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Proposed traffic changes at Nabiac



A proposal to alter traffic conditions at the 4-way intersection of Dibbs Street / Woosters Lane and the Pacific Highway at Nabiac is currently open for feedback.

The roadworks upgrades and modifications are proposed as part of the Highway Service Centre development at the existing caravan sales site, on the Pacific Highway immediately to the north of the Nabiac township.

Entry and exit ramps to and from the site of the service centre are conditions of the development consent. Following the design review process of the proposed modifications with Transport for New South Wales (TfNSW), it has been determined that additional intersection modifications will be required to improve the safety of the surrounding road network.

Under the proposal, travellers heading north on the Pacific Highway would no longer have the option to turn right into Dibbs Street, and vehicles exiting Woosters Lane would no longer be able to cross into Dibbs Street or turn right into the southbound lane of the Pacific Highway.

For northbound vehicles accessing Nabiac, the safest option is to use the overpass at the western end of town. If vehicles are accessing the highway to the east of this overpass, there is an existing u-turn bay at Pipeclay Creek Road approximately 1km to the north of the Woosters/ Dibbs Street intersection.

Motorists travelling south on the Pacific Highway, and traffic exiting Dibbs Street will not be affected.

Submissions close at 4.30pm on Thursday 25 February, 2021.

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
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MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID Australia

Since COVID-19 hit the planet, more people are reporting they are struggling with their mental health. However, if someone divulges this information to their loved ones, friends or work colleagues, they often feel that those they turn to have very little skills to be able to assist. Whilst it is mandatory to have physical First Aid courses in many workplaces, there is a lack of awareness that there are actually Mental Health First Aid courses available. Mental Health First Aid Australia designed these courses over 20 years ago and they are available in over 25 countries around the World. In Australia, mental illness is the cause of the 3rd largest disease burden - it's the biggest cause of disease burden for 15-24 year old's. Furthermore, Mental ill health costs Australian workplaces \$4.7 BILLION in absenteeism, \$1.6 BILLION in presenteeism AND \$146 MILLION in compensation claims per year. Out of 700 schools surveyed, 80% reported they had seen increase in depression and anxiety in their students.

One person who is appalled by these statistics is Caroline Haines. She has been delivering a variety of Mental Health First Aid courses for over 3 years and is an Accredited Principal Master Instructor. These courses are designed to assist a person who may be experiencing a mental health problem or mental health crisis until appropriate professional help is received or the crisis resolves, using a practical, evidence-based action plan. Some of the topics covered include Anxiety, Depression, Severe Psychotic States including Schizophrenia, Eating disorders, Substance Use Problems and Severe Effects of Drugs and Alcohol Abuse, Bipolar, Suicide and Non-Suicidal Self Injuries (self-harm) Panic Attacks, Traumatic Events, and Aggressive Behaviours. These courses are based on guidelines developed through the expert consensus of people with lived experience of mental health problems as well as professionals. There are courses aimed at assisting 12-24 year old's, Youth, Over 18's, work places, schools and the community and are open to all.

Throughout her career, Caroline's roles have included working with clients who have mental health &/or physical health issues. With a degree in Social Anthropology and also extensive experience working with people from young children to seniors from all walks of life both in Australia and overseas, she enjoys being able to connect with a wide range of audiences. She has actually lived and worked in 6 different countries! Caroline says she has finally found a place to put down roots in beautiful Nabiac and is looking forward to contributing to the mental health of the immediate community and beyond. \rightarrow

Ross River Fever is still affecting significant numbers of people in our local area. NSW advises the following;

The vaccination of the Australian population is a mammoth task. It is going to involve 240,000 doses being administered each week day nationwide for nine months. This is on top of influenza doses.

Lets stick to the facts that we know for sure;

It's safe, you'll need two doses three weeks apart, you'll need a flu vaccination separately, flu doses cant be given at the same time, most people will have to wait many months to get it, we don't know yet how well it will work to stop the spread and reduce mortality.

