Nothing else of great news seems to be happening in our little bit of paradise unless you know something that I don't.







Nabiac Landcare

Nabiac Landcare members were happy to get back to work after the rain and floods. We did approach the Bullock Wharf reserve with some trepidation having seen the high water mark on the picnic shelter at the bottom of Nabiac St. We were quite surprised at the minimal damage to the vegetation in the areas of the reserve that flooded. The last serious flood through the end of Wharf Street had scoured part of the flood way to bare earth. After that event we worked to control weeds in the area and planted a number of trees and shrubs. There has been damage to the river banks. Friends who regularly kayak in the area describe lots of bank erosion with many trees falling into the river.

The biological control program for Wandering tradescantia, *Tradescantia fluminensis*, moved forward a step when we were offered a supply of the smut infected plants earlier than expected. We planted the material (in the rain) in dense patches of trad along the river at Bullock



Wharf. Since flooding was expected we chose sites fairly high up the banks. Well, the flood was higher than we expected and all the plantings were inundated but not significantly damaged. So we are hoping that the smut survived to do its job. We will be monitoring the area.

We've recently identified two 'new' weeds at Bullock Wharf. The first is African Olive (*Olea* europaea subsp. Cuspidata). This edible olive relative is highly





invasive and a serious problem in the Sydney and Hunter regions. Although we have only found three immature plants, their presence indicated that there is a mature seed source in the area. The link to further explore is MSW WeedWise. If you discover this plant on your property or on public land contact your local council weeds officer.

The other weed, Cadaghi (Corymbia torelliana), is a native of far north



Queensland. It was planted extensively in southeast Queensland and NSW in the 70's and 80's, it grows fast, has lovely smooth bark and attractive furry red new growth. Cadaghi is now considered an environmental weed in SE QLD and is beginning to spread locally. https://weeds.brisbane.qld.gov.au/weeds/



You don't really want it near your house since it's roots are quite invasive. We are finding many seedling at Bullock Wharf. Cadaghi has an interesting relationship with the small stingless native bee, *Trigona carbonaria*. When

the cadaghi seed capsule matures it contains a resin very attractive to the bees, the bees collect the resin, seeds stick to the resin and the bees inadvertently spread the seeds. The cadaghi and Trigona do not normally occur together in north Queensland. There is some concern that the bee's obsession with collecting resin may distract them from more important activities like eating.

We work each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by morning tea. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.

We have already received acceptances from a Founding Member and some Life Members of the Brigade, so there should be some good stories told (most probably exaggerated) and photos shown, on the day.

As advised last month, the Bush Fire Danger Period has finished and therefore no Fire Permits are required before lighting fires. However, with every strike of a match comes a responsibility, such as never leaving your fire unattended. Calls for help to Triple Zero are for emergencies and cannot be ignored. We have received a couple of callouts to grass fires which had been reported to Triple zero. These were un-necessary 000 calls, as maybe, when spotted, there was no-one in attendance. It is inconvenient when this happens, but we do encourage people to *report unattended fires to Triple Zero*. Obviously *that* message is getting through. We now need to ensure that the following message is getting across to everyone.......

Give at least 24 hours' notice to **your neighbours** –across the fence, across the road or across the river, AND to the **NSW Rural Fire Service**.

You can do this online by simply going to www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify and following the prompts. If you do not have internet access, you can notify NSW RFS Mid Coast District on 1300 643 262.


The Wallamba Watershed's History — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, 1941 by Bob Mann

KRAMBACH: MARCH 1941: Krambach P & C Association wrote re the condition of the footpath in front of the store premises at Krambach. The President said the water on the road was higher than the footpath. He suggested that the Riding Committee and the engineer meet the writers on the spot and see what could be done.

NABIAC: The Nabiac P & C wrote re the condition of the road to the Bullock Wharf and asking for attention. Writers to be informed that the road would receive attention. Bucca Wauka P & C brought under notice of the council the condition of the Bucca Wauka road. The President said about the end of the month he would be attending an executive meeting in Sydney and he would see what was being done or when it would be done. It was decided to inform the Association that the council had done all it could in the matter and would follow it up.

COOLONGOLOOK: Mr C.E. Bennett, M.L.A. for Gloucester, is in receipt of a letter from the Minister for Education, the Hon D H. Drummond, acknowledging his representation on behalf of the Coolongolook P & C Association and advising that he now has authorised the acceptance of a tender for additional accommodation at the Coolongolook Public School.

