


Results of Krambach's Country & Western Day

Local History - *The Wallamba* – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, July, *by Bob Mann*

NABIAC SHOW: It is pleasing to learn that Mr Harry Paff's Killeevy Beauty 3rd of Killeevy A.I.S Stud farm, Bunyah Roadside via Krambach, won the butterfat competition against all comers in hot competition at the recent Nabiac Show with a total of 1,825 lbs of butterfat in 24 hours under official test conditions, the judge being Mr L.C. Parker, the manager of the Dyer's Crossing Butter factory. Considering the fact that the two cows which Mr Paff had been preparing for the competition developed sickness just prior to the show, the pride of the herd contracting fever and the other sickening from *ergot poisoning, necessitating Mr Paff selecting one of the ordinary cows for the competition, it says a good deal for the class of cows which comprise the Killeevy A.I.S. Stud. The butterfat competition at the Nabiac Show, in spite of the bad season and no The butterfat special preparation, Mr Paff has been a keen breeder of registered A.I.S. for some years and just recently Mr Mitchell, the A.I.S. Inspector, had the pleasure of passing 10 heifers of Mr Paff's own breeding for entry in the A.I.S. Herd Book and at the time the remark was passed that they were one of the batches which had passed final inspection for many a long day. Mr Paff's wonderful herd is headed by Greyleigh bulls from the South Coast and in the near future it is confidently expected that the Killeevy A.I.S. Stud will be very much in evidence under the Government Official Herd recording schemes.

WOOTTON - SEPTEMBER, 1936: POPULAR GIRL DANCE. The organizing committee of Miss *M Milligan*, the popular girl candidate for Dyers Crossing, held a dance at Wootton on the 22^{nd} August in Wootton Hall and it proved to be a wonderful success. The proceeds are in aid of the Church of England at Dyer's Crossing. We feel sure the crowd that came to Wootton from all parts of the Bunyah district meant to swell the funds of their candidate in the support they are rendering her. Many people in the Wootton district regret they missed the dance owing to the notice being removed. Music was supplied by Weismantel Band of Krambach and everything was as one could wish it to be. Mr *Leedham* acted as M.C. whilst *Pat Stevens* acted as doorkeeper. A chocolate waltz was held which brought in a handsome sum to defray the overhead expenses. Supper was provided by the ladies and a happy gathering broke up in the early hours of the morning.

DYER'S CROSSING BRIDGE - SEPTEMBER, 1936: The Upper Wallamba Co-Operative Society and the Progress Association at Cocumbark, in

letters to the Manning Shire Council on Monday, advocated the construction of a high level bridge at Dyers Crossing. The former stated that the present structure could only be regarded as a temporary one. The president said that the matter of a bridge was history. Cr. *Breckenridge* said tenders for a high level bridge and the present bridge was put there temporarily. The work of building a bridge (high level) had not been carried out. They had since asked for a high level bridge and had bee informed that the present structure was taking its place. He moved that the point be stressed to the Department. The Cocumbark P. & C. Association presented a petition from 169 residents asking for the full construction of a high level bridge. It was decided to place the matter before The Main Roads Board.

FIRES BURNING AT MINIMBAH - NOVEMBER, 1936: A correspondent writes to say that fierce bushfires raged at Minimbah district on Tuesday and did much damage. He states that much damage was done particularly to the Minimbah - Nabiac telephone line by falling trees. Mr *James Fenning* lost 8 sleepers which he had cut. Firefighters had no chance of stopping the flames but fortunately the wind changed to the opposite direction and the blaze eased down

<u>COOLONGOLOOK - FEBRUARY, 1937</u>: The Progress Association has received a notice from the Manning Shire Council to be placed on the wharf warning trespassers about the lighting of fires and the penalties incurred by the infringement of the Act.


All timber has been delivered for the broken down culvert on Midge Street. This will be placed in position by relief workers. This was in response to reports by the association. The Progress Association had an afternoon in the cemetery last Saturday 21st February. Scrub was cleared which gives drivers an opportunity to see the oncoming traffic from Bunyah Road.

All herds in the locality have been affected by 3 day sickness there being three deaths.

Young *Max Fenning*, aged 2, met with an accident on Tuesday afternoon when he fell off the verandah while playing and broke his arm . He was taken to Nabiac for attention by Dr *McCredie*.

Nabiac Landcare



Check carefully before attempting to poison these since best results are achieved when the plants are healthy and actively growing. The lantana is looking very sparse with the effect of both the cold and drought. This does make it easier to see where the plant is coming from and get hold of the main stem for pulling.





Nabiac Library Refurbishments Launch

abiac Library was officially re-opened on Monday 26th, with members of the community attending the event to showcase the work that has been done. The Library has had a complete refresh but it was important for staff and the wider community to see the original character of the building maintained, with modern upgrades.

35 people attended the launch, including the member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead, MidCoast Council General Manager, Adrian Panuccio, and Mayor, David West. It was wonderful to see so many past and present library volunteers attending. Everyone appreciated the delicious morning tea put on by the Wallamba CWA following the event. It was also a wonderful opportunity for those who attended the launch to reminisce over the history of the building, which had been a supper room before it was converted to a library in 1993.

