### Sport Health

With our local sports clubs well underway during the winter months it is important to recognise that sport, along with a wide variety of exercise, is an effective way to keep in shape for most people, and a great start on the road to a healthy lifestyle. However, organised sports and individual activities can also sometimes have adverse effects in the form of injury.

Here are some tips for getting the most out of your fitness program or sport while preventing injury.

- Avoid dehydration and overheating Drink plenty of fluids. It is important to start activity well hydrated. Drink before and during your sporting activity. Continuing to drink after you have finished will ensure that weight lost through fluid depletion is replaced.
- Acclimatise to the conditions This helps to ensure your body is equipped to handle the conditions.
- Use sun protection If you are outdoors, always remember to use adequate sun protection, including wearing a hat and using sunscreen.
- Wear appropriate clothing There is no benefit to exercising when you are dehydrated or have hyperthermia. So always wear appropriate clothing, which should be light and permits your sweat to evaporate freely. Sweat only cools you when it evaporates off your body.
- Warming up, cooling down You can help to reduce the risk of a serious sporting injury by warming up before exercise and taking time to cool down after your activity. A warm up should consist of some gentle aerobic activity, such as cycling or jogging, to gradually warm your muscles. Stretching as part of your warm up helps to promote blood flow to your muscles, increasing flexibility and reducing the chance of getting a new injury or aggravating an old one. Remember to stretch only when you are warm. A gentle cool-down period means you will experience less muscle stiffness and soreness. It also helps to remove waste products from your muscles you have used during your activity, replacing them with nutrients and oxygen.
- Progress gradually Try not to overdo it when beginning a new activity, build on your fitness levels and set goals. Attempting to do too much, when your body is not conditioned for it, will also increase your risk of an overuse injury.

### Treating an Injury

While broken bones and severe sporting injuries such as concussions should be treated immediately by a medical professional, less serious sprains and strains can initially be helped by the RICED method. Using this method immediately can help to limit swelling, reducing pain and loss of function.

REST – no further exercise, stretching or quick movements

ICE – should be applied for at least 20 mins as soon as possible after the injury, then every four hours while you are awake, for the next 48 hours. Cold packs are ideal, we even have instant cold packs in store that you can keep in your sports bag. No need to be kept frozen!

**C**OMPRESS – use a firm crepe or elastic pressure bandage on the affected joint or limb.

**E**LEVATE – keep the injured arm or leg up.

**D**IAGNOSIS – if the injury turns out to be more than a minor strain, an accurate diagnosis is important, so that early and appropriate treatment can be obtained.

**Local History - The Wallamba** — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Northern Champion" 1934 - 1935 by Bob Mann

**QUALITY JERSEYS AT BULBY** - Northern Champion, 1934: Mr E.W. Milligan, of the Bulby Jersey Stud Farm, recently purchased three high quality Jersey cows and a Bull which is yet another addition to the fine lot of pure bred cattle which has been added to the Wallamba herds in recent years. The latest purchase was made in November at the disposal sale of Mrs J. P. White's Millabah Jersey Stud at Exeter.

KARKATT CALF SHOW - March 1935: The annual show of the Karkatt Calf Club was held on Saturday last and again proved to be a success. The exhibition was not as numerous as in the past although the quality was up to the previous show. Competition amongst the Jerseys was fair but there was no contest in the registered A.I.S. classes. Mr D.S. Redman, of Taree, judged the Jerseys and Mr D.A. Cowan, of Oxley Island, the A.I.S. The ladies conducted a refreshment stall and luncheon booth which added considerably to the financial success of the show. Officials were as follows:- President - Mr E. Monk; Secretary - Mr. F.A. Paff; Committee Members - Messres, A.H. Mullen, G. Parker, E. Abraham, C. Middlebrook, C. Holstein, E. Milligan and A. Simmonds.

