

In having perused the content, it is disappointing to read that there is no change for concessional(s) lots to allow older farmers to retire in the family home or development in the future for landholders and the next generation or the opportunity for rural areas to grow and develop with new residents.

In our own position we have lived on our farm for 40 years and would like to subdivide our family home and 5 acres because of our age and reducing ability to manage the work load on the farm without breaking up the family property. After several appeals in the past on compassionate grounds it has been refused. ## **Nabiac Village Futures Group News**

The Draft MidCoast Rural Strategy is on the MidCoast website.

Know Your Rural Zone | Have Your Say (nsw.gov.au)

The Strategy provides a consolidated platform for considering how land and water resources outside our towns and villages are expected to be used and developed in the coming decades. It also establishes a program of actions Council and other stakeholders can take to facilitate the sustainable use of the region's assets.

Other planning controls that are being considered as part of the Draft MidCoast Rural Strategy include:

- Minimum lot size standards for subdivision in rural areas; and
- Local provisions and environmental overlays to assist with the protection of, for example, drinking water catchments and steep land
- Non-urban land/paper subdivisions

In the Nabiac area we've been used to having 2 different sets of zonings, of Taree and of Great Lakes. Now the new zones will be harmonized across both sides of the Highway. The Village Futures Group has a keen interest in these changes. Submissions close Friday  $28^{th}$  January.

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

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## **MINIMBAH MATTERS**


inimbah Rural Fire Brigade draws your attention to the new public awareness Bushfire Preparedness campaign the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) has launched. The campaign, which is on TV and radio now, focuses on how we've been through bush fires as a community before, and as a community, we'll face the same challenges into the future.

> Put simply, we live with bush fire so we need to Live Bush Fire Ready.



With the easing of several Covid restrictions recently, we will hopefully be back to normal with our regular Brigade activities such as meetings, training, etc. Some warm weather and a bit of rain will green things up, but there will still be more than enough dry fuel on the ground to entice and encourage a fire.

FIRE PERMIT Please be very careful with your fires.

## Are two permits better than one?

We all know that when it comes to rules, there are also responsibilities attached to those rules, and not everyone is created equal. The rubbish bin with a green lid is for green waste and not all rural properties have access to what is commonly referred to as a "green bin".

This particular rule does not apply to everyone in the Minimbah Brigade area.

However, it does apply to most of those who live in more built up areas and villages, who have been provided with (or are entitled to be provided with) a green bin. The majority of those properties have special year-round restrictions when it comes to burning, and before the RFS can issue a free Fire Permit, MidCoast Council approval to burn must be obtained.



The rule was not introduced by Council, but having adopted it, they are required to police it. It is a State Government regulation under the Clean Air Act.

Approval lasts for 12 months and there is no application/ administration fee payable, so if you live at one of those properties who require the approval, instead of leaving it to the last minute and then perhaps getting held up with your burn, why not make a point to routinely get Council approval each year. Perhaps apply on your birthday, wedding anniversary, the Ides of March or whatever date is special and memorable to you.

If you are unsure whether this rule applies to you or not, please check with MidCoast Council on phone 7955 7777.

Nabiac Brigade brought their new Cat 9 along to lend us a hand, so some vital "training" was had by Members of both Brigades and in the end, no harm was done. Hearts were racing for a while, but all's well that ends well.


President Margaret read her report and thanked her current members for their support and those who have filled the various positions, both at Branch level as well as MNC Group level.

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## **Nabiac Landcare**

The Nabiac Landcare team is still working at Lilypilly Bend, not much exciting is happening except the growth rate of lantana seedlings encouraged by the recent rains and warmer weather. The good thing is they pull easily from the moist soil. Actually, it's been very noisy in the trees, tallowwood and ironbarks have been blooming profusely and the birds and bees are enjoying the feast.

Nabiac Landcare operates as a subcommittee of the Neighbourhood Centre and I was pleased to report to their AGM that we had contributed 1,450 hours this past year working for the natural environment in Nabiac.

Normally I don't mention 'bugs' except to comment on tick season but I learned something this week.

