

Hair is made up mostly of keratin, the same protein animals' horns, hooves, claws, feathers, and beaks are made of. When wet, a healthy strand of hair can stretch an additional 30% of its original length.

All hair is dead, with the exception of the hair that's still inside the epidermis of your scalp. Hair contains information about everything that has ever been in your bloodstream, including drugs, and is one of the most commonly used types of forensic evidence.. The only thing about you that can't be identified by your hair is your gender - men's hair and women's hair are identical in structure.

Black is the most common hair colour. Red is the rarest and only exists in about 1 percent of the world's population, with blonde hair found in 2 percent.

As soon as a hair is plucked from its follicle, a new one begins to grow.

Hair is 50% carbon, 21% oxygen, 17% nitrogen, 6% hydrogen, and 5% sulphur.

Hair can grow anywhere on the human body with the exception of the palms of hands, soles of feet, eyelids, lips, and mucous membranes. Goosebumps from cold or fear are the result of hair follicles contracting, causing the hair and surrounding skin to bunch up. The average number of hair strands varies by natural colour, with blondes having the most and redheads having the fewest.

Local History - The Wallamba — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" 1933 by Bob Mann

SERIOUS ACCIDENT AT NABIAC SHOW: MARCH, 1933: An accident of a very painful nature and one which might have been easily one with much more serious results occurred at the Nabiac Show on Friday afternoon during the progress of the wood chopping event Amongst the spectators were Mr McGibbon (dairy inspector) and Mr Dalgleish -Senior Instructor in Dairying. One of the cutters who had his back to these gentlemen aimed a mighty blow to sever the log, but there was little thickness to cut through and the axe, after passing through, slipped out of the cutters hands between his legs and went hurtling towards the audience amongst whom were many children and women. Mr McGibbon very pluckily put out his hand in an endeavour to deflect the flight of the axe, but he had the misfortune to sustain an awful gash from near the wrist almost to the elbow. With the aid of the amplifying machine, medical attention was promptly forthcoming and a large number of stitches had to be inserted in the wound. Later in the afternoon Mr Dalgleish took Mr McGibbon to his home at Kempsey where he will be for some time before he is able to resume his duties. The painful experience of Mr McGibbon should prove a warning to the public to keep a safe distance from the cutters in the contests for what happened at Nabiac can easily happen again. It is said that had Mr McGibbon not done what he did when he did the axe would have struck a number of women and children who would not have had time to escape.

NABIAC SHOW SPECIAL SHOW AWARDS: At the recent Nabiac show the winner of the Angus & Coote silver cup trophy for the most points trophy in the cooking and fancy work and jam section was won by Mrs J.W. Startin. The winners of the Messrs. Arthur Yates & Co medal for most points in the vegetables went to Mr Fred Pelley of Failford. The Australian Fertiliser Ltd. special of 3cwt of superphosphate for most points in farm produce section was won by Mr F.T. Cox of Kimbriki and 2nd prize of 2cwt of superphosphate by Mr F. Pelley of Failford. Mr Horace Basham (Avalon) won Mr Dave Hancock's tea set special. Mr Arthur Everingham was head hall steward and it was due to him that the hall was opened so early to the public. Constable Davey of Nabiac took great interest in every way possible night and day. His efforts were greatly appreciated and the smooth running of the exhibition was in a large measure due to his assistance. Mr Joe Woodward made a great success of the wood chopping events. They were successful financially and next year the events in that direction will probably be extended. He was ably assisted by Mr Ernie Woodward and Messrs. H Deer (Bunyah) and William Easton (Belbora) did great work in the matter of securing cattle. Mr C.H. Cook informs us that Mr C.H. Peel of Taree has measured the ribbon used in the length of ribbon guessing competition at the Nabiac Show and certifies that the length is 9ft 61/4 inches. Mr Jim Woodward gave

the free use of his lorry to help the show. He drew a lot of gravel (?) the logs for the woodchop and also promised to renovate the ring with a view to holding trotting evets next year. KRAMBACH SCHOOL OF ARTS - MAY, 1938: The Public meeting convened by Mr Edwin Wright to discuss the closing of the School of Arts was well attended and many new members were enrolled. The selection of the committee followed and many of the new members now fill the vacancies of the old committee. They are already on the way with some alterations and improvements to help the public running dance socials.

