NEW BROADCAST SYSTEM TO TRANSFORM NABIAC SHOWGROUND



\$30,000 from the NSW Government's Country Shows Support Package is set to modernise the broadcast system at Nabiac showground and improve the experience for locals and visitors alike.

The old system was not weatherproof and had to be manually installed each year and then dismantled and stored for the following year's show. Its coverage was also somewhat limited to particular parts of the ground rendering it impossible to use in certain patches.

The President of the Show Committee, Mr *John Baker*, said that new broadcast system will benefit all users of the Showground.

"The new all-weather system will remain permanently ready for use by any of the many users of the Showgrounds, such as the Farmers Market and Pony Club. It will be just a case of flicking a switch" Mr Baker said.

"The new system will also have the capacity to be 'zoned' to certain areas of the ground and will have a number of roving microphones to allow commentators to get amongst it and give the audience a true taste of the action.

Member for Myall Lakes, Mr Stephen Bromhead said: "Wallamba District Show is a fantastic local tradition in its own right and this grant will ensure it continues to delight locals and be a part of our history for many generations to come.

I'm proud that the NSW Nationals in government are able to continue supporting country shows, which are a real highlight in the local calendar. I look forward to seeing spectators back at the show and hearing the new broadcasting system in action."

The balance of the grant is to be spent on some new infrastructure projects around the ground and for the implementation of a new online ticketing system that will provide safe and easy entry into the ground on Show day.

"With most COVID restrictions removed for spectators and major drawcards like wood chopping again featuring on the program, this year's Show will be a great opportunity for the community to shake off the last two years and have some fun" Mr Baker said, "We just need 19th March to be a fine day!"

We have some exciting events coming up in March at Nabiac Library. To celebrate the Seniors Festival in late March we plan to have two events:


- Scams Awareness Information Session on Tuesday 22nd March in the afternoon.

MINIMBAH MATTERS

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade, like so many other Brigades across the State and interstate, were exceptionally busy in the latter part of 2019 and early 2020. Also like many other Brigades, several Minimbah Brigade Members have recently received a Commissioner's Certificate for Service "in recognition of their involvement and support in the effort to preserve life and property during the 2019-2020 bush fire season". We are volunteers and don't join the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) hoping to receive awards or medals, but it is nice to receive recognition for our efforts from time to time.

Some of the Minimbah Brigade Members who received the Commissioner's Certificate for Service. Some recipients were unable to attend on the day.



After any fire, regardless of size, an "after action review" is carried out. It may be at Brigade level in the truck on the way back to the Station or in the Station itself - a simple "What did we set out to do? Did we do it? Could we have done better?" type of scenario. It may be at District Level, or even interstate and inter-agency level, depending on who was involved and the intensity and length of the campaign. In the case of large fires such as those in Victoria in 2009 and our 2019-2020 campaign, it is not unusual for a list of recommendations to come from the review. Amongst these in the last year or so has been the development of a National Bush Fire Alert System

Don't forget to bring your questions with you. In the meantime, remember it is currently the Bush Fire Danger Period (hard to believe, we know, but it is) and therefore Fire Permits are still required and a much sought-after item.

Tennis has continued on without a break over the Christmas New Year period and last Wednesday, we had a pleasant surprise when one of





Weed pulling is a lot easier at the moment but a whole lot sweatier. Even on a cool day the Nabiac Landcare members come out of the bush looking like they've had a shower and need another one! Luckily with a judicious application of bug spray, the mossies haven't been too bad. Unfortunately, the bullants nests are better hidden in the long grass and they really don't like being disturbed.

We have divided into two teams at the moment with one team attacking the big stuff at Lilypilly Bend and the other doing follow-up weeding at Bullock Wharf.

My BOLO weed list at the moment are mostly the old faithfuls--


Maderia vine is powering in the warm wet weather. If you do clear some up DO NOT DUMP it somewhere and expect it to die. Wrap it and into the red bin. I have thought a 44 gal drum with a fire under it might be a solution to large amounts of Maderia vine.



Cassia, Senna pendula var. glabrata, is showing it's pretty yellow flowers in sunny spots around Nabiac. It really catches your eye at this time of year so deal with it when you see it. If you love the cassia in your garden please prune it to remove seed pods.



Formosa/Taiwan lily is finishing blooming. I went out to get what I thought was ten plants, there were fifty!!! When there are so many plants digging becomes time consuming. Check out Weedwise NSW Weed-



Lastly, another garden escapee that is thriving. **Montbretia** (Crocosmia x crocosimiiflora) is a vigorously growing bulbous plant with pretty orange flower sprays. It is considered an invasive weed of environmental areas. It spreads rapidly and is setting seed at the moment. **NSW WeedWise** is the best source of information on control in NSW.



