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




To catch up on January happenings, the two School Holiday Activity Events were lots of fun!!!

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
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
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MINIMBAH MATTERS





We do ask people to **report unattended fires to triple zero (000)**, but quite often enthusiasm over-rides accuracy of reporting, especially from motorists driving on the highways. What sometimes appears to be a house on fire to a passing motorist, can actually be a smoky pile burn in someone's backyard with the owner, who has a permit, diligently sitting on the back veranda with a hose and rake at the ready. The driver may not stop to check and by the time they report the fire, they are 5km further into their journey and in an unfamiliar area.

Better to be safe than sorry we hear you say, but from a volunteer organisation's point of view, it is very frustrating to respond to these calls. Four or five appliances with upward of 20 volunteers would normally be turned out for a structure fire. When the fire is finally located and it turns out to be a legal pile burn, it is easy to see how far our resources can unnecessarily be stretched should there be another fire or a truck accident at the same time.



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There will never be enough fire trucks to be everywhere, so please take that extra couple of minutes to be sure before you call triple zero. In a time- sensitive situation, accurate reporting is vital.

Fire Permits are still necessary
and they come with the requirement to
give your neighbours and local fire authorities
24 hours' notice of your intention to light up.
Please call the Mid Coast Fire Control Centre on
1300 643 262 for answers to your burning questions and to find out the contact number of your local Permit Issuing Officer.

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
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The Wallamba Watershed's History - Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, May, 1944 - 1945by Bob Mann

NABIAC - SEPTEMBER, 1944: There was some commotion on Thursday morning near the Central Garage Station when the wiring in a car belonging to Mr Tom Johsen, the well known Nabiac - Taree bus proprietor and town taximan, became ignited. Taree Fire Brigade was summoned at once and was quickly on the scene, but there was no necessity for the use of water as the flames were quickly put out with a chemical extinguisher. The call was received before 8 o'clock and the following firemen were in attendance—Captain N. Neilson and Firemen A. & P. Whatson, C. Peedom, Stan Clinch and Sid Collins. It so happened that motor officer George Ealie of the Brigade headquarters was at the station when the call came and he drove the engine to the fire.

WOOTTON TRAM LINE - OCTOBER, 1944: The Railway Line which carried loads of logs for just on 30 years from timber forests on the northern side of the Wootton/Mayer Flat district for about a distance of about 10 miles has been pulled up. The rails have been sold. The rails which weigh 400lbs each and in excellent condition are being transferred to Stroud Road by truck.

MRS HELENA MILLIKEN - MANNING RIVER TIMES, OCTOBER, 1944: Mrs Helena Milliken, widow of the late Mr James Milliken, passed away on Friday 21st October, 1944 at the home of her daughter, Mrs Paton Breckenridge of 33 Tillock Street, Dobrayd, St Haberfield. Mrs Milliken (nee Helena Hill) was a native of Ulster and was born in Island Magee, County Antrin, Northern Ireland. She was one of a family having four sisters and two brothers. She was married in Island Magee to Mr James Milliken who had returned to Ireland from Australia where he had made a home on his selection - Sunny Bank, Lower Wallamba River. After their marriage Mr and Mrs Milliken immediately set out for Australia arriving here on Anniversary Day in 1893. Farming operations were commenced on their property on the Wallamba at Sunny Bank which is still in the hands of the Milliken family. The late Mrs Milliken was always interested in her husbands work both personal and public. The Milliken family consists of three

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daughters and six sons. The daughters are May (Sydney) Anna at home, Margaret - Mrs Paton Breckenridge (Haberfield). The sons are William (Newcastle), James (Nabiac) John (deceased) Robert at home, Thomas (Tuncurry) and David (Wingham. The remains of Mrs Milliken were cremated at the Rookwood Cemetery on Sunday 22nd, October. A short service was held at the home (Darawank) being conducted by the Rev. Hunter and Rev. Bowen.

