We will keep everyone updated with the progress of our plans.



The Wallamba Watershed's History - Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, 1938, by Bob Mann

Now we have our public school additions finished and officially opened, it is a very pleasing building and the inside is all that can be desired. But, as previously mentioned, still too small. However we can live in hope.

We are still wondering when our roads are going to get a dressing of bitumen and how far. Let's hope we get as far as other towns, not so far away or perhaps not as important.

Last evening, a very successful evening, a very successful concert was held in the Agricultural Hall by the Church of England Young Peoples Dramatic Society. It was something unusual and outstanding and a special treat for our town as we seldom have the pleasure of such entertainment. Good luck to the Society.

The Wallamba Show Committee has been busy beautifying the entrance by way of a new picket fence and gravel walk to the entrance. We are looking forward to a bigger and better show each year, this year particularly owing to the wonderful season.

DYERS CROSSING BRIDGE TO BE OFFICIALLY OPENED ON NOVEMBER 25TH, 1938: On Tuesday night Mr J. W. Startin,

President, presided over a full attendance of the Dyers Crossing Bridge Committee. It was decided to ask Mr C. E. Bennett, member for the electorate, to officially open the bridge on Saturday 26th November at 10:30am. It was also decided to ask Mr T. O. Martin, Minister for Justice and Mr J. N. Harrison, District Inspector of School. The ribbon will be cut by one of the oldest residents of Dyers Crossing. The day will take the form of a basket picnic. Hot water will be provided and the Church of England Ladies Guild will have refreshments, fruit, cordial, ice cream stalls & etc. and will also provide afternoon tea at a moderate charge. In the afternoon there will be a sports

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programme for the children. This will be organised by a committee composed of the teachers of the various schools. The prizes are being secured by a 1/- fund raised locally. Mr L. C. Parker, the energetic secretary of the movement, has everything well under way to be a successful day. The bridge is a wooden one of five spans and will be a boon to residents of the Wallamba and the travelling public; previously in flood time it had been necessary to use a 'flying fox' and butter, cream, mails and provisions had to be conveyed across by this means on many occasions, whilst in the case of sickness, there has been many trying experiences. The conditions prevailing during the flooded state of the stream was a constant source of worry from which all concerned will now be released.

Sumer, accompanied by a surplus of storms and sultry conditions, is here. We swelter under the tropical sun but why worry. In a district so richly endowed we are not troubled by such discomforts. The dairy cow still fills the buckets, rain has fallen at regular intervals and up to the present time the season is proving to be all that could be desired. Opening of the bridge will be a big attraction and all residents of the district together with those who have lived here at some time or have interests in our welfare are asked to be present. The function will begin at 10:30am and a very old resident of the district in Mrs Macavoy (Senr) (??think a line was omitted saying that she cut the ribbon) It is hoped to complete the formal part of the programme by midday so that following lunch a start can be made with the sports for the children. It will be a memorable time for the young people and some interesting events should take place. We trust that every child present will receive some gift.

A deputation will ask Mr Bennet to have the work of bridging Nabiac Creek completed without delay. We are told that the work was commenced some time ago but owing to the flood it was abandoned. With the building of the Taree bridge this is the only link required to give access to the railway. The Church, of England concluded this years functions with a euchre party at Mr Dugold Griffis' and dance. Great credit is due for the fine effort those people have made in order to raise funds for the erection of a new church at this centre.


Bobby Tobruk is dead. He was run over by a truck driven by an Arab. Let this be his epitaph.

He barked at the planes of Olympus, And fought in the thick of the van, The boys of C Coy loved him And voted young Bobby a man. For Bobby was born to battle, Though with none of a battler's luck, And he who dodged dive-bombers Had to die 'neath an Arab truck. So we gave him a soldier's funeral, 'Twas all that we could do, For Bobby Tobruk was a cobber of ours And helped to see us through.


Next year's service will be held at St. Paul's Anglican Church with the service set by the women of Vanuatu


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Nabiac Landcare

As many of us are not enjoying the enforced 'holiday' from our normal activities—let me assure you that the weeds are enjoying the current conditions. I must admit that one of my most mentioned weeds, cassia aka senna is a cheery note of yellow as it is blooming prolifically along any unburned road verges. Unfortunately that means we will get a huge seed set to continue the problem. One person I was speaking with recently said she was leaving the cassia for bee food, fair enough, wait until it finishes blooming and then attack. One problem with this approach is that you forget about the weed or can't find it once the tell-tale yellow has faded.

