

Nabiac Village Futures Group News

nce again, we've had a busy year for the community members of the Nabiac Village Futures Group. We were able to meet as a group in February, March, April, May and June. Since the June meeting we didn't meet due to COVID distancing requirements. We are now planning our final meeting for the year on 9th December.

Our Nabiac Community Strategic Plan is due to be reviewed in 2022. This will be an opportunity to look at what has been achieved over the past 5 years and to discuss and prioritise our planning for the next 5

Sustainability issues have continued to be of importance throughout the year. Rather than create a separate group to work on Sustainability for Nabiac and the surrounding area we agreed to ask those community members who had participated in the Sustainability surveys to join with the Village Futures Group. It has been a positive experience to welcome a number of new people to our group.

One of the important issues we were involved in this year was the Highway Service Centre developer's proposal to alter the traffic arrangements for the Woosters Lane, Dibbs Street and Pipeclay Creek intersections. Thank you to Amanda Holden and Phillip Costa for addressing the Councilors of MidCoast Council on the danger that would have been imposed on our community if this proposal had been accepted by them, and thank you to Council staff and the Councilors for listening to us.

We also participated in the Council's planning for pedestrian access and bicycle planning. We will be discussing how we can promote more footpaths and cycleways in the town at our December meeting.

The works for Town Creek have been frustratingly slow to happen. There is grant funding and a plan of the works to carry out, the hold up at present is the tendering process. The completion date has been pushed back to mid 2022. Other works to watch for in 2022 include the installation of a water bottle filling station near the children's playground, and the possible installation of a lower speed limit in the Nabiac /Clarkson Streets area around the shops and eating venues.

The Summer Reading Club is aimed at children aged 0-16yrs and is a great way to enjoy reading throughout the summer holidays while scoring some great prizes along the way!







Unfortunately, we cannot run on promises so with the unpredictable and unknown restrictions that will be in place between now and Christmas, we have made the decision not to hold our Brigade Community Christmas gathering/party. It's not that we don't want to, it's just what it is. Please accept our apologies and also our thanks for what you all do to keep our community as safe, happy and fire free as we possibly can. It's raining now, but who knows how dry the long grass etc. will be and how hot it will be in February. Maybe a new leaf rake should be on your Christmas wish list. Just sayin'.

Here's a little

SHOULDA, COULDA, WOULDA

hypothetical story for you to think about.

It's that time of the year, when we endeavour to catch up with friends and family before Christmas. Most times it's over a meal or a nice beverage. Sometimes it is pre-planned, but often it can be a "just passing and haven't seen you for ages" opportunity. This is when we might have a simple impromptu barbecue - with our concentration on the people and the food and not necessarily the equipment or surroundings.

The visitors have arrived, the first bevvie has gone down very nicely, the sausages are ready, and the gas BBQ has been lit. How good is this - it's been a while since we had a barbie.

Perhaps you **SHOULDA** checked to see if you have gas in the cylinder. Oh you did. Good. How about the fittings, hoses and the drip tray that caught and collected the fat last time you cooked sausages? Oops! Snags are sizzling, stories are being told, and then the barbeque is on fire. How can this be? We are not trying to paint sausages in a bad light, but oh, the fat from the sausages and chops is not just an issue for our hips.

Thankfully, due to some quick and clear-thinking action, all's well that ended well, but the pulse rates really went up for a while, and it COULDA turned nasty.

What **WOULDA** happened if your barbecue was on your wooden verandah, or very close to your house? Is there plenty of clear space around it? Do you have an appropriate fire extinguisher handy? When it comes to fire extinguishers, it's not a case of one size fits all. An electrical fire requires a different type of extinguisher than that needed to calm a fat fire and/or burning oils for instance. Hindsight is a wonderful thing, especially if we enact of the changes required. If you need help deciding which type of extinguisher to buy, your RFS District Fire Control Centre or your local fire prevention and suppression equipment supplier will be able to provide guidance.

Don't let this be the Summer of burnt snags, chops and houses.