FIRE AT DYERS CROSSING—JANUARY, 1945: In the early hours of Wednesday morning residents awakened to find the Upper Wallamba Co Operative General Store ablaze. The fire had been noticed and the alarm given at 1.00 am by Mr L. Stevens an employee of the Butter Factory and a band of willing workers quickly arrived on the scene but the fire had such a good hold that there was little they could do to quell the flames. They therefore turned their attention to the work of saving as much as possible but owing to the fact that the building had rapidly filled with smoke and flames it was absolutely impossible for anyone to enter and the whole building and the entire contents were completely destroyed. As the fire spread there was immanent danger that the house occupied by Mr Stevens would also be burned but unceasing efforts by the workers saved the premises . In the meantime Mr Stevens' furniture and personal effects were moved to safety. At one stage it was thought that the office of the Butter Factory, in close proximity to the store, would also catch alight and so all the records and equipment were removed as a precautionary measure. Fortunately the light easterly wind did not change directions or it is almost certain that the above building and also the Butter Factory itself would have been included in the conflagration. Shortly after the outbreak of the fire the services of the Taree and Wingham fire brigades had been summoned, but owing to the rapidity with which the fire spread and the long distance of the brigades had to travel they arrived too late to save any of the building or stock, Although the cause of the fire and the value of the damage is not yet known it is a serious blow for the district, since the store supplied practically all the needs of the farmers on the Upper Wallamba and a large number of families living in Dyers Crossing, Karkatt, Bulby, Bunyah, Tipperary, Kings Creek, Krambach and Bucca Wauka, Belbora and elsewhere will be greatly inconvenienced by the

During the 1930's Migrants from Europe changed the way Coffee was consumed, particularly after WW11.




Maintenance of our grand old building continues to use up funds and members time. Recent problems being worked on include

Nabiac Village Futures Group News



Representatives of NVFG (**Kit**, **Christal**, **Bruce**, **Phil**, **and Louise**) met in December with Council staff – *Alexandra Macvean* (Senior Land Use Planner), *Gerard Tuckerman* (Manager Natural Systems) and *Paul de Szell* (Executive Manager Sustainable Futures) to discuss the Midcoast Draft Rural Strategy. We had until 28th January to submit comments on the Draft Rural Strategy. We didn't at this stage decide to lodge a group submission as the process is ongoing throughout 2022 – 2023.

It was interesting to learn that **Council's water and drought resilience teams** have been set up and these teams are working on long term assessment and planning. This should ensure that our communities are well prepared to meet the impact of droughts and floods. https://www.midcoast.nsw.gov.au/Water-Services/Water-Resilience

Also of interest was our discussion about waste management and landfill sites. Council is rationalizing its landfill sites, closing some and transferring waste to others. They are building a new waste 'cell' at Taree which will take our area's waste for the next 30 years.

The landfill site at Minimbah - it was approved for waste transfers, but no license was commenced. Last year the Minimbah site was used as a sorting facility for flood damaged waste before disposal. It is possible that it may be used again for sorting and temporary storage of such waste. As part of their Delivery Plan and Operational Plan Council were to investigate the introduction of FOGO, which provides for food and garden organic waste to be separated from other waste. This means diversion from landfill, reduction of waste processing costs and less production of harmful methane gas. At our meeting with Council staff, they mentioned that the Minimbah site could be set up for processing of FOGO.

Nabiac Strategic Plan 2016-2021 is to be reviewed this year. There will be more news about this in coming months.

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Nabiac Landcare

The Nabiac Landcare group has been on their summer break, so in preparation for returning to work I went for a wander down the tracks at Lillypilly Bend and the Bullock Wharf reserves. I must say I enjoyed the walk. Ok, there are weeds and I pulled a few but the resilence of the local bush is obvious. Our group has put in thousands of hours controlling weeds and the bush is showing that care with excellent regeneration of local species appropriate to the various sites. For comparison, if you enter the Lillypilly Bend reserve from the end of Cowper Street and look at the privet infestation on the right side of the track—you can see the challenges we face. We will get there—slowly!

While driving around the local back roads over the last couple of months I couldn't help but notice the 'lovely' creamy flowerheads of the broad-leaf privet (Ligustrum lucidum). By now they have set great bunches of greens seeds that will mature to black and be a magnet for all fruit eating birds. Broad-



leaf privet is a large shrub/small tree with glossy green leaves. It has

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distinctive white spots called lenticels on its brown bark. It can be confused with the native cheese tree but at the moment the bunches of seeds are very obvious. Small leaf privet is more common in our reserves and along the local creeks but the large leafed species is quite visible along fence lines. If you have it, now is a good time to remove it or prune it before the seeds mature. Have a look at NSW WeedWise for control information.