Let me introduce you to an Australian native bug that is a pain in the ...... a pain where ever it's spray hits you.

Musgraveia sulciventris—the Bronze Orange Bug, a quite attractive shield or stink bug-



attractive until you smell it. The native hosts are citrus like the finger lime or correas but of course citrus also means lemons, limes and oranges and these guys aren't fussy about country of origin. Now this creature leaves me somewhat conflicted it's a native but it's destroying my very expensive finger lime. I've been picking them off (with bbg tongs) and drowning them in soapy water and I really don't feel the local population is endangered! Take a look for them on your citrus trees, the babies are green, as they grow, they turn orange and

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then mature into ugly black buggers that fly (and breed). The article on them on https://en.wikipedia.org/ wiki/Musgraveia sulciventris is quite good.



There are some really interesting groups on Facebook on Australian insects and plants, do a few searches and check out what's on offer. The photography is amazing. There are many ecologists who are concerned about the effect of drought and fires on the diversity of invertebrates—the creepy crawlies—that are the major pollinators in our environment and play a huge part in the development and maintenance of healthy soil.

Nabiac Landcare normally works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by morning tea. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. Most of all enjoy the local bush!



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


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## Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre Association

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**The Wallamba Watershed's History** — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, May, 1943 by Bob Mann

TIPPERARY - FEBRUARY, 1943: The rugged hills of this locality are, for the greatest part, densely covered with a mixture of artificial grasses, chiefly paspalum, Rhodes grass and clover, although kikuyu is prominent in many places and the bountiful rain since the early spring has proved what the district is worth under favourable seasonal conditions. The autumn and winter were severe prospects and farmers had a very trying time. From Mr Jack Affeck's Liberton Jersey Stud Farm, which is 1,200 feet above sea level, an impressive view can be had and from that dominating eminence to the sea the grand scene of hill and valley is one of verdure and is dotted by the homes of the hard working and patriotic farmers who are playing such a noble part in the worlds present crises. Those examples of manhood are reaping some reward for their labours at present but the comparatively low prices for butter is robbing them of much they consider they are entitled to. Liberton farms are managed by Mr T. Dunn and Mr H. Bennett. Both herds are of high class jerseys mostly of stud stock from Hawkesbury, Glen Innes, Richmond and other Government Farms. Mr Dunn has a fine patch of Lucerne on top of the pinnacle at the farm house. He had good results from half a hundred weight of potatoes having dug 13 bags. Crows are playing havoc with the corn on Mr Bennett's farm. Mr W. Bloache, who is on Mr Everingham's farm, has some nice crops coming on and his herd is producing very satisfactorily. It may be mentioned that Mr J.H. Stevens runs about 200 Hereford steers on his property. Mr Fred Paff's farm, under the care of Mr H. Bennett, appears to be prosperous. Incidentally, Mr Paff has returned to his farm again after being on military service and is residing at Karkatt. Mr Rex Latimore, who is on the late Mr Chris Schneider's farm, is hitting up record returns for the farm and his line of pigs should be choice baconers at an early date. Abbott's farm is capably run by Mr Angus Kellinor and he had a trying time with his leg which was injured in August. He is handling a 100 cows on the farm and in October produced 1,830 lbs of butter and in November 2,865 lbs and for December reached the record of



3,425 lbs for the month.

Mr Kellinor has a splendid looking crop of 10 acres of maize. Mr *Laidlaw* recently paid a visit to his farm in this locality. Mr *Paimbab* (?) is working on the farm and has some maize coming along nicely. He had a good crop of 20 bags of potatoes from one bag of seed. Mr *G. McKay*, on Mr *Martin's* farm, has a splendid crop of fruit this year and his corn is very pleasing. He is pulling in a good monthly cream supply from the farm. Mr *E. Gallagher* has returned from the services to his farm and is settling down to work on his splendid property. Mr *Percy Smith* has transferred to Mt George and is busy driving for Mr *Haines*.