FIRE PERMIT REQUIRED

We leave you with the reminder that we are in the middle of the Bush Fire Danger Period and Permits are required if you intend to do any burning - regardless of whether it's a small pile burn, or something much larger. Once again, one size does not fit all.



Please call the **Mid Coast Fire Control Centre on 1300 643 262** for information regarding Fire Permits and the contact number of your nearest Permit Issuing Officer. You can give your minimum 24 hours' notice of intention to burn online at **www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify.** A phone call, knock on the door or a chat *across the fence* is all it takes to notify your neighbours, so don't forget about them.

Our Brigade really appreciates the opportunity offered by Lyn Reid and her Across the Fence newsletter for us to reach out to our Community. We receive very positive feedback with regards to this form of communication and know that, especially when it comes to "do we, or do we not, need a permit" type of information, some people use the Across the Fence as their "go to" resource. Thank you very much Lyn for what you do, not just for our Brigade, but for the district.





Murud you may see some proboscis monkeys.

There are 27 ethnic groups in Sarawak including the Iban tribe, which has long ceased headhunting but still maintains many of its traditional customs and ways of life. Orang-utans are sacred to the Iban and their jungle home of Batang Ai is the best place to spot the great ape. Penny told us a great deal about the country and this included a flower species Rafflesia arnoldii – a huge native flower of Sarawak which grows up to 3ft (1 metre) across and can weigh up to 11 kgs..

We are studying Malaysia because the 30th World Triennial Conference of ACWW is being held in Kuala Lumpar, Malaysia from 17th-23rd,May, 2022.

Merle gave her Handicraft report and said how the members had a fun day at her workshops learning how to make Japanese flowers, learning how to fold and sew different patterns. Some of the ladies





The Wallamba Watershed's History — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, May, 1944 by Bob Mann

<u>WILLINA - AUGUST, 1944</u>: After a lapse of some time racing was revived at Willina on the 22nd July when a meeting in aid of the District Red Cross was staged. Although the weather was far from good for some time prior to the race day, energetic members of the committee contrived by much hard work to have the course and necessary enclosures in first class order. The large crowd which attended was amply catered for at the luncheon and soft drink stalls where the local ladies worked throughout the day dispensing luncheon and refreshments. The booth was presided over by Mr Gallagher The entertaining programme of events and liberal prize money attracted a large number of entries and some exciting finishes kept the crowd interested throughout the day. The success of the meeting was due in no small measure to the efficient way in which the various officials carried out their duties in support of the local committee men. Mr A Nosworthy as stipenndary steward was eminently successful while Messrs A. Tagg (starter), Stuart Murray (clerk of course), George Stevens and P. Tattersal (handicappers) rendered yeoman services. Mr Ron Legge assisted at the gate while Mrs L. McGuire of Coolongolook aided the ladies in the cool drink stall.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING: Mr Justice Lynch, of High Street, Taree, at the weekend visited his property at Bunyah. There he saw where a tree had been struck by lightning some days before. He states that the tree had a circumference of about 3 feet 6 inches and all that remains of it is the stump about 2 feet above the ground. The balance of the tree was split into small and big pieces and some of the latter had been hurled at least 300 yards. About 200 yards away he had his valuable blood mare. He informed us some of the pieces, weighing hundred weights, were hurled at least 300 yards away and the small paddock in which the mare was, had been strewn with limbs and timbers but the animal had a marvellous escape. Mr. Lynch says the tree was an exceptionally sound one. He considers his blood mare had a wonderful escape by which he is exceedingly fortunate. Milliken,* occupied the chair and the following members were present. Messrs. J.E. Gorton (acting Secretary) A. Everingham, M. Holstein, H. Croker, W. Breckenridge, J. Fenning, A. Mullens, M. Schneider, T. Cornell, C. Beisler, H. Aryan, G.A. Campbell, D. Hancock, R. Brown, W. Digby, J. Nixon and J. Startin (Treasurer). Before proceeding with the business of the meeting the President made a feeling reference to the death of Mr H. Miles of Forster who was one of the founders of the association. A motion of sympathy with the relatives was moved and carried by all standing. The main object of the meeting was to discuss the possibility of holding a show in 1945. After a short discussion it was unanimously decided to hold a show on the 12th and 13th April, 1945. The President said no tenders had been received for the position of secretary and Mr Gorton had agreed to carry on if extra money was paid to enable him to employ an assistant if necessary. Mr M. Holstein moved and Mr H. Croker seconded that an additional £12 be added to the Secretary's salary. Carried. The Secretary asked if something could be done to eliminate the issuing of entry tickets for ring events with the exception of stock drafts as in the past he had to issue entry tickets to every competitor and sometimes up to ten to the one man for the one class. As all competitors holding members tickets competed free he did not see the advantage of this old method which involved the Secretary and stewards in a lot of unnecessary work as well as expense to the society. After considerable discussion it was decided on the motion of Messrs Breckenridge and Beisler that all entry tickets be eliminated for ring events with the exception of stock drafts where an entry fee is charged. Mr Startin moved and it was seconded by Mr Hancock that the schedule be adapted as it stands and a special class be added to the pig section for saddle backs. Carried. On the motion of Messrs Fenning and Holstein it was decided to call tenders for the printing of the schedules from three local papers. Apologies were received for non attendance from Messrs R. Harwood, J. Breckenridge, W. Weller, H. Deer, J. Sambell, V.G. Ayoul and R. Weller







