

A round this time last year we were surrounded by fires at Minimbah, at Failford and across Mount

Talawahl. People living in those areas were protecting property and our volunteer fire fighters were working hard to protect us all. Some people evacuated to the town oval and to other towns nearby. We then waited anxiously through the Summer months for rain to break the drought, only to be introduced to another unimagined threat. COVID 19 has set the rules this year.

Throughout the last 10 months of COVID restrictions we have been fortunate to live in a relatively safe place, with many caring people and much community involvement. There are opportunities in this area to be involved in activities such as sporting groups, dance, yoga, aerobics, and art and craft groups, to mention just a few. There are also opportunities to be involved as a volunteer in places such as the School and preschool, local Fire Brigades, SES, Op Shop, Community Garden, Show Committee... the list is long.

Nabiac Village Futures Group supports the planning for local facilities and equipment. 

When he retired in July, 2019, he was as one of the most beloved and respected Governors General in Australia's history. Lush green grass in the paddock looks wonderful, but when the heat hits and the winds blow, and that grass dies off and turns brown, it loses some of its appeal. It also becomes very dangerous from a fire point of view. Dry thunderstorms, a cigarette butt, an empty glass jar or bottle lying in the sun, a slasher hitting a rock. They are all real threats and with the exception of the slasher, don't necessarily wait for someone to be present when they strike. Please, do you best to keep your grass down.



Free Permits! Get your permits here! Fire permits are currently required, so if you are having a vegetation clean-up, once you have your property prepared, please contact your local Permit Issuing Officer for a permit.



Having received a permit, you are then legally required to advise your neighbours and your local fire authority of your intention to burn. This notification needs to be at least 24 hours' before you light up. You can notify the

You may prefer the convenience of notifying on-line. You enter your details directly onto the system, and receive a receipt of having done


Simply go onto www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify and follow the prompts.

The Op Shop is in need of good, clean saleable bed linen. If you are able to help please bring them in during Opening hours. Please do not put them in the Donation bin.



Sec *Pam* gave her report on the activities and achievements during the year then a very brief Treasurer report of the financial position was presented by President Margaret on behalf of Treasurer *Mary* who wasn't able to present at the meeting.

*Merle* followed with her Handicraft report and was pleased with what had been achieved but so many of the days were cancelled, including the State Conference which she and *Penny* had both planned to attend.

Penny's International Report was somewhat shortened due to fact that most branches were forced to cancel their International Days on this year's country of Study – Ecuador - and even the State Study Seminar was called off. We are still learning much about this South American Country but without our Branch International Day, funds for International work of ACWW and other projects supported by the branch have been put on hold.

Jean Price, our Cookery Officer, thanked all who had participated in the Group Competition that were able to be held with the Branch members Coral, Ruth and Merle gaining places with their entries – Congratulations ladies.

Ruth presented the report on Ag & Environment projects for 2020 which were Waratahs, Whales and Wild Dogs and showed off the comprehensive scrapbook she had made on Waratahs which was a credit to her.

Penny spoke briefly on the Cultural segments which take place at each meeting and she thanked all members for their contributions and making it varied and interesting.

Finally our Catering Officer, Beth, had her turn to report and thanked the ladies for their efforts with the couple of events which were catered



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# Nabiac Landcare



A fter spending most of the winter doing follow up weeding at the Bullock Wharf reserve, Nabiac Landcare volunteers have moved on to the small block by the Catholic Church. About five years ago we cleared a major privet and camphor laurel infestation from the area and have been doing regular follow up. The Hoskin Street end of the block has the best soil and therefore, the 'best' weeds. Most weeds that we are removing are seedlings of fruiting plants, the seeds most likely brought in by birds.

Two weeds have caught my eye in the bush in the past couple of months, both are garden escapees. Our first-- ferny asparagus, *Asparagus plumosus*, once a popular house plant, although I can't imagine why. It's wiry, ferny stems are armed with nasty little curved spikes. It is now considered a serious environmental weed. In true weedy asparagus fashion it is very hard to kill. It sets purple black berries that birds eat and spread the



seed. If a plant is large, its stems may climb 5 metres into trees; it is best to cut the stems near the base and dig out the crown. Have a look at Weedwise (<u>https://weeds.dpi.nsw.gov.au/Weeds/</u> <u>Climbingasparagusfern</u>) for further information.