WALLAMBA JUNIOR FARMERS SHOW—MAY, 1943: A very successful show was held by the Junior Farmers of the Wallamba District at Dyers Crossing on Friday 30<sup>th</sup> April. For the first time the Junior Farmers of the district have ventured to hold an exhibition as their own unaided effort. When one takes into account the manifold difficulties of the present period through which we are passing, the show was really a splendid display. Until the beginning of this month there was a prolonged period of dry weather and it's a tribute to the industry and the careful work of the Junior Farmer Clubs that they were able to produce such a wide and excellent variety of vegetables, farm produce and flowers. The display was held in the Dyers Crossing Hall which was tastefully decorated for the occasion. In all six schools (viz) Nabiac, Dyers Crossing, Wang Wauk, Cocumbark, Krambach and Karkatt. The Department of Education granted a holiday to all schools concerned in order to participate in the exhibition. Despite transport difficulties there was splendid attendance of both children and adults. Both judges and visitors commented favourably on the products of the children's industry in such a poor season. Vegetables were particularly good while the work of the girls in the cooking and needlework sections were quite excellent. Exhibits were mostly sold or donated by the children at the end of the day. The number of exhibits in the poultry was not quite up to expectations but the difficulty of transport made a large number of entries manifestly impossible. The quality of those at the show was, however, very satisfactory.

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**Blue Blocking Glasses: Misconception**

## **Ingredients:**

Base

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- 1 1/5 cup almond flour. Non-GMO. (Can use almond meal for an earthier flavour)
- 2 1 small baked sweet-potato (bake several spuds in the oven for up to an hour then scoop out the flesh from one). Save the rest for other meals.
- 3 1 egg (pasture raised. Room temp is best)
- 4 1 spoonful organic flax meal dried mixed herbs
- 5 turmeric, black pepper & 1 grind salt (optional)

## **Filling**

- 1 3 cloves garlic
- 2 1 large onion, with a dash of balsamic for sautéing
- 3 6-7 large eggs (pasture-raised) for the filling
- turmeric, black pepper and a little salt
- 5 3-4 oz of goat's cheese or feta
- 6 handful of rocket (arugula) or spinach
- 7 grated cheese for top (pasture raised)
- 8 5-6 medium mushrooms, sautéed in butter.
- 9 1 teaspoon real butter for cooking
- 10 avocado oil for sautéing

## Method:

## Filling:

- 1 Slice the onion & cook over a low heat in avocado oil & real butter
- 2 Add 1-2 teaspoon brown sugar and a dash of balsamic vinegar and sauté for around 15 mins, add the mushrooms and continue to cook, allowing the mushrooms to dry out a little. If they are too soft, they'll create a soggy base
- 3 add the garlic near the end of cooking
- 4 chop a handful of rocket and add near the end of cooking the onions and mushrooms
- 5 lightly beat the 6-7 eggs.

## Base:

Place the ingredients into the food processor and pulse until just mixed.

## \*pre-heat oven to 180c or 356f

- 1 Place 1-5 cups almond flour to the food processor
- 2 add the flesh of one small/medium baked sweet potato
- 3 add a dessert spoon full of flax meal
- 4 Lightly beat the egg and add turmeric, black pepper and 2 grinds salt to taste. Add the egg mix to the food processor
- 5 2 teaspoons dried Italian herbs or herbs of choice





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- 6 Press the base mixture into a lined quiche dish to a depth of around 1/4 inch or 6 mm. If it is sticky, dust it with more almond flour to make it easier to use
- 7 bake base for around 25 mins in moderate oven
- 8 add the onion mixture, the eggs, along with the goat's cheese, then top with grated cheese and bake for another 25 mins until set.
- 9 Remove tart from the oven and allow to sit for a few mins to set. Enjoy.

## **Let's Talk Big Head & Calcium Deficiencies**

Since then it has been widely recognised in horses grazing buffel, pangola, setaria, kikuyu, green panic, guinea and signal grass. These tropical grasses, planted along the seaboards of Australia, contain oxalate - a chemical that significantly interferes with mineral utilisation by horses.

