My best wishes to all for a dry, warm Easter break and continuing good weather for the kids during their holidays.


Keep well and fingers crossed that we survive the COVID problem when we can get vaccinated.

We must also thank you for your patience during the recent floods as we were not able to trade normally for about a week. It's very lucky for us and most others that power outages and tech troubles were the worst of it; our sympathies go out to those who have lost so much. 

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MINIMBAH MATTERS

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade knows exactly how you feel – wet! As at the time of writing, (26th) our station has received 1,065mm of rain this year. That is double what we received for all of 2019. In fact, in the week commencing 17th March we received 495mm. In 2019 our annual total was 530mm. We have found ways to occupy ourselves though; e.g. by removing fallen trees from the roads, assisting SES by setting up and running an Air Base at Taree airport. The NSW Rural Fire Service is not all about fighting fires. Bet you can't wait for the "fire season" to finish.

Good news, and this is not a cruel April Fool's Day Joke. Believe it or not, the Bush Fire Danger Period has finished. Effective from 1st April, 2021 you will not require a fire permit if you wish to do some burning off. BUT, you know the deal. Like any good bargain, if it sounds too good to be true, then it probably is.

Terms and Conditions do apply.

Prior Planning and Preparation is the key to a successful and safe burn. You will need to:

- Clear around the area to be burnt.
- Give at least 24 hours' notice to:
 - your neighbours -across the fence, across the road or across the river;
 - NSW Rural Fire Service. You can do this online by simply going to www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify and following the

If you do not have internet access, you can notify


Mid Coast RFS District on 1300 643 262.

- Make sure you have sufficient equipment and helpers to control the fire and contain it to your property.
- Check the current and predicted weather conditions.

While the fire is burning:-

- Do not leave the fire unattended
- Be aware of changing weather conditions
- It's a good idea to have a phone handy

You are NOT permitted to light fires on Total Fire Ban days







It is an offence and attracts large fines and possible imprisonment. If you need to clarify any rules or for more information, please call NSW RFS Mid Coast District Office 1300 643 262

Welcome to new members who have recently joined the Neighbourhood Centre. Our newest members are volunteering at the Op Shop and selling their home made goodies at the Nook.

Maintenance has again kept us busy. The verandah floorboards on the western side of the old building have now been replaced. This was partly funded by a \$2,000 heritage grant from MidCoast Council. The beautiful Liquid Amber in the carpark provides much shade for both the pre-schoolers playground and the carpark. We've been investigating it's health and have received a report from an arborist who advised that the tree has a further 20 -40 years of life so we'll be having some tree maintenance work done. Recent rains have caused further leaks in the roof that are being investigated.

Security cameras have now been installed to monitor the Op Shop donations bin and the car park. Rubbish dropped at the Centre and into the donation 'bin' continues to a concern. It's costly for us to dispose of and very unpleasant for the volunteers who sort it.

Ruth had brought along a most unusual flower from her garden – which I believe is called a back flower – and it took pride of place on

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
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the executives table.

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The Wallamba Watershed's History — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, 1940, by Bob Mann"

Manning Shire Meeting—December 1940: Deputation to Council:

At Monday's meeting of the council Cr. Wright introduced a deputation of 3 from Minimbah. Mr Salter was the spokesman of the 3 which included a lady. He said some time ago the Council gave a donation of £20 towards work on the road and already the residents had put in £65 in wages and £30 for the hire of the lorry. They had only about 100 yards to go to complete the work which had been more costly than they had anticipated owing to the road having to be risen about a foot. If the shire would give them another £20 he thought they would complete the road. Owing to the state of the road he was forced to cease sending his cream to the Tuncurry factory, but if the road was put in order he would again send it there. The President said the money the council gave had to be spent on the portion of road under its control otherwise they might be surcharged for the money. Mr Salter said the £95 had been spent on the shire road. The President said that he just had a ring about another matter in the district. He said the Shire Engineer would be going out to Forster the next day (Tuesday) and after they had finished their business they would take a run out to Minimbah and have a look at the road and see what could be done. On the motion of Cr. Wamsley and Machin it was decided that the President and Riding Committee inspect and they be empowered to grant the money asked for if they thought right.