The second environmental weed is actually one of my favourite scented garden plants, the vine, **Japanese honeysuckle** (*Lonicera japonica*). Honeysuckle is best kept in a position where is cannot escape either under or over the fence. If allowed to roam it may travel many metres under mulch or through grass setting down

roots at every node; once it finds a suitable bush it will climb many metres into the trees. It smothers and weighs down the vegetation that it climbs. It also can occasionally set juicy black berries that birds love. I noticed when researching this plant that words like '*robust*' and '*aggressive*' were used. It is also toxic and irritating to the skin. https://weeds.dpi.nsw.gov.au/Weeds/JapaneseHoneysuckle

On a less than happy note, there continues to be damage to the tracks at the Bullock Wharf reserve. One track is now almost





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impassable when wet due to damage caused by 4-wheel drive vehicles. Recently someone has taken it upon themself to build small jumps in the other main path digging the soil from the surrounding bush and cutting some trees.

Nabiac Landcare works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by morning tea. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. Most of all enjoy the local bush!

100,000 new apprenticeships and traineeships will be supported with a 50% wage subsidy for businesses who employ them. This is in addition to the 180,000 existing apprenticeships and trainees that are being protected.

The new JobTrainer fund will create up to 340,000 free or lowcost training places for school leavers and job seekers. 50,000 new higher education short courses will be available, including in health, IT, agriculture, science and teaching. New cadetships and apprenticeships are being provided for women in science, technology, engineering and mathematics


Planning for the project started in earnest from early 2020, although many would say discussions involving the need for a new kiosk have been going on for several years.

*L* to *R* : John Baker, Show President, receiving the cheque from Steve Bromhead, M.P. & Dan Aldridge from MidCoast Council


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# \$253,824 for new kiosk at Nabiac Showground

In conjunction with the MidCoast Council, the Wallamba District Show Committee has secured funding to replace the old kiosk at the Nabiac Showground, which is located on the cattle pavilion side of the ground.

This funding has been made available through the NSW Government Crown Lands Showgrounds Stimulus Funding Program and was strongly supported by the Member for Myall Lakes, **Stephen Bromhead.** 

The President of the Wallamba District Show Committee, Mr **John Baker** said "The construction of this multi-purpose kiosk will accommodate the food preparation, alcohol service and hot/cold

food sales requirements of the many community groups that use the Showground throughout the year".

The existing kiosk is in very poor order, with limited facilities and is currently marked for demolition in the draft Plan of Management being studied by the MidCoast Council.

The Member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead said the current kiosk is no longer properly equipped to service the Nabiac community.

"The current infrastructure means community groups have been limited to serving commercially produced snacks and drinks," Mr Bromhead said.

"I'm proud to support the construction of the new multipurpose kiosk which will be a game changer for Nabiac Showgrounds."

"The new multipurpose facility will support safe food preparation, handling and serving for users of all ages and abilities."

"Minimising disruption for community groups the old kiosk will remain operational as the new facility is constructed," Mr Bromhead said. Mr Baker said the MidCoast Council have been an enthusiastic supporter of the project and will manage the construction of the new kiosk and ultimately the demolition of the existing one.

"While there is still uncertainty surrounding the running of the 2021 show, this new facility will stand as a vital piece of showground infrastructure for decades to come." Mr Baker concluded.





The Wallamba Watershed's History – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, May, 1940, by Bob Mann

DYERS CROSSING: More than 50 years ago a noble band of pioneers settled in this district and commenced the task of clearing and preparing the land for production and though the task was great the hardship severe and the hours long, they persevered until successful. They were imbued with the true spirit for quite an early start was made with the construction of a place of worship. St John's was one of the first places of worship on the Wallamba, came into being 58 years ago on a site in the vicinity of Koribar. It was erected by the late John *McCoy* at a cost of £50 and pit sawn timber was used throughout. With the advent of dairying however, the centre of population moved somewhat closer to the factory and it was considered advisable to remove the church to its present site. This was done 16 years ago. The work of rebuilding was by the late Mr W. Batchelor. Mr James Harris, the veteran carrier who is still an ardent follower of the church, did the cartage free and among those who assisted in rebuilding were as follows - Messrs George, Dick and James Harris, G.E Stevens, A.D. Murray and H. Schuberg. Although the timber in the building remained solid it was decided to make a move for the erection of a new church which would be more keeping with the progress of the district and 4 years ago the commencement was made with the collection of the necessary funds. The response was excellent and by means of home parties and other social functions, sufficient cash was obtained to make a start with the work. The contractor was Mr A.E. Woodward of Nabiac, who carried out his work faithfully and well. The seating accommodation was the work of Mr J. Butler and the painting was done by Mr Cornish of Taree. The building is of very suitable design for the country and is all that can be desired. It is indeed a fitting climax to the labours of the people. The church was dedicated on January 27<sup>th</sup>. The first services were held on May 5<sup>th</sup> and were largely attended. The old St John's building is being retained as a hall and it is intended that activities in connection with the church will now have a building for their conveniences.