KRAMBACH: On Friday night two lorries collided near Krambach. One was carrying Jersey cattle from the Wingham Show to the Stud farm of Messrs. E.W. Milligan and Sons near Dyers Crossing. The other lorry was conveying some of the clever acrobatic children of Nabiac to give a display in the ring on the final night of the show. We understand the lorry was loaded with children. Master Woodward, son of Mr and Mrs Ernie Woodward of Nabiac, was in the school lorry and received painful injures one of which necessitated in insertion of stitches in the forehead. Mr Higgins of Bucca Worka was travelling in the school lorry and had his coat and shirt off. A two year old Jersey cow which belonged to Messrs E.W. Milligan and Sons was thrown



out of the lorry and received serious injuries from which she may not survive. One young bull was thrown out but he and the other show cattle escaped serious injury.

TIPPERARY ROAD: At the last meeting of the Gloucester Chamber of Commerce a resolution was passed urging the Gloucester Shire to connect up the road from Iataatee(?) creek with the Tipperary Road. This would mean the construction of about 3 miles of road, 2½ of which would be in the Gloucester Shire and ¾ of a mile in the Manning Shire. Such a road would be a great convenience to the settlers in that area giving them direct access to the Gloucester pig and calf markets, the most important on the coast, and to the Gloucester butter factory and store. At present these people who do business with Gloucester have to do many extra miles travelling than should be the case.

The road it is said would not be a costly undertaking. It is hoped that councillors will make an early inspection of the proposal

WOOTTON: Mr C.E. Bennett M.L.A. is in receipt of the following letter from Mr I.O. Martin, M.L.A Minister for Works and Local Government. "With reference to your personal representation on behalf of Mr S. Squires and Mr J. H. Squires and a number of other residents of Wootton whose names appear as signatures to a petition urging that the Stroud Shire Council be moved to construct a high level bridge in place of the one washed away by flood waters recently, I have to advise that this is a matter for consideration by the council. It is suggested that the petitioners approach the Stroud Shire Council in the first instance when it would be competent for the council to make representation to the Department for assistance."

SHIRE MEETING: At a Shire Meeting held on Monday 10th March some residents who use the Wang Wauk - Cocumbark and Nabiac Road via Dargavilles wrote in about the condition of these roads It was stated that some of the worst sections of the road has been gravelled and minor repairs effected to culverts.

COOLONGOLOOK: The P & C Association held its usual meeting on April 17th when general business was transacted. The matter of the Empire Day picnic for the pupils was discussed and decided upon. It was decided to have a stall on Polling Day in aid of the P & C Funds. With the opening of the new school it was expected that there would be a big calling on the funds. Accounts for £2.6s.1d were passed for payment.

On Saturday April 19th a dance was held in aid of the Patriotic and War Funds. Fords Orchestra supplied the music and the duties of M.C. was carried out by Mr *Pat Kennedy*. Soft drinks and ice cream was on sale during the entertainment.

Nabiac Village Futures Group & Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre

The Nabiac Futures Group, on behalf of the Nabiac Neighbourhood Centre Committee, have for months been involved in two issues that will affect the Nabiac community.

They are the proposed changes to the Dibbs Street and Wooster Lane intersection and the preparation of a cycleway plan for Nabiac. Both items were addressed by Council on Wednesday 28^{th} April 2021.

The Cycle plan was adopted, and Council refused the application to change the configuration of the Dibbs Street intersection. We addressed Council in the morning and spoke on both items. That presentation is quoted below.

PRESENTATION TO COUNCIL WEDNESDAY 28th APRIL 2021

"Mr Mayor and Councillors thank you for the opportunity to address you today.

I will speak to Items 19 and 20 in your business paper.

I represent the Nabiac Village Futures Group a subcommittee of the Nabiac Neighbourhood Centre Committee.

We support your staff's recommendations for both items.

I would like to begin with the Mobility and Bicycle Plan.

We thank council and in particular senior staff for their long-term relationship with the Nabiac Village Futures Group.

Your support for our strategic plan, which we have developed in cooperation with Council over the years and is now incorporated into your planning, is very much appreciated.