Nabiac Landcare normally works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am 11am, followed by a very yummy morning tea. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. Most of all enjoy the local bush!

Nabiac Community Garden is a hidden treasure at the rear of the



EARLY CHILDHOOD SUPPORT CENTRE WILL 'NURTURE GENERATIONS OF LOCAL FAMILIES'



Federal funding of \$3.2 million has been announced for construction to be completed on a new early childhood support centre for the MidCoast.

Building work is underway on the First Steps Count Child and Community Centre in Myall Avenue, Taree with a Federal funding commitment now allowing the project to be finished.

"This announcement is the result of an outstanding community collaboration and I am very happy to be delivering this news to everyone involved," Dr Gillespie said. "This will be a far-reaching and transformative service, nurturing generations of local families."

First Steps Count campaigner Rosemary Sinclair AO: "I am so grateful to Dr David and the Federal Government for getting behind this project. The centre will be offering many essential programs, child health screenings, supported playgroups, parenting support programs and health and wellbeing guidance for those in need. I could not be more proud of this coming to fruition; it will help so many in our community."

Taree Universities Campus will now have a permanent and much larger home after Lyne MP Dr David Gillespie announced \$5.5-million in Federal funding to secure the former **Council Chambers and Administration** building in Pulteney Street.

"This is a very big win for our region and another important milestone in the development of Taree Universities Campus," Dr Gillespie said.

"I started this process in 2018 which came out of our Vision 2030 Plan survey. From there we pulled together a steering committee, then we launched Taree Universities Campus as a project

and appointed a community board of eminent locals to oversee the new entity.

"After that we began putting together the plan and application for operational Federal funding which we secured. In just over a year, there are now more than 180 registered students studying through the campus."

In addition to providing a place for local university students to study, Taree Universities Campus provides pastoral, academic and industry support and has established formal partnerships with several universities to deliver online and face-to-face teaching and learning.



Food to aid good digestion.



Many of us have experienced digestive issues. Sometimes, certain foods are harder to digest. Did you know that some foods possess enzymes which help our bodies break down food and aid digestion? Some beneficial food pairings are outlined below.

Just over half of your blood is plasma. It's full of proteins that can be used in 18 different ways.

How does a plasma donation work?

While you're resting in a comfortable chair, a special machine draws blood from your arm. The machine separates the blood out to collect the plasma, which is actually a yellow colour. It's yellow because your red cells, which make your blood red, are returned to you during the donation.


Beam Me Up Scotty - There's No Intelligent Life Down Here!

The Wallamba Watershed's History – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, May, 1944 - 1945by Bob Mann

NABIAC - FEBRUARY, 1945: It has been decided to abandon the Nabiac Show which as to have been held on the 11th and 12th April.

TRANSPORT PLANE FORCED DOWN AT NABIAC - APRIL 1945. Taree had a large and unexpected influx of our R.A.A.F. Airmen during the Easter week end when a large transport plane was forced down at Nabiac. About twenty personal were transferred to Taree by bus chartered from *B.Ivens* and a stretcher case was brought in by Ambulance. Owing to heavy holiday bookings the hotels were unable to accommodate all the visitors some of whom travelled to Sydney by train and others were given accommodation for the night by a Taree citizen. On report of a favourable weather report from the V.A.O.C. control room the aircraft left the following morning bound for Melbourne.

NABIAC - APRIL 28TH: On Friday night last a Spitfire flying from Queensland to Williamstown developed engine trouble when in the vicinity of Taree. The pilot, Flying Officer Anderson of the F.A.A.F., immediately headed for Nabiac where he made a forced landing. On hearing of the landing Mr Stan Holden, N.A.D.C., Chief Officer at Nabiac, went to the aerodrome and brought the pilot to Nabiac where he stayed the night. Mr Holden also arranged with Mr. H. Mann and Mr J.R. Magennis of Nabiac to guard the plane. At daylight the following morning repairs were made and the aircraft proceeded to Williamstown.