RECIPE – STUFFED PUMPKIN



This stuffed squash recipe pairs beautifully with all the Christmas food faves. It's easy and can bake away whilst other foods are being prepared. 1 whole small pumpkin Half an onion, finely chopped 1 carrot, finely chopped Lentils – soaked/boiled (1 tablespoon) Garlic

Mushrooms Pecans or pine nuts Feta or goat's cheese Pepitas

Salt, pepper, nutmeg

Pre-heat oven to 180c/350f. Halve the pumpkin/squash. Scoop out the seeds and save. Bake the halved squash for around half an hour. Bake the seeds on a tray for approx. 20 mins on 150C (300F)—toss through favourite oil and spices. They can also be baked undressed. Turn them over halfway through.

It's a good idea to turn the oven down and bake these between cooking times for the stuff pumpkin.

Sauté the finely chopped carrots and onion in butter and avocado oil (or olive oil), on a low to medium heat.

Add half tsp brown sugar and cook for a further few minutes. Add the sliced mushrooms, and garlic. Season with salt & pepper & nutmeg. Add the drained lentils. Mix everything together with the feta. Spoon desired amount into the 2 halves - pressing the mixture inside - and top with the pumpkin seeds & nuts. Optional, top with grated cheese. Bake in the oven for a further 30 mins.







While a welcome relief for some, heavy rainfall across parts of the MidCoast region has taken a significant toll on the local transport network.

Motorists are urged to take extra care on damaged roads as Council's road crews undertake temporary repairs in the worst hit areas. Along with repairing potholes caused by the recent wet weather, crews have also been clearing debris and removing fallen trees, and will continue to assess the condition of the region's roads over the coming days.

Council says it's important for the community to understand that while potholes are a constant problem, filling them is only a temporary fix because reconstructing roads is a much larger operation that requires long term planning and more importantly, funding.

"This kind of persistent rain over a period of time brings all our work to a halt and when we already have a backlog, it unfortunately sets us back even further," explained Daniel Park, MidCoast Council's Manager, Operations North.

"We know some people are upset when they see us patching the road, but this is the best temporary solution to improve safety on our roads in the interim."

"We are aware that the condition of our roads has been heavily impacted by the weather over the last few days, and we're doing our best to try and make them safe again, first and foremost. We're asking people to be alert to changing road conditions, slow down, and to

Get to know your rural zone

The MidCoast community is being encouraged to consider a range of proposed changes to the way

the region's waterways, rural and environmental lands are managed, with feedback invited on the draft Rural Strategy until 28th January 2022.

