He was very happy to finally work out why he had always struggled at school and why he avoided reading and writing most of his life. MINIMBAH MATTERS

Inimbah Rural Fire Brigade is all smiles again. We have our fire truck back and in good working order. It didn't sit idle in the Station for long before we were called out to a motor vehicle accident. There's just something about having your own truck with your own Brigade name on it. Ah, the little things in life that mean so much!

Save the date: Saturday 12th September, 2020

Channeling every positive thought imaginable, we have registered with the NSW Rural Fire Service to hold our **Get Ready Day** at our Fire Station on 12th September. At this stage it is anticipated it will be from around noon onwards, but please, once you have written this in your diary, watch this space for more detailed information.

Easing of COVID-19 restrictions have allowed us to resume holding meetings provided we abide by distancing and disinfecting rules. Therefore, on the second Saturday of each month we are planning to be at our Station by 9.00 a.m. for our monthly meeting. You are more than welcome to call in and see us.

We are learning all the time.

There is currently a Parliamentary Enquiry being held as a result of the horrific 2019-2020 fire season. Aiming to minimize mistakes and improve our knowledge, capability and outcomes on an on-going basis, it is standard procedure for the NSW RFS to hold an After-Action Review after any incident. The size and nature of the incident determines the size and nature of the Review. This past season was exceptional, hence the Parliamentary Enquiry.

One thing that has just come out of the enquiry is that some of the community does not have a clear understanding of the Fire Danger Ratings and how to respond to Bush Fire Alerts. This is very concerning to us and one of the topics we will be focusing on at our Get Ready Day. You may very well need to know this before 12th September, so here is some brief information to tide you over.

Fire Danger Ratings

Minimbah and immediate surrounds are in the North Coast Weather District.

The Bush Fire Danger Ratings give you an indication of the possible consequences of a fire, if one was to

Bush Fire Danger Ratings are based on predicted conditions such as temperature, humidity, wind and the dryness of the landscape.

The higher the fire danger rating, the more dangerous the conditions.



When the Fire Danger Rating (FDR) is Extreme or Catastrophic for your area, any fires that start are likely to be fierce, making their control impossible until weather conditions moderate. Even a well prepared, well constructed and actively defended home may not survive.

During a bush fire, Alert Levels are used to give you an indication of the level of threat from a fire.

Remember - don't wait for a warning.

Some fires start and spread so quickly there may not be any time for a warning. If you get a **Bush Fire Alert**, you must take it seriously. Failure to take action can result in death or injury to you or your family members.

There are three levels of Bush Fire Alerts:



Advice - Blue Flame

A fire has started. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes.



Watch And Act - Yellow Flame

There is a heightened level of threat. Conditions are changing and you need to start taking action now to protect you and your family.



Emergency Warning - Red Flame

An Emergency Warning is the highest level of Bush Fire Alert. You may be in danger and need to take action immediately. Any delay now puts your life at risk.

For some fires, you may hear a warning message over your radio or television, such as a siren, or you may receive an Emergency Alert. Other fires may start so quickly that there will be no time for any warning at all.

If the Bureau of Meteorology advises an Extreme or Catastrophic FDR for the following day, leaving bush fire prone areas the night before, or early in the day is your safest option – do not wait and see. It is an **advice of what the consequences may be** in the event of a bush fire starting. You are basically being put on notice that you should have enacted your Bushfire Survival Plan and know exactly what to do and when you are going to do it. We'll also talk about that at our Get Ready Day.

When burning off, at <u>least 24 hours before</u> you light up, you are required to notify your neighbours, and the RFS.

From the Captain and the wonder of nature.

A s mentioned, our truck is back. Long wait for parts from Japan and the need to manufacture a new tank.

The old non-repairable tank had a consistent leak and during one particular event, Minimbah Brigade, together with perhaps four other units were on property protection east of our station. Fire is in the tree -tops and 75m away, our pump was connected to the home swimming pool and there was constant movement with crews getting ready and moving about.

Imagine our surprise to discover a large death adder curled up under our truck, under the water dripping from our leaking tank.

We had seen several during the season but all much smaller, usually as large as a broom handle and perhaps 30cm long. A fully-grown adult can be up to a metre long. Our visitor may have been 70cm and 7cm in diameter, we didn't have a tape measure but a good example. Was this one perhaps driven out of the thick scrub by the approaching fire and injured? The real question is, how did it reach our truck with the crew traffic and how did it find that particular drip of water? Amazing. And "yes" to your question - the animal was relocated.