A FATAL ACCIDENT: A fatal accident occurred on the road to Nabiac on Monday morning when Mr William Everett Careless was killed. It appears that he was riding a bicycle along the road and by some means or other came into collision with a lorry approaching him. Death was instantaneous almost. Dr. McCredie of Nabiac was called to the scene but deceased was then dead. The late Mr Careless went in for bee farming and had two aperies. It is understood he has a brother living in

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
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Manly. He was an Englishman and a returned soldier having served in Palestine during the previous Great War. The remains were interred in the Failford cemetery, Mr *W.T. Howard* being the undertaker. Mr *Hubert Flett* - Coroner, who viewed the body, will hold an inquiry on a date to be fixed.

COOLONGOLOOK: There was a great attendance at the Comforts Fund meeting held recently. The meeting was opened to the general public. Business was of a general nature. The committee approved of the action of its officers in presenting Sapper Nilson with £5 in cash on the occasion of his hurried send off there being no time to purchase a gift. It was decided to present each departing soldier with a gift or cash to the value of £5 at his farewell, besides supplying the usual comforts. A social committee consisting of Mr and Mrs H.H. Woodward, Mrs Burns and Mrs Thompson was appointed to arrange for the dispatch of Christmas Hampers and arrange suitable functions when send offs became necessary. The President mentioned that kitted socks were appreciated more than anything else by the troops but that very few ladies were knitting them. He appealed for more ladies to knit socks. Wool may be obtained from Mrs McDean, the Hon. Sec., whose address is Wootton. He hoped that more ladies would make application for wool and get to work. Mr P. Bunt thanked those who had helped with the Willa Race Club with gifts, cash or work on the occasion of the races in its patriotic effort. As a result of the effort at Willa the sum of £20.17s.9½d was handed into the treasurer for dispatch to the Federal Treasurer as a gift to help in the war. The treasurer reported that the sum of £4.4s.0 had been realised on the sale of a beast donated by Mr D. Batchelor. The balance now in the hand was just under £100. Accounts were passed for payment It was decided to forward the sum of £2.10s.0 to Mr McGrath, late of Wootton, in order to bring his total send off gift up to £5. It was decided to hold a day's sports at Coolongolook on the 15th February in aid of the Comforts Fund, the programme to be arranged at the next meeting. The next meeting was set down for the second week in January.


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

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
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
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
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
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LOCAL RFS VOLUNTEERS LEAD THE WAY

Local NSW Rural Fire Service Volunteers are leading the way in the rollout of a plan to encourage and help MIdCoast Rural Fire District (MIdCoast and Port Macquarie-Hastings Local Government Areas) residents and communities reduce their risk of bush fire. The Community Engagement Strategy and Annual Action Plan has been developed in response to the recently released Bush Fire Risk Management Plan and focusses on assets listed at high or extreme risk of bush fire.

A key part of the NSW Rural Fire Service's philosophy and role has always been the prevention of fire; more prevention means fewer fires. In other words, a well prepared community is the way to go.

Inspector Guy Duckworth AFSM, Acting District Manager for the MIdCoast District, said today that the area poses many challenges for firefighters.

"There is a diverse range of population and landscapes; with high tourism areas, large numbers of property owners travelling out of the area to work, growing numbers of retirees, and rapid population growth generally as people look for an alternative to living and working in large cities. Many new or part time residents are from urban areas, often people with little previous exposure to bush fire and living within bush fire prone areas."

Assets include rural residential estates and rural villages plus individual assets such as schools and tourist facilities. Many assets at high risk of bush fire can be treated in practical ways such as hazard reduction works or improved building codes. Others need a more personal approach and this is where our local volunteers fit into the plan. Simply by using and sharing their local knowledge and experience to pass on critical safety messages to their own communities, they are able to assist landowners to prepare for bush fire.