The draft Rural Strategy sets out a proposed framework for clear and consistent land use planning principles to sustainably manage the use of land and water resources outside of the region's towns and villages. Rural landholders and others who haven't yet had an opportunity to understand how the proposed changes might impact them are encouraged to make an appointment with Council's Land Use Planning team

"The draft strategy applies to land and resources that make up more than 95% of the MidCoast region, so it's important for us to hear from our community", explained Council's Director of Liveable Communities, Paul De Szell. "To ensure everyone has a chance to provide feedback, particularly given COVID restrictions were in place when the exhibition began, we have extended the consultation period out until late January 2022".

Face-to-face appointments are now also being offered in a number of rural locations over the next four weeks, as well as the opportunity for phone appointments..

Consultation opportunities are also available for community and interest groups, whether that's a presentation in person or virtually. To request information or a presentation on behalf of a community or interest group, email rural@midcoast.nsw.gov.au to discuss how Council's land use planning team can best work with you. Phone appointments can be arranged at any time by calling 7955 7777.

Regional pools set to reopen on 15 December

MidCoast Council is preparing to open unstaffed pools from 15th December (or when the State reaches the 95 per cent vaccination rate) in line with expected changes to the Public Health Order as outlined in the current NSW Government Roadmap

The pools are ready to open and welcome swimmers as soon as the current NSW Government Roadmap comes into force, Council's Director of Liveable Communities, Paul De Szell said.

"We have been unable to open pools at Nabiac, Stroud, Krambach, Bulahdelah and Tea Gardens to the general community as we haven't been able to meet the current requirements."

The pools have been available to local swim clubs, subject to them holding their own COVID-19 safety plans and insurance.

However, come 15th December/95 per cent vaccination rate, it is expected the Nabiac, Stroud, Krambach and Bulahdelah pools can open to the general community, as QR code check-in will no longer be required based on the current NSW Government Roadmap.

"We are very pleased to be able to open all our pools to the community from 15th December, in time for the holiday period," Mr De Szell said.

"Dine & Discover NSW vouchers will start appearing from today in the Service NSW app with all delivered by early December. Current digital customers do not need to reapply to receive the extra vouchers."

Financial statements to go on public exhibition

MidCoast Council's draft financial statements for 2020-21 will be placed on public exhibition in December. This follows this week's meeting of the elected Council, which resolved to re-sign the statements as part of the NSW Audit Office process.

The NSW Audit office will now finalise the Audit process and prepare their Audit Closing Report. Following that the annual financial reports will be lodged with the Office of Local Government, and then placed on public exhibition.

The statements report a consolidated net operating result for the year of a \$37.077 million surplus.

"Given the many challenges faced by Council and the community over the 2020-21 financial year, particularly in relation to COVID-19 and a major flooding event, this is a solid result for Council," according to General Manager, Adrian Panuccio.

"The statements indicate Council is in a stable financial position and has a good base on which to build its long-term financial sustainability."

The statements also confirm that the challenges of managing a backlog of renewal works across our roads, bridges, footpaths and community assets remain, Mr Panuccio said.

"This is a long-term issue that existed prior to merger and Council is working consistently to reduce this backlog through ongoing programs funded by rate revenue and grant funding through State and Federal Government programs."

MidCoast Council's financial statements have been through a detailed audit process. They will go on exhibition for comment from the community following submission to the Office of Local Government. It is expected this will occur in December, before the Auditor presents to the newly elected Council in February.

"Our financial position is scrutinised and audited externally to ensure transparency in our financial management."

The statements also revealed MidCoast Council delivered over \$94.8M million of capital works for the community during the financial year.

"This financial result is evidence of our commitment to delivering services for our community," Mr Panuccio said.

MidCoast Council is responsible for the management of \$3.6 billion of property, plant and infrastructure assets.

EARLY WORKS START ON \$60 MILLION HARRINGTON COOPERNOOK OVERPASS

Planning is moving ahead for an upgraded intersection on the Pacific Highway at Harrington and Coopernook roads, with survey investigations underway.

This \$60 million project is funded by the Australian and New South Wales governments on an 80:20 basis.

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development Barnaby Joyce said the Australian Government has committed \$48 million towards the project.

"A grade-separated interchange will improve safety and traffic flow at this location, which has had seven crashes in the past six years resulting in one fatality," the Deputy Prime Minister said.