Nabiac Landcare will be returning to the local bush very soon. We normally work each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by morning tea. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. Most of all enjoy the local bush!

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

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How happy is your gut?

Your gut contains trillions of beneficial bacteria and your gut converses with your brain! We evolved from bacteria, which existed for around 3 billion years before we started to evolve, so it's easy to see why microbes are intrinsic to our existence.

Your gut microbiome contains trillions of bacteria, fungi, and viruses. A myriad of messages are sent throughout the body, to ensure everything functions properly.



A wide variety of beneficial bacteria live in, and on our bodies which keeps the body thriving. We live in harmony with these beneficial bacteria, and they are essential to our survival.

A range of maladies, including chronic illness, mental health issues and diseases can be influenced by the bacteria in the gut micro-biome.

Serotonin is a good example of how activity in the gut micro-biome influences our health. Serotonin is mostly produced by gut bacteria and around 90% of serotonin produced is stored along the lining of the gut. Serotonin is a hormone, which is responsible for regulating mood, along with sleeping, eating and digestion. So, if you'd like better mood, sleep, and digestion, look after your gut friends!

Exercise, exposure to natural light and intake of essential protein from red meat, nuts, seeds, milk, and eggs, are all key in serotonin production. Looking after yourself is an investment!

A diet which is high in processed foods and sugar, can make the good gut bugs sad and hungry, and deplete their numbers. This can lead to an increase in bad bacteria, which negatively impact the health of the body's cells.

Eating a variety of fresh, whole-food ensures that your friendly gut bacteria are well-fed, and that the *range* of good bacteria are increased



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too. A variety of friendly gut bacteria is important.

Probiotics will increase the number of bacteria. Prebiotic foods provide fuel to feed the bacteria.



Prebiotic foods feed the good gut bacteria. These include:

Asparagus, Jerusalem artichokes, apples, garlic, chicory root, dandelion, seaweed, and sweet potato



Foods which contain probiotics:

- · Natural yoghurt
- Kefir
- Kombucha
- Tamari
- Blue cheese
- Fermented tofu/tempeh
- Miso
- Kimchi
- Sourdough
- Sauerkraut

Natural yoghurt with honey contains more benefits than sweetened yoghurt. Refined sugar should be avoided.

Soaked foods can also help boost the number of beneficial bacteria. Soak the following foods Note; the amount of time will depend on the food:

Oats Nuts Brown rice and quinoa

Legumes

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Soaking foods will also aid digestion and make the nutrients become more bioavailable for absorption into the body.

How are you feeling?

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

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Dealing with itchy horses (also known as Itch, Sweet Itch or Queensland Itch) can be a frustrating and exhaustive task for horse owners. What works for one horse may not work for another and it can, for many, be a matter or trial and error to find what works for your particular horse.

Understanding what itch is and what causes it is the first step to tackling it and managing the symptoms.

So, what is itch? Itch is Equine Culicoides Hypersensitivity, a medical condition caused by an allergic response to the bites and saliva of <u>Culicoides</u> (<u>midges</u>) and itch most often occurs in horses living in warmer humid climates.

Itch is usually a seasonal problem, occurring during the hot and wet months between October and April.

The typical symptoms of a horse suffering with itch include a seasonally itchy horse, rub sores and hair loss around the face, ears, neck, along the top of the back and base of the tail. Some horses have rub sores along their flank, and in severe cases they can have sores under their belly. Also, in severe cases horses can create open wounds, puncture wounds and abscesses from continuous scratching. Often horses who suffer badly with itch will develop swollen and thickened skin after a long period of chronic skin inflammation and can develop skin pigment changes.

When thinking about managing and treating itch our tip is to take a 3pronged approach.


1. Stop/reduce the midge bites: The best way to keep itch to a minimum is to minimise bites. Midges are most active at dawn and dusk, therefore applying an insecticide, such as Alto Bug

Keeping your horse rugged during the afternoon through to

A fly mask that covers the horse's head, poll and ears, such as the heavy-duty Cashel Crusader Masks, will stop the horse getting bitten on the face and can help prevent face rubbing.



2. Diet changes: Evidence suggests there are feed additives that can help repel biting insects, these include yellow sulphur powder, Thiamine/Vitamin B1 (which can be found it Country Park Brewers Yeast), apple cider vinegar and garlic(which you can get combined in NRG's Apple Cider Vinegar with Garlic).