Karkatt School - Additions to be Made: Mr C.E. Bennett, a Member for Gloucester, has received the following from the Minister for Education:- "I refer again to your personal representation on behalf of the Karkatt Parents and Citizens the Honory Secretary, which is Mr G. Parker, Firefly via Krambach, relative to the need for additions to the Karkatt Provisional School building and desire to inform you that this Department is prepared to proceed immediately with the building improvements contemplated without waiting for the property to be vested in the Department if the owners (viz) the Parents and Citizens Association, will give an understanding that such an addition of the building at the original price agreed upon and it is understood that the purchase price of £65 is not to be made available until the land and building become finally vested in the Department upon receipt of the desired undertaking, the building work will be promptly put in hand."

MANNING SHIRE COUNCIL: At a meeting of the Manning Shire Council held on Monday 10<sup>th</sup> June a letter was received from the Wallamba PDU wrote re Cowan's Crossing on the Krambach—



Bunyah road suggesting that council apply for a high level bridge. At another meeting of the council a letter was received from Mr *G.A. Paff* and others who wrote re the Krambach cemetery road and suggested that attention by relief? workers be given. Any timber for culverts would be given by towns people. Inspection to be made with a view to repairs being effected

NABIAC NOTES, JULY, 1935: Mr and Mrs M. Ford have left the district to take up a business in Brisbane. The trip to the northern capital was made by car last week. They were accompanied by Mrs Ford's mother, Mrs N. Tattersal of Koribar.

Mr *Grimson*, who lately disposed of his Nabiac Business, has purchased a business in Lismore and leaves to take over same next week accompanied by Mrs *Grimson* and their son *Bobbie*. As Mr Grimson was a keen business man and a grand citizen and a good sportsman, he will be missed from the village.

Mr and Mrs *Gould* and family, of Sydney, are spending a holiday with Mrs Gould's parents, Mr and Mrs *E.E. Everingham*, of Bullock Wharf.

Mr and Mrs *Joe Woodward* and family, late of Coolongolook, have taken up residence in this town. *Warren*, son of Mr and Mrs A.E. Woodward of Bullock Wharf, who has been a patient in the M.R.D. Hospital for several weeks owing to a serious accident, is slowly showing signs of recovery.

Last week Mr *Hall*, who is employed on the construction of the new Wang Wauk bridge, had a narrow escape from serious injury. Mr Hall, who was working underneath the structure, was struck on the head by a piece of falling timber, suffering a very serious blow which caused facial injuries and rendered him semi conscious for some time.

Mr *J. Morrow*, who has not long been enjoying good health for some time, has been in Sydney to seek medical advice and as a result he found it necessary to relinquish his work as a blacksmith.

KARTKATT SCHOOL - August, 1935: The Minister for Education writes "with further reference to your personal representation on behalf of the Karkatt's Parents & Citizens Association, relative to the proposed additions and alterations to the local school, I desire to inform you that the matter is at present with the Under Secretary for work for the preparation of the necessary plans and specifications. The officer has been asked to expedite action as far as possible and immediately a decision has been reached, you will be further advised. The Honorary Secretary is Mr G. Parker, Firefly via Krambach"

### **Nabiac Landcare**

A bit of rain has made the weed pulling a little bit easier and there's been a nice flow of water in Woosters

Creek through the Lillypilly Bend reserve. If you get a chance, have a walk through the reserve from Farnell Street to Abbot Street and enjoy the view of the Lilly Pilly Bend pool from the new bench. A big thank you to the Midcoast Council for supplying the seat and to our members for installing the seat.

My weed for the month is moth vine (Araujia sericifera) aka false

choko vine. It's recognised by it's grey-green heart/lance shaped leaves that bleed a sticky milky sap when broken. The twining stems may run for up to 10 metres along the ground and up trees. The weight of a single plant may kill or stunt smaller trees and shrubs. It has 'fragrant', in my mind sickly sweet, white bell shaped flowers followed by choko shaped fruits that split to release a white fluff bearing seeds. The wind can move these



seeds, which germinate easily, a long way starting new infestations.

Why am I 'picking' on moth vine? Last week, three of our members worked for three hours each removing an infestation. Unfortunately some of the fruit had already split sending their seeds off into the wild blue yonder! We collected a feed bag full of fruit from this one room sized spot. Please bag and dispose of the fruit in your red bin. When pulling large plants take care to remove as many of the roots as you can. Larger roots can regrow. Although butterflies may feed on the plant, I have read that it can stop up their feeding tubes leading to their death. As well the sap is an irritant for humans and animals and it may cause an allergic reaction.