In big head-producing grasses the major portion of calcium is present as crystalline calcium-oxalate which is insoluble, making the calcium unavailable for absorption in the horse's gut. Grasses with more than 0.5% oxalate are capable of inducing big head.

There are three clinical manifestations of the big head described in Australia: ill-thrift, lameness, and swelling of the facial bones in the skull. Horses suffering ill-thrift have harsh coats and lose condition, even while grazing adequate pasture.

The most severe changes occur in the skull bones - notably the jaws, maxilla, mandible and nasal bones - which often swell, giving the disease the expressive name of 'big head'.

Affected animals can only be treated by correcting the imbalance of calcium and phosphorous, however the good news is that even severe lesions throughout the horse's body may disappear with correct treatment. It can take 4 to 12 months to re-mineralise the bones and although some horses will never fully recover most can!

With the correct calcium and trace mineral supplementation subtropical grasses can be made safer and great for horses. Furthermore even horses grazing on non-hazardous pastures need mineral supplementation. So, what are the options for supplementation?

A supplement for use in grazing horses has to be inexpensive, high in calcium, palatable, consumed in sufficient quantity to promote storage when supplied regularly, able to correct the phosphorus deficiency and be safe in the long term.

There are now many different options on the market for calcium. Lick blocks, powdered supplements and balancer pellets are three of the

most popular forms. Jenquine's

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
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
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## A little bit of Highway history taken from Manning River Times 23 April 1898

......a bridge is very badly needed over the Wallamba River, at Clarkson's Crossing. It is an ugly place for a stranger to ride or drive into, even when the water is clear and low, but as the depth is affected by the tides, the crossing is rendered uncertain and positively dangerous. Fatal accidents have occurred, and it is a matter for surprise that more have not taken place. At the present time children have to cross to and fro to school, walking on some poles laid over the stream, which is of considerable width. A suitable bridge — which the amount traffic at the crossing and the liability of accident demand — would not be a very expensive undertaking. The Government would only be doing an act of justice if they had a bridge constructed, and we hope soon to see steps taken for this purpose. If an application were made to the Minister for Public Works, who knows the locality, he would probably see his way to place an amount to cover the





In case the plaque is unreadable for some "From the earliest days of European settlement this point was used as a crossing of the Wallamba River. With the construction of a concrete road surface early in the  $20^{th}$  century, the causeway also set the limit of navigation and the flow of salt water in the Wallamba river. From the early 1950's it was also a section of the Pacific Highway. After the construction of a high level bridge in 1958, Clarkson's Crossing was made redundant and was demolished in 2009.




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

## Step 3: prepare your home for bushfire

**CHECKLIST TIME** – there's a list of things to do to prepare your home and your yard before a bushfire threatens.



And if you're on a farm or large property – there's a checklist for you too.

"A well prepared home is easier to defend against fire, and it's safer for you and for our volunteer firefighters," MidCoast Council's Mayor David West explained.

"Get started by heading to the website and find the 'Step 3' information plus the Bushfire Survival Plan document. You'll find the NSW RFS Get ready videos there – for preparing your home, your yard and your rural property. The Plan has a checklist for preparing your home and yard."

If you can't physically do the work yourself, please don't hesitate to ask your family, friends or engage a service to help you. And if you have limited support from these sources, then the NSW RFS's AIDER service may be able to help you.

There's information at <u>rfs.nsw.gov.au</u> or you can call 8741 4955 or email <u>aider@rfs.nsw.gov.au</u>.

"We want to make sure everyone's home is as well prepared as possible each fire season," said Mayor West.

It's a fact that many homes are under-insured for bushfire, and can't be rebuilt for the amount they are insured for.

"This week, pull out your home insurance policy and review it. Check your insurance policy, and talk to your insurer if you think this might be the case."

Place a copy of your insurance documents in the emergency kit, or make sure you have the "Know Risk" insurance tracker app on your phone to keep track of your policies.

Once you've ticked off the jobs in the Bushfire Survival Plan Step 3, you'll be well prepared at the start of fire season.