Soothing the symptoms: The sores resulting from selftrauma will themselves become itchy and perpetuate the itch




cycle. Using a medicated wash, such as Malaseb will help kill any unwanted bacteria and reduce infections. Topical creams, such as Ranvet's White Healer, and oils such as



Calafea Oil or Shapley's M-T-G Oil can help sooth and repair damaged skin and reduce overall itchiness.

Finding what works to keep your horse's itch at bay will take some testing, some successes and some failures. The main thing to remember is to be consistent with your management and treatment of itch - this is the best way to see positive results.

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Lyn's Larder

FENNEL & MUSHROOM GRATIN I will admit I haven't tried it but it sounds nice

INGREDIENTS

- Small Potato
- Large Fennel bulb
- 10 g Butter
- Olive oil 2 tsp
- Small Clove Garlic, crushed
- 50a Button mushrooms, sliced
- 1 tbsp White wine or dry vermouth
- 1/4 cup (60ml) Cream
- 1 tsp Chopped fresh thyme
- Semi dried tomatoes, chopped 30g
- 2 tbsp Grated Parmesan

- 1. Bring a small saucepan of salted water to the boil, add the potato and boil for 5 minutes or until tender. Cool and cut into 5mm slices
- 2. Meanwhile lightly grease a 2 cup (500ml) shallow ovenproof dish.. 3. Cut the top and base off the fennel and remove any tough outer layers. Thinly slice the fennel
- 4. Heat the butter and oil in a frying pan, add the fennel and cook over a low heat for 6 minutes or until soft. Add the garlic and mushrooms and cook for a further 6 minutes. Add the wine, cream, thyme and tomato, reduce the heat and simmer for 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. 5. Stir in 1 tbsp of the parmesan.
- 6. Place the fennel mixture in the prepared dish, layering it with the potato. Sprinkle with the remaining cheese and place under a hot grill for 1-2 minutes, until the cheese melts. Serve with tossed green

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MANNING BASE HOSPITAL WELCOMES MEDICAL INTERN CLASS OF 2022



Manning Base Hospital has welcomed the appointment of 10 new interns to boost the local health workforce.

Mr Bromhead said the new interns would boost Manning Base hospital at a pivotal time in the ongoing COVID-19 response.

"Our community owes a huge debt of gratitude to our local health teams who have worked around the clock to keep us safe, especially over the past two years," Mr Bromhead said.

"I am incredibly pleased that these new interns have the opportunity to learn from the world-class doctors at Manning Base Hospital and play a significant role in navigating the challenges of this unprecedented, world-wide pandemic."

Interns are medical graduates who have completed their medical degree and are required to complete a supervised year of practice in order to become independent practitioners.

The new doctors who commenced orientation this week will be entering a training program with networked hospitals throughout the state, providing formal and on the job training.

They receive two-year contracts to rotate between metropolitan, regional and rural hospitals to ensure the diversity of their experience. They also join different units in each hospital, including surgery and emergency medicine.

In the largest ever health workforce boost in the state, the NSW Government has invested a record \$2.8 billion to recruit an additional 1,060 doctors, 5,000 nurses, 880 allied health staff and 1,360 hospital support staff over a four year period.




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

There were three nominations for the position of Mayor - Cr Peter Epov, Cr Claire Pontin and Cr Kathryn Bell.

After a vote by a show of hands, Cr Pontin was elected with seven of the eleven votes.

This is Cr Pontin's first term as Mayor and second term as a MidCoast Councillor. She was first elected to MidCoast Council in 2017 and served as Deputy Mayor.

Cr Pontin welcomed the opportunity to represent Council and undertake the other duties of Mayor.

"I'm incredibly honoured and humbled to be elected as Mayor. I don't accept the role lightly," Mayor Pontin said.

"I'm keen to effect some changes that I see as important and I've spent a lot of time over the last few weeks talking to Councillors to get a better view of their priorities and concerns for MidCoast Council, and to encourage a collaborative and progressive approach.

"I am looking forward to working with them all to achieve some tangible benefits for the people of MidCoast.

"We have some challenges ahead and we need to respond effectively to them. I'm hopeful we can introduce some new processes to improve our consultations, communication, accountability, and responsiveness to the community.

