MINIMBAH MATTERS

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade would like to remind everyone that we are now in the Bush Fire Danger Period and Fire Permits are required if you intend to light up.

FIRE PERMIT REQUIRED



Regardless of the time of year, if you are planning to burn on your property, there is always the requirement to let your neighbours and your local Fire Authority know, at least 24 hours before you light up. Also, the fire must not escape your property. These are legal requirements.

If it's information you are requiring, about things such as joining a Brigade, or contact details of your local Permit Issuing Officer, please call

- **On-line** Notification of your intention to burn.
- A more convenient way of notifying is on-line. You enter your details directly onto the system, and
- receive a receipt of having done so.
- Simply go onto www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify and follow the prompts.

L By using the new tool, you will be notified of any Total Fire Bans and will be advised to not proceed

with your burn.

If you do not have internet access, you can still notify the RFS by phone on 1300 643 262

Where the "Heck" are you?

While we were delivering our little Season Update/Get Ready packs last month, we noticed that several properties do not have a "Street number" visible. This time we weren't looking for your property specifically, but if it was on fire we would be.

Mid Coast Council have available, special posts with high visibility numbers on them, and they will install these for you. Installation is part of the fee. To apply for one of these you will need to complete a Rural Address Application either through the Council web site, or call in to a Council office.

It would be a time saver, and could be a life saver if the Ambulance service, Fire Fighters or other emergency service is trying to locate you.

Little things can mean a lot. RURAL



As has been proven time and time again, and especially in the 2019-20 Bush Fires, little things can mean a lot. In an emergency the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) and other emergency services often need to rely on Static Water Supplies.

In the past our Brigade has identified and marked many SWS in our area, and sought permission from the property owner to use these if and when required to help save properties. Times change, property owners change, water supplies change, and sometimes things slip through the cracks. We want to plug up a few cracks and once again need your help.

For an SWS to be useful to us, we require clear access and lots of water which can be accessed by fire trucks and sometimes helicopters. An SWS sign will be affixed to your front gatepost and we will know where to look for it.

Do you have one of these signs on your property and no longer feel it can safely be used by the emergency services? If this is the case, would you please help us out by removing the sign. It could be giving us false hope.

Perhaps you are new to the area and aren't sure why it is on your gatepost. We hope this information has been helpful.

Maybe you have a lovely full spring-fed dam in your paddocks, with no power lines close by, and access for fire trucks and the like, and would be happy for us to use it if we needed to. If so, please let us know.



Artist of the Month: Beate Brooks Tracy



Beate arrived in Australia in 1970 with her parents and brother, leaving behind family and friends in Germany to begin a brand-new life, settling initially in Adelaide. Within a short time, the family headed off for adventure to the tiny opal mining town of Andamooka, 600 km north of Adelaide in Central South Australia. It would be hard to imagine a more different lifestyle from the one they had left behind. A dry, dusty, brown environment with very little in the way of modern conveniences provided a huge contrast to their previous rich green European landscape.

Moving between Andamooka and Adelaide for the next few years, the family created a

simple lifestyle that Beate often found challenging as she navigated teenage years. In the early 1980's, when Beate was in Year 11, the family moved back to Germany for a time. Beate found herself in a rather mundane job, returning to Australia and then Germany again following love and partner for a time. Finally, back in Australia, Beate lived in Upper Bowman, a small community north west of Gloucester. Here she was a part of a very hands-on lifestyle, building a mud brick house, establishing solar power and even making her own plates and dishes for food. Beate gained a different perspective of life, and took part in pottery classes in Gloucester, meeting tutor and potter *Richard*

Beate created the hand-built pottery side of the business, with both teaching pottery students in Dyers Crossing, as well as selling and exhibiting their work to galleries in Canberra and further afield. The Wallamba Watershed's History – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, November, 1939, *by Bob Mann*

AERODROME AT NABIAC: £12,000 TO BE SPENT IN PREPARATION -SITE AN IDEAL ONE:- The Inspector of aerodromes wrote under date (?) to the Taree Municipal Council expressing appreciation of assistance by the Mayor and Alderman in standing for an aerodrome site in this district. Every site inspected would be investigated before a decision was made it was stated. At the meeting of the council on Wednesday night the Mayor stated that they had stated in that nights paper that a site near Nabiac was favoured. After many sites had been investigated that site was favoured . The site was 51/2 miles from Nabiac, it was crown land. They had brought before the Department all the sites in the district that had been reported to them. For sometime past offices of the Defence Department had been making inquiries in this district for a suitable site for an R.A.A.F. aerodrome and this week it was released that the site near Nabiac had been chosen for one in this district. In all £87000 will be spent in aerodromes, the allocations for the North Coast include Evans Head extension and improvements £5000, Coff Harbour £4000, Nabiac preparing areodrome £12000. We learn that the site selected is on the Southern side of the Wallamba River. About a mile or so beyond Nabiac is the Geln Ora turn off to the left known as Glenora Road. It is about 4 miles down the river to the beginning of the aerodrome area which will be 2 square miles. The road is only a rough bush one but it can be made into a good one without much expense. The area is perfectly dry and some miles south of and opposite to Failford, the land is of a sandy nature and is crown land.

The timber on it is of a small dimension so that clearing will not be a costly job. The site is some seven or eight miles from the ocean in a bird line and is remarkably level. The selection of the site should prove a big lever in the movement for a bridge across the river near Nabiac. It is understood that Mr *Charley Blows*' old Forster/Tuncurry ferry will be used to cart gravel from the Failford quary for the work. Messrs *H.E. Milligan* and *W.P. Chapman* Shire President of Taree, respectively and Mr *Montgomery* (Shire Engineer) spent a lot of time taking officers throughout the district on an inspection of possible sites. It is understood work will be commenced at an early date possibly next week.

<u>NABIAC, FEBRUARY, 1940</u>: Great iterest is being taken in the Naiac branch of the Manchester Unity Independent Order of Odd Fellows.



This lodge has only been opened here a little over 12 months and has won a Grand Masters Shield which is given every year to the lodge that has the most i*nitions* in Australia for 12 months. This speaks volumes for th popularity of the above society. I believe all memers are looking forward to this visit to the Taree branch next Monday where they will play for the Eucha Shield which Taree now holds and they are confident of people to see a car go by and leave no cloud of dust blowing into their shops.

We are experiencing a very dry time at present. Many farmers are having difficulty in obtaingng water for their stock and most pastures look as bare and brown as the road. It is to be hoped rains will come soon for this part of the district.

LABOR AT NABIAC AERODROME - LETT TO MR BENNETT, SYDNEY MARCH 7TH, 1940: "With regards to the personal representation

MARCH 7TH, 1940: "With regards to the personal representation made by you on behalf of Mr Magennis of Nabiac in respect to the employment of labor at the Nabiac Aerodrome, I have to advise you that before this work is commenced instructions were issued that in the engagement of labour therewith, consideration was give to the suitable unemployed to the 1st November last at Nabiac - Taree - Forster and Coopernook and in accordence with this instruction information has been received by the Departemtn that the whole of the suitable married men registered for employement at Nabiac to the 1st November at Nabiac were engaged for this work from the centres mentioned were as follows - Nabiac 6, Taree 10, Forster 10, and two carpenters from Gloucester. The next call is to be made up from the unemployed at Coopernook, but in all cases the engagements concerned were made from the unemployed register at the State Labour prior to the 1st November. In the engagement of any additional men for this work, consideration will be give to the claims of local married men who were registered at Nabiac.