There is quite genuinely no better place in the world to be right now, please keep up all the good work in keeping COVID away.

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

Helen Smith, founder of Nabiac Farmers Market, sadly passed away 23rd December 2020.



Member *Lyn Matthews* has supplied the thought for February's meeting to be read in her absence.



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Nabiac Landcare

As I sit here and contemplate my knee high grass--yes, two mowers and a slasher have died at the shock of having to

cope with the blessings from 500 mm rain—I'm thinking the garden could use a drop or two! I'm so amazed at the recovery of our local area after fire and drought. I don't think any of us will forget the bare paddocks and empty dams of January 2020 for a long time.

The recent rains have triggered a lush growth in two native plants that do an amazing job suppressing weeds and protecting the soil from hot sun and erosion. The 'good guys' this month are Basket Grass (Oplismenus \rightarrow

<u>Landcare Network (hunterlandcare.org.au)</u> This link can help you distinguish between the native commelina and the similar white flowered weed tradescantia.

Although usually thought of as plants from moist subtropical forests, both are doing very well in my garden in full sun. If they are encroaching on young saplings or other desirable plants just free up the plants by mowing or trimming around them. Avoid spraying with herbicides since the bare ground will only encourage more weeds.

In my neighbourhood the bloodwoods are blooming. You may



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actually get a whiff of their heady honey scent and hear the buzzing of pollinators before you actually see the cream coloured flowers high in the tree. Enjoy the experience.

Nabiac Landcare is still on our summer break but will be returning to the bush in Nabiac in early February. We work each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by morning tea. Long term members of our group were saddened in 2020 by the illness and the passing away of Helen Smith in December 2020. Helen joined NVFG when the new bridge over the Wallamba was being built and the Pacific Highway changes were impacting on our town.

Helen was also involved when the Community Technology Centre was established and worked tirelessly to establish the Nabiac Farmers Market. Helen wrote the vision for Nabiac that forms an important part of our Nabiac Community Strategic Plan. 2016-2021. If you knew Helen then you'll recognize her in the Vision.

<u>Our Vision for Tomorrow and Beyond</u> Written by Helen Smith (for 2016-2021)

Our vision sees Nabiac as a vibrant historical rural village with a strong environmental sustainability focus. It is a friendly place, where people of all ages participate in activities that nurture the beautiful environment, enjoy arts and cultural events as well as promote a healthy lifestyle. Many families choose to live in Nabiac as there is something for everyone. Perceptions of safety are high. Community groups are vibrant, strong, open and friendly, with plenty of willing volunteers.

Our older people are able to continue living in the community they know, with support from family, friends, local medical practitioners, support services and regular visiting medical specialists. There is a purpose built retirement or aged care facility. It is easy to catch a bus to Forster or Taree if further services are needed.

The entrances into Nabiac Village are attractive and colourful. Public spaces in and around the Village are beautifully planted out and residents enjoy walking along shaded pathways through restored natural habitats along Town Creek. The boat ramp and picnic area near the river are very popular with picnickers and water sport enthusiasts. There are a number of art installations dotted throughout the village which tells stories of Nabiac - past, present and future. Local produce is valued and celebrated. Outlets for local produce attract shoppers from across the district looking for high quality fresh food and local eateries promote local producers.

The village is well connected with footpaths and cycle ways, supporting residents and visitors of all ages and abilities to get around the village and shopping centre with ease. The pathway networks are well signed with interpretive signage to highlight the natural and human history of the area. Road surfaces are well maintained with ample parking for cars, truck and caravans.

Nabiac is known as a 'Gateway' to the Manning Valley and Great Lakes. It thrives 7 days per week because of the eclectic mix of shops while retaining its rural village charm. This blend of contemporary style with old world charm brings a rich cultural feel to the village. New businesses abound and offer employment for locals without overdeveloping the area. The village boasts a variety of charming village style shops and eateries, with many places to sit and chat or meet up with friends and visitors. Shopping is encouraged by good directional signage, colourful and quirky shop fronts and plenty of accessible parking for cars as well as caravans and RVs.

