very fine cedar logs on their way to the Failford mill so if any one is in need of some of this classy timber, now is the time to get it.



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Permaculture in your Garden

W ell it's that time of year again, long hot days are just around the corner and this means our gardens need to be well protected and this means making sure that they are well mulched!

Mulch is vital for the health of your plants and soil and here is why:

- 1. Mulch protects your soil A layer of mulch protects the top layer of your soil from the harsh suns rays drying it out which can sterilise it leaving it useless for your plants.
- 2. Mulch regulates soil temperature This stops your plants from stressing out and ensures healthy, stable growth in roots and leaf, fruit and flowers.
- 3. Mulch adds organic matter As your mulch breaks down over the season it adds carbon to your soil helping to improve soil structure and feed your microorganisms. This will only help in your crops for next season!
- 4. Suppresses weeds This means less work for you and all the available nutrients go towards the plants you actually want to grow and not towards your weeds.
- 5. Finally, it saves water! In our dry climate this is so important! It stops water evaporating in the harsh summer sun which dries out the soil and stresses your plants. It also means that if you're unable to water your garden one day they are more likely to survive without you!



So now you know why you should use mulch the question remains WHAT mulch you should you use?


Mulch should always be a form of carbon material (dry and brown stuff). You can use hay, dried (seedless) grass clippings, wood chips, dried leaves or anything suitable you have lying around but the general the rule is, that the bigger and thicker the mulch is, the longer it will take to break down. Finer mulches, such as sugar cane mulch, are perfect for your annual vegie patch while wood chip mulches are better used around established perennial plants as they can last for years. Hay and grass clippings encourage bacteria while wood chip encourages our fungi friends which aid in healthy root development and prevention of disease in bigger plants.

There are some things to remember when mulching however:

- 1. Make sure your mulches are well aged or well "dried" and your soil healthy and fed before adding the mulch and;
- 2. Add enough mulch to completely cover your area but don't go too crazy as some mulches can create a barrier that, when too thick, doesn't let water through.
- 3. Don't wait! Make sure your garden is always mulched. It's such a satisfying job and has such great results so get out there and get mulching today!

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




n update from the Village Futures Group (VFG). Some may not be aware that this small group with the interests of the village at heart, is responsible for several changes that have occurred recently. The stop signs at the Dibb Street / Highway intersection has had a long gestation. Discussions began with RMS and Council some two years ago on this project following several accidents, and it is pleasing to see some results. Likewise our efforts for new ripple strips at the Failford Road and Highway intersection to replace the worn out strips had also been some time coming.

The VFG meet at the Neighbourhood Centre the $1^{\rm st}$ Wednesday of the month at 7.30 pm.

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

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

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
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NEWS FROM BUNYAH

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The History of the Poem always recited on Remembrance Day

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

The poem was written by a Canadian Medical Corps doctor, Major **John McCrae**, who was serving with a Field Artillery Brigade in Ypres.

The death of one of his friends in May 1915, buried in the cemetery outside his dressing station, affected him severely and he wrote his poem as a way of expressing his anguish at the loss.

He was dissatisfied with the poem when he finished it and threw it away, but one of his fellow officers retrieved it and was so moved that he sent it to the media in London, where it was published by Punch on 8 December 1915. Its simple but evocative encapsulation of the horror of the trenches has made it the most famous of the war poems.

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Lyn's Larder

BEEF, RICOTTA & SPINACH PIE.

Thought that with the warmer weather this easy serve meal can be done early and is a light meal served with salad. As spinach is also in season, a good time to make it and the recipe is for a slow cooker, if you have one, or could easily be adapted for the oven

INGREDIENTS

500g Fresh ricotta

½ cup Milk

1/4 cup Finely grated parmesan cheese

10 grates of Whole nutmeg (or a very small pinch)

6 cups Cooked Italian Bolognese chilled (recipe in next column)

4 sheets Large instant dried lasagna 2 cups Shredded mozzarella 50g Baby spinach leaves Salt & pepper to season Basil leaves to garnish

METHOD

- Combine ricotta, milk, parmesan and nutmeg in a large bowl and season
- Spoon 1/3 of the Bolognese into the bowl of a 5L slow cooker (or a similar sized baking dish) spreading to cover the base.
- Top with 1/3 of the ricotta mixture, spreading to cover Bolognese. Scatter over ½ cup of the mozzarella
- Using 2 lasagna sheets, cover mozzarella layer with a single layer of lasagna sheets, broken to size if necessary to fit snugly to the sides of the bowl/dish
- 5. Top with ½ the spinach
- 6. Repeat steps 2-5 to make another layer, then finish layering with remaining 1/3 of the Bolognese, remaining 1/3 of the ricotta mixture and remaining 1 cup of the mozzarella. Place the bowl in the appliance, put the lid on and cook on low setting for 4 hours.
- Remove bowl from appliance, remove lid and set aside for 15 minutes to let the juices settle
- Serve garnished with basil and freshly ground black pepper

If you are using a normal oven, cover the dish with foil or if it has a lid, use that and cook for 40 minutes at 190°, removing the foil or lid for the last 5 minutes to finish melting the cheese.

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ITALIAN BOLOGNESE

INGREDIENTS

2 tbsp. Extra virgin olive oil

600g Beef mince
600g Pork mince
1 cup Red wine
½ cup Tomato paste
250ml Chicken stock

Brown onion, finely chopped

2 cloves Garlic, minced

2 sticks Celery, finely chopped

Carrot, diced into 1cm cubes

400g can Chopped tomatoes 1tbsp Brown sugar 6 Basil leaves

1 Fresh Bay leaf

Salt & Pepper to season

Rind of parmesan wedge (on the season)

1 Rind of parmesan wedge (on the edge of packet cheese or see if a deli would cut you a bit.) Not compulsory

METHOD

- Heat oil in a large frying pan over a high heat. Add all mince and cook, stirring every 2 minutes for 8 minutes or until mince is no longer red. Stir in wine and tomato paste, bring to the boil. Cook for 5 minutes or until the wine is reduced by half.
- Stir in everything else, cover and cook on low heat for about 40 minutes.

If you want to use your slow cooker, after the wine has reduced by half, transfer the frying pan mixture and the rest of the ingredients into a 5L slow cooker bowl, cover and cook for 9 hours on slow setting.

The same rules would apply as do when the pace car is out -aset speed and no passing. Does another death have to happen before something like this is considered a little more than "possibly useful"