COOLONGOLOOK - MAY 1945: COOLONGOLOOK AIRMAN DECORATED: Mr and Mrs Nosworthy of Coolongolook were recently informed by the Department of Air that their airman son, Flying Officer Sydney John Nosworthy had been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. This young man, who had enlisted from Coolongolook shortly after the outbreak of war, received his training under the Empire Training Scheme in Canada and was posted as wireless air gunner to Bomber Command in Britain. Later he was commissioned and has now been awarded the D.F.C. the citation for which reads "Flying Officer Nosworthy has taken part in a large number of operation sorties



In April 1944 he was wireless operator in an aircraft detailed for an attack against Aulnoye. His aircraft was attacked by a night fighter and afterwards illuminated by and subjected to anti-aircraft fire and as a result the aircraft was damaged and the Captain and flight engineer seriously wounded. Flying Officer Nosworthy, with great coolness, attended to the needs of the flight engineer and gave valuable assistance to the Captain during the return flight. This officer has always shown exceptionally cool courage in the face of danger and his outstanding technical ability has materially contributed to the successful completion of many missions."

The proud parents are receiving may congratulations from their host of friends on the high honour won by their distinguished son.

Could a Grain Free Diet Help Your Horse?

Do you have a horse or pony who gets hot or fizzy? A horse that can't focus? A horse that you suspect of having hindgut acidosis or stomach ulcers? Or perhaps a pony prone to laminitis or EMS?

Going grain free may just be the key to solving your horse's underlying issue.

Horses need sufficient levels of energy in their diets for optimum performance and function, however high sugar and starch are one of the leading causes of health issues in horses today. Typically, the feeds with the highest sugar and starch levels are those containing grains and grain bi-products.

The most common reasons for going grain free include:

- Feeding the hot fizzy horse
- To help prevent or manage hindgut acidosis
- Feeding the laminitis prone horse
- Feeding for horse with tying up issues
- Feeding the horse who suffer from Cushings, Insulin Resistance or Equine Metabolic Syndrome (EMS)
- To help prevent and manage stomach ulcers
 - Feeding the hot fizzy horse: The type of feed you use may make a difference in your horse's behaviour. Sugar and starch are found in large quantities in cereal grain and when this is digested in the small intestine of the horse the end product is glucose, which is absorbed into the blood. Fluctuations in

blood sugar may be the cause of behaviour changes such as hotness, fizziness, and an inability to concentrate. If your horse seems reactive to grain-based feed, try a fibre and oilbased feed that contains lower starch and sugar content, it may just help curb negative behaviour.

- To help prevent or manage hindgut acidosis: Many health disorders, such as laminitis and colic, are associated with hindgut acidosis, which results from a starch overload in the digestive system. Hindgut acidosis occurs when there's excessive acidity in the horse's hindgut, coupled with a drastic drop of the pH value, most commonly caused by a high grain and low forage diet. 60% of performance horses have hindgut acidosis with the most common cause of it being a diet high in
- Laminitis: When a laminitic horse needs extra feed in addition to the low sugar forage it is very important for owners to not feed grain-based feeds. A laminitic horse should not be fed any of the following ingredients - oats, corn, wheat, rice or barley, millrun, millmix, bran (rice or wheat), pollard, any form of steam flaked, micronised or extruded grain. Ideally, feeds for laminitic horses should have a sugar and starch level of less than 12%.
- Feeding for horses with tying up issues: Close dietary management of horses that tie up can help to reduce the incidence or severity of the disease in affected horses. Minimise starch and sugar intake. Diets high in starch and sugars (mainly those

that contain large amounts of grain) are well known to make tying up occur more frequently and severely.

- Feeding horses who suffer from Cushings, Insulin Resistance or Equine Metabolic Syndrome: Horses who suffer from any of these disorders benefit from a low starch and sugar diet, with grain free most often being the safest option for these horses.
- To help prevent and manage stomach ulcers: Studies have also shown that 60% of performance horses and up to 90% of racehorses have stomach ulcers, this is in part from the way these horses are fed and what they are fed. Large grain meals and extended periods of fasting in stables leads to excessive gastric acid output without adequate saliva protection, paving the way for ulcer formation. One of the best ways to prevent stomach ulcers is through the liberal feeding of forage (hay and pasture). A horse's digestive system is design to constantly be processing small amounts of food. Changing to a feed containing less starch and sugar and more fibre and fats is good feeding practice to help prevent ulcers.



Welcome to Deb's Gardening,

ife throws curve balls at you from time to time and when it happens, it's strange how your life changes and how you cope with the all the emotions and grief. A curve ball hit me and there were days when I could only put one step in front of the other to get me through the day. I would look out my window and look at my garden and at times grateful that I had a garden to look at, but there were times when I resented the garden because I didn't have the energy or the time to get out and take care of it.