The town is home to many artists and craftspeople. There are art, music and social events and activities both in the shopping district as well as at the showground. The showground is a drawcard for community activities as well as eco and agri-tourism and people travelling with horses. The nearby sport precinct supports a range of activities and is a favourite place for young people.


If you would just like to enjoy some company, but not play, that is fine too. There is no charge for a social visit! Come along, everyone is most welcome!

The funds were received in December, the order placed and a

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
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celebratory presentation by Stephen Bromhead MP was made in January.

Remembering Helen Smith, who passed away on 22nd December 2020.

Helen founded Nabiac Farmers' Market in August 2003.

An article about the first market day, sent through to me by Helen's husband Bruce Glimmerveen, outlines how Helen was inspired by the wonderful markets in Europe with their beautiful array of fresh produce, olives, wine and cheeses.

She observed that market stalls in Pyrmont, Sydney, were flourishing and stalls cost as much as \$250 each. Whilst Nabiac Farmers' Market was not for profit, with a minimal stall cost, Helen was reassured by this potential for the market to be a viable organisation.

Helen created aims for the market which are still staunchly adhered to today, including:

- To support sustainable choices and systems, agricultural diversity and environmental conversation and reduce "food miles"
- Stimulate the local economic environment
- Promote social and cultural development between community members
- Increase income for farmers and stimulate value adding
- Inform the public about the benefits of farmers markets, health, agriculture and job creation in the region.
- Provide a diverse range of quality products.

I chatted with Helen nearly two years ago to gain her input for a feature on the market in Focus magazine:

"Helen relayed her desire to connect people with locally grown produce, in a convivial atmosphere. Creating a place which brings people together. The market also has a positive impact on the local economy. It's been satisfying to see how many people have started a new business, based on the ready platform of a market stall.

The market continues to flourish, thanks to a motivated market management team, volunteers and members of the local community who are passionate about the market's place in Nabiac".

Today the cost of a stall is \$25-30. The market continues to thrive, with around 70 stalls, encompassing a wide range of high-quality produce and artisan wares.

The motto of "Home-baked, home-made, home-grown" has been the ethos of the market from day one.

Helen was a truly inspiring, wonderful person and a passionate wildlife lover, with an impressive range of life achievements.

We all thank you Helen, for starting something so essential and pivotal to country life.



Sweet Potato Brownie

Sourcing recipes which are healthy and delicious is one of my missions, since most people I know love a treat and I like to make it healthy!



It's not surprising that these are different from your usual brownie, with a sticky texture and

different kind of sweetness. These are dairy and gluten free and contain no refined sugar. Sweet potato brownies definitely tick the box for a yummy treat with fab nutrient density.

This recipe received a thumbs up from my family, so thought it was a good one to share.

RECIPE:

- 2 medium sweet potatoes
- 2 cups pitted dates (soaked overnight) I forgot to soak mine last time, so just simmered them for 20 mins, then allowed to cool)
- coconut oil (I've also tried with almond butter from a local market which was delicious too)
- 1 cup almond meal
- 1/2 cup buckwheat flour
- 2 tablespoons almond milk
- 1 tablespoon raw cacao
- 3/4 cup vegan chocolate (or quality ethical chocolate) melted
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp Himalayan rock salt
 - coconut and/or hemp seeds to sprinkle on top for you guessed itextra goodness?

Method:

- Pre-heat oven to 180 degrees
- Peel, chop and boil the sweet potatoes. allow to cool (can place in fridge to speed up)
- Place the cooled sweet spuds in the food processor with the dates and coconut oil
- Add the almond meal, buckwheat, milk, cacao, salt and baking powder - process until combined
- Add the melted chocolate and pulse enough to combine.
- Turn onto a lined tray and bake for 25 mins

Cut into portions to serve or freeze. I like to cut mine into tiny squares. The perfect pick-me-up with a cup of tea or served as a dessert with yoghurt or ice-cream and fruit.


