

**Local History - The Wallamba** - Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, 1937, by Bob Mann

Nablac: May, 1937: As Dallas Wright, son of Mr and Mrs C.K. Wright of Nabiac, was returning home from school on April 22<sup>nd</sup>, his pony shied at a culvert. The boy was thrown from his pony and rendered unconscious. He was taken to Nabiac by Mr J.J. Carey and allowed to go home the same night. Eric Wright, another so of Mr & Mrs Wright, was getting firewood one day last week when a piece of wood flew up and cut his ear right through. He was unable to go to school for a few days.

Mr Ken Brown, of Darawank, was competing in a hunt on the 2<sup>nd</sup> afternoon of the Nabiac Show when his mount fell at a hurdle. Mr Brown was thrown and as a result, his collar bone was broken. He was conveyed to the Nabiac Hospital where he remained till Tuesday.

KRAMBACH: The excitement of the Wallamba Show has now quietened down and the patrons are slowly recovering from the bruises and severe shaking received on the roads above the Nabiac Crossing in negotiating the journey to and from the showground. Exhibitors from the top of the river more than held their own in the awards in all departments. Many of the districts best stock hail from such breeders as Messrs. Schneider, Paterson, Paff, Mann, Andrews and, upheld the records held by them . I'm sorry that Mr P. Schneider (snr.) was not able to attend through sickness, but I understand he is progressing satisfactorily.

Mr *Theo Paff* is not in his usual good health, but is being attended to and soon hopes to be home again. Mr *W. Carney*, our popular butcher and baker, has I'm sorry to say, found it necessary to enter the M.R.D. Hospital for surgical treatment. His condition is giving some concern at the moment, but reports each day are more assuring. Mrs *Tom Gallagher* has also been an inmate of the M.R.D. Hospital for several weeks but has progressed sufficiently enough to be allowed to go to her mother's home as an out patient. Mrs *W.J. Martin*, who has been an invalid for some years, is not as well as she has been, but we hope she will soon improve.

Mrs J.J. Gallagher, has again returned to her home in Chatswood. She has been on a health trip to Krambach where she spent many years in the Commercial Hotel, now carried on by her son Austin. She improved very much while here and we hope to see her back again at a later date restored to her former good health.







### Nabiac Landcare

A new season, a few drops of rain and PRESTO, more weeds!



It was highlighted that although both introduced and native plants can be toxic to animals, a sizable percentage are garden escapees. Some of the weeds in our area that are highly toxic are Mother of Millions, green cestrum and crofton weed. Many weeds aren't a problem in good seasons but with the current drought, hungry stock will try anything. It is a timely reminder to check any fodder brought in for feed and make sure you know if any garden prunings are toxic before throwing them over the fence for the cows or the neighbour's sheep.

So you live in town and choose to grow toxic plants - why worry? These plants are also poisonous to pets and inquisitive grandkids! As well, the birds and wind don't know fence and town boundaries and can spread the problem.

The workshop also introduced the NSW WeedWise app and website. (weeds.dpi.nsw.gov.au) This is a comprehensive resource of 300 agricultural and environmental weeds and includes photos, identification material, control measures and biosecurity duties. Hint: the photo's are at the end of each listing!

An emerging weed in the area to watch for is St. John's Wort (Hypercium perforatum). This is a low growing shrubby herb with pretty yellow flowers and leaves with oil glands that look like holes if held up to the light. Although it is used in herbal medicine to treat depression - having it show up on your property and poisoning livestock can be very depressing.



It's a great time to work in the bush, so if you've got a bit of spare time, consider joining us. Make some new friends, learn some new skills and enjoy a great morning tea.

### MISCELLANEOUS FACT #10 PUBLISHED ON 25 SEPTEMBER, 2019

The Osmothèque (from the Greek « osmè » = odor and « theke » = storage) is a library of smells in Versailles, Paris. It protects the world's fragrance heritage by housing a living collection of more than 4,000 existing and 800 no-longer available perfumes.

