Local History - The Wallamba — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, by Bob Mann

GOLDEN WEDDING AT NABIAC - JANUARY, 1936: On the evening of the 21st December, 1935, at the home of Mr and Mrs G Holstein of Rockdale, Nabiac was the scene of a very happy gathering. The day was the 50th Anniversary of the wedding of an old and honored couple mentioned above. The function took the form of a surprise party and presentation when all the family, with their wives and husbands, assembled for the happy occasion. The breakfast provided by the ladies spoke volumes of the standard set by the honored guests of the evening. The cake, which was set with 50 miniature candles and other decorations, was both beautiful and delicious. When everyone had done justice to the choice joints and delicacies and the toast for the occasion had been honored Mr Charles Holstein, oldest son of the guests, in a neat speech of well chosen words, presented the bride and groom with a pair of handsome arm chairs on behalf of the family and hoped they would be long spared to use them, The remainder of the evening was spent in song and mirth including "for they are jolly good fellows" and "Auld Lang Syne." At 11pm the party disbanded and left for their respective homes, conscious of having made their venerable pioneer parents happy and most comforted in the restful hours of their old days.

Mr *Wilde* has been recipient of many messages of congratulations to his teacher and himself. We also offer our congratulations and trust this success will be followed with even greater deeds. Next year I understand he is going to continue his studies at a city college where we will keep and eye on his future. Master *Frank Mullen* is also going to St Josephs College at Hunters Hill He is the son of Mr and Mrs *H.S. Mullen* and to him we wish a

The death of *Alex Ross* cast a gloom over our district. He has been known to the people of our district since his boyhood days having been engaged in the shop keeping business in its many and varied changes prior to going on the land. He was popular with the young and old alike and his passing will be keenly felt by many To his



Berriman* is still about and after his daily paper despite his 86 years. Mr *Matt Maher* was a familiar sight in a bathing suit during the holidays on the beach, where he is having a well earned holiday. He has left 87 years behind him. It is a pity these good people ever get old. We wish him continued good health throughout the year.

KRAMBACH SCHOOL - JUNE, 1936: Mr C. E. Bennett, M.L.R. has been notified by the Minister for Education that repairs and renovations to the Krambach Public School and Teacher's Residence will be carried out by the Department day labor staff as soon as possible.

At the M.S.C. meeting held on 8th June, the following business was discussed. Wallamba Branch of the P.P. Union referred to the proposed bridge across Cowan's Crossing and settlers to be asked what donations are available as promised. Wallamba Branch of the P.P. Union asked that carpet grass be declared a noxious weed. Received. *D. Hancock* asked for part payment in respect to culvert in front of his premises. The Main Roads Department drew attention to condition of main road to Wang Wauk. Metal had been noticed. Indicator signs could be used, with advantage on sharp points. It was asked that the causeway at the Wallamba River be put in order. Referred to engineer.







Which plant is a weed? It's very much in the eye of the beholder. Ask a gardener, a grazier, a farmer, an ecologist and a bush regenerator about the same plant and you'll probably get at least six different opinions! Just ask a lawn proud home owner and a grazier about their opinions on clover.

Some gardeners complain when the local weeds officer says they should remove certain plants from their garden. Good gardeners can and do grow plants that are environmental and agricultural weeds safely, however, I have seen several examples of these same plants getting out of hand when properties change hands and the new owners are not conscientious gardeners. If a plant has only one 'baby' a year that escapes into the bush and it's offspring do the same, in ten years you can have a sizable problem. If you want a challenge play around with the maths.

A weed to be looking for this month is Mother-of-Millions. Look it up on the NSW Weedwise website. Our local weeds officers have also been highlighting it in the local media. You may see it at the moment along the road-side flashing lovely orange-red bunches

of flowers on a long straight stem. Do not blame the council that it is still there. The plant is rarely noticed unless it's blooming. Do not be tempted to take a bit home!!!!! All parts of the plant are toxic and full grown cattle can die if they eat enough of it. It is difficult to kill and spreads very rapidly when conditions are favourable. If you are new to the area and don't know Mother-of-Millions make it a point to find out about it. Contact your local weeds officer for assistance if you have a bad infestation otherwise, pick up and bag small amounts and place in your red bin. Be vigilant, check back every few months to ensure total removal. Just remember its name—that is a warning!

The coming months are the best time to work in the bush so if you've got a bit of spare time, consider joining us. Make some new friends, learn some new skills and enjoy a great morning tea.

Nabiac Landcare work each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by morning tea at the picnic tables at Bullock Wharf. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.



News from Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre

Did you know? This first building on this site was constructed as a hospital in 1915, on privately owned land. In 1947 a committee of trustees appointed by the RSL purchased the land and the building from private ownership to be operated as the Wallamba War Memorial Hospital.