## Get ready step 4: when a bushfire starts

**BE AWARE OF BUSHFIRE ALERTS AROUND YOU,** especially during the fire danger season.

"The first way to keep updated is to watch for the NSW RFS Fire Danger Ratings, which are issued daily and are specific for your area. Roadside Fire Danger ratings signs are located throughout the Mid-Coast, or you can check the fire information each day at <a href="https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au">www.rfs.nsw.gov.au</a>," said Mayor West.

"As the fire danger ratings increase, you should be following your bushfire safety plan. At severe and extreme ratings, the safest option is to leave early – don't wait to see what happens.


"At a catastrophic fire danger rating, your only option is to leave early. No homes are built to withstand fires in catastrophic conditions and it is not safe to stay and defend your home."

During a bushfire, the RFS will issue alerts, which give you an indication of the level of threat from a fire. The **Advice** alert means a fire has started, and there is no immediate danger. You should stay up to date in case the situation changes.

The **Watch and Act** alert means there is a heightened level of threat and conditions are changing. You need to start enacting your bushfire survival plan.

The **Emergency Warning** alert is the highest level of bushfire alert. You may be in danger and need to take action now.

"The RFS says you should not wait for an alert – some fires start and spread so quickly there may not be any time for a warning.



Remember, leaving early is the safest option for your survival," said Mayor West.

"Downloading the fires near me app to your phone is one of the best ways to make sure you know when a fire starts, you can set to be alerted when a fire starts near you."

Otherwise, stay aware at the RFS website, via the RFS information phone line 1800 679 737 or via the NSW RFS social media sites.

During a fire emergency, you should tune into the emergency radio broadcaster, ABC 95.5FM.

## Step 5 Before and during a bushfire: look out for each other

As households complete their bushfire Get Ready plan this week, Mid-Coast Council is urging everyone to register their plan via a 30 second survey.

"We want every home on the MidCoast to have a bushfire survival plan this year, so make sure you, your family and your neighbours get ready following the steps on your household copy of the Get Ready plan," said Mayor David West.

You can visit <u>haveyoursay.midcoast.nsw.gov.au/getready</u> to download and complete the Get Ready plan, and the 30-second survey to register is there also.

"The survey only asks two questions – do you have a Get Ready plan, and your postcode. Nothing could be easier – and it's anonymous," said Mayor West.

"Importantly, it helps us understand which regions have Get Ready plans in place, and where we might need to provide further assistance to help people Get Ready."

A five week campaign is underway to guide you through the five steps to Get Ready, focussing this week on step 5 – looking out for each other.

"MidCoast people have big hearts – and they're very good at pulling together in tough times. I have no doubt that now we've worked through the steps to prepare our own bushfire survival plans, everyone will embrace this final step – looking out for those around us who may need help to put their plans in place."

Share the bushfire survival information with your family, friends, neighbours and those who may need assistance – especially older neighbours, and people with a disability.

There's handy information to share with people with a disability, on the <u>Resilience NSW website here</u>: <u>emergency.nsw.gov.au</u>

Make sure older neighbours have prepared their homes for bushfire season, and they have completed the Get Ready plan.

"Write down the names and phone numbers of anyone who is vulnerable, or may need your help during a fire emergency – it's the last item on your bushfire survival plan.

"In an emergency, make sure you call them early and help them leave early too.

"It's important to have conversations with family, friends and neighbours before an emergency happens – it can help everyone be more prepared."





## **NEW DINE & DISCOVER VOUCHERS COMING SOON**

Customers in Myall Lakes will have more reasons to celebrate catching up with friends and family this summer with two additional Dine & Discover vouchers up for grabs for NSW residents.

It's great that the market plays an integral role in the wider community.



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## Welcome to Debs Gardening,

have a very heavily pregnant daughter waiting to give birth to my 3<sup>rd</sup> grandchild. We threw a baby shower for her in my garden, laid out a few blankets under the shade of a big date palm. In amongst the guest were a few children and I watched them play in my garden; they picked mulberries, played games finding my ornaments, wandered through the vegie patch. It was a very warm spring day so out came the hoses and I told them to water the garden and themselves too, they had so much fun. Mind you there was a bit of a mess to clean up after them but I did it with a smile on my face because it gave me such joy that they had so much fun in the garden. It kept them entertained for hours and the parents enjoyed the setting.