The church officers of St John's are at present Rector:- *Rev R.V. Harrington*, Rectors Warden:- Mr *Pat Stevens*, Wardens:- Messrs *Pat Stevens*, *Alf Newell and C.C. Paff*, Server;- Mr *Harry Murray*. Organist:-Mr *Windsor*. Messrs *Pat* and *George Stevens* deserve special mention for the work they did in connection with the new building. The following donations were given to the church. A **Cross**  in memory of the late Mr *Henry Avery* by the Avery family, Mrs *A.D Murray, Mrs G. Wells, Mrs Roy Spooner, Mr Harry Avery* and *Mrs Harry Avery* (snr); **Candlesticks** in memory of the late *John Stevens* by his wife and son Mr *G.E. Stevens and Joanne Stevens*; **Pyx** in memory of the late Mr *Henry Stevens* by his wife *Phylaine, Stevens.* The Parochial Council contributed the cost of the Prayer Book for the desk and Mrs *Sellon* also donated a prayer book. The **Font** was the gift of the *Rev Harrington* as was also the other wood work for the alter. Mrs *Lyn Stevens* also made some beautiful coverings. A substantial gift from the Bishop towards the building was also received.


In a recent report for the opening of St Johns church it was omitted that the land for the original church which was moved from Koribar was donated by Mr *Finch* some years ago

#### Got a vegan coming to dinner?!

... These sweet potato patties are easy to

make, yummy and versatile - a good accompaniment for BBQs, fish and stews, so everyone can enjoy. Gluten, dairy, meat free, they're bound to suit most.

A delicious balanced vegan meal can be baking in the oven, whilst salads are being created and lovely pasture-raised fare is on the BBQ.

- 1 large sweet potato
- 1-2 medium potatoes
- 1 onion
- 2-3 radish finely chopped
- 2-3 shallots finely chopped
- 2-3 cloves garlic
- 1 tin white beans

Ground black pepper, salt turmeric & dried herbs to taste

- 2-3 large handfuls of chopped rocket
- Fresh herbs coriander or parsley

1 dessert spoon of flax.

\*Note: Normally 1 spoonful of flax meal + 3 spoonsful of water will replace an egg. I find that there's enough moisture in the boiled veggies to absorb the flax in this recipe.



Boil the potatoes, onion, and tinned beans.

Finely chop the rocket and fresh herbs, radish, shallots and garlic Drain the potatoes, add 1-2 teaspoons turmeric, garlic, black pepper and salt

Add the rest of the ingredients, stir/mash to the desired consistency, ensuring the spices and flax are stirred through.

\*I like it left rustic chunky, but it can work mashed.

Place spoonsful onto an oven tray, sprinkle some almond meal on top and pat into shape – (my quick version, instead of rolling them in the almond meal).

Bake at 200c for approx 20 mins.

Serve with guacamole and/or ratatouille.



Imagine life without mobile phones, WI-FI, GPS, Bluetooth devices, or microwave ovens. That's the way it is in the little town of Green Bank, West Virginia, known as *the quietest town in America*.

It's also the location of the Green Bank Observatory, the world's largest steerable radio telescope. The telescope needs *quiet* to *listen* to naturally occurring radio waves emitted by the movement of pulsars and galaxies in deep space. It has a surface area larger than a football field and stands in the centre of the National Radio Quiet Zone, a 13,000-square-mile area established to prevent electronic interference to the telescope's extreme sensitivity. It has been the pioneer in modern radio astronomy since the 1950's.

This intentional quiet enables scientists to hear "the music of the spheres". The people who choose to live in this town also enjoy a quieter life … BBQs instead of microwaves sounds appealing to me.

This reminds me of how we need to quiet ourselves enough to listen to the **One who created the universe**. In our everyday, busy lives, who wouldn't like some quiet time? My daughter used to intentionally turn off the TV when the children were young and tell them *we're going to have some quiet time now*.

The Green Bank telescope makes many discoveries ... one is a large hydrogen gas super bubble, 23,000 light years away. If this boggles the mind it is good to remember that God is much closer than that.