After the hospital closure in 1981, the continuing Management Committee created the Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre. Trusteeship for the land and buildings was transferred to the Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre Association Incorporated (NMNCAI) on 30/4/1987. This Trusteeship for the land and the buildings continues today some 32 years later. In 2014 a large shed was constructed at the rear of the block to house goods donated to the Op Shop. In 2018 the shed was extended.

The Management Committee have the responsibility to care for the land, all buildings on it, all assets owned by the NMNCAI and to oversee and support the community activities of the Neighbourhood Centre.

The Subcommittees of the Neighbourhood Centre are

- Nabiac Second Chance Opportunity Shop
- Nabiac CTC
- Nabiac Village Futures Group (NVFG)
- Nabiac Landcare
- Aub Ferris Sports Complex Redevelopment
- Nabiac Farmers Market

All volunteers belonging to each subcommittee are insured by the NMNCAI and are members of the Association.

MINIMBAH MATTERS

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade has just had their truck in for its scheduled maintenance check. These checks are carried out on all NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) appliances at regular intervals to ensure they are safe, roadworthy and bush-fire ready. Depending on the work required, the Brigade may be without a truck for several days, so just because you see a Fire Station, and there may be a crew available, it doesn't necessarily mean they can turn out.

Even at the best of times, there are never enough fire trucks for every house.

There never seems to be sufficient fire fighters available either. Work commitments, family commitments and life in general is time consuming. Having taken all that into consideration, how about investing some of your "spare time" into your local Rural Fire Brigade. Minimbah Brigade is always in need of new Members. On the second Saturday of each month we have a meeting at 9am, and this is followed by some training. Our other training day is on fourth Wednesday of each month, also at 9am. The meetings are at our Fire Station which is at 681 Minimbah Road. Like we said—work commitments etc., are time consuming so we have a weekend and a weekday training session each month to best cater for everyone. Six electronic Fire Danger Rating signs have recently been installed across the Mid Coast District. The new ones are hooked up to a feeder network which enables the RFS to change the rating simultaneously across the District, rather than manually. Up-to-the-minute specific warning messages can be provided on the signs, and therefore further help communicate the risk of fire danger to the community. We expect they will get a workout this season. Already in July we have had some days with High Fire Danger Ratings and some well-planned pile burns escaping private property.

For several years the Bush Fire Danger Period (Permits Required) in this area has been scheduled to start at the beginning of September. **HOWEVER Yes, you guessed it!**

The 2019 Bush Fire Danger Period commenced on Thursday 1st August.

An early introduction of the Bush Fire Danger Period has been approved for the Mid Coast RFS District due to the current dry spell, forecast weather conditions over the next 3 months, lack of rainfall and

increase in the number of escaped burns. From this date, until further notice, any person wishing to light a fire for the purposes of burning off or hazard reduction will require a Fire Permit. To enquire about Fire Permits, please contact the Mid Coast District Office of the NSW RFS on 1300 Mid Coast.

That translates to 1300 643 262

A trained representative of the RFS will inspect your proposed burn pile/area and if it is deemed safe to burn will issue the required free Fire Permit. If you are doing your best to prepare your property by carrying out some burning, once you have your Fire Permit, please be mindful of the requirement to give your neighbours and the RFS at least 24 hours' notice. Also please be mindful of the need to check the current and forecast weather conditions before you light up.

Your Fire Permit comes with certain conditions, and these are printed on the document.

Don't run the risk. Follow the rules and reap the reward

There is no doubt as to the value of these devices. Continually throughout the year, there are constant reminders in the media of fortunate escapes from burning homes where an alarm has woken the occupants. Occasionally there has also been the sad result of an incident where no alarm was fitted or not working. Is yours up to scratch? It's easy to find out. Press a broom handle on the check button of the alarm. It should go off. If not, do something about it. Wireless alarms are as cheap as chips – from about \$12 and upwards. Stick them on the ceiling and you are in business. Get one or two next time you are at the hardware store. It's the least you can do.



Permaculture in the Garden

Hi everyone!

For this month's issue, seeing as how we're coming into the best time of year for planting, I thought I would explore the topic of food forests. I have been approached by a number of people this year interested in planting out a food forest as a way of growing food for their families long into the future and it's such a great idea I want to share with everyone what they're about.

What is a food forest?

Food forests are a low-maintenance food production and agroforestry system based on woodland ecosystems, mirroring natures desire to grow in a layered fashion.