Over the coming months, local brigade members will be working with property and rural business owners to encourage everyone to complete a Bush Fire Survival Plan and undertake any work necessary to make themselves, their families, homes and properties more fire safe, not just for the coming summer but for years into the future.






Last year I visited Centennial Coal with Barnaby Joyce and Matt Canavan, the Hunter Valley produces the best quality coal in the world. With new technologies being developed to deliver greater efficiency and carbon capture, there is the potential to significantly reduce emissions at our coal-fired power plants. Now is not the time to be abandoning the coal industry and the many other industries and jobs that rely on it.

If we want to boost Australian Manufacturing we need to deliver affordable reliable power and the only source currently available to do that is coal. I believe we should be building a HELE in the Hunter.

MEETING AND BEATING OUR INTERNATIONAL TARGETS

Australia beat its 2020 Kyoto target by 459 million tonnes.

We are on track to meet and beat our 2030 Paris target of reducing emissions by 26 – 28%.

On a per-person basis, that's a reduction of 50 – 52% (on 2005 levels).

WE ARE GLOBAL LEADERS IN RENEWABLE ENERGY

In 2020, Australia had its fastest ever level of deployment in renewable energy.

Australia is building wind and solar four-times faster than Europe or the USA.

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The power of Turmeric

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Turmeric is a rhizome (an underground stem, not a root). It originated from India around 4,000 years ago and has been used as a culinary spice and in herbal medicine (especially for respiratory, digestion & skin)

Turmeric is purported to have oodles of health benefits, due to its antiinflammatory and healing effects on the body. Inflammation is the key to many chronic health disorders. Around 50% of Australians live with an inflammation-related chronic condition. Until only recently, this figure was 40%.



Curcumin is the main active ingredient in Turmeric. It is a strong antioxidant (which protect the body's cells from damage) and possesses powerful antiinflammatory effects. Curcumin is best absorbed into the body when consumed fresh and with black pepper. Although ground turmeric still has benefits and is better than none.

Clients often ask how to incorporate more turmeric into their diet, here's some ideas:

Inflammation is often a precursor to many chronic illnesses.

Turmeric, along with a healthy diet & lifestyle, may help with the following conditions, due to its anti-inflammatory effect and gut healing properties:

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So, what is inflammation? An inflammatory response in the body is designed to wake up the immune system. An immediate immune response is the body's response to an injury, in order to prevent infection and aid healing. Normally, the body then naturally returns to an antiinflammatory state.

If this process doesn't work and the inflammation remains, it can lead to chronic inflammation. This may be caused, or exacerbated by many

environmental factors, such as lifestyle, toxins, diet and stress.

Turmeric is fat soluble, so consuming it with healthy fats will help absorption: -Nuts, seeds, olive oil, coconut, eggs, meat, fish, milk,

Do I need a supplement? Well, that's up to you and it depends on your individual health requirements. Studies have shown that turmeric is best absorbed when consumed as food, especially when fresh turmeric is

Supplements can be highly beneficial for certain conditions.

With many supplements, it can be a good idea to vary them and have a break - to allow ebb and flow of nutrients into the body.

(*Some minerals/supplements can block absorption of others or allow too much of a particular mineral to be stored in the body).

Is fresh best? Evidence shows that fresh turmeric has more benefits over ground turmeric and is better absorbed. If using fresh turmeric is time-consuming for you, then it is still good to use the ground turmeric. It's better than none at all. Remember to combine it with black pepper. This may be challenging in a chai latte, unless you like pepper in yours!

Chai latte. Even without the black pepper a chai latte is a healthy, warming drink - as long it's consumed without sugar. Other warming spices for teas, include cardamom, ginger and cinnamon. These aromatic spices possess antioxidants.

A healthy diet and daily exercise will improve and heal inflammation and decrease risk of disease.

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

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Free kerbside collection to take pressure off local landfills

MidCoast Council is working with a range of agencies, including the NSW Police, Public Works Advisory, Fire and Rescue NSW, the NSW Rural Fire Service and the Australian Defence Force as part of a multi-agency recovery taskforce to deliver a planned recovery that includes the efficient and effective disposal of flood waste.