As this is being written we are in the winter solstice which means that the days will become longer but not necessarily warmer for some time yet. A good time to ready your property for the coming fire season which generally begins in September in the Mid Coast; get rid of rubbish, prune your garden and have your (hopefully not needed) Bush Fire Survival Plan ready.

Stay warm and cuddle up-no need for that extra blanket.

Nabiac Landcare

Nabiac Landcare members are back in the bush! We've had a great roll-up at our weekly working bees and have been able to resume working at both Bullock Wharf Reserve and Lily Pilly Bend. It's been great seeing people walking along the tracks enjoying the bush.

At the moment we are targeting White Passion-fruit (Passiflora subpeltata). This inedible and possible poisonous white flowered relative of the edible passionfruit is quite visible climbing in bushes and trees along the road. It has pale grey three lobed leaves and is bearing golf ball

sized pale green fruit at the moment. If you are controlling White passionfruit in your patch take care when pulling it. Its shallow roots spread sideways and break quite easily. Roots left in the soil will send up new shoots. I find it easier to 'scrape and paint' the stems of larger specimens to avoid this problem.



The other weed of the moment is Bridal Creeper (Asparagus asparagoides). It is an asparagus incognito—looks nothing like the other common weedy asparagus. It is shooting vigorously at the moment from its strong mat like perennial root system. It's small green leaves and thin fragile stems belie its ability to climb three metres and smother shrubs. Bridal

creeper is drought tolerant, has a root system that suppresses plants near it by its competition for water and nutrients and produces many small burgundy red berries that birds and other animals eat and excrete the seeds pre-fertilized! Although not a serious weed in Nabiac at the moment it has the potential to spread and is becoming more common in the Bullock Wharf Reserve.

We were very excited in the past couple of weeks to discover several patches of small terrestrial greenhood orchids (species?) in the Reserve. Very small and not the kind of orchid you'd put in a corsage but still their discovery was enough to get some of us down on hands and knees to appreciate them.

Nabiac Landcare works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by morning tea. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. And most of all enjoy the local bush!



Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre

Our Centre began its life in 1915 when nurse Sarah Jane Nixon laid foundations for


"Araluen". Araluen continued as a small private hospital until 1947. There are no records for many of those years other than stories of Nurse Sarah Bidner (nee Nixon) and the memories of many families who benefitted from the hospital.

Spanish Flu in Nabiac – Laura Sykes writes about the early days of Araluen - ".....an outbreak of pneumonic influenza in 1919 when the hospital, the school and the School of Arts in Clarkson Street, the Agricultural Hall and a private home were all transformed into emergency hospitals." (Copies of Laura's book are for sale at the Op Shop \$25).

By 1947, while the old building was sound, it was no longer a working hospital and was somewhat neglected. At a public meeting called by the RSL in September 1947 a Committee was formed and the decision made to purchase the hospital from Mrs Bidner. Much was done locally to prepare the hospital to reopen as the Wallamba War Memorial Hospital. The Hospital continued until closure in 1981. By 1984 the building became the Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre. Over the years many activities were conducted in the old hospital, including Doctor's rooms, Preschool, Meals on Wheels, the Library, and the Clothing Pool to name a few.

The Centre has a Constitution that states the following purposes:

- to promote respect and consultation between residents and Local, State and Commonwealth governments through a Community Strategic Plan;
- to advance the health and wellbeing of the local community through the ongoing support of (but not limited to) local facilities such as community gardens and parks, playgrounds, and sporting, recreational and cultural amenities;
- to promote the wellbeing of residents through opportunity for sustainable lifestyles, care of our environment,



opportunity for volunteering, and participation in arts and crafts:

- to work towards the provision of affordable and accessible facilities for community groups and activities;
- to manage the operation and maintenance of the Neighbourhood Centre property for the benefit of the Nabiac community.

We have several volunteer subcommittees. These are

<u>Nabiac Village Futures Group</u> – having responsibility for the Community Strategic Plan

<u>Nabiac CTC</u> - offering internet use and support, printing, scanning, laminating, faxing

 $\underline{\textbf{Second Chance Opportunity Shop}} \text{ - processing and selling donated second-hand goods}$

<u>Nabiac Landcare</u> – eradicating weeds on reserves and providing information to the public

<u>Aub Ferris Sports Complex</u> – redevelopment of the Aub Ferris Oval <u>Nabiac Nook</u> – the latest group to join with us – selling their own arts, crafts and produce in Nabiac.


<u>Mid Coast Community Quilters</u> are working on joining us. They are volunteers who work together to make and donate quilts into communities and support groups.