"It's the next stage in improvements after the full duplication of the Pacific Highway and I welcome the work being carried out to progress the design for this upgrade."

NSW Deputy Premier and Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Paul Toole said the Coopernook to Herons Creek section of the upgraded highway opened to traffic in July 2010, improving safety for through traffic and locals alike.

"With the final section of the Pacific Highway duplication opening to traffic in December last year, the next logical step is to improve safety at intersections which open directly onto this busy route," Mr Toole said.

Federal Member for Lyne Dr David Gillespie said the overpass was a high priority project for local residents accessing the busy M1.

"About 5,000 vehicles move through the intersection each day and the overpass is essential to keeping local motorists safe," Dr Gillespie said.

"Traffic counters are being installed and surveyors are carrying out early works to develop the concept design, which is expected to be displayed for public comment next year. I'm thrilled to see work underway on such a significant safety improvement for our region."

State Member for Port Macquarie Leslie Williams said the Australian Government's commitment of \$48 million to this project will deliver better safety outcomes for the North Coast community as well as tourists and freight operators.

"This work will ensure better traffic flow, reduced congestion and improved travel times for the local community and other motorists moving through this major intersection in the North Coast," Ms Williams said.

"After the community raised safety concerns with me, I'm pleased to say that this grade-separated interchange will improve road safety for all road users, ensuring local road users can join the highway more safely."

Transport for NSW will engage a contractor in the first half of the year to continue developing the concept design for the intersection improvements and start work on the Review of Environmental Factors (REF).

Some of the investigation work used to help inform the concept design and REF will include traffic modelling, drainage, road and structural designs, as well as environmental studies including biodiversity and flooding studies.

"The plan includes preparing a 'grab and go' bag with pet and animal essentials, ensuring you have crates or containers plus transport to move your animals if required, and identifying the place you will take your animals in an emergency."

"Although native wildlife can be severely affected during emergencies, the message form the NSW SES is you should never enter emergency zones during fires, floods or other disasters."



MISO GLAZED SALMON WITH BROCCOLINI & SUGAR SNAP PEAS

INGREDIENTS

450g Sunrice Long Grain White Microwave Pouch 4 portions Skinless salmon fillets (about 200g each)

1/4 cup White miso paste
1/4 cup Brown sugar
1/4 cup Mirin
3 tsp Light soy

3 tsp Light soy 2 tsp Ginger, finely grated 2 medium Cloves garlic, finely grated

1 tbs Water 2 bunches Broccolini

300g Sugar snap or snow peas 1/4 cup Chopped spring onions

Handful of picked coriander or parsley leaves

METHOD

- Cook the rice following packet instructions.
- 2. Place the salmon fillets on a baking tray lined with baking paper. In a bowl, mix the miso, brown sugar, mirin, soy, ginger, garlic and water until smooth and brush generously over each piece of fish. Grill on 150°C on the second to top shelf of oven for 8-10 minutes, basting more miso on every couple of minutes, until the salmon is cooked through.
- At the same time bring a medium saucepan of salted water to the boil. Blanche the sugar snap or snow peas and the broccolini for only a few seconds, then quickly run them under cold water so they stay nice and crisp.
- 4. To serve, divide the meal into 4 portions. Microwave the remaining glaze in a small bowl for about 40 seconds and pour over the vegetables, then garnish with spring onions and coriander.

tirement, some people love it some hate it, me I love it. More time for the vegetable garden and experimenting. I have always wanted to raise my own seeds again, which I always did when I was a full time tomato grower back in the day and one of my secrets to successful germination was "Planting by the moon phase". Now that I am newly retired there is no excuse, I have the time to sow my own seeds again and follow the moon cycle.

As a guide vegetable that bears crops above ground such as tomatoes, corn, watermelon, zucchini, lettuce, capsicum should be sown in the waxing stage (from the new moon to the full moon) and best in the 2nd quarter which is the week before the full moon.

Root crops such as carrots, potatoes, asparagus, beetroot, onions, turnips even flowering bulbs should be planted in the waning stage (full moon to the new moon) and best in the 4th quarter which is the week before the new moon.