A great shock was cast over the district in our midst when the sad news came to hand of the death of Mrs W.P. Easton and to make arrangements for the digging of the grave. For many years, with her husband and family, she lived at Belbora, and there was no other person more highly respected than the late Mrs Easton. She commanded the very highest respect. This was clear in the large number of relatives and friends who paid their respects to her at the gravesite in the Presbyterian Cemetery. It was one of the largest funerals seen in the district for many years. To Mr Easton and family we extend our deepest sympathy also to members of the Andrews family in their sad loss.

Nabiac Landcare

Most of the Nabiac Landcare group is currently doing follow up at the small reserve on the corner of Nabiac and Hoskin Streets. We first attacked a major privet infestation on this block five years ago and did follow two years ago. Over all we're quite pleased with the way this small patch of dry bush is regenerating but we were surprised to find some 'new' weeds. In particular, blue potato vine (Solanium seaforthianum) also known as Brazilian Nightshade and the ferny climbing asparagus. These are considered environmental weeds with the potential to become invasive. It is highly likely that they have been brought into the bush from local gardens, both have juicy red berries and are highly attractive to birds. It is possible that they are toxic to children and pets. If you have them in your garden it is recommended that you remove them.

The dry cold weather has slowed weed growth but the dry soil makes it harder to pull weeds. The roots of woody weeds and perennials will often survive and re-shoot if broken off below soil level. Remember if you are using poisons to control weeds, the weed needs to be actively growing and not stressed for the poison to be most effective.

Enjoy your local bush. Go for a walk, take the dog or the grandkids or spend some quiet time on your own. If you want to do more—join us.

Nabiac Landcare work each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by morning tea at the picnic tables at Bullock Wharf. 



We hear about it on the television, and on the radio, so now you are reading about it here. Yes, the smoke that has been hanging around for the past couple of weeks is from hazard reduction burns being carried out by the Rural Fire Service (RFS) and other emergency service agencies. The weather has been perfect for the actual burns, but the lack of wind has left the smoke with us, which can be an issue for

infants, the elderly and those people who have breathing difficulties. It seems that most things that are designed to help us, such as burning off to prevent or minimize bush fires, can also have an unpleasant side effect. Over the past month our Brigade was invited to help with a hazard reduction (HR) burn near Tea Gardens, and as this is being written, we have a crew involved with an HR burn at Possum Brush.

If you are planning on making the most of these ideal conditions to reduce the fire fuel on your property by burning off, may we remind you of some standard burning regulations.

- Prepare well, making sure you clear around the area to be burnt.
- At least 24 hours' notice is required to your neighbours, whether separated by a road, fence or river, and the Mid Coast District Fire Control Centre.
 The number to call is 1300 Mid Coast. That's 1300 643 262.
- Ensure you have sufficient personnel and equipment to contain the fire to your property.

Prior to lighting up, we encourage you to make a quick call to 1300 Mid Coast to check that forecast conditions are still favourable. The Bureau of Meteorology /MetEye webpage is a handy and valuable tool. It shows the wind direction and speed, plus other weather factors such as humidity and predicted rain. Check it out

www.bom.gov.au/australia/meteye

You may have seen our fire truck out and about lately, but not with lights and sirens on. We have been taking advantage of some quiet time to meet with new residents, and familiarize ourselves with fire trails, locked gates etc. to ensure we know where we can safely and speedily access properties in case of fire. While a GPS is wonderful, it won't tell us where a gate has been locked, a new home has been built, or a gully recently washed out. You really can't beat local knowledge.







ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATION

Some may have witnessed that the electric vehicle fast charging station opposite the community centre is up and running.

This is a state wide program by the NRMA who are installing 40 such stations at selected areas throughout NSW and the ACT at a cost of some \$10m. The one in our village was an initiative by the Village Futures Group (VFG) some eighteen months ago when the NRMA showed interest in locating these in key areas from major cities, and is the first on the Mid North Coast.

There are probably no such vehicles in Nabiac. This was not the intention. The tech guy at the opening on Monday last (3rd), had driven from Homebush to Forster and then to Nabiac in a new basic Hyundai and had 20% range remaining. Fast charge here to 80% took about 40 minutes and he had plans of recharging at Tamworth. More expensive models have larger batteries and so longer range. Future battery development will no doubt extend this much further. Whatever way one looks at it, change is coming.



News from Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre Assoc. Inc.

The last week in May was National Volunteers
Week, celebrating the achievements of volunteers and thanking
them for their efforts. What better time then to look at the Neighbourhood Centre's 78 members and the various groups operating under the
Nabiac Neighbourhood Centre banner, all of whom are volunteers.

