The Nabiac SES unit was started on 27th November, 1987. The Nabiac Emergency Services Headquarters was opened in 1991. Community members bought "bricks" to assist with the fundraising.

SES members prepare and respond to severe weather events, including storms, floods and tsunamis. This can include storm damage repairs, land searches and flood rescues.

It also builds skills to work as a member of the team, develops social skills and job qualities.

We say there is a job for everyone in the SES.

SES Volunteers come from all walks of life, bringing with them many different skills, interests and backgrounds. They have a common purpose of supporting their communities in times of need. Training is provided in a supportive and practical environment. Your do not need to have strong literacy or numeracy skills, tie fancy knots or be a strong swimmer. We will help you find your strengths and help you contribute to the team.

Nabiac unit has provided assistance in the local area and throughout NSW in a variety of roles, including supporting other emergency agencies.

Anyone can join if you are over 16 years to ??? You are never too old to learn something new. As long as you are willing to help out in an emergency, whether it is out on the massive trucks or rescue boats to filling sand bags, manning the telephones or making sandwiches and drinks for the people out on "the face".

You don't have to be a "full time" member. They are happy with what they call "spontaneous members" who just come and help out in an emergency.

Full intensive training in all aspects will be given by the Tuncurry branch in coordination with the Nabiac branch.

Training at Nabiac is on Wednesday nights from 6:30pm for two hours and if needed on Tuesday nights at 6:pmTuncurry (transport can be assisted with to get to Tuncurry if needed)

Training includes driving the trucks, the big rescue boat (rescues include animals as well as people in all flood situations—you could be hauling a cow from a flooded river or a person from the sea), getting


End of 2020 Summer Reading Club for children


#### **Reservations**


everyone.



#### Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre



At the Neighbourhood Centre this year is shaping up to be much different to last year. During 2020 our Committee was only able to hold two meetings (February and November) plus the AGM but it was 'business as usual' with much of our communication by email. In March we made a decision to close the Op Shop and the CTC was also closed.

At the February meeting, *Kathryn Murphy* was appointed as the overall Op Shop manager and *John Baker* as the shed manager. Kathryn and John, along with a small band of helpers, used the shutdown to totally reorganise shop and shed and to introduce a new volunteer agreement. The shop reopened in July and the changes have been well received. There has been much positive feedback about the new layout and the displays, and there has been a steady stream of new volunteers. New book cases have recently been installed in the popular 'library' area of the Shed.

Major maintenance work regarding drainage was also carried out throughout 2020 under the guidance of *Colin Henderson*. Subsidence on the western and southern sides of the old building had been a problem for many years and as the underneath of the building was investigated it became clear the problem was much larger than it had seemed at first. The work is now completed and the result is that we now have a new drainage system for surface and storm water, rotting timbers have been replaced and the rear of the building has been raised some 50 mm.

Membership of the Neighbourhood Centre is now 136 people. The Centre is the home for eight different groups and provides support to them, especially with Public Liability and Voluntary Workers insurance. New groups to come on board with us in the last year include the Nabiac Nook and the Mid Coast (NSW) Community Quilters.

Our first Committee meeting for 2021 was held in February, and it looks like a busy and interesting year ahead.

In previous years the Centre has donated to the building of the Pool and to further pool works including repairs, installation of solar heating and security cameras. Other contributions in that area of town include the BBQs, the children's play equipment and the planting of trees around the oval. Donations have also been made towards the fireworks at the Nabiac Show for the last three years.

This year we are planning to support

- Mid Coast (NSW) Community Quilters \$10,000 towards a new quilting machine
- ★ Defibrillator at the Neighbourhood Centre Wallamba River Lions \$2,000 and Neighbourhood Centre \$500 →

#### Nabiac Landcare



Only couple of weeks after our summer break and Nabiac Landcare members have been having a bit of an unplanned break due to the recent spate of rain. Besides being downright uncomfortable working in the wet and battling mossies and sweat in the humid conditions, most of our members are in the 60-70+ age group and the danger of slips and falls is real. Needless to say the weeds aren't on break so we will be back.

We are investigating a CSIRO initiative to release a biological control for wandering trad, aka wandering jew, *Tradescantia fluminensis*. This white flowered, scrambling ground cover smothers everything at ground level and is a real problem on the river and creek banks where we are working.