The project has cost around \$60,000, with the bulk of that funding coming from a successful grant application of \$58,000, through the NSW Government's Regional Cultural Fund. The funding resulted in new timber flooring and new carpet, upgraded shelving, modern furniture and repainting of the building, along with a new public PC.

Feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, with the most common comment being that the library feels larger. Customers have also appreciated the 'new' look, with the children's area receiving special praise.

A huge thanks to everyone involved in making this project possible. 'Yasmine, had done a fantastic job coordinating the branch in recent years and making the refurbishment possible', says Library Manager, Chris Jones, 'and we can't forget all the library coordinators who





MINIMBAH MATTERS

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade did tell you last month that the 2019 Bush Fire Danger Period started on 1st August, and as if by magic, the District erupted into flames.

It's still officially Winter and already there has been a State of Emergency declaration in the Mid Coast District. This means the local District has been granted operational and financial support from the State and Federal Governments. In other words, we needed, and were able to access some serious aerial assistance, and crews from out of area. As this is being written on a very blustery and brutal afternoon, the area near Lakeside Tavern and Stockland Shopping Centre at Forster is under impact as a result of embers coming from the fire on Big Island.

The fire up near Port Macquarie airport is still active. This is a peat fire which burns underground, and consequently is extremely difficult to extinguish. 

fed chicken eggs. The health benefits mean the higher price is worth it.

When we last reported we had been in Biloela. We left Rockhampton and south onto Duringa. then Baralaba to camp beside the weir but the gas wouldn't work on the fridge so camp at the showground with power. Back to Biloela to get fridge attended to. Wasted three days here when the "guy" kept putting us off, but met up with friends from Wauchope. Continue to Eidsvold then to Gayandah and visited the "upside down bridge". A remarkable structure on an abandoned rail line. It is surprising just how many of these rusty rails are in Queensland. Major consolidation in the last thirty years has perhaps been the reason.

Instead of reinforcing structures above as support, these are below the line and in tension. Built over a very steep gully makes this possible. Finally fixed the fridge here ourselves by CAREFULLY reading the instructions and a Melbourne phone call. Picked up veggies and fruit at a Ban Ban Springs roadside stall, an historic aboriginal meeting place here where water has always been available through natural soakage.


Camp at Biggenden and next to a bloke that could have been Lucky Star's brother, been everywhere. Checked out the Chowey Bridge on the same abandoned rail line. This concrete bridge built in 1905 consists of one major arch and three smaller ones an each side. Staggering as to how it was done. There were smarter people than some of us long ago.

Duck into Gin Gin and check out the old court House and a local art exhibition. (SHE had to buy something) Onto Mt Perry and lunch at an old hotel. Drove through a 100m old railway tunnel at Normalby where gold was shipped by rail from Mt Perry. Now home to a large quantity of bats.

Camp at Goomeri but no water over the falls. Great new facilities here (no power) and surrounded next morning by some 40 variety bash cars from Hervy Bay who called in for morning tea.

"Trading post at Maidenwell in the Bunyah mountains is a must" -Yeah right; turned out to be a cafe selling groceries. Camp here \$2 for a hot shower. Continue on to Angolan, sorted out some medication by a friendly Chemist. Morning tea at a restored grand country residence, Ringsfield House. Went to the tip but found nothing worth while.

Camp a few days at Lowood on the Brisbane river. Older race car followers may remember Lowood's race car circuit in the 1946-60s.





Water from nearby Lake Wivenhoe and Somerset Dam was released evidently prematurely from here which caused the Brisbane floods in December 2010.

An overnight stay at Lightning Ridge and meet again an Aboriginal elder from a previous visit. Our family had, a generation ago, received several ancient artifacts supposedly from Mungindi. By various means these were returned to Daryl recently. He was delighted to decipher the meanings on the boomerangs and confirmed that they were indeed from his Grandmother's tribe at Mungindi.

Very satisfying and back where they belong.

As we approach Parkes, we see the first green fields in the 3,000 kms covered since Nabiac. Emerald green wheat and brilliant yellow canola seems to be everywhere. (quick trip to Temora whilst at Parkes) and have seen thousands of acres of crops. BUT if no rain by early September it will all be lost. One must feel for those who have invested upwards of \$100 an acre to plant, as they have done for the last 4 years. 1,000 acres is not a large area in this business so that equates to \$100.000 with no guarantee of a return.

By the time you read this, we have been in Parkes for three weeks. giving a friend a hand building a cab for a1930 solid tyred, chain drive Mack truck. This 5 year project needed a shove and hopefully that has been accomplished.

We will be in Victoria mooching around and catching up with friends and attractions particularly one very clever guy who has made his own full sized steam driven traction engine, boiler wheels, steam engine, everything. Looking forward to that. The bride? Glad you asked; burning through a lot of books and of course shopping.

We have to be in Marlborough, S/E of Ballarrat for a hi-wheeler rally. Nabiac motorcycle museum owns two, both 1908. These are similar to a two seater horse drawn buggy with large wooden wheels but powered by a very heavy old petrol engine. There are some 35 from all over OZ attending. Hope things stay together for the five day event. Report next month if we make it.