Most of us are lucky enough to have a patch of yard, bush, park or paddock that we can still access in splendid isolation. So.....it's time to get out in between the downpours and showers and enjoy the sunshine and pull a few weeds. Keep an eye out for vines that grow rapidly and may smother desirable small bushes and trees. Some pruning, redirection or even removal may be in order. Continue to monitor your area for new weeds that are emerging post drought. There are plenty of resources on line such as Weedwise (weeds.dpi.nsw.gov.au) to help you identify your invaders.

Nabiac Landcare has temporarily stopped group working bees and morning teas but some members are working 'socially distant' from each other. We are not in a position to accept new members at the moment but the weeds won't go away so we'll be back.

When we return: Nabiac Landcare work each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by morning tea. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.

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MY CHILD IS A REALLY GOOD READER BUT HAS TROUBLE COMPREHENDING.

The teacher suggested that she could have *Irlen Syndrome* but how can she be such a good reader if she has Irlen?

This is one of the main things that stop some parents thinking that their child may have Irlen. BUT the child may read well, but they may be light-sensitive to the point where the white page is discomforting for them, and while it may not affect their fluency, it can affect their comprehension, or they may simply be reluctant to read, despite being a good reader.

Other signs could be that they come home from school more fatigued than would normally be expected. These also are signs that should be investigated to make sure that they are not the result of Irlen. The only way to determine if anyone (adult or child) has Irlen is to have them assessed by an Irlen Certified Screener or Diagnostician.



There are no standardised educational or psychological tests that can identify Irlen Syndrome.

Part of what the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) does, comes under the heading "Community Engagement". Could be just having a

cuppa at your place while going through your Bush Fire Survival Plan, or it could be something like attending the Nabiac Show and offering advice. We also have a programme aimed at Primary School Children, during which we teach about "Good Fires and Bad Fires". The lesson doesn't stop when the school bell rings. It is for grown-ups as well.

A **Good Fire** would include the local farmer/property owner carrying out some pre-summer burning off or pile burns. Currently there is no requirement for a Permit to do this. Unless you actually see some serious flames, and no sign of people attending to those flames, there is more than likely no need to call Triple Zero. Have a good look at it and assess whether, in your opinion, it is out of control or at serious risk of damaging property. If you decide it is, then that's when you call Triple Zero 000.

The vast majority of property owners understand and are well practiced in winter hazard reductions and general property clean-ups, and will have prepared their proposed burn area adequately, advised the relevant people, considered the weather, and arranged for sufficient help and equipment to be on hand well before they strike that match.

A **Bad Fire** on the other hand, would include a motor vehicle, a building or large area of National Park on fire. Triple Zero 000 are ready for your call on that one. A "smoke sighting on Minimbah Road" at 7pm this time of the year, is not always worthy of a call. It could be worth having a look at – if you can find it. We would have a look at it – if WE could find it. When reporting fires, please give clear and accurate directions as to where it is; e.g. on the corner of Minimbah Road and MacKinnon Road. Then we stand a fair chance of getting to it in a timely manner, rather than driving in the opposite direction.

It's that time of the year again. Daylight Savings finishes.

Note to Self: Check and change if necessary, the battery in the Smoke Alarms.

We would hate for you to show up on the **Bad Fire** list.

Yep, this is your time to shine. Until 1st of October (earlier if things change) plan on getting those heaps of rubbish alight. NOT TODAY as they will be too wet to burn as a local here found out recently. Lot of smoke and no action.

We need 2 weeks at least of warm weather without rain to allow them to dry out. Green leaves and branches need to be a lot dryer than at the moment, but when the time is right get into it. It is also ideal if you can arrange to have machinery that can stir up the heaps as they burn, without this it is likely you will have several large timber pieces left over.

These actions will save not only you, but neighbours and fire crews a lot of heart burn and we don't have enough Quick Eze for that.

Of course, you **are required** to let your neighbours, the RFS District Fire Control Centre and, as a courtesy, your local Brigade know what your intentions are. At least 24hrs notice before you burn must be given to all of them.

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In 2020, Australia marks 75 years since Victory in the Pacific and the end of the Second World War.

ANZAC BISCUITS

The origin of the ANZAC biscuit

Army biscuits, known as Anzac wafers or tiles, were a hard biscuit eaten by soldiers as a bread substitute. They were often ground up and eaten as porridge.


The Anzac biscuit we are familiar with today was developed by the mothers, wives and girlfriends of our soldiers. A sweet biscuit made of rolled oats and bound with golden syrup or treacle (eggs were scarce during the war) were sent to the frontline by ships of the Merchant Navy.