Nabiac Second Chance Opportunity Shop commenced in the mid '80s with its primary aim for most of that time being to raise money for the construction of Nabiac Swimming Pool. With the pool completed four or so years ago, the proceeds from the Op Shop now go into projects that benefit the local community. To date this year, the projects include security cameras for the pool, a desperately needed new horse for the local Riding for the Disabled and most recently helping Nabiac Team Penning with the purchase of new panels. The Op Shop is run by a team of about three dozen ladies and gents – too many to name here - who work 9.00am to noon on Mondays to Saturdays, receiving donations, sorting and pricing them and of course, selling them to the shoppers. The Shop is having its best year ever, thanks to the support of the public and the hard work of the volunteers. We think it is the best Op Shop going. Local member Stephen Bromhead called in at the start of the week with a Certificate of Appreciation for the Shop volunteers.

CTC@Nabiac is a community technology centre, providing computer and office services including weekly Seniors classes and printing, copying etc. every day. The hosts, *Sheila* and *Jillian* can be found in the **Tim Gething Room** in the Neighbourhood Centre on Tuesday mornings.

Nabiac Neighbourhood Landcare Group is a group of about 12 who turn out every Wednesday morning whatever the weather to work on a number of sites around Nabiac, including Lilly Pilly Bend and Bullocky Wharf. They regenerate the sites by removing weeds, planting new plants and generally improving the area. As President *Liz Rees* noted in her Annual Report, none of the group that gets down and dirty every Wednesday actually live in the village. Maybe it's *Leone Henry's* morning teas that keep them coming back but whatever the case, they're doing a fabulous job.

Nabiac Village Futures Group aims to oversee and implement the strategic plan for the village. The plan was first formulated in 2004 and has been updated three times since then. The plan is currently undergoing a minor revision. It is held up by Council as the model for strategic plans and groups managing them. The plan is important for a number of reasons, none the least being if something is not identified in the plan as being a priority for the village, there is little chance of receiving any State or Federal Government assistance through grant schemes.

Aub Ferris Redevelopment comprises a small group of people who aim to redevelop the Aub Ferris Sports Fields behind the Showground.





The substantial funds required are being raised through weekly raffles at the Nabiac Hotel and were recently boosted by a grant from the NSW Government.

Nabiac Farmers Market commenced in 2003, an initiative of *Helen Smith*, to enable locally grown produce and locally made foods and crafts, under the ethos *Hand Grown*, *Hand Baked*, *Hand Made*, to be available for sale each month throughout the year. The Market, 8am - 12noon on the last Saturday of the month (except December) at Nabiac Showground, has since grown significantly in the number of stalls and customers (the community and visitors) to need a large band of 20 volunteers, rotating through the year, to setup and manage this popular event. The Committee meets once a month to assist coordination and administration. The volunteer run BBQ, using locally sourced meat, eggs and bread, helps raise funds for projects and organisations (e.g. Public Schools, Rural Fire Service and sporting groups) in the communities around Nabiac.

And lastly, the **Neighbourhood Centre Committee**, which is an elected group of nine members who meet every second month. This Committee has the responsibility to care for the Centre's buildings and land, to manage day to day affairs of the Association and to guide future development of the Centre.

What a great effort from all the people involved in all these groups and what a great contribution to our village and area.

use it for a fee. I wonder who will be the first person to charge their vehicle? Perhaps a local person, perhaps a visiting traveler.

An application for funding for a Project called 'Active Nabiac' has been submitted through My Community Project.

Nabiac has a several facilities for sport and fitness. The <u>Showground Precinct</u> (including Aub Ferris fields) and the <u>Recreational Precinct</u> (which is the Oval and all the facilities from the Oval around to Memorial Park). As a community we need to participate in maintaining our facilities, working out how they could function better and to plan for additional facilities. The Aub Ferris Committee have recently been offered a grant for that area. We want to also seek funds for the Recreational Precinct.

We have called the application **Active Nabiac** and have identified 2 main actions needed to begin.

Firstly, repairs to the surface of the Nabiac Tennis Courts and secondly, funding for a consultant to plan for a pathway from Memorial Park, past the Tennis Courts, around the Oval and up to the Nabiac School corner. This would join Nabiac, Hoskins and Farnell Streets to the Clarkson Street pathway. There is also opportunity for the community to discuss how they would imagine this to be, including (but not limited to) exercise stations, gardens

and shade trees. Planning for this area is complex with existing infrastructure and facilities and drainage problems.