"One of my key priorities is to build better linkages with the various business sectors. Without thriving businesses, the community as a whole suffers.

"The Mayor's role is one of strategic oversight and leadership and I want to be accessible for the community, to listen and better understand the majority views, so we can better focus our resources to achieve the outcomes the community want to see."

The Deputy Mayor is Councillor Alan Tickle who will also hold the position until September, 2023. The other nominee for the position was Cr Kathryn Bell.

Cr Tickle, who received seven votes for the role of Deputy Mayor, is serving his first term on MidCoast Council. He previously served on Greater Taree City Council.

Cr Tickle said that he had lengthy discussions with Cr Pontin on the need to mould a team of Councillors who maintain a strategic focus and work collaboratively.

"It was apparent that the majority support was there for Cr Pontin which was a telling factor for me in my decision not to contend the position of Mayor at this time but I am honoured that the Council voted for me in the support role of Deputy Mayor.

"The saying 'there is no I in team' means that all Councillors need to move forward, respect the decision on leadership, listen to the views of colleagues and not lose sight of what the community expect of us and the trust that is vested in the elected body," Cr Tickle said.

The new Councillors will serve a reduced term of two years and eight months as a result of the 2020 election being rescheduled.

RAAF to use Old Bar airfield

The Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) will be making use of the Old Bar airfield for flight training exercises from 28th February to 8th April.

MidCoast Council advises that the site will not be accessible to the public during this time. Fencing will be erected around the site, with a seven metre 'hazard zone' sectioned off with signage.

Residents should expect some aircraft noise during the flight training exercises from 14th March - 1st April. Generators will be running 24 hours a day at the airfield to support the radar while the RAAF operation is underway.

Old Bar's airfield has a long history of use by the RAAF.

The Old Bar Airstrip was created in 1925 by George Bunyan and was added to the New South Wales State Heritage Register on 25th February, 2,000.

From 1931 until the Taree Aerodrome at Cundletown was opened, Old Bar was often used by the RAAF as a refuelling base. RAAF aircraft were based at Old Bar during the first year of World War II and Old Bar was a designated 'emergency airfield' for the duration of the War.

A volunteer management committee operates and maintain the grounds on behalf of MidCoast Council.

Planning for bulky waste clean-up

Ahead of this year's bulky waste collection, we are calling on Mid-Coast residents to help keep their region attractive and safe during the clean-up.

If you plan on doing a clean out at home, now's the time to familiarise yourself with Council's guidelines for bulky waste collection.

"We know locals look forward to the bulky waste collection, but there are rules and guidelines in place that we ask everyone to follow," explained Paul De Szell, Council's Director of Liveable Communities.

"People often start placing waste outside their property the minute we announce collection dates, making our neighbourhoods unattractive and sometimes dangerous. For everyone's benefit it's important that you don't put your waste out ahead of the dates specified for your zone."

Place your waste out two days before your zone's scheduled pick-up. Any earlier and it will be considered illegal dumping and could result in a fine.

Waste must be separated into two piles. One for scrap metal and whitegoods, and a separate pile for general and electronic waste. Scrap metal is collected for recycling. All other waste is sent to landfill.

"We also ask that you consider the environment when putting out our waste. For example, electronic waste can be recycled for free at our Community Recycling Centres any time," added Mr De Szell.

Mattresses are not collected as part of the bulky waste service. However, a maximum of two wire-spring mattresses or one mattress and bed base per household can be dropped off for free at your nearest Waste Management Centre during the bulky waste collection period for your region.

Bulky waste collection dates by zone

The MidCoast 2022 bulky waste collection starts in the Manning region on 28th February. The service will collect from one zone each week until the end of April.

The Gloucester region clean-up will begin on 2nd May. The Great Lakes region will start soon after in May, zone by zone until 24th June.

How to Give CPR to Yourself....Try to <u>remain calm</u>, and REMEMBER THIS...A possible lifesaver

This comes from Dr. Patrick Teefy, Cardiology Head at the Nuclear Medicine Institute University Hospital, London, Ontario.

I hope everyone can send this on as it is really important for everyone to know!