The coming months are the best time to work in the bush so if you've got a bit of spare time, consider joining us. Make some new friends, learn some new skills and enjoy a great morning tea.

Nabiac Landcare work each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by morning tea at the picnic tables at Bullock Wharf. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.





Our September meeting just happens to coincide with NSW RFS Get Ready Weekend so please make a note in your diary that on 14th September our Fire Station will be open to one and all with information and fun aplenty. Last year we had a very successful day, and we hope to eclipse that this year. Further information about this will be published closer to the event.

### Spread the word, not the flames.

It's that time of year and it's the weather for it.

The Rural Fire Service is doing it, and so are National Parks and also the Forestry Commission.

You might be doing it, and so might your neighbours, but probably on a much smaller scale. In this case, size does not matter. It's a one size fits all scenario. Having prepared the area you wish to burn, checked the weather forecast, and made sure you will have the necessary equipment and personnel on hand, the next most important thing is to give your neighbours and the RFS at least 24 hours' notice of your intention to light up.

The number to call is 1300 Mid Coast.

### That's 1300 643 262.

Ignoring this could cost you more than a friend. It's the law. Large fines are enforceable for allowing your fire to escape your property.

When emptying the ash from your inside fire, beware the wolf in sheep's clothing. This time the wolf could well be a hot ember in the nice comfortable looking ash. You've heard the saying "if looks could kill". Well in the case of cool-looking ash, looks can kill.

Here's the big tip. Before you throw the ash onto the garden, or in the corner of the yard up against your picket fence, a good squirt of water into the ash bucket (galvanized, not plastic) may save you some embarrassment, may save your fence and may save you a call to Triple Zero.

At this time of year particularly we hear of house fires and loss of life caused by various things. The most obvious one is placing things too close to room heaters. One metre from the heater. That's the guideline and that should be the absolute minimum. Another potentially deadly practice is using portable outdoor cooking fires etc. inside the home. These are designed for outdoor use only where there is plenty of ventilation to overcome the poisonous gases they produce. Indoor solid-fuel fires require a flue/chimney to remove the gases from the room. The guideline for this is "no flue, no fire". Both practices are quite common, and exceptionally dangerous.









### **DAD'S FAVOURITE BEEF STEW**

### INGREDIENTS

1.5kg Stewing beef cut into 5cm cubes

½ tsp Salt

14 tsp Black Pepper
2 tbsp. Vegetable Oil
3 lge Onions, thickly sliced
1 tsp Sugar
1 can Larger Beer (375ml)
11/4 tsp Dried Thyme

1½ tsp Dried Thyme

1 Whole bay leaf

8 med Carrots, peeled and cut into 4cm lengths

500g Small New Potatoes

2 tbsp. Cornflour or arrowroot blended with 1/4 cup cold water

11/2 tbsp White wine vinegar

### METHOD

- 1. Season the beef with half of the salt & pepper. Heat the oil in a large saucepan over moderately high heat for 1 minute. Working in batches, add the beef and brown it on all sides - about 7 minutes per batch. Transfer the beef to a plate.
- Add the onions, season with the remaining salt & pepper, and sauté
  over moderate heat, stirring occasionally for 8 to 10 minutes or until
  they are lightly browned. Add the sugar and cook, stirring for 1
  minute more.
- 3. Return the beef to the saucepan and add the beer, stock, thyme and bay leaf. Bring the stew to a boil, reduce the heat to moderately low, cover and simmer for 1½ hours, or until the beef is tender. Add the carrots and potatoes cover and simmer for 20 to 30 minutes more or until the vegetables are tender.
- 4. Remove the cover and bring the liquid to a boil over moderately high heat. Blend in the cornflour mixture and cook, stirring constantly, for 2 to 3 minutes or until the sauce thickens. Stir in the vinegar and remove the bay leaf.