There were moments when I got to have a wander around the garden and it gave me mixed emotions. Happy emotions like seeing the pumpkin patch taken over with plenty of pumpkins on it. Zucchini that I missed picking and were huge in size, loads of cucumbers, carrots and beetroot ready to pick. The day lilies flowering again, the flowering gum tree, the crepe myrtle coming out in flower for the first time. Surprised and delighted emotions, when I took a seat in the garden and watched the bird life, quails, wallabies and even a small goanna climbing my jacaranda. Then there was the sad depressing emotion – the tomatoes full of fruit fly, the capsicum full of grubs, weeds everywhere since I didn't get a chance to get the mulch on the garden at the start of summer and one of the weeds that was appearing everywhere was tobacco bush. Even looking at the lawn growing as quick as it did was disheartening and let's not mention the whipper snipping that needed doing. All these emotions just from the garden plus the curve ball, all exhausting!!

So with all these emotions and feelings, I have to work at sticking with the happy emotions otherwise I will go insane with depression (now I know what depression feels like) and the garden is my happy place.

It was like taking baby steps. In the past few weeks I started with the secateurs and started pruning the plants and trees that needed pruning. Weeding one garden bed at a time and before I know it I have almost the garden weeded. My wonderful supporting partner kept on top of the lawn mowing for me (cause he knows when the lawn is too long I stress out). I managed to spend short bursts on the whipper snipper and have it under control. I think to myself that I am back getting exercise, vitamin D and happy hormones which are all good for the soul and recovery.

I now have to attack the vegetable garden and those pesky pests, which I have left to the last minute. Time to get out the fruit fly traps and fill them with the bait made up of 100% fruit juice and pulp, mixed with 1 tablespoon of cloudy ammonia. The fruit fly have gotten into my pear tree, luckily I got to net a few branches so didn't lose all the fruit but the fruit fly is prolific. It also means that I have to pick up all the dropped fruit and dispose of in a big plastic bag and leave in the sun to cook.

So, Jean slowly fumbled her way out of her clothes.

She grabbed a dried flower from a nearby display and held it between her teeth. Then, completely naked, she streaked (as fast as an old lady can) through the front door of the flower show.

Waiting outside, her friend soon heard a huge commotion inside the hall, followed by loud applause and shrill whistling.

Finally, the smiling Jean came through the exit door to the sounds of a cheering, clapping crowd.

"What happened?" asked Connie.

"I won \$1,000 as 1st prize for "Best Dried Arrangement'!"

I need to spray the capsicums and tomatoes with Eco oil for grubs (Eco oil is an organic oil which you can get from a produce store) it needs to be sprayed early in the morning or late in the afternoon so as not to burn the leaves. The tomatoes and capsicum are still growing with plenty of new fruit considering they were neglected. I usually give them a dose of Seasol every 3 weeks, plus a top up with blood and bone, organic life scattered on the soil during its growing life, and kept mulched. By dosing and fertilizing the tomatoes and capsicum it makes them healthy and less prone to attack of pest and disease. I will start fertilising them again.

The compost bin needs attending to – time to empty it and spread it in the vegetable garden to get ready for the winter crop, like the Brassica family (broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower and turnips) and almost time to get the garden bed ready for peas.

As I am typing this it all sounds still exhausting but like the weeding and pruning etc, I will put one foot in front of the other and take baby steps. It doesn't have to be done all in one day, it's time for me to look after myself, get my life back and get back into my happy place.

Thank goodness for nature and gardens.

LAMB WITH RAISINS, HONEY & ALMONDS

A friend of mine from 100years ago had a Moroccan restaurant in Sydney and this is a recipe from her cook book, 'Salama'

INGREDIENTS

2 kg Lamb shoulder, cubed

400g Onions, finely chopped

400g Seeded raisins

125g Blanched almonds

1tsp Tumeric

1tsp Paprika

1tsp Chilli

1tsp White pepper

1tsp Black pepper

1tsp Mace

1tsp Nutmeg

1tsp Cardamom

1dsp Ginger

1dsp Cinnamon

1dsp Salt

150g Butter

1ltr Water ½ cup Honey


METHOD

Mix all the spices except the cinnamon to a paste with a little water. Coat the raisins with half of this mixture and set aside

Coat the lamb with the other half and put in a heavy bottomed saucepan with the finely chopped onions, salt, butter, almonds and water. Bring to the boil

Add the raisins, honey and cinnamon and continue cooking until tender.

Reduce the sauce, and serve with rice.