Both the Nook and Quilters have similar purposes to the Neighbourhood Centre

We welcome the new members from the Nook and the Quilters. The Wallamba Watershed's History — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, 1939, by Bob Mann

<u>DEPUTATION:</u> Messrs *R.J. Salter* and *Clive Bussey* waited on the meeting of the Manning Shire Council on Monday as a deputation. Mr Salter asked for attention to the road down the river. He said it was the only practicable out let for cream. Two suppliers at least would use the road. They were willing to assist the council to the extent of £40 if the council would spend £20. The President said that Mr *Anderson*, Newcastle, who was interested in a property on the other side said he was also prepared to put in £20. Mr Salter said that Mr *Drury* was also prepared to put in £10. That would be £50 altogether for gravelling. They had corduroyed the route and also had done bad pot holes. The President said that they intended to do the work with the grader but bush fires interfered.

Councillor Hammond - 'How much more would be needed to make the road trafficable? The President said that Mr Ruprecht had stated if the corduroyed work was done they could finish in half a day. The plant was at present at Mount George and would be working on the Upper manning for 3 months. It was decided that the councillors of Riding C. inspect.

PROPOSED WALLAMBA BRIDGE: Mr C.E. Bennett, M.L.A., forwarded to the Manning Shire Council on Monday the following letter from the Secretary of the main Road Board.

Mr S.A. Henderson under date August 1st Main Road No. 110—Bridge Over Wallamba near Nabiac. With reference to your personal representation on behalf of the Manning Shire Council, I have to advise that the Department has not carried out any preliminary survey work in connection with the construction of a bridge over the Wallamba River near Nabiac. With reference to the statement in the council letter to you to the effect, that the council considers the bridge should be constructed without cost to the council, I would point out as the river crossing is on the main road the Department is unable to vary the rate of assistance granted generally to councils which in this case is three quarters of the total cost. Should the council submit an application for assistance to have the bridge constructed on the afore mentioned basis then the matter will have the consideration of the Department. Mr Wright said they should see if they could get assistance. They did not have the money to do the work. It was a very important thing. It was decided to try and have it looked into as a defame (sic) matter Sept 13th 1939 MRT.

COOLONGOLOOK: For some weeks now the weather has been very dry ad windy. Nights have been cold and there have been many frosts under these conditions, little or no growth is possible, the ground being very dry and rain is needed.

Owing to the unsettled world affairs, timber shows a slight slackening in demand.

Football matches have been played lately between the 18 years and under teams. Our team succeeded in winning the cup from Wootton only to lose it to Bulahdelah las Saturday.

The measles epidemic has increased, three more families being effected.

KRAMBACH: OCTOBER 1939: Spring has now put in its customary appearance later than we may wish, but the recent rain has changed the colouring in district pastures and set the farmers in their stride. Early crops of maize have the plows weaving shines where the rust of winter was a little while ago showing in plenty. Dairy farmers are showing small figures on their returns at present, but as is customary to them they hope to furnish new records as the season progresses.

Sickness has visited many homes of late and in many forms of flue, being one of the most prevalent. The general health is now very satisfactory. Mr *Joseph Kelleher* of this locality was cranking his car on Sunday week when it backfired, the result being a bone broken in his right arm. He is doing satisfactorily. Mr *Mark Stevens*, of "Killarney" Dyers Crossing, is receiving medical treatment at Newcastle where he expects to be for some time. We hope he has a successful trip and comes home without the trouble that caused his visit.

I hear the popular garage proprietor has a scheme going to place a number of lights along the main street for lighting the town at night. Quite recently the light was installed at the Catholic Church, Convent School and Presbytery by Tyler Bros of Wingham and other extensions are contemplated shortly.

Builders are being kept very busy with the towns progress. Mrs *Carney* completed a new shop with a new modern refrigeration plant that has made the keeping of meat possible now at all periods of the year. Mr *Austin Gallagher* has also put in a similar plant.





A love of photography, and the stories she can create, has always sat on the sidelines of a business career incorporating sales, marketing and organising trade exhibitions for major companies in Australia and overseas.

With the arrival of the internet in the 1990's, Diane's opportunity to link up with photographers from around world was exciting, allowing her to enhance skills and techniques, taking her own work to the next level. For the past 12 years, her work has featured regularly on Channel 10's weather segment. She has appeared in a feature article in Focus Magazine, completed the photography for *From our Farm*



Restrictions continue to ease

Monday 29 June 2020



MidCoast Council's volunteer run libraries, visitor information centres and tip shops will be among services to the community to restart from Wednesday, following a further easing of COVID-19 restrictions and the welcoming back of volunteers.