A major focus for us has been the improvement of amenities, safety, and sustainability of our community. We are at present preparing a sustainability plan to be incorporated into our revised strategic plan. I mention this because the community of Nabiac is proud of their village and desire to work with Council to advance the betterment of the community. The Bicycle Plan brings forward an opportunity to deliver amenity and safety to the Nabiac community.

We congratulate your staff for an excellent plan. It has identified many of the connectivity issues across Nabiac. In our sustainability plan discussions connectivity is becoming a major consideration. We see the plan as complimenting what we are looking at and improve not only the amenity and safety within Nabiac but may have an economic benefit as people who visit Nabiac can safely move around the village and stay and spend money.

We look forward to assist in the progression of the objectives of the plan. The Nabiac Neighbourhood Centre Committee ,through the Futures Group, can assist through consultancy and on ground support. Our proactive alliance with council has already delivered projects that have benefitted our community.

In resourcing such a comprehensive plan we appreciate the challenges however, we ask that Council be proactive in delivering it. Allocate funds each year to progress even the smallest of elements of the plan in each of the communities across the council area. Seek partnerships with groups such as the Nabiac Neighbourhood Centre to deliver projects as we have done for many years. Waiting for Section



94 funds, grants and annual budget opportunities is good but nothing as strong as a line-item commitment in your annual budget for the bicycle plan.

Well Irrigation Area

I will now address the DIBB and WOOSTER STREETS INTERSECTION

The Dibbs Street report and recommendations to Council is very much supported by the Nabiac Village Futures Group.

We have met on many occasions over this proposal with many members of the community. We are not a lobby group but are proactive in engaging our community on all matters that will affect their amenity, service, and safety. Our major concern is the safety of the proposed changes especially the forced U Turn at Pipeclay Creek Road. In our view this a most dangerous option. Your officers have also identified the same safety issues as many of us outlined in our submissions. Over 100 submissions were received. Ninety nine percent, mostly locals, do not support this current proposal. It is simply not in the best interest of our local community.

If this proposal were to be approved it would reduce amenity, service, and safety to Nabiac. The closure of the right-hand turn at Dibbs Street would force all vehicles coming from the south to travel through the Nabiac commercial centre and impact upon key locations such as the school and the local streets. The main street is narrow and all service vehicles, tradies and deliveries to the many people who live north of the main commercial centre would be forced to enter Nabiac Village from the south down through the main street.

The good folk living in Woosters Lane would be disadvantaged the most. We believe B Doubles exit Woosters Lane from a successful and expanding commercial enterprise and for those needing to travel south after exiting have no choice but the do a U Turn at Pipeclay Creek to turn around which would be extremely dangerous.

There are many families living on Woosters Lane, and all will be required to travel north and do a U turn to simply go to their local shops in Nabiac including taking children to school, collecting the mail, and visiting doctors. Heavy vehicles servicing Wooster Lane will also be forced to travel north and do a U turn. This represents a significant reduction in service to those families.

The current proposal is flawed. There needs to be a better and safer option. I understand that you are looking at the development of the proposal, the on-ground facility. The approval of the service centre DA happened years ago through a decision of the courts and subsequent application to Council. However, council needs to ensure the safety and amenity of its local community in considering the application before you today. Your officer's report clearly outlines that neither amenity, service nor safety are met.

We therefore strongly support the recommendations to Council. Both reports and recommendations will assure the safety, service, and amenity of Nabiac.

Once again thank you for the opportunity to address Council."



It's soup time

In the midst of Autumn, we find ourselves reaching for warming foods. I tend to favour 3 main soups: pumpkin, minestrone and lentil soups. Keen to try something new, I trialed this recipe and found it a delicious change.

Apple & Fennel soup Ingredients

- 2 granny smith apples peel & diced
- 3 fennel bulbs-Save the tops & finely chop for a generous garnish
- 1 parsnip chopped
- 1-2 celery stalks, chopped
- 3 garlic cloves
- Juice of 1 lemon
- 1 onion peeled and diced
- 4 cups broth of choice. (I used veggie stock, but chicken bone broth would be nutritious & add flavour)
- Sea salt & black pepper to taste
- 1 tsp curry paste or Dijon mustard
- 2 tablespoons avocado oil (or olive oil & real butter) for sautéing.