The leaf smut/fungus, *Kordyana brasiliensis*, was discovered in Brazil as part of a New Zealand research program for the control of *Tradescantia fluminensis* and was released in New Zealand in 2018. The CSIRO continued this research in



Australia, testing the fungus in Australian conditions on closely related native and non-native species. They found that the fungus would not infect or reproduce on the native species tested including the local blue flowered *Commelina cyanea* (see last month's article) and introduced ornamental species of *tradescantia*.

The CSIRO released the fungus in selected areas of Victoria in 2019 and 2020 and is now coordinating the release to interested stake-holders in NSW.

The links below discuss the processes involved in selecting the biological control agent and how it is being released. They are well worth reading.

#### What's happening at Nabiac Pre-school




**ROAD WORK** Gravel was spread on Midge Street by volunteer workers, the Stroud Shire providing the lorry. Some work is now being done on the main road through the village

**DYERS CROSSING:** A Soldier's Letter - Mr and Mrs Allen McFadyen of Dyers Crossing have received the following letter from their son **Private Neil McFadyen**.

"You will be wondering what part of the world I'm in and how I am getting along. We arrived in Palestine after an uneventful trip and although they say it is practically winter it is as hot as summer is back home.

When I wrote we were about 2 days off Bombay and arrived about 2 o'clock on Sunday. Looking at it from the sea it is a very picturesque city. We got shore leave and after changing our money into Rupees seven of us hired a car and went out through the native quarters. There are some very fine quarters. There are some very fine buildings around the water front where the white population live and also the higher class natives.

We transferred to another ship and filed into another train. After travelling for 3 or 4 hours we left the train and were ferried across to the northern side where we had tea and filed into another train and travelled for the rest of the night. Waking in the morning we saw nothing but a sea of sand in hills and hollows as far as the eye could see, but later on we started passing small isolated oases here and there along the line with a few ragged Arab men and women and dozens of youngsters running everywhere.

Our camp is situated in what is know as a fertile valley, although for most part it is sand and there are native villages scattered in all directions and they are the only place where there is any vegetation and greenery.

We went for a route March on Friday and it was pretty rough going in the sand as we were a bit soft after the trip. The camp is not too bad except for the sand. We sleep in tents. The bunks re like folding boxes and are made from the stem of palm leaves split and interlocked through each piece."

## GILLESPIE CALLS FOR NEW PHASE IN PACIFIC HIGHWAY UPGRADE PROGRAM

In the last Parliamentary sitting I have called for a new phase of investment is required into the Pacific Highway.

With completion of the upgrade to four lanes along the entire route of the Pacific Highway, construction of the Coffs Harbour bypass underway and planning in its final stage for the M1 Pacific Motorway extension to Raymond Terrace, it's now time to begin planning the next phase of the Pacific Highway Upgrade program.

Population growth along the Pacific Highway corridor, combined with increasing tourism traffic has made many of these major intersections busy at peak times, raising further safety concerns.

In recent times, we have seen fatal accidents at these busy intersections and it's now time for them all to be upgraded.

The next phase of the Pacific Highway Upgrade Program include:

- An interchange for Medowie Road, Italia Road and Bucketts Way linking Newcastle Airport the Pacific Highway, western villages, Gloucester and the Barrington Tops with the Pacific Highway
- An interchange at Myall Way linking Tea Gardens & Hawks Nest with the Pacific Highway

- An interchange at Failford Road linking Forster-Tuncurry with the Pacific Highway.
- An interchange at Harrington Road linking Coopernook and Harrington with the Pacific Highway.
- An interchange Houston Mitchell Drive at Lake Cathie-Bonny Hills with the Pacific Highway
- Upgrade of the Oxley Highway interchange linking Wauchope and Port Macquarie with the Pacific Highway.

## **COVID-19 VACCINE ROLLOUT**

This week the first doses of the coronavirus vaccine arrived in Australia, this first shipment is part of 20 million doses of the Pfizer vaccine, secured through an advance purchasing agreement under our vaccine strategy.

The arrival of the vaccine confirms that we are on track for our most vulnerable groups to start receiving the vaccine on 22 February 2021.

Approximately 80,000 doses of the Pfizer vaccine will be made available in the first week. The first priority for vaccines are hotel quarantine and border workers, frontline healthcare workers and aged care and disability care residents and staff.

The Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has approved the AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine for use in Australia following a full and thorough assessment process.

We have secured 53.8 million doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine, with 50 million doses being manufactured here in Australia. Two safe and effective COVID-19 vaccines are approved for use in Australia.

<u>Zucchini Slice</u>. What to do with all those zucchinis (assuming you've managed to harvest before the rain really set in!). Rainy days are perfect for baking!



Plans for a solar farm on a landfill site, the development of a sustainability and education centre and a move to electric fleet vehicles are amongst the future projects flagged by MidCoast Council as part of a climate change action plan currently on public exhibition.

These plans, and others, are explained in a video available via Council's YouTube channel or on the Council's website.

The community has **until 12th March** to provide feedback on Council's first climate change policy and strategy.

The first stage of Council's plan for climate action focuses on the activities that Council can take, with future stages to look at how the community can become more adaptable and sustainable.

"It's important we lead by example, but it is also important for the community to see that climate action has been part of our business planning for a long time, across a range of the functions we deliver," Director of Liveable Communities Paul De Szell said.

Mr De Szell said the video explains Council's future plans for a solar farm on a landfill site, as well as a sustainability and education centre at Tuncurry's Waste Management Centre and a move to electric fleet vehicles.

It also looks at current measures that have been implemented to reduce emissions, including solar panels on Council buildings, hybrid vehicles in the fleet, sensor lighting and more.

"We know there's always more that can be done and we will have to do much more if we are to meet our ambitious target of zero emissions by 2040, but this is a new way of life for us, we take it extremely seriously and we're asking the community to support us."

The strategy has 150 actions that Council want to commit to, with feedback from the community on the plans welcome.

#### Community and heritage funding available

MidCoast Council's Community Donations and Heritage Funding rounds open on 1 March, two of the competitive funding opportunities Council offers each year.

Community Donations funding rounds are administered under Council's Community Donations Policy which invites not-for-profit organisations to apply for funding to deliver community-development and capacity-building projects and activities.

Up to \$2000 is available for capacity-building projects under the Annual Donations Program, or up to \$10,000 over two years for significant projects under the Seed Funding Program. While the focus of the funding is on building capacity of organisations or the set-up of new, innovative programs, sometimes an organisation just needs new equipment to enable them to continue operating effectively. Previous funding rounds have funded a full range of activities from program start-ups to improving accessibility of facilities, to equipment purchases like a PA system.

"Not-for-profit organisations are a really important part of our community and this donations program is one way we can acknowledge and support their tireless work and ongoing contributions," explained Paul De Szell, MidCoast Council's Director of Liveable Communities.

"Each year it's great to see the different ways these funds can help innovative projects get off the ground, or assist in providing muchneeded equipment."

## Applications for the 2021/22 Donations Program open on Monday 1st March and close on Saturday 27 March.

Full details of eligibility and application criteria can be found by visiting <u>www.midcoast.nsw.gov.au/community/grants-and-funding</u> where you can also complete the online application form.

Applications will be assessed according to how well they meet the criteria, and provide value for money.

"We want to distribute donations in a fair and equitable way, and to

provide support for projects that meet a genuine community need," added Paul.

The 2021/22 Donations Program is part of MidCoast Council's commitment to supporting the region's unique, diverse and culturally rich communities.

Anyone across the MidCoast who owns a heritage listed place or property within a heritage conservation area, may be eligible for a grant through the Local Heritage Fund.

The Local Heritage Fund has been available across the MidCoast since 2017 and aims to preserve the region's heritage while breathing new life into buildings and places from our past.

Council has seen some amazing restoration projects come to life through this initiative, and the team is pleased to be working alongside Heritage NSW again this year to open up this exciting funding opportunity.

Paul noted that these grants are like a helping hand.

"They are a great way to make a start on your renovation project. The grants offer assistance of up to \$2,000, but in some special cases up to \$5,000 can be provided.

"As part of the application process, eligible property owners must demonstrate their contribution to the project, as the grant cannot make up more than 50 per cent of the total project cost," he said.

Some examples of the work that could be completed with the heritage grant funding include repairing front fences, replacing guttering and fascia board, external painting, replacement of roofing and repairs to windows and verandahs.

#### Road improvements make for cleaner waterways

A two year project to ensure run off from unsealed roads is cleaner before it reaches MidCoast waterways will see significant improvements for roads and our environment alike.