Some vegetable seeds should be sown direct into the soil such as - carrots, pumpkin, zucchini, watermelon, peas, beans and cucumber because they don't like their roots disturbed but any other vegetable can be sown in punnets and be transplanted.

As I said I have time to experiment - I have been very frustrated of late because the seeds that I have sown directly in the ground have not germinated – either it be ants, birds, or mice. I planted a row of beans and only 2 germinated. My carrots, not one germinated.

The past waxing stage was the time for me to plant the above ground crop, so I thought I would out smart those pests and raise the seeds in egg cartons (once they germinate you divide the cells and plant straight into the soil, the egg carton breaks down and roots are not disturbed). What a success, the sunflowers germinated in 2 days. The zucchinis, beans, cucumbers, pumpkin and watermelon germinated in 3 days. I thought I had the perfect spot to raise the seeds, at the end of the shed on a table. I was wrong the birds found them and pulled them all out, back to the drawing board. So this time I covered them with wire netting, thinking they were birds. Still the right moon phase they germinated again quickly but now the mice's turn. I am a determinate woman, they weren't going to beat me but by this time we are passing the waxing and heading into the waning stage, so I persisted and covered them with plastic trays. It has been just over a week but I can see that they are just starting to germinate now. So planting by the moon cycle does work. It is now time to sow the carrots and beetroot but this time in my new seedling propagator kit which I bought on line and has just arrived. Determination and persistent does pay off in the end.

With the hot summer months fast approaching it is time for me to get on top of the mulching to minimise watering, suppress weeds and

Also it will be time to spend with my family and my new baby grand-daughter and of course, with school holidays not far away, my older 2 granddaughters spending holidays with Nan and Pop. Christmas Spirit

'How would you define the Christmas spirit? Would it be a friendly smile between strangers, the sound of familiar carols, a tree with twinkling lights, brightly wrapped packages or just that good feeling you get this time of the year? None of these elements quite captures the real meaning of the phrase. They might describe feelings we have in response to the commercialisation of Christmas ... which itself distorts the **real** meaning.

Perhaps we think of peace ... but this probably ends up being the hustle and bustle of preparations for visitors. The first Christmas was not peaceful. In the past I considered camping on our mountain for 2 weeks to avoid Christmas ... quite an uncharitable attitude. Although it's an appealing thought to get away from the stress and problems of real life, in fact it was 'into the **real** world that Jesus came ... into the city where there was no room and into the country that Herod, murderer of innocents, was king.'

Maybe it's taking one of many opportunities to volunteer at events ... one I know of is Christmas dinner for the disadvantaged at Gloucester and you may know of others as well. Some churches make up and deliver hampers or meals. A few years ago I read about a dinner event at Stockton Beach for the less fortunate, and thought what a great experience of volunteering it could have been for my teenage grandchildren in Newcastle.

One of the activities of the charity, Samaritans Purse, is sponsoring 'pack a shoebox' for children in poor countries ... other charities like the Salvation Army etc. supply meals. There are many charities which help people. These kinds of activities help show the Christmas spirit of giving time, thought and care to do good to others ... wherever the need, *Micah 6:8*.

In 1945 the first peacetime celebration held in New York harbour consisted of an armada of warships which hosted 1,000 needy children and presented them with gift wrapped coats and woollen caps.

At Christmas in 1818 a vicar in Austria had written a new song and it had been set to music. However the church organ broke down and so

the song was sung to a guitar. When the man came to fix the organ and heard the new song he took a copy of it to his village where four daughters of a glove maker learnt it and began singing it all over the region. So through a broken organ, God chose to bless people all over Austria, and eventually the world, with the carol Silent Night.

God wants to bless us and He has the perfect gift for us... perfect because we can't earn it, it is offered by grace and received through faith, *Romans 5:15*. It is the gift of salvation and it is available to anyone willing to accept it. The God of heaven and earth laid aside His divine glory and became our servant by dying on the cross for our sins ...what an amazing thought. The Bible 'encourages us to duplicate that same mind of service to others, *Philippians 2*.

That's the true Christmas spirit!'