Nabiac people have a history of community volunteering to achieve the facilities they want. *Lionel Gilbert* wrote in the mid 1950's....
'On 30th November, 1886, an area adjacent to the school playground was notified as a "Recreation Reserve." However, the surveyor could not help noting: "low, wet land—tea trees and gum." The area was re-notified on 4th February, 1905. Behind Tonks's place an excavation still marks the source from which voluntary workers obtained filling material. The town tennis courts were built on the area, 1922.

We are hoping that Nabiac people will support this new application for funds. Have a look at the website and be prepared to vote for this application.

SWEDISH MEATBALLS

250g Very lean minced beef

125g Minced veal

1 Medium onion, grated and squeezed dry 1/3 cup Dry breadcrumbs soaked in 2 tbls skim milk

1/4 tsp Pepper

1/4 tsp Ground mace or nutmeg 3 tsp Unsalted margarine

1tsp Finely chopped thyme or 1/4tsp dried thyme

1 cup Low sodium beef stock

½ cup Skim milk with 1tbsp plain flour

3 tsps Low fat sour cream
3 tsp Low fat natural yoghurt
1 tbsp Finely chopped parsley

Non stick cooking spray

METHOD

- In a large bowl, combine the beef, veal, onion, breadcrumbs, pepper and half the mace; shape into 4 cm balls
- 2 Lightly coat a heavy 25cm frying pan with the cooking spray; add the margarine and heat for 30 seconds over a moderate heat. Add the meatballs and brown, turning frequently, for 10 minutes. Drain the fat from the pan. Add the thyme and the beef stock; cover and simmer for 5 minutes. Transfer the meatballs and any accumulated juices to a plate. Cover with foil
- 3 Add the milk-flour to the pan and cook, stirring often, until thickened, about 5 minutes. Blend in the sour cream, yoghurt and remaining mace.
- Return the meatballs and any accumulated juices to the pan. Spoon the sauce over the meat and heat through, about 2/4 minutes. Transfer to a warm serving bowl and sprinkle with parsley.
- 5 Serve with egg noodles, mashed potatoes or rice & greens. Tip. To dry grated onion, place between two paper towels and squeeze until liquid is absorbed.

You can use ordinary milk, yoghurt and beef stock. This recipe was suitable for people watching weight or with salt problems.






REAL KULTCHA

Permaculture in the Garden

Compost Tea!

Hi Everyone, June already! Because I've been writing about soil and its microbes I thought it would be a good time to delve into the topic of compost tea. What is it and how is it made.

The simplest definition of Compost Tea is a brewed, water extract of compost. If made right, it can not only fertilise your soil with directly available nutrients but also act as a soil conditioner and bio-stimulant for the microbes already living in your soil. You can make it three ways. Aerating, not-aerating and anaerobic methods. Anaerobic (no oxygen) teas have foods (such as sugars like molasses) added and no aeration. This makes the organisms multiply rapidly but if left too long, beneficial organisms such as aerobic fungi, protozoa and nematodes will be lost and replaced with anaerobic yeasts and bacteria. Notaerated compost teas are water and compost, with or without food added, however as the name suggests, still are not aerated. If a quality compost is not used in this method though the organisms are unlikely to be active (we want them active). I know it is commonplace in many gardens to soak weeds or manure in buckets however this method risks the spread of diseases and pathogens and if the tea is stirred high numbers of anaerobic bacteria are extracted.

Aerated Compost Tea (ACT) is the method I use and allows beneficial organisms to grow in high numbers and be active. As they become active they use up the oxygen available in the water hence why we

need to continue to oxygenate. The Bucket-Bubbler set up is perhaps the most basic. My set up at home is with a 60L flexi bucket and a simple fish pump. To make the tea half fill your bucket with water and aerate for 10-20 minutes before adding your compost. Add compost almost to the top of the bucket with enough space for bubbling but don't compact it. Add your other food sources but not too much otherwise the growth of the organisms will use the oxygen faster than the pump can replace it. Ideally it should be left for 2- 3 days but whee that is not possible just leave it for a minimum of 12 hours. When its ready let it sit for half an hour and scoop the tea off the top and put the solids back in the compost.

You can really play with your food sources such as kelp or other fish products, molasses (sugars which bacteria LOVE) and plants that act as food fertilise such as Comfrey which is a bio-dynamic accumulator meaning it has a deep root that is able to reach places and nutrients and minerals other plants are unable to access. I'll often add some fermented comfrey tea to my mix.