Heat the oil over a medium heat. Sauté the onion, celery until

softened, add the garlic for a minute too

- Add the mustard or curry paste
- Add the stock, chopped fennel bulbs & apple
- Bring to the boil, then simmer for around 35 mins
- Add the lemon juice, salt & pepper
- When cooled a little, blend with a stick blender.

- Add some coconut cream, cashew cream, feta cheese or natural

FORSTER TO COFFS COACH TRIAL EXTENDED

A weekly trial coach service designed to connect Forster to Coffs Harbour and communities in between has been extended for another year.

Minister for Regional Transport and Roads, Paul Toole, said the new service was part of the NSW Government's vision to help make public transport a first-choice option for people living in the regions.

"This is great news for locals right along the Mid North Coast, making it easy for people to connect to Coffs Harbour for work, medical appointments and shopping with the option to return on the same day," Mr Toole said.

"We've been working hard with communities right across the State to trial new services that provide improved connectivity in the regions and new options to travel where they want to go."

Parliamentary Secretary for Regional Transport and Member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead, said he was glad to see the trial extended ensuring the community have time to embrace the service, outside of the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Most people minimized their travel last year which made it difficult to get a gauge of the demand for this service," Mr Bromhead said.

"I would encourage the community to give the service a go over the next year and show there is ongoing demand, all feedback will be taken on board."

Member for Coffs Harbour, Gurmesh Singh, said connecting the communities of the Mid North Coast was paramount.

"If we can keep this service running, it will continue to increase tourism opportunities and provide expanded transport options for local residents," Mr Singh said.

The weekly return coach service will operate on **Friday** between Forster and Coffs Harbour, with stops including Taree, Cundletown, Coopernook, Kew, Wauchope, Port Macquarie, Kempsey, Frederickton, Macksville, Nambucca Heads and Urunga.

Improvements complete at Tuncurry Rockpool

The fences came down on Monday 26thApril, with repairs to the beach retaining wall and a number of improvements completed at Tuncurry's Rockpool, on time and budget.

"Access to one of our most popular waterside locations has been vastly improved, with wider promenades, stepped and ramp access to the sand and new hand rails installed," said Council's Acting Manager of Community Spaces, Recreation and Trades, Michael Cross.

Stage one was completed in time for Easter, with the shared walkway directly in front of the kiosk extended and widened, tiered steps that double as seating constructed down to the beach, and ramps and handrails installed to provide improved all-ability access.

After the holidays, the work crews returned to complete the area in front of the carpark to widen the walkway, and construct two access ramps including one that provides easy truck access to the beach during sand harvesting.

"All works are now complete, and we are awaiting the arrival of extra seating for the promenade area, which will be installed once it is delivered."

Visitors to the Rockpool are reminded that this spot is not patrolled, there are strong currents that can pose a risk to swimmers, particularly at the southern edge near the safety net, and to exercise caution at all

Council's draft operational plan and budget on exhibition

A draft plan outlining projects and services to be delivered across the MidCoast during 2021-22, along with MidCoast Council's draft annual operating budget, is now open for feedback until Friday 28th May, 2021

Operational plans are prepared each year as part of Council's commitment to implementing the four year Delivery Program. Both are part of a suite of planning documents developed to achieve the objectives identified as priorities for the local community in the Community Strategic Plan, 'MidCoast 2030: Shared Vision, Shared Responsibility'.

"This year marks the final operational plan within the delivery program for our current councillors, with a continued focus on providing services to our community in a way that adds value and builds trust," explained Adrian Panuccio, MidCoast Council's General Manager.

"While we remain committed to delivering against our original fouryear program, this year's draft plan has added context as our community undertakes the long journey of recovery from the impact of recent bushfires and floods."

Along with an outline of the projects and services to be delivered over the next 12 months, the draft plan provides a detailed budget breakdown to guide their delivery, and importantly performance measures that will be used to report on Council's progress.

Focusing on improving the roads that connect our communities has been a consistent theme over recent years. This year, as well as continuing to roll-out the \$100 million road improvement program, the draft plan highlights a number of important projects and initiatives, some of which include:

• An upgrade for the Gloucester water supply system

- Adopting the region's first Climate Change Strategy, and moving into the implementation phase
- Continued focus on developing a consolidated Local Environment Plan and Development Control Plan to extend across the entire region
- Harmonising Council's rating system, a legislative requirement for all merged councils, to be in place for the 2021/22 financial year
- Initiatives aimed at managing our natural assets, such as the Biodiversity Framework and Greening Strategy
- Renewal works across our transport network, building assets and facilities
- Construction of additional landfill capacity at the Taree Waste Management Centre

"Providing value for money to our ratepayers underpins our approach when developing the annual operational plan and budget," Mr Panuccio said.