Sweet potato facts:

It originates from a different family from the regular spud and yams are different again.

Sweet spuds are a good source of fibre, antioxidants and have antiinflammatory compounds, which help reduce the risk of chronic disease. They possess Vitamin A, B6, potassium and Vitamin C (*although the heating would deplete the Vitamin C)

The leaves are edible and are also a rich source of nutrients.

The Wallamba Watershed's History – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, 1940, *by Bob Mann*

DYERS CROSSING - SEPTEMBER, 1940: As the result of the general rain which fell during the week a little over an inch was recorded locally. It is hoped that this will be forerunner of more substantial falls. The pastures are responding rapidly however and even now are being coated in a mantle of green. At the moment the farmers are working overtime to get the crops in and retain the moisture.

Great enthusiasm is being shown in the local detachment of the Voluntary Brigade which parades each Saturday. The enrolment is upwards of 50 and each week new recruits are forthcoming. A supply of wooden rifles has been ordered and Mr *Merve Milligan* is making arrangements for the installation of electric lights for night parades so that ere long we should present quite a formidable force. Mr *Lindlay* has volunteered to give a course in signalling and lectures in First Aid which will lead to the St Johns Ambulance Certificate and are to commence shortly. Any of the lads interested in these branches of the work are asked to communicate with one of the instructors as soon as possible. Mr *Bradley* is in charge of the troop and his assistants locally are Messrs *Harry Croker, Tom Lynch* and *Mr Squance*. A pleasing feature of the work which needs special commendation is the fact that a number of the local ladies provide afternoon tea free of charge for the boys on parade. This action is greatly appreciated.

During the coming season the Department is desirous of extending the Junior Farmer Movement on the Wallamba and when we realise how the war effort can be assisted by the increased production on the land it is hoped that all boys will endeavour to join one of the clubs. At present there are 40 members on the Wallamba but this can be greatly increased. A field day has been arranged for Saturday 12th October at Mr *Higgins* at Karkatt at which all boys are invited to be present.

The P & C Association, in conjunction with the Australian Broadcasting Commission, have recently installed in the Cocumbark area a modern wireless set of the 5 valve vibrator type. The reception of the school broadcasts is excellent and the children should derive much benefit from this popular feature.

Among the local members of the A.I.F. who were recently home on leave we noticed *Neil McFadyen*, *Glen Startin and Viv*, *Bob and Forster Stevens*. They all appear to be well and happy. Mrs *Sid Abbott* has spent several weeks in Wingham owing to the illness of her mother, Mrs *Murray*, whose condition has improved slightly during the past few days.

Mr *Bill Gollen* of the local factory staff is on annual leave, most of which he is spending on the Manning.

It is sometime since the district has had such an epidemic of common complaints; whooping cough, chicken pox, influenza and German measles have been very common and in many cases severe. Not many homes have escaped one or more of the maladies. Mr *George Stevens* of the factory staff has just resumed work after being ill for sometime. We hope that a break in the weather will have the effect of cleansing up these complaints. Little *Val Newell* is at present nursing a broken leg as the result of a fall from a swing. Her leg is in plaster and her condition is very satisfactory.

NABIAC AERODROME VISIT OF AIR COMMANDORE, OCTOBER, 1940

The first plane to land on the Nabiac Aerodrome was a small machine which arrived on Wednesday. On Thursday about 10:45 an Aero Anson Light Bomber machine with five persons on board (2 pilots) landed on the drome. There was quite a big gathering of the Public including Nabiac School children. Air Commander Cole-Air Officer commanding the Royal Australian Air Force and Group Captain *Wilson* (members of the Aerodrome Selection Committee) and Squadron Leader *Waddy* visited the drome. They were met by the Shire President (Cr. *H.E. Milligan*) Shire Clerk Mr *S.S. Shepherd* and the Shire Engineer (Mr *Lipscombe*) who discussed matters in connection with district facilities. The Mayor of Taree, Alderman *W.P. Chapman* and Cr. *J.W. Breckenridge* were also present. We hear that when underway there will be many men at the drome. The electric light and sewerage are to be installed.