My garden is 6 years old and there was only lawn when I moved in. I started with a small garden bed and it has evolved. My favourite shop would have to be a garden nursery; when I am in town I am always at the nursery or at markets. If my partner sees me getting the plants out of the car he says "more shrubbery". Yes, gardening can be expensive. I watch those Lifestyle shows and they unload a truck with advanced plants, now that's expensive. My garden purchases are tube stocks, seeds, punnets or raiding friends' gardens, I very rarely buy big plants or spend a lot on a plant. Oz gram

6

6 170 Margarine

170 Castor Sugar (6 rounded tablespoons)

3 Eggs - large

10 284 Mixed, dried fruits, washed and dried

2 57 Mixed, cut peel

2 57 Glace cherries, halved

8 227 Plain flour ( 8 heaped tablespoons) ½ Level teaspoon baking powder

½ Level teaspoon mixed spice

## METHOD

Sieve the flour, baking powder and mixed spice together into a bowl.

Add the rest of the ingredients into the bowl and beat the lot with a wooden spoon until well mixed, about 2 / 3 minutes.

Place in a greased and lined round 7" (18cm) tin. Smooth the top with the back of a metal spoon.

Bake in a pre-heated moderate oven (325f or 160c on the middle shelf for  $1\frac{1}{2}$  -  $1\frac{3}{4}$  hours

Leave in the tin for 2-3 minutes then turn out and cool on a wire tray.

## Journey of Life

Early in the twentieth century an advertisement appeared in a London newspaper: "Men wanted for hazardous journey. Small wages, bitter cold, long months of complete darkness, constant danger. Safe return doubtful". These words were written by Sir Ernest Shackleton, the famous South Pole explorer. There was such an 'overwhelming response' to this ad that he commented it seemed as though all the men in Great Britain wanted to accompany them.

"Shackleton's words remind me of the words of Jesus in Matthew 16:24, *If anyone desires to come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me"*. Jesus knew He was going to Jerusalem to suffer and be killed and was "calling people to go with Him on a hazardous journey ... "the way of the cross".

Recently I watched the children's version of Pilgrims Progress on DVD. I have never read the book ... thinking of it as a bit musty ... but the DVD was great.

It tells the story of Christian's travels from his city of darkness to the celestial city. He meets many people along the way and has a variety of 'adventures' and experiences ... some people help him or travel with him while others give him bad advice. Sounds a lot like life doesn't it? Yes it's meant to be a picture of our life's journey. At one point he comes to Legality Hill covered with laws written on tombstones with ever more popping up when a 'judge' at the top bangs down his gavel. Meant to represent rules we put on ourselves to obey or follow as a way to heaven ... 'don't waste a minute' was one I could relate to.

Along with all the components of a children's story ... adventure, mystery, goodies, baddies, lions and dragons, flying attackers ... is the ever present message threading through of finding the right path and persisting through hardship and difficulty. My granddaughter asked 'is he ever going to get there', and sometimes we say 'I'm getting there' ... but do we know **where** we're going?

The book was written by John Bunyan in the 1660's while he was in jail for holding 'unlawful' church meetings outside of the established church of that day. Even though he was a non conformist, the book

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he wrote has been one of the most published religious books and never been out of print since 1678. I would recommend the DVD and now think I will read the book.

Many people today follow Jesus ... in countries where there is persecution the journey might be as dangerous as a trip to the South Pole in the 1920's but, for all who answer Jesus' invitation there is salvation and the abundant life that Christian searched for in Pilgrims Progress.

'I have come that you might have life in all it's fullness' John 10:10.

One report about the pandemic says it has caused many Australians to experience a spiritual search and think more about God and the meaning of life.

Jesus said, 'The one who comes to Me I will by no means cast out' John 6:37.