Ingredients

- 1 cup each of plain flour, sugar, rolled oats and coconut
 - · 4 ounces butter (115g)
- 1 tablespoon treacle (golden syrup)
- 2 tablespoons boiling water (add a little more water if mixture is too dry)
 - 1 teaspoon bi-carbonate soda

Method

- 1. Grease tray and pre-heat oven to 180°C.
 - 2. Combine dry ingredients.
- Melt together butter and golden syrup.
 Combine water and bi-carbonate soda
 add to butter mixture.
- 4. Mix butter mixture and dry ingredients.
- 5. Drop teaspoons of mixture onto tray.
- Bake for 10 15 minutes or until golden.
 Allow to cool on tray for a few minutes before transferring to cooling racks.
- * Makes approximately 35 biscuits (From an original recipe provided by Mr Bob Lawson, an ANZAC present at the Gallipoli landing.)



Show News

Old McDonald Travelling Nursery returned this year to great delight of young and old. It was situated beside the bungee / rock wall, which made supervision of the kids easy for parents.



Our Vice President, *Judd Barker*, did such a great job promoting the Demo Derby that we had 24 entries. This number meant we got twice the fun by splitting the entries into two Derbies, and those still 'standing' at the end finished with a dash for cash. Great entertainment and fun for those positioned around the Ring.

The Grand Parade had to interrupt the Cattle judging but was held and lead in, once again by a representative of the Light Horse Brigade. The usual formalities were completed, including the fancy dressed rider and horse and the twelve winners of the Raffle prizes.

Bruce Weller, as a volunteer and member of the many community associations he is and has been involved with, kindly opened the Show and had the pleasure of making two special awards. It was with great pleasure that our prior Committee office holders – Dave Reeve, President and Lyn Reid, Treasurer/Secretary were awarded Royal Agricultural Society of NSW medals. These are a sign of our appreciation for their significant contribution to our Show over the years. Our congratulations go to them both, from the Committee and all the Wallamba District community. It is a token of the thanks felt for all the years of hard work they voluntarily put into making our Show what it is today.

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

Nabiac Farmers' Market.... Hang in there everyone!

I'm sure that the March Market was hugely missed. The April market is up in the air too. To all our wonderful stallholders and customers, we send out love, energy and motivation to see you through this time. We hope there may be some other opportunities to trade during this crazy period. This can be a good opportunity to re-group, take a break from the routine, re-invent and embrace change. (Although by the time you read this, everyone will possibly be climbing the walls!)

Our amazing community is strong and resilient. People are always thinking of ways to support each other. The sooner the world listens and takes measures to slow the virus, the sooner we can get back on our feet.

Let's be confident that stall holders will survive the tough times and thrive when doors are flung open again. We can take inspiration from Mother Nature, who survived drought and fire and is now flourishing after the rain.

In the meantime, hopefully there's a good supply of fresh produce available locally so you can feed your immune cells. They can target a single unwanted invader amongst trillions of bacteria. Most immune cells live in your gut and they love fibre, so feed them well and let them do their job.

Ensuring a good intake of Vitamin C is a key to nourishing your immune cells.

The daily recommended intake for Vitamin C is 60mg. The good news is, it is pretty easy to find: An orange contains 60mg, 5 strawberries





have 35mg, a capsicum 180mg and a kiwi fruit 64mg. Fresh is best. Fruit will lose around 50% of their Vitamin C content by freezing – so just eat double if you only have frozen fruit! Mandarins will be in the shops soon. Perfect!



Vitamin C is not stored in the body, so we need some every day. It is essential for many functions including iron absorption, collagen production and supporting healthy immune cells. It is also an important antioxidant, which protect cells from harm, reducing the risk of heart disease and cancer.

So, for a healthy immune, eat plenty of fresh local produce; fruit and veggies; pasture raised meat and eggs; fermented foods and honey. Equally important is to; exercise, stay off the sugar, laugh, do something you love and stay connected (via face-time or out in nature, just stay a few metres apart!)



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
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WIPES STOP PIPES

MidCoast Council is urging residents to stop flushing so-called 'flushable' wipes

down the toilet as blockages seriously affect the sewage system.

It's a confronting photo – but this is the result of using so-called 'flushable' wipes as part of your toilet routine.

"Despite these wipes being advertised as 'flushable', there are no wipes that are suitable for flushing down the toilet," said Council's Director of Infrastructure and Engineering Services, Mr Rob Scott.

"This image shows a blockage of one of our sewer pumps, because of wipes being flushed down the toilet. A blockage can effectively shut

down the movement of sewage through the system and is a serious problem."