<u>COOLONGOLOOK</u>: A very successful euchre party and dance was held in the local hall on the evening of the 19^{th} in aid of the Sunday School. There was an excellent attendance of dancers and card players. The winners of the prizes were Miss *Nell Worth* and Mr *Nat Cheers*. The music was by Messrs *F. Batcheldor* and *G. Cheers*.

A series of thunderstorms on the afternoon of the 20^{th} resulted in a fall of 108 points of rain which will be very beneficial. There was some hail with the rain but not enough to do ay damage. A further fall of rain was recorded on Friday 25*th* when 50 points were recorded.

Our Grey Ghosts have been on the move again.

Just missed the December edition, but here are some thoughts of our trip to Temora late November for personal reasons.

Harvest was in full swing and the best result any of the old timers can recall. The amount of canola, barley and of course wheat was staggering. Silos were full and extra outside storage was a matter of priority, acres of it.

A real eye opener and the organisation was a marvel to witness. Some harvesters this year have 12m (40ft) combs out front and can strip 50tons per hour. Air conditioned cabs and a constant supply of information as to how much grain in the bin controls to auger the grain into the chaser bin and to witness the river of grain pouring into the machine at 6kmh is staggering.

Each header can store about 6 tons whilst a "chaser" bin and tractor (with the bride on board) follows the headers to receive the clean grain without stopping, can carry 30 tons. A "mother bin on the property we were fortunate to visit stores 150tonns so there is a constant flow of grain ending up in this large bin. This must not be allowed to overflow otherwise the whole operation stops. A constant flow of "B" doubles have the grain augured into them then transported to storage, where, before dumping, it must be graded as to moisture, quality weight and variety. A very precise system and nothing stops

"What about the Chinese not taking our grain?". Not one farmer was worried, markets are evidently assured and prices good. Prices at any silo can vary several times a day and if one buyer is offering slightly more than another, trucks are directed wherever, no loyalty here.

During a harvest visit during the drought in 2019, a friend had planted crops for 4 years and had virtually no return. For them the cost for each planting was in the region of \$250K so everyone needed this result. The optimism is evident everywhere, from the hairdresser to the pubs to any business, all are in a great mood.

We came home with a new perspective, if you get the opportunity to witness this event, go and see for yourself.

Upgrade underway on Avalon Road



A section of busy Avalon Road near Dyers Crossing is the latest target for remediation, as MidCoast Council's engineering team continues its focus on improving the roads that connect local communities.

The current project, which kicked off this month, involves widening and reconstructing a 3.2 kilometre stretch of Avalon Road between the Wallanbah Road intersection and Idalorn Close.

The upgrade complements work previously undertaken on Avalon Road, from Germany Lane to Idalorn Close in 2019, and from Fire Station Road to Paterson Lane in 2020. All three stages of the Avalon Road works have been funded by the NSW Government in association with Council as part of the \$100M Road Upgrade package.

Works will be undertaken by contractors on behalf of Council and are scheduled for completion at the end of June 2021, weather permitting. Along with widening and reconstructing the existing road pavement, improvements will be made to roadside drainage, signage and guideposts. Finishing with a two coat bitumen seal, the result will provide a wider, smoother and safer driving surface.

The work has been scheduled to take place Mondays to Fridays from 7am to 6pm, however reduced speed limits will apply at all times. While the road will remain open to through traffic at all stages of construction, lane closures will be required at times, with one-way traffic managed under traffic control.