It is a non-profit organization which opened on 26 April, 1990 and is

the first perfume archive in history. Perfume formulas are not donated but entrusted to the Osmothèque, which acts as guardian. The collection is grouped and stored in a room called the "cellar" that is especially equipped for preserving perfumes: absence of daylight, constant temperature



of 12°C, perfumes stored with a protective layer of argon (inert gas), regular assessment by the osmocurators.



### Permaculture in the Garden

### FOOD FOREST PART TWO

So I know I missed last months issue and part two of food forests but it was for a good reason! I'm currently in East Timor where I am working with a small community establishing a demonstration permaculture food garden. It will be a place where members of the community can come and learn about different ways you can grow your own food.

But for the time being, lets get into food forests. So you're ready to pick and plant your fruit trees but then what? When growing trees, you want to support the growing process by planting nitrogen fixing support species. Pidgeon Pea, ice cream bean, beans, vetch, and acacias are all commonly used nitrogen fixers (these are plants that use a bacteria to trap nitrogen in little bubbles on the roots). You want more of these than food producing trees at the beginning and as they grow (they grow faster than your fruit trees) you can cut them back and drop them around the base of the fruit trees as mulch. Every time you cut them back, the corresponding amount of root system dies back too and this means that the trapped nitrogen gets released and feeds the trees. They will be phased out as your system grows too so they won't be there forever. As you plant your trees put in your sun loving understorey and smaller trees. Herbs, such as comfrey, use tap roots to bring up important minerals your young trees can't reach (they're called biodynamic accumulators). Other perennial herbs and shrubs such as borage, yarrow and lemongrass help attract beneficial insects and microbes that act as your tree protectors from pests and diseases. Groups of plants that grow together that help each other out are called guilds and some google searches and experimenting will help figure out successful guilds. Food forests are about space saving too, so tall lean plants next to bushier plants can work as well as tap root systems next to more shallow feeder root systems allow for more to be grown in a smaller area. As your system grows and creates more shade and protection your sun loving species will die out but can be replaced with understorey species such as coffee and native ginger that need a forest environment. This layered idea can be applied even in a more orchard style garden by planting trees further apart and planting minimal but specific guilds around your main trees so they are still supported but it becomes less of a forest. The less foresty a system becomes however, the more work you will to do as the system is less able to maintain itself, but the main principle of diverse planting in layers is still applied. For more information about species, a google and YouTube search will help, but no matter how you choose to go about it, it remains a fantastic way of growing food. 

Our GREY GHOSTS are still on the road

Have always loved the West. Everyone should visit.

As mentioned in our last epistle we spent three weeks in Parkes assisting in restoring an old Mack truck. Whilst there, attended the Parkes show, (brilliant) visiting various friends, rellies and car club members and a quick trip to Wagga to watch some women's netball games. It was surprising as to the large number and the professional quality of the teams. As mentioned last month, crops are in dire straits. A friend has, for the second year in a row, spent close to a million dollars on planting wheat and is watching the whole effort disappear. Stout people.

Big excitement here as the "Inland Rail" project is under way. This project, which is to link Melbourne and Brisbane by rail, has Parkes as a central staging area. Double decked freight trains already travel from here to Perth but not from Sydney as the tunnels under the Blue Mountains are not high enough. Once here things get sorted quickly and sent in all directions. Massive infrastructure is already underway and planned.

We journeyed south complete with a good dose of flu.

A couple of days in Young with friends. This is cherry country of course and whilst these trees are budding, no flowers. BUT plum and apricot ARE in flower, pink and white blossoms cover the fields in all directions. With rain, a great result is assured.

Over the border into Victoria, and it must be the location. Green fields everywhere, dams full, cattle fat, such a stark contrast to the dry areas we have seen in the last two months. One could easily mistake the surroundings for English countryside. Very pleasant The flu took some time to get rid of, so we stayed a few days at Yakadandah not far from the snowfields. Those that watch Back Roads on the ABC may have seen a story on a massive S.H shed, donated by a local that was dismantled near Tamworth, transported, again by donation, and re-erected in Yackadandah. Massive project and with additions and facilities, a definite asset to this similar sized community as Nabiac.