Council staff have to hoist the pump out of the ground from depths of up to 10 metres, and then remove the 'choke' manually. Apart from being a disgusting job, it's expensive and time consuming.

"Normal maintenance includes our staff checking sewer pumps about once a fortnight – there's normally just a hose-off of domestic fat residue required. But recently, we've been deploying staff every second day to some pump locations to remove blockages due to people flushing wipes, sanitary items and sometimes nappies down the toilet."

Recently several pipe blockages have occurred at Wingham, Tallwoods and Tuncurry, with wipes being the major problem.

Unlike toilet paper, wipes do not disintegrate in water. They stay pretty much intact as they travel through the sewer pipes and can get caught on other debris. This increases the likelihood of a blockage in the sewer pipes which can cause costly damage to pumps or lead to sewer overflows – which have the potential to impact on the environment.

The best advice is to throw away any cleaning/disinfecting wipes, moist towelettes, personal hygiene products, baby wipes and any other type of wipe you may use in the garbage, never in your toilet.

Clogged sewer lines are ugly and expensive to fix. Binning disposable wipes is an easy way to protect our sewer system, our environment and prevent unnecessary trouble.

Be aware that by binning the products, you are contributing to landfill waste – and that also is not good for our environment – and contributes to the NSW Government's Waste Levy that ratepayers pay on all landfill waste

"It's really a case of old fashioned toilet habits are best - avoid new



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flushable wipe products if you can. And if you must use them – they go in the garbage, not the toilet," said Mr Scott.

Follow the three $P\sp{'s}$ rule - the only things that are OK to flush are pee, poo and paper.

2. Council facilities to shut from midnight 25th March in COVID-19 response

MidCoast Council will close libraries, visitor information centres, playgrounds, parks and a range of other facilities from midnight tonight in line with the Federal Government's latest COVID-19 measures to reduce the spread of the virus in the community.

Essential services such as water provision, sewer services, road maintenance and rubbish collection will continue.

Members of the community will be able to continue to do business with Council via phone, email and online services.

Playgrounds will also be closed and signage placed in parks and on beaches to remind the community of the anti-gathering requirements of the Federal Government, Mr Panuccio said.

All Council owned pools, including the YMCA operated facilities in Taree, Forster and Wingham closed on Monday, with the Manning Entertainment Centre closed late last week.

Council owned halls and facilities will also no longer be able to be hired.

MidCoast Council will continue to provide essential services to the community and the following facilities remain open for business including:

Gloucester's Service NSW and Services Australia (Centrelink) agencies

Waste Management Centres

Council's public amenities will remain open while ever they can be appropriately cleaned and hygiene facilities can be provided. Council is endeavouring to provide toilet paper and soap where possible, however is **battling an increase in theft and vandalism**. Facilities may be closed on short notice if these requirements are unable to be fulfilled

The annual bulky waste collections have also been suspended at this point in time to prioritise weekly and fortnightly rubbish collections. Any members of the community who have put their waste out to be collected need to remove it from the side of the road.

We are doing everything we can to support our staff and customers in these challenging times and are committed to ensuring the vital services we provide continue," Mr Panuccio said.

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JOINT MEDIA RELEASE FROM MID-COAST COUNCILLORS IN SUPPORT OF MIDCOAST COUNCIL CENTRAL ADMINISTRATION BUILDING – BIRIPI WAY



Wednesday 1st

MidCoast Councillors, by a majority decision at its Ordinary Meeting on 25 March, agreed to appoint the Head Contractor charged with the fit out of the Biripi Way building for use as MidCoast Council's central administration building.

We, the undersigned Councillors, are pleased and excited (albeit in uncertain times) that this landmark project can now proceed in the interest of better community outcomes. It will also provide an economic boost to the local building industry.

This decision is the culmination of over two years of careful planning and analysis by Council staff and expert consultants. It follows a tender process (overseen by an expert probity consultant) with the winning bid well within the range of prices expected.

With the full fit out cost of \$18.6m, the total cost of this project is \$25.6m and well within budget; costs will be partially offset by savings and sale of investment and/or no longer needed properties.

While there has been some vocal opposition from a local lobby group, the benefits in terms of improved productivity and cost savings will lead to better outcomes for ratepayers.

There has been some recent speculation (including a rescission motion signed by three Councillors) that MidCoast Council should go into "hibernation" and not make important decisions at this point in time, due to uncertainties around Covid-19.