Serve with your choice of green vegetables and pumpkin or sweet potato for colour and some crusty bread. Serves 8




### REAL KULTCHA

### **Flowers for Winter**

pring, we all know, is all about the blossoms. When I think summer I think fields of wild flowers and sunflowers. Autumn obviously is when nature paints the landscape in deep reds and oranges and then there's winter. It's the time of year when you start to question if that tree was deciduous or has just died. But I realised this winter that I've been underestimating the beauty of some of winters flowers. These are some of my favourites. Medicinal, edible, super easy care, flower prolifically and are a great splash of colour.

### Chamomile

### **Quick Grow**

- Does best in full sun but will tolerate some shade
- Will tolerate most soils
- Regular watering
- Attracts beneficial insects

Chamomile is an herb that comes from the daisy-like flowers of the Asteraceae plant family. It has been consumed for centuries as a natural remedy for several health conditions for its anti-bacterial, antiinflammatory, anti-allergenic and sedative properties. chamomile tea, the flowers are dried and then infused into hot water.

It's also great in the garden as it repels unwanted insects as well as attracting beneficial friends.

### Calendula

### **Quick Grow**

- Full sun to part shade
- Regular water
- Will grow in most soil types
- Hardy
- Self Sows
- Bee attracting

Calendula is a member of the Asteraceae Family, which includes stevia, sunflowers, and even lettuces. It's useful in repelling unwanted insects, but great at attracting beneficial ones, plus it works to protect and enrich the soil.

Since the times of ancient Romans and Greeks, this edible herb of a flower has been used in religious ceremonies and for medicinal purposes. The name Calendula originated from the ancient Romans due to the fact it was said to have bloomed the first day of each month (kalend or calend) and was a symbol for happiness.

Can be made into skin creams, tinctures, teas and in cooking but those allergic to the Asteraceae family, pregnant or breast-feeding women and those on sedative, diabetic and blood pressure medications should

**Dyer's Crossing** 

(Koribar - Dyers Crossing - Cocumbark)

**Khoribakh** white cedar place corrupted to *Koribakh*, *Koribar*, creek flowing E, SE from Belbora to Brown's Creek, extinct village, locality east of Dyer's Crossing

**Kookumbakh** fig tree place corrupted to *Cocumbark*, locality west of Dyer's Crossing

### Koribar

380 acres of land on the Wollomba River (parishes Wollom & Goolongolok, R143) about 2 miles SE of the village of Koribakh, were reserved as the site for a future village in 1886. However, the use of this site for a village apparently lapsed with site of Koribakh being used instead.

The name Koribar, an Anglicised version the First Australian place name, Khoribakh, was initially shortened to Koribakh and in 1907 changed to Koribar.

The original European settlers in the Koribar district, near the junction of Khoribakh Creek and Brown's Creek, took up land under conditional purchase from 1864, were -

- 1864: Owen Matheson, 40 acres, N side at horseshoe bend of Wollomba River,
- 1865: William Startin, 80 acres, S side of Wollomba River at junction of Khoribakh Creek
- 1865: Samuel Croker, 40 acres, S side of Wollomba River at junction with Khoribakh Creek.
- 1865: Jas McKeough, 40 acres NE side of Wollomba River;
- 1867: Thomas Dyer, 49 acres, on S side of Khoribakh Creek
- 1867: George Brown, 40 acres, on N side of Khoribakh Creek opposite T Dyer's 49 acres
- 1867: Thomas Brown, 50 acres, on NW side of Khoribakh Creek
- 1878: John Korn, 40 acres, on N side of Firefly Creek
- 1879: Ludwig Schlenert, 40 acres, S side of Firefly Creek

The village of **Koribar**, also known as Jockey Gulley (from 1886 until at least 1907), was about 4 km west of Nabiac, about 1 km NE of Dyer's Crossing and about 0.5 km NW of the junction of Khoribakh Creek, Brown's Creek and Wollomba River.

It was established in the 1880's with St. John's Church of England church and graveyard being built in 1882, a public school (1884) and, as well a post office, general store, butchery and probably a community hall.

A provisional school, located at parish Wollom 99, operated between 1884 and 1888 and as a public school, 1888 to 1936.





The public school was moved to the recent location on the Dyer's Crossing – Nabiac road in 1936, being renamed Dyer's Crossing provisional school until 1938 and as a public school until closure 1969.