While waste from flood impacted properties will be collected from kerbsides across the MidCoast free of charge, there is still some confusion around charges for taking flood waste to waste management facilities.

"We understand the frustration from our community over the disposal of flood waste at our waste management facilities, particularly, in relation to the charges that continue to apply," Council's Director of Liveable Communities Paul De Szell explained.

"We have large areas of the MidCoast that have been severely impacted, and this has created significant volumes of waste.

"We simply don't have the room in our landfills to accommodate the volume of waste that is expected from the flood clean-up."

Mr De Szell said Council is in the process of building a new landfill cell as the current cell is near capacity and fees that are paid over the weighbridge go towards creating these new landfill cells.

"It is important for the long term management of our landfills that we reserve space for our normal weekly red bin collection service.

"While we understand it will not suit all circumstances the most efficient and effective way to remove flood waste on such a large scale is to place it on the footpath."

Council will then work in conjunction with Public Works Advisory to take the waste to a sorting point so that it can be disposed of through contractors engaged by Public Works Advisory without impacting on our landfill capacity.

"We understand the community want to know when the waste will be collected. We are working closely with Public Works Advisory on timelines for collection and will let our community know as soon as we are able to do so.

"We are fortunate to have the support of State Government Agencies and the Australian Defence Force to assist us in managing the clean up in a way that ensures our day-to-day services can continue to run concurrently with the recovery."

For the free kerbside collection, the waste is required to be sorted into piles on the kerb into the following categories -

- food waste (use your red lid bin first. If the bin is full put food waste in a container on the curb side. Food can also be taken to Mid-Coast waste management centres free of charge)
- hard bulk waste (furniture, carpets, mattresses)
- green waste (vegetation)
- scrap metal (whitegoods and e-waste)
- hazardous materials (gas bottles, paint, pool chemicals, unlabelled drums)

Residents and business owners who choose to go to a waste management facility will still need to pay \$97.49 per tonne, a reduction from the usual \$190 per tonne fee.

"We do really encourage people to use the kerbside collection."

MidCoast beaches and Easter markets

A multi-agency taskforce and local residents are working hard to undertake a clean up of the MidCoast region's beaches ahead of upcoming Easter and school holidays.

"We've now placed large skip bins where possible at beaches for anyone cleaning up to place flood-related waste collected from the beach," said Council's Manager of Community Spaces, Recreation and Trades, Dan Aldridge.

If there is no skip bin at the beach you're cleaning, please place the waste in a pile in an accessible spot and away from the high tide mark.

Latest reports are that most beaches have been cleared of flood debris, however water quality could be an issue at some locations and more debris could also continue to wash up.

If beaches are patrolled this Easter weekend, please follow lifesavers' directions on safe swimming, however some beaches may not be suitable for swimming.

If "no swimming" signage is up, please do not risk your health by swimming in the water.

"We're also asking those with beach driving permits not to drive through the dune systems. Driving is only permitted within the intertidal zone to protect shorebird habitat, animal nests and vegetation.

"Unfortunately if there is too much debris on the beach, then it's a nogo zone for beach driving."

Council teams are also working progressively through the region to clean up parks, reserves, showgrounds, sports fields, campgrounds and similar facilities. Many are unsafe due to damage to infrastructure and trees need to be inspected as they may be compromised due to the rain soaked ground.

In great news for MidCoast Easter markets, safety inspections have been completed at two sites and markets at the Pacific Palms community centre and Gloucester's Billabong Park can now proceed.

"The safety of our community and visitors over the Easter period and holidays is the most important thing to us as we recover from the flood disaster," said Mr Aldridge.

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Water remains safe to drink across the region

While much of the MidCoast has been impacted by the widespread flooding that occurred last weekend, it's important to know that the region's drinking water is safe for consumption and has remained so since the disaster began.

Council's Director of Infrastructure and Engineering Services, Rob Scott, said Council has extensive monitoring and control measures in place to ensure our water is safe to drink.