"We've really enjoyed being able to welcome the community back into our spaces over the last month, and are really pleased to be able to welcome our valuable volunteers back over the coming weeks, Council's Director of Liveable Communities, Paul De Szell said.

The first of the openings will be the Taree and Gloucester Tip Shops on Wednesday, with Taree Visitor Information Centre following a few days later.

Visitor information centres in Forster and Gloucester reopened at the beginning of June, and the Taree Centre will reopen from Friday 3 July with reduced hours. The centre will initially reopen from 9am to 12 noon, Monday to Saturday - while volunteer run centres at Tea Gardens, Pacific Palms and Bulahdelah will reopen under a staged approach currently being finalised.

While the majority of Council's libraries opened their doors at the beginning of June, branches run by volunteers have remained closed. However, from next Monday, 6 July, Old Bar and Nabiac Libraries will reopen to their communities.

"The Libraries team has continued to adapt to the conditions throughout this pandemic and they're offering their usual school holiday program online in July, which will be really popular.

"Library users will also be pleased to hear that our public computers will become available, albeit in a limited capacity, during this round of

The Manning Regional Art Gallery is also welcoming back volunteers and will be reopening the smaller spaces in the gallery from this week.

Council is also working to reopen their camping grounds as soon as possible, following a comprehensive assessment of these sites.

"We do ask our community to continue to practice social distancing, and not to come into our facilities if they are unwell or have recently been in contact with a confirmed case of COVID-19."

Venues including the Manning Entertainment Centre will remain closed at this point in time, as per the requirements of the State Government's COVID-19 Public Health Order.

Funding for Nabiac Plant to improve water security

MidCoast Council has welcomed the announcement by Federal MP Dr David Gillespie of a \$1.47m grant to increase capacity at the Nabiac Inland Aquifer system, further improving water security for the Manning – Great Lakes water supply system.

"Severe water restrictions were enforced late last year during one of the worst droughts ever experienced in our region, and Council undertook several actions to ensure we could continue to supply emergency water to our largest population, in Manning and the northern Great Lakes areas," said Council's Director of Infrastructure and Engineering Services, Rob Scott.

"We are very pleased that the Federal Government will partner with us to complete Stage Two of the Nabiac Inland Aquifer scheme, which will build more capacity for Manning and the northern Great Lakes should we experience another prolonged drought."

The Nabiac Bore Field is an important element of Council's response to drought conditions.

Stage Two started late last year, to lift the Nabiac scheme's production to 12 million litres per day. At that time under the severe level four restrictions, the Nabiac plant was able to take some pressure off Bootawa Dam supplies until the drought ended.

"This grant allows us to now complete Stage Two, involving the duplication of most of the treatment process equipment. This will add six million litres per day to the plant's overall capacity, taking it to a treatment capacity of at least 18 million litres per day.

The estimated total cost of Stage Two is around \$6 million, with Council contributing the remainder of the cost. "This will place us in a much better position should we ever face such a crippling drought again," said Mr Scott.

With the return of regular rainfall this year, Bootawa Dam has now been completely refilled.

"To see the dam full again is a great contrast to earlier this year and a reminder of how responsive our system is to rainfall and river conditions".

New annual permits for cats and dogs Wednesday 1st July

MidCoast Council has welcomed the news that the NSW Government is introducing annual permits for **non-desexed cats** and restricted dangerous dogs, as a way of encouraging responsible pet ownership.

From **Wednesday 1st July**, owners of cats that are not desexed by four months of age will be required to pay an \$80 annual permit, in addition to their one-off lifetime pet registration fee.

Annual permits for non-desexed cats will create a stronger incentive to desex cats, which will in turn improve their health and wellbeing, including reducing the risk of some cancers.

Improving desexing rates will also lower demand on pounds and shelters, reduce euthanasia rates and help to address concerns about feral, stray and roaming cats and their impact on local wildlife. "This is great news from our perspective because anything that promotes responsible pet ownership means less animals in the pound and more information is available to us about the pets in our area," said Bruce Moore, MidCoast Council's Manager of Development Assessment.

Similarly from 1st July, owners of dogs of a restricted breed or formally declared to be dangerous will also be required to pay a \$195 annual permit in addition to their one-off lifetime pet registration fee.

"We hope this will serve as a further disincentive to owning high-risk dogs and encourage owners to better manage the behaviour of their animal," added Bruce.

"We see too many dog attacks in our region, with a serious attack happening only last week so this is more positive news to help us try and bring this number down."