Imagine the forest with its tall canopy trees, all the understorey plants and then the forest floor with its' saplings and ground covers. These are our forest layers. Even our bush has its layers with towering gums and hardy undergrowth (sadly often lantana). This growth pattern is based on the idea of succession. Leave even the barest paddock untouched for long enough and in time hardy (often weedy) species will pop up. These are our pioneer species and are super important. They put carbon in the soil and start holding the soil together better, they attract and start to feed microorganisms improving the soil that little bit more. Then one day a bird flies overhead and poos, dropping a seed package and now that the soil has improved even that little bit and the grasses and weeds provide some protection, it germinates and as it grows it puts more carbon in the soil and creates bigger roots, feeding more microorganisms and holding more moisture in the soil creating conditions for more plants to survive. As it grows bigger (perhaps it's a tree or a shrub) it starts to drop bits and pieces that break back down into the soil, creates shade and protection for more understorey species to begin to grow and attracts more wildlife that potentially bring in more and varied seed. As it grows it also begins to shade out the pioneer species which die off and break back down into the soil and so it becomes a closed loop of self -sustainability and a battle of the species.

Now imagine walking through a forest where everything, every layer was edible! This is a food forest.

There is a lot to gain from following this concept. There is strength in diversity. Nature knows what it's doing and it would be silly not to learn from it. Food forests also ultimately mean less work. Less weeding and feeding and if done well, less watering. Not only that but you can grow your own food and improve the soil at the same time.

Next issue of ATF I will share how to grow a food forest, some great species for growing in this area, also how you can play with the principle of food forest to suit you in your context.



Our **GREY GHOSTS** are on the move again

"We need to get away a bit" Uh? oh, ok where? "Queensland's nice at this time of the year"

So it was and first night caught up with *Phil Mathews* the Uniting Church Minister stationed at Hallidays and Nabiac some years ago. Phil is the Rural Chaplin for most of NW NSW. Not a lot of publicity for those providing counseling for so many doing it tough. Nabiac congregation is aware of this and has been providing funds for some time for Phil to distribute as he sees fit. Women trying to run large properties on their own may only need a hot water tank replacing or an accountant paying to complete their tax return to enable to get some Government assistance. Simple things. Very few have any funds left and it's extremely stressful for those looking after them, such as Phil.

A couple of stops and we are in Biloela, inland from Gladstone Qld. Biloela has a population of close to 6,000. It is the administrative centre of the Banana Shire, no bananas ever grown here, rather it was named in the 1860's after a huge yellow bullock named Banana that was trained to mingle with the wild bush cattle and enable them to be corralled and captured. It boasts the second largest abattoirs in Qld, has two major coal fired power stations and coal mined for export, dry land cropping and irrigated lucerne.

But the reason we are here is the annual Biloela "wheels in motion rally" where a large collection of tractors (some 80), stationary engines (50+), steam engines and tractor pulling are held at the local Old Machinery Group rally grounds. A good two days here with amenities larger communities would cry for.

Onto Rockhampton with 66,000 other people. Founded in 1858, this large city is a result of the gold fever that gripped the area with the discovery of gold at Mt Morgan west of here. Some 262 metric tons of gold were extracted in the 99 years of it's operation from 1882. It was once the largest gold mine in the world and also exported large quantities of silver and copper. Gold money from here founded the Anglo Persian Oil Company which in 1954 became British Petroleum or BP

Consequently, Rocky was the nearest port on the Fitzroy River, however, a massive natural rock outcrop prevented ships navigating any further than the present location. Serious infrastructure happened here and the substantial sandstone buildings, including the wonderful domed Customs House are still in use today. The Catholic Cathedral alone is worth a visit.

Heading south tomorrow.

Chuck Steak cut into 2cm cubes - fat trimmed off

21/2 cups Water

Onion - medium, sliced Garlic crushed

2cloves Chilli, crushed 1_{sml}

Green ginger, chopped 1tbsp

Salt 1tsp

Curry powder 1tbsp

Butter ½0Z

1tsp **Ground Cumin** Ground Cardamom 1tsp **Ground Cloves** 1/2 tsp

1tsp **Ground Ginger** Cinnamon ½tsp Coconut Milk 1/₂cup Lemon Juice

METHOD

- 1 Combine in a saucepan water, sliced onions, crushed garlic, chopped chilli, green ginger, curry powder and salt; add meat, cover and bring to the boil. Reduce heat and simmer 40
- Heat butter in another saucepan, add cumin, cardamom, cloves, ginger and cinnamon, gently fry for 5 minutes. Add to the meat with coconut milk and lemon juice, cover and simmer a further 20 minutes or until the meat is tender, stirring occasionally.

Serve with hot rice and curry accompaniments i.e. chopped tomato and onion, dry coconut, yoghurt, chutney, etc. & papadams

I used to use very small dried red chilli which is extremely hot as Paul loved spicy hot curries. Bit too hot for me so lots of yoghurts on mine.

Good Medicine

Anxiety

We all get anxious and fearful at times – about almost anything, from making a speech to travelling on a plane! But is anxiety holding you back from living life to the fullest?