MidCoast Council and NSW Local Land Services have been working together to implement the NSW Government's Marine Estate Management Strategy (MEMS) to protect and enhance the waterways of MidCoast Council.

"Water will always run off the roads and into our waterways" says Drew Morris, Catchment Officer for Midcoast Council. "Through this project though, we are trying to make sure the water running off the road is as clean as possible."

Unsealed roads are a significant source of sediment and nutrients into our waterways. During rain events water runs down the roads, taking sediments from the road and the surrounding landscape and depositing them into our rivers, creeks and bays.

This muddy water can smother animals and plants, clog fish gills and reduce the health of our rivers and streams.

To achieve this over 20 creek crossings and unsealed roads within close proximity to rivers across the MidCoast will be sealed this year. Sealing the approaches to river systems stabilises the road and allows roadside vegetation such as grasses and sedges to establish, further reducing sedimentation of our waterways.

Roadside drainage is also being upgraded to slow down the water and help the fine sediments to drop out before they reach the waterway.

Works have been completed already on crossings over the Wallamba and Coolongolook Rivers which flow into Wallis Lake, roads near Wallis Lake, Burrell Creek which flows into the Manning; the Branch sub-catchment of the Karuah River and North Arm Cove.

With support from NSW Government's Marine Estate Management Strategy this project is continuing across 2021 and is hoped to be expanded into future years.

#### Feature Weed – Green Cestrum

Now is a good time of year to look out for the highly toxic Green Cestrum - its distinctive yellow, trumpet shaped flowers are blooming. If you spot it, promptly destroy it before it sets seed, which is spread by birds. Be careful to remove cut vegetation and to prevent stock access to sprayed vegetation – it is known to be more palatable when wilted, and it remains very toxic until fully disintegrated.

All parts of the plant, especially the berries, are highly toxic to mammals, especially cattle - it contains carboxyparquin, a potent liver and brain toxin. It is a notorious cause of sudden death in cattle. If victims are seen alive, they may show symptoms of severe stomach pain, bloody diarrhoea, staggering, convulsions and coma.

Be careful to avoid skin contact when treating these plants - use gloves and cover up with long sleeves and pants. Small plants can be physically removed after rain, cut stump treatment with glyphosate is effective on larger plants. For more information and more control options, see NSW Weedwise.

#### PORK WITH APPLE AND SWEET POTATO MASH

#### INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 Green apple, unpeeled
- 30g Butter
- 1 Leek, thinly sliced lengthwise
- 1/2 tsp Soft brown sugar
- 2 tsps. Oil
- 200g Pork fillet, trimmed
- 100g Orange sweet potato, cubed
- 1 tsp Plain flour
- 2 tsp Dijon mustard
- 100ml Cream
- 2tsp Snipped fresh chives
- 1-2 tsp Milk

#### Метнор

- 1. Core the apple and cut into 6-8 slices. Melt the butter in a frying pan and add the leek and sugar, cook for 2-3 minutes then add the apple and cook for another 5 minutes or until the leek and apple are golden brown. Set aside and keep warm
- Heat the oil in the same pan and cook the pork over medium heat for 3-4 minutes each side, or until cooked through. Remove from pan, cover with foil for 5 minutes then cut into thick slices
- 3. Place the sweet potato in a saucepan of water, bring to boil, then reduce heat and simmer for 5 minutes until tender.
- 4. Combine the flour and mustard in a small bowl, then add the cream. Add to the frying pan and cook, stirring until bubbling and slightly thickened. Add the pork and chives and stir until warmed through. Season.
- 5. Drain the sweet potato when just about tender, add the remaining butter and enough milk to moisten, season and mash with a fork or masher.

To serve arrange the pork over the leek and apple and spoon on the sauce. Serve with the sweet potato mash and steamed vegetables of your choice

#### And an addition for your sauce recipes

#### **BÉARNAISE SAUCE**

Put a tablespoon grated white onion, 2 tblsp white wine vinegar, 1 tbsp fresh tarragon leaves, 1/2 tsp dried tarragon leaves and 1 tbsp water in a SMALL saucepan.

Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for 2-3 minutes until the sauce reduces to 2 teaspoons. Remove from the heat.

Whisk 2 egg yolks with 1 tsp water and add to the pan, combining well. Gradually whisk in 80g melted butter.