The draft document sets out the details of the rates harmonisation process MidCoast Council will be undertaking from 1 July 2021.

This process, which is a requirement of the State Government for merged Councils, standardises rates across the three former local government areas and needs to be in place for the 2021-22 financial year.

"We have worked hard to ensure this is as equitable as possible for our community and have been able to develop a structure that means 80% of property owners will either have no change, or experience less than \$50 a year increase, with reductions for some."

This year also sees a continuation of harmonising other fees and charges across the MidCoast region, including waste collection and water charges which have remained static in recent years.

While variations apply, the general increase in fees and charges sits at approximately two per cent, in line with the 2021-2022 rate peg set by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) – an indicator of changing costs in the delivery of council services.

In its 'business-as-usual' budget, MidCoast Council allows for income from continuing operations of \$283 million, exceeding the projected operating expenditure of \$277 million.

"More than just focusing on the year ahead, our challenge has always been looking after our infrastructure into the future; we will continue to work with elected councillors to balance this with meeting our community's needs," Mr Panuccio said.

A visual breakdown of income and expenditure can be found on Page 12 of the draft Operational Plan, while budget summaries are available in the section beginning on Page 88. Detailed budget statements are provided in the Draft Budget Papers.

Single rating structure to roll out across the Mid-Coast

A single rates structure developed for the entire MidCoast region will come into effect from 1 July 2021.

The rates harmonisation process is a requirement of the State Government for merged councils to standardise the rating approach across the three former council areas, and is required to be in place for the 2021-22 financial year.

Under the new structure, which aims to distribute the rates burden more equitably across the region, over 80% of property-owners will either have no change, or experience less than a \$50 a year increase, while some will experience a decrease to their annual rates.

"We have worked hard over the past 12 months to devise a new rating structure that minimises the extent of any negative financial impact on as many of our ratepayers as possible", explained Adrian Panuccio, MidCoast Council's General Manager. "The process of harmonising rates has also been an opportunity to simplify and build efficiencies in the way we apply rates".

While property-owners will receive mailed notification of what's changing and why over coming weeks, harmonising rates does not change the total amount of rating income Council can collect. This is controlled by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal through an annual rate peg. It is a more equitable redistribution of the total amount across all rateable properties.

An online calculator has been developed to help property-owners understand how the new structure will impact their individual circumstances. Entering a property address will display the category or sub-category applied to the property in the new structure, and the change in annual rates.

Visit www.midcoast.nsw.gov.au/rates to use the calculator, or call Council's customer service team on 02 7955 7777 to access the information by phone.

Individual phone appointments with members of Council's rates team are also available, along with in-person appointments at Bulahdelah, Wingham, Gloucester, Taree and Forster (see following). To register for either service, call 02 9755 7777.

"It is a priority for us that all rate-payers are aware of what's changing and how it impacts them ahead of the new rating structure being implemented from 1st July.

"While we are providing a range of information and resources by mail or email and online, we do encourage anyone who wants to learn more about their individual circumstances to arrange an appointment".





As the weather is starting to cool, here is a quick lentil and meat soup

Hot Spice - Lentil & Meat Soup - Eastern Mediteranian

INGREDIENTS

500g Beef, diced 1cup Lentils 1 Ige Onion, diced Water

8 cups Tomato puree (3½ tablespoons) 85grm Potatoes, peeled & halved

½ tsp Saffron

Garlic powder-to taste Black pepper- to tast

1tsp Cumin

Caraway seeds 1tsp Salt

2tbsp Oil, canola

METHOD

Sauté onion in oil, add tomato puree and spices and stir while bringing to boil.

Add water and boil again, add meat and lentils and cook over a low heat for at least an hour.

About 20 minutes before soup is ready add the potatoes.

Serve as a main course in soup bowls, adding half a potato and a portion of meat for each bowl, with crusty buttered bread.

*You can add some chopped spinach if you like and also season with lemon juice after serving.