"We monitor all aspects of the water supply system and are constantly adjusting the treatment systems to get the best quality water we can," he said.

"Our water must meet the standards of the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines and I'm happy to report that this continues to be the case across all six of our water supply systems.

"I understand that people may have their concerns given the appearance of our rivers at the moment, but we've spent the last 20 years investing in our water treatment capabilities and as a result we've got the technology, operators and processes in place to continue to supply safe drinking water to the community."

Mr Scott explained that the majority of Council's water supply systems incorporated the use of either off-creek storage dams or groundwater, meaning there was no need to draw from the river directly.

Cane Toad discovered on Oxley Island

MidCoast Council's Environmental team has confirmed that a cane toad has been found on Oxley Island.

Council has notified the Department of Primary Industries and both organisations have spoken to the community member who discovered the toad.

While it is possible the toad has been unknowingly brought to the area from Queensland or northern NSW, both Council and DPI are concerned it may have already been in the region and has washed on to Oxley Island in flood waters.

"Anytime a cane toad is found in our region this is a huge concern for us because they pose a major threat to our native wildlife," explained MidCoast Council's senior ecologist, Mat Bell.

"A breeding female toad can lay up to **35,000** eggs per year and there is a very high survival rate of tadpoles and toads, which are toxic at all life stages."



"While the toad found on Oxley Island appears to be a male, there is always the potential that more are around. The toad was dead when it was discovered and we are unsure if it was killed in the flood waters."

Council's team will work with the state authorities to continue to investigate the area and are urging the community to be aware and on the look-out for cane toads.


"We are asking that all local residents and visitors be vigilant, particularly in the vicinity of the Oxley Island area, to ensure that there is not a local population of this species."

Mat added that a sighting like this highlights the need for the community to familiarise themselves with the distinct cane toad call as well as the differences between cane toads and native frogs.

Cane toads are regarded as one of Australia's most damaging invasive species. Poison in the glands on the toads' neck and back is toxic to pets and most native predators.

If anyone thinks they may have found a cane toad, the animal should be captured alive and safely secured in a ventilated container. Photographs should be taken and contact should be made with the Department of Primary Industries and Council straight away. The best way to report a cane toad sighting is via Toad Scan (https://www.feralscan.org.au/toadscan/). Reports to this website are monitored and DPI will be in contact within 24-hours to confirm the identification.

"If you see something suspicious – keep it alive, secure, photograph and report it," added Mat.

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Lyn's Larder **Easter Bunny Cup Cakes**

INGREDIENTS Makes: 12 cupcakes

CUPCAKES

250g softened butter

350g sugar eaas

2 tsp

finely grated lemon rind

vanilla essence 1 tsp

450g plain flour

1 tsp bicarb soda

1/2 tsp baking powder

1/2 tsp `salt

450g `sour cream

BUTTERCREAM ICING

250g softened butter 1 tsp vanilla essence

600g icing sugar

2 tbsp milk TO DECORATE

30 marshmallows, cut in half lengthways pink decorating sugar Smarties or M&Ms 1 tube black writing icing

.METHOD

Preparation:25min. Cook:25min. Extra time:30min cooling .Ready in:1hour20min

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180 degrees C and line a muffin tin with patty cups
- 2. In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar together then beat in eggs, one at a time. Add lemon rind and vanilla; mix well.
- 3. In a separate bowl, combine flour, bicarb, baking powder and salt. Add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream (cake mixture will be thick). Fill the patty cups 3/4 full. Bake 25-30 minutes or until a skewer tests clean. Cool for 10 minutes then remove to wire racks to cool completely
- 4. Meanwhile, make the icing: in a large bowl, cream together the butter and vanilla. Beat in the icing sugar in four batches, beating well after each addition. Beat in the milk until light and fluffy
- 5. To make the ears, take the marshmallow halves and place them on a clean surface cut side down. Spread a little bit of icing over the top of each then sprinkle with the pink decorating sugar to make the