We are journeying west more or less following the Murray. In the late 1860's, the Chaffey Brothers from Canada, began a massive irrigation project at Renmark. Three successive droughts (an Oz wide

one which extended into early 1900's) saw them financially ruined. However their legacy remains and thousands of kms of canals are still in use and are visible in every direction. It is not unusual to travel across a culvert with the canal water 1m above the roadway either side. Did you know the Vic- NSW border is the southern side of the Murray? Which means technically NSW owns the river, a big concern in the early days and still today.

We have traveled hundreds of kms on main and back roads and the amount of lucerne being grown for hay together with wheat and canola is mind boggling. A good season here.

We are in Maryborough, the centre of the "Golden Triangle" gold-fields in central Victoria.

Untold wealth here following gold discovery in 1852. This is still evident in the impressive buildings and infrastructure still standing with construction dates and foundation stones from the 1850's The "Welcome Nugget" at 69kgs in 1858 really put the place on the map and the area erupted. The largest alluvial nugget ever discovered, the "Welcome Stranger", was discovered in nearby Dunolly and as it was too large for the bank scales, was cut into three pieces by the local blacksmith on an anvil still on display in the main street, in 1869. This nugget had a gross weight of 109kgs and in today's money worth in excess of \$4.5m. Many smaller nuggets have been since discovered and mining is still being carried out in the area. Fascinating area with Bendigo and Ballart nearby.

We are here with *Brian & Margaret Kelleher* from the Nabiac Motor Cycle Museum as mentioned earlier, to engage in a "Hi-Wheeler" rally. These 111 year old motor buggies with high wooden wheels are coming from all over for a serious 330km event over some 5 days. By the time you read this we hope to be home. There are several eventualities. We compete the event and arrive home without drama, the others do not bare thinking about. Bang splutter, wheeze.

Wash the oranges and cook whole in the boiling water for ½ an hour, rise (gets rid of the bitterness) then fill pot again, bring to the boil and simmer them for another hour. Drain, allow to cool to room temperature, cut into quarters with skin on, take out any pips and then puree.
- 3. Beat the eggs and sugar until well combined, thick and creamy. Very gently fold in orange puree followed by the almond meal and baking powder. Pour the batter into the prepared tin. Bake for 1-1¼ hours, until the top is golden and a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. (If your oven tends to cook high, place a piece of foil or baking paper over the top after about 40 mins to avoid burning)

Allow to cool in the tin. Then add topping of choice.

### TOPPING:

Dust with icing sugar. Or serve with Jalna vanilla yoghurt and blueberries piled on top. Or Cream Fraiche to be decadent

Oven temperatures are for conventional; if using fan-forced (convection), reduce the temperature by 20°C. | 1 teaspoon equals 5 ml; 1 tablespoon equals 20 ml; 1 cup equals 250 ml

### Good Medicine

### Good Grief

Have you ever experienced grief due to a death, health issue, relationship breakdown, job loss or similar? Chances are, if you're human you have ... if not then I'm sorry to say your turn is coming. Or perhaps you are on your grief journey right now.

We think of grief as mainly associated with death but, in reality it applies to any loss.

Emotions related to grief include feelings such as

- \* shock and numbness
- \* denial
- \* anger against others, parents, God
- \* depression

If you have felt like this after a loss or felt a little crazy be assured you are normal.

Denial protects us by diluting reality as we muster our coping forces while depression slows us down to explore the impact of the loss.

From this comes acceptance of reality and mustering of new strengths. The grieving person can help others who may be grieving.

Grief is different for each person and lasts as long as it lasts.

It is a journey which must be worked through and can't be avoided or minimised by unhelpful remarks such as ... they're in a better place, or you should be over it.

Only God knows how another person feels.

If grief takes a normal course it is indeed *good* grief, but it can also be difficult and longer (2 to 4 years), or even delayed and needing professional help such as counselling.

Some practical suggestions to help work through grief are:

- \* talk about it
- \* keep a journal/ make a scrapbook
- \* write a letter to the deceased in the case of death
- \* join a support group.

The Bible says God cares about us and is close to the broken hearted (Psalm 34:18).