Strain the sauce through a fine strainer, season with salt & pepper and stir in 5 shredded tarragon leaves. Serve with char grill steak or vegies.

#### Mental Confusion and Water Drinking

Whenever I teach clinical medicine to students in the fourth year of medicine, I ask the following question: *What are the causes of mental confusion in the elderly?* 

Some offer: "Tumours in the head". I answer: No!

Others suggest: "Early symptoms of Alzheimer's". I answer again: No! With each rejection of their answers, their responses dry up.

And they are even more open-mouthed when I list the three most common causes:

uncontrolled diabetes; urinary infection; dehydration

It may sound like a joke, but it isn't. People over 60 constantly stop feeling thirsty and consequently stop drinking fluids.

When no one is around to remind them to drink fluids, they quickly dehydrate.

Dehydration is severe and affects the entire body.

It may cause abrupt mental confusion, a drop in blood pressure, increased heart palpitations, angina (chest pain), coma and even death.

\*This habit of forgetting to drink fluids begins at age 60, when we have just over 50% of the water we should have in our bodies.

People over 60 have a lower water reserve. This is part of the natural aging process.\*

But there are more complications. Although they are dehydrated, they don't feel like drinking water, because their internal balance mechanisms don't work very well.

#### \*Conclusion:\*

People over 60 years old dehydrate easily, not only because they have a smaller water supply, but also because they do not feel the lack of water in the body.

Although people over 60 may look healthy, the performance of reactions and chemical functions can damage their entire body.

#### So here are two alerts:

1. \*Get into the habit of drinking liquids\*. Liquids include water, juices, teas, coconut water, milk, soups, and water-rich fruits, such as watermelon, melon, peaches and pineapple; Orange and tangerine also work.

\*The important thing is that, every two hours, you must drink some liquid. Remember this!\*

2. Alert for family members: constantly offer fluids to people over 60. At the same time, observe them.

If you realize that they are rejecting liquids and, from one day to the next, they are irritable, breathless or display a lack of attention, these are almost certainly recurrent symptoms of dehydration.

Did you like it? So spread it out! DON'T FORGET TO DO IT NOW! Your friends and family need to know for themselves and help you to be healthier and happier.

Our **GREY GHOSTS** have been on the road again! Can't keep them home.

Need to see the south Coast again before it's too late for us, so across the Sydney freeway west of Hexham and onto the Golden Highway. We bypass Gulgong due to the very narrow streets of this old gold mining town, to Mudgee, and camp at the Taralga Showground surrounded by a flock of sheep. Dinner here at the original pub built in 1876. No poker machines so lots of conversations. Great. To Goulburn and over the range to Batemans Bay. Years since we were here and as expected development is staggering. Up the coast a short trip to see friends at Burrill Lake and the very small block facing the lake they have lived in for years could buy a couple of Bentley cars and have change.

"Always wanted to see the cheese factory at Bega" so off we go; nup, closed for "an incident" whatever that means. Head west on the Snowy Mountains Highway. Like so many areas last year, these mountains suffered during the bush fires and for the next 100kms or so we travel through areas that, due to the type of undergrowth and trees, will never, unlike our coastal flora, regenerate. This means that the stark blackened fingers of dead trees will be a feature for many years.

Onto Cooma, a new enthusiasm wherever we travel is evident. Rain has produced wonders, both to the landscape and the attitude of those wherever we go. We begin to see evidence of the "Snowy Scheme" at Adaminaby and Lake Eccumbene. Conveys of log trucks hauling burnt logs from the plantations to local mills

We are in the Great Dividing Range now and onto Talbingo at the top end of Blowering Reservoir which retains three times the water of Sydney Harbour.

Visited perhaps the only private broom factory in the country at Tumut and have one made for us as we looked on. Unfortunately the broom straw is no longer available in Oz and must be imported from Mexico. The result is identical to the "Ecallaw" (Wallace backwards) brooms made locally in years past. Many log trucks here as well salvaging whatever is possible from the burnt forests.

During our spell here beside the Tumut river, notice that it is flowing quite rapidly but no rain anywhere here for some months. What? Of course, this is water from the Tumut 1 power station following it's passage through the electricity turbines upstream.



Home again and repair the van after the rough roads just mentioned. Good trip, but time to go again.