- 1. Let's say it's 7:25 pm and you're going home (alone of course) after an unusually hard day on the job.
- 2. You're really tired, upset and frustrated.
- 3. Suddenly you start experiencing severe pain in your chest that starts to drag out into your arm and up into your jaw. You are only about five km from the hospital nearest your home.
- 4. Unfortunately you don't know if you'll be able to make it that far.
- 5. You have been trained in CPR but the guy that taught the course did not tell you how to <u>perform it on yourself.</u>
- 6. HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK WHEN ALONE? Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack without help, the person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness.
- 7. However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously.

A deep breath should be taken before each cough and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest.

A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again.

8. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating.

The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it to regain a normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get help or to a hospital.

- 9. Tell as many other people as possible about this. It could save their lives!
- 10. A cardiologist says: "If everyone who gets this email and kindly sends it to 10 people, you can bet that we'll save at least one life.



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Welcome to Debs Gardening,

ummer, so far not much of one again this year! I think to myself that it feels as if the seasons are moving forward- Spring seems to be more like October, November and December. Summer – January, February and March, etc; that's just my opinion.

The garden has flourished with all this rain, so has the weeds and the lawn but I am proud to say that I haven't lost my touch with the tomato patch; I have had an abundance of tomatoes that I have been making relish, chutneys and sun dried tomatoes with. I planted Roma, Round and cherry tomatoes, the mice have had a field day but they are still leaving me plenty.

I planted a crop in a large vegie planter box; prior to planting I filled the planter with weeds, grass clippings, food scraps, basically made a compost heap then topped it with loads of cow manure, scattering of blood and bone and chicken manure, added a layer of sugar cane mulch and planted the seedlings straight in it. The tomatoes are growing as the compost is breaking down; it was a continuing supply of fertiliser from the breakdown of the compost. A dose of liquid Seasol was applied a couple of times at the early stages of the growing season. I also planted basil, nasturtiums and marigolds as companion planting on the outside of the planter box. They are still growing strongly and still plenty to pick. The other crop of tomatoes were planted directly into the ground, and were planted a month later so I had a continuous crop, they are almost ready to pick and are also thriving. Cow manure, bloody and bone and chicken pellets were added to the soil prior to planting.

I also have a couple of large concrete containers. I had corn growing in one, capsicums in another, all grown in the same process as the tomatoes. The corn has just been harvested and I have followed it up with carrots, which are just germinating now. Carrots like to follow a crop that is a heavy feeder as they don't like fresh manures; hence they will grow arms and legs. The soil in the container is riddled with worms and very friable, perfect for carrots. The capsicums are not quite ready to pick but looking healthy.

My daughter has moved to a property with no garden at all just lawn and she would love to put a small garden in, however it is very sandy soil, with little organic matter and no water retention. She told me that she wants to buy a load of soil (very expensive) I have mentioned to her the NO DIG garden, which is just how I did my planter boxes by layering organic material, but with the NO DIG garden starting on top of grass, a thick layer of wet cardboard or newspaper to smother the



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
grass is how it should start, then start the thick layering with grass clipping, manures, cuttings, any sort of organic material and just layer it over the top of the newspaper/cardboard. The final layer should be a layer of sugar cane mulch, straw or hay. It will all break down, improve the soil structure, and incorporate organic material into the soil and hold moisture. She can plant straight into the no dig garden by just digging a hole in the compost and adding some potting mix where she wants to put a plant in. The potting mix will feed the plant, help anchor the roots until the NO DIG compost breaks down. I started a lot of my gardens that way and I am still watching the pansy's flower.

I am starting on a new garden where a Fig tree was recently cut down as the roots where invading the septic system and it was planted too close to the house. However as I haven't gotten to it, weeds have taken over such as thistle, lantana, croften weeds, etc. I have whipper snipped the lot and covered it with black plastic a technique called solarisation to cook the weeds and seeds. Then I will start the process of the NO DIG approach. I plan to plant waratahs and Proteas but I want to wait until the summer heat is over before I start planting.

With my theory that the seasons have changed, I sowed the last crop of climbing beans a few weeks ago to see if I get a pick, as if they are left too late in the season to plant they don't set pods. I have also had a lot of Broad Beans self sow in the garden which are just coming into flowering; it will be interesting to see if I get a pick as they are planted usually in the spring too.

Well I am off to jump on the lawn mower again; I can watch the grass grow in front of my eyes. Happy gardening everyone and a thought "Happiness is a state of Activity"

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