The original church was built by John McKay (for £30) from pit sawn timber on 3 acres of land (Wollom 99) registered in 1886 to the Right Rev. Josiah Brown Pearson, Bishop of Newcastle.

Sale of the church was proposed in 1905 to finance a new parish hall at Nabiac. However, the church remained on the Koribar site until 1924 when it was moved across Khoribakh Creek to the present Dyer's Crossing site. This church was replaced by the current St John's church, Dyer's Crossing in 1938, built, adjacent, south of the older church.

Early identities who were buried in the churchyard included William Startin, (1889) and James Hanna, Firefly Creek, 1890; James was the father of Robert Hanna who was an itinerant Anglican catechist who ministered to the early settlers in the Myall, Wallamba and southern Manning districts.

A general store existed at Koribar. It was operated by P U Alley prior to 1908 when it was purchased by G Mohammad. He operated until 1918 when it was sold to George Newell.

### **Dyer's Crossing**

The place name, "Dyer's Crossing," was adopted after Thomas Dyer who took up land there in 1867 – (49 acres, parish Wollom 11); the name first appeared in the media in 1903.

The establishment of the Upper Wallamba Co-op Dairy Co. in 1904/05 kindled the development of the locality which led to the slow demise of Koribar as a village.

A general store was opened by McFadyen in about 1915; this was later operated by Adam Murray from 1917 and a butchery operated by Jim Carney from 1928; at a later date, he moved to Krambach. A receiving post office was opened in 1909.

### Cocumbark

A provisional public school at Cocumbark (parish Wollom 53) opened in 1880 with William Alway as the first teacher; Alway was originally the teacher at the two half time schools at McLean's River (Wang Wauk, Coolongolook). The status of the school was upgraded to public school in 1888 which operated until closure in 1947.

A Union Church, serving the Presbyterian, Methodist and Anglican congregations, existed opposite the school between 1904 and the 1930's.

A glimpse of the early days of Cocumbark is recorded in the *Dungog Chronicle*, 4 May 1937 p 4 -

"In 1877, the residents of Cucumbark first turned their attention towards the establishment of a school in their district.

In those days it was a centre and there were sufficient children of





school ago. Owing to the tireless efforts of the late Robert Hanna, James Stevens, Colin Cowan and others the erection of a school was sanctioned by the administration of Sir Henry Parkes. On the present site the land was cleared, slabs cut, bark stripped from the trees and the building erected wholly by the parents themselves. The structure was small, badly ventilated, and dark, possessing one shutter for a window and a large fire-place capable of accommodating huge logs. In the course of time the slabs began to shrink and out of the cracks the children obtained a view of as much of the land scape as the trees would permit.

Native bears were numerous in the playground and provided great amusement for the youngsters.

In 1879 (?) a public school was opened and the first teacher to be appointed was Mr. Alway - an Englishman and an old soldier of an Indian Regiment. He was a most eccentric, exacting disciplinarian, who was kind to a fault and a confirmed bachelor. He provided a bark house for himself in the school ground, and carried out his duties as teacher in a very capable manner. He had interests in farming pursuits at Wang Wauk and frequently journeyed to that centre after school in the afternoon, but never was known to return late for school. Sometimes he would walk back in the moonlight playing his cornet as he proceeded along the narrow track. He was generous to a fault and willingly handed over anything he had to the residents. Financial assistance was also gratefully given, as some of the old pioneers may remember.

His newspapers were always circulated, one copy reaching, in many instances, more than a dozen homes."

In 1895, Alway retired to his farm, "Dilkhoosha," at Wang Wauk where he died in 1905. Dilkhoosha being the name of the site of the Indian Mutiny in 1857)

A second, lesser known, Clarkinson's Crossing was at Brown's Creek, Cocumbark on the early Myall River - Bunyah – Waterloo - Larry's Flat - (to Tinonee) road.

The trial survey of the proposed eastern route of the Morpeth - Grafton railway line passed through Cocumbark, north via Krambach to Wingham. The western route via Gloucester was adopted in preference to the eastern route.