We took the view, however, that this would add to the general economic uncertainty and supported the Prime Minister's call for businesses – and government bodies in particular – to get on with business as usual, wherever possible. Council staff are in continual contact with State Government agencies in relation to the impacts of Covid-19 and the implications for this region and are monitoring all health-related government information.

The Head Contractor is a national firm that has locally based employees. Much of the \$18.6m fit out costs will be awarded to local sub-contractors and tradespeople. We believe that it is important to go ahead so this money can be injected into the local economy as soon as

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practicable. This will provide significant economic certainty for the local building industry.

We would like to thank the staff involved in this project who worked with commitment and professionalism to deliver results, sometimes in the face of unwarranted and uncivil criticism from a small number of opponents to the project. This will also provide some certainty for staff who have been working in an amalgamated Council scattered across a large LGA for nearly four years.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

We, the undersigned Councillors, today reiterate our arguments in favour of this project:

- The total purchase price of the project is \$25.6m (\$7m for the land, building and utilities; \$18.6m for the fit out, modifications to the building structure, furniture and solar panels).
- Council will pay for this project using existing savings, property investment incomes and loans repaid over 20 years so that the cost is spread out. (Council has very flexible and low-cost borrowing facilities.)
- The move will free up four existing Council buildings for lease or sale at an appropriate time to recoup the highest returns (there will be no fire sale). Council also has other investment properties, some with better expected returns which may be sold in the first instance, for instance vacant land in Chapmans Road, Tuncurry which is currently on the market.
- Two independent cost benefit studies (including financial sensitivity analyses) undertaken by external financial experts concluded that the financial benefits of this project outweigh the alternative campus model of dispersed offices.
- Council can afford the project, having prepared a Financial Strategy that was reviewed by the State Government's Office of Local Government and independently peer reviewed by external auditors.
- The project will replace four buildings, several in need of costly repair and refurbishment, with a relatively new building with lower ongoing maintenance costs and improved and more collaboration friendly facilities for staff.
- Front counter services will still be available in Forster at the new Council facilities in Lake Street (Civic Precinct).
- For those residents wanting to attend Council Meetings, travelling to Taree rather than Forster is more convenient for many, including those living in the southern regions such as Tea Gardens and Gloucester.
- This project will not impact on rates. It will be fully funded outside of the rates budget. (Any increase in rates would need to be through a request for a Special Rate Variation and there is no intention to apply for this.)
- The Covid-19 restrictions may cause some disruption to completion of the work.

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Lyn's Larder

Some simple cake recipes for the kids to make during the holidays, confinement.

ROCK CAKES

INGREDIENTS

2 cups Self Raising Flour

90 g Butter 1/2 cup Sugar 1/2 tsp Mixed Spice

2 tbsp each of Currants, sultanas and chopped mixed peel

4 tbsp Milk

METHOD

- 1. Grease oven trays and set oven at hot (400f/200c)
- 2. Sift flour, rub in butter lightly, mix in sugar and spice. Add fruits and mix well.
- 3. Beat egg and add milk in a bowl, then mix with the dry ingredients to a stiff dough.
- 4. Put small tablespoonfuls in little rough heaps on greased baking tin and bake in a hot over for 10 to 15 minutes.

Can be sprinkled lightly with sugar before baking

HUMMINGBIRD CAKES

INGREDIENTS FOR CAKES

.440g Canned crushed pineapple in syrup

1 cup Plain flour
1/2 cup Self-raising flour
1/2 tsp Bi-carb soda

1/2 tsp1 cup1 Ground cinnamon and ground ginger1 cup1 cip2 cip3 cip4 cip5 cip6 cip7 cip7 cip8 cip8 cip9 ci

1/2 cup Desiccated coconut

1 cup Mashed banana (2 large overripe)

2 Eggs, lightly beaten 3/4 cup Vegetable oil 1tbsp Icing sugar

3 cups Shredded coconut

1/2 cup Firmly packed light brown sugar

3. Eggs lightly beaten

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 C. Line 18 cups of 2 large cup muffin pans with paper cases $\,$
- 2. Drain pineapple over a medium bowl, pressing fruit down with a spoon to extract as much syrup as possible and reserve 1/4 cup of the syrup
- 3. Sift flours, soda, spices and brown sugar into a large bowl and then stir in the pineapple, reserve syrup, coconut, banana, egg and oil.
- 4. Divide the mixture int the paper cups
- 5. Bake cakes for 10 minutes, then spoon Coconut topping on top of the cakes and bake a further 15 minutes.

Stand cakes in the pan for 5 minutes before removing and placing top side up on a wire rack to cool. Dust with icing sugar.