Motorists can expect minor delays and are asked to observe all signage and directions from crews, and to travel with caution in the vicinity of the works.

Bulky waste collection to resume in 2021

The annual bulky waste and scrap metal kerbside collection service will return to the MidCoast region this year, kicking off for residents in the Manning area on Monday 22 February.

The service provides local residents with a hassle-free way to dispose of those larger, unwanted household items by placing them on the kerbside for collection. From unused furniture and electrical appliances that don't fit in your wheelie bin, to old pushbikes, lawnmowers or wheelbarrows, now's the time to start thinking about cleaning up around your home to make the most of the popular yearly collection.

"We know locals look forward to the bulky waste collection, but there are rules and guidelines in place that we ask everyone to follow", explained Dan Aldridge, Acting Director of Liveable Communities for MidCoast Council.

The collection starts in the Manning region in February, continuing through to the end of March. While households will receive a letterbox brochure outlining when and how waste should be placed out for collection, the information can also be found at www.midcoast.nsw.gov.au/bulkywaste2021.

Waste must be separated into two piles - one for scrap metal and whitegoods, and a separate pile for general and electronic waste – and placed neatly on the kerb no earlier than specified.

"Waste items presented too early, or rejected items left out after the collection has taken place, are considered illegal dumping which attracts a hefty fine", Dan said. "No-one likes to see rubbish scattered along our residential streets for any longer than necessary".

Tip vouchers issued in lieu of the cancelled service remain valid until June 2021 and provide an opportunity to drop items – some of which are not included in the kerbside collection – to our waste management centres for free.

Yalawanyi Ganya's first exhibition

The public gallery space at Yalawanyi Ganya (ie the new MidCoast Council Building) will welcome its first pieces of art in January with a very special exhibition that is close to curator Rachel Piercy's heart. Rachel is the Director of Manning Regional Art Gallery but first and foremost she is a proud Murrawarri woman and her culture has always driven her passion for art.

The theme of the exhibition is about the strength and resilience of First Nations people and what has been described as the cultural renaissance currently taking place in South-eastern Australia.

"This exhibition gives an insight into the strength and resilience of the custodians of the land we live and work on, the Biripi and Worimi people," explained Rachel.

"Titled *Barray marrung duumu*, meaning 'Keep Country well' it is a reflection of and ode to the groundswell of interest and revival of culture in our area."

Leading aspects of the cultural revival include the creation of canoes, weapons, possum skin cloaks, tools and weaving baskets, speaking language, performing ceremonies and caring for Country.

Gathang is the language of the Birrbay, Warrimay and Guringay people and the revival of their language has helped to ignite a deeper connection to the land and strengthen the focus of many.

As Wiradjuri/Kamilaroi artist Jonathan Jones has observed – "this region is commonly recognised as ground zero within Aboriginal colonial history, Kooris are dogged with stale one-liners about the loss of culture. Culture was damaged but not destroyed. Our fires have not gone out, they are still burning – sometimes just embers mixed with memories but with the guidance of our Elders and the enthusiasm of many, the fires are being stoked and the south-east is alight."

The exhibition includes Biripi and Worimi weavings created at the Manning Regional Art Gallery during the devastating fires of 2019. Community members used the safe and cool space of the gallery to share stories, have a cuppa, debrief and weave stories of the area with Aboriginal weavers and Elders as part of the Saltwater Freshwater Aboriginal Art Award and Cultural Object Touring exhibition.

"The resulting works are stunning examples of Aboriginal cultural practice, which can be shared with all," added Rachel.

Also among the works are the original pieces by local artists Brittany Cochrane and Raechel Saunders that were selected to have elements incorporated in the design of the building.

'Living as One on Biripi Country' and 'Connected' now feature prominently on and in the building and it's fitting to have these works






as part of the first exhibition.

Everyone is welcome to visit the gallery space with the opening exhibition finishing on Friday 30th April.