From today, local pet owners will be able to pay for annual permits using the <u>NSW Pet Registry website</u> or through MidCoast Council.

Anyone registering a cat on the NSW Pet Registry will be informed that they must pay for an \$80 annual permit if their animal is not desexed by four months of age.

Annual permit fees will go directly to the Companion Animals Fund which pays for companion animal management by local Councils including pounds/shelters, ranger services, dog recreation areas, and education and awareness programs.

The fund is also used to operate the NSW Pet Registry and carry out responsible pet ownership initiatives.

Lyn's Larder

A good winter dish to warm the belly

BEEF AND CAPSICUM STEW WITH POLENTA DUMPLINGS

INGREDIENTS FOR STEW

2 tbsp Olive oil

1 kg Rump steak cut into 8cm pieces

1 tbsp Olive oil extra

2 Ige Red Capsicums, cut in 6cm piecesRed Onions cut into thin wedges

2 cloves Garlic, sliced

8cm piece of Ginger, slivered

1tbsp Sweet Paprika
½ tsp Chilli flakes
2 tbsp. Tomato paste'
1½ cups Beef stock
2 tbsp Balsamic vinegar

METHOD STEW

- 1. **Preheat oven** to moderate 180°C. Heat half the oil in a large heavy based pan. Add half the steak and cook on medium high for 1 minute on each side. Remove and repeat with remaining oil and steak. Place in a medium sized round casserole dish.
- 2. **Add extra oil** to pan. Cook capsicum, onions, garlic, ginger until they start to brown. Put into the casserole dish.
- 3. **Add paprika**, chilli flakes and tomato paste to the pan and cook, stirring, for 1-2 minutes. Cook further 1 minute with stock and vinegar added. Pour mixture over the meat and capsicum. Cover and place in the oven for 1 hour.
- 4. **Remove dish** from oven, uncover. Spoon heaped tablespoons of dumpling mixture (see below) on top of the meat, about 10-12 dumplings. Return to the oven uncovered for 10-15 minutes or until the dumplings have risen and are golden.

INGREDIENTS FOR DUMPLINGS

1 cup Self Raising Flour, sifted 1 cup Polenta ½ cup Tasty Cheese, grated 1cup Buttermilk Salt & Pepper

METHOD DUMPLINGS

Place flour and polenta in a medium mixing bowl, stir to combine. Add cheese, salt and pepper and mix through. Make a well in the centre of bowl and add buttermilk and stir through with a dinner knife until a soft dough is formed.



Amazing Book

book ... it was written over 3,000 years ago, has been translated into many languages and five billion copies have been printed. This book has shaped history, saved people from death and suicide, been used to teach reading and writing and is described as poetic literature. It is the most read book in the world.

Did you guess this is describing the Bible? It comes in many shapes and sizes and you can even get bible apps on your phone.

Writers like Shakespeare and Mark Twain referred to it and you'd be surprised how many of our expressions come from it ... eat drink and be merry ... by the skin of your teeth ... a fly in the ointment ... the blind leading the blind ... pride comes before a fall ... are just a few.

My children had high school ones from the Gideons and I have one my father gave me from an hotel room ... which I always felt guilty about owning.

You might be interested to know that the first *Sunday Schools* in Britain used the Bible as a base to teach *working* children to read and write. There are amazing stories from across all the wars ... of soldiers saved by a bible in their pocket and, in one case, of bullets from a plane coming through the tin hospital roof and striking the bible on the bedside table ... not the soldier.

You can read these on the internet by typing in - 'soldier saved by Bible'.

An especially moving one was about *Frank Viner* in the First World War. Some words from Psalm 91 went through his mind ... 'A thousand shall fall at your side and ten thousand at your right hand and you will not be harmed' ... and for some reason, he moved his Bible from his right hand to his left hand pocket, just before being hit

by a blast which threw him to the ground and killed his comrades. Shrapnel from the explosion embedded in the bible and thus his life was saved. His father had given him the bible for his 21st birthday.

There are more miraculous, incredible stories **in** the Bible ... the floating axehead (2 Kings 6), the sun standing still (Joshua 10), God killing an enemy army (2 Chronicles 32) ... plus many in the New Testament.

Whatever you think of the Bible, it's message is timeless and eternal – Houtos gar egapesen ho Theos ton cosmon or *God loves you*.

We know how important it is to hear from someone the words 'I love you', but what if you never heard those words in a language you understood? That's why translators continue the work of making the Bible available to more people worldwide.

God's Word is with us through every circumstance in life including wars and pandemics, speaking words of comfort and hope.

Why don't you read the Bible and find out what God is saying to you.


