Frederick Rupert Leslie Williams

An insight of a local young man's time at war.

Former resident and Captain of the Krambach Fire Brigade, *Fred Williams*, at the age of 17 years, decided, with his cousin, to enlist in the Army to fight the War overseas. He put his age up, as did many young men, thinking they were going on an adventure.

On the 10th January, 1940, he sailed on HMT Otranto with the 2/2 AIF arriving in Egypt in February. On his 18th birthday he almost drowned in the Mediterranean Sea Palestine.

He was in action in the attack and capture of Bardia and Tobruk. On 18th March 1941, his unit embarked for Greece. They then moved to near Mt Olympus. Their unit was over run by the German Army. Fred escaped to Crete via Milos and other islands on a fishing boat, eating only a slice of bread and lemon to survive.

On his 19th birthday, their position was dive bombed, luckily the bomb did not explode. He walked across Crete, then evacuated on the HMS Phobe, the last ship to leave Crete.

On the 19th September his unit moved to New Guinea. Over the Kokoda Track he served as a Bren Gunner in at least 10 heavy engagements against the Japanese. In particular Templeton's Crossing and Eora Creek, where some of the bloodiest fighting occurred on the Kokoda Track. His unit suffered heavy casualties.

In Fred's last action at Sanananda, two of his companies attacked the enemy from behind. Again they suffered heavy casualties. Fred was ordered to give his Bren Gun to someone else, and move the casualties to safety and look after their wounds, while still under heavy fire. Later that night a Supply Party got through to them.

The Company Commander, Captain *Bosgard*, said they could only evacuate 10 casualties, and that Fred had to choose the ones who in his opinion who would survive. The others would have to wait for the next night, as they could only move under the cover of darkness. Fred protested, saying he would be playing God, choosing who would live or die. The Captain said there was no one else to do it. So Fred carried out the order. He was only 20 years old!!

During the night, 4 men died, and Fred said that he often wondered if they would still be alive, if he had sent them back.

American Troops came to support the unit, and Fred took charge of their casualties also.

He ended up being Doctor for two Aussie and one American Company. The American Officer gave Fred all his medical supplies, as their Medic was killed. The American Officer-In-Charge thanked Fred personally.

Fred too, was then wounded, and was carried out by the Fuzzy





Wuzzies.

Fred never got over having to make these choices, nor did he come to terms with his own mates whom he buried, and whose remains were never found. He worried that these men would be forgotten.

To honour Fred, three of his children, *Kevin, Joan* and *James*, walked the Kokoda Track. They were able to share their experience with him and let him know his mates names are on the No2 Pillar of Remembrance at Bomana War Cemetery, Port Moresby.

On the 26th November 1942, the King awarded Fred the "Mentioned in Dispatches for GALLANT AND DISTINGUISHED SERVICES" award which now proudly hangs on the family home wall."

MINIMBAH MATTERS

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade, has had a very interesting and exciting March. With the weather being the way it is, we have had some unusual call outs; some flood related, one to a potentially nasty blaze at a service station, the Ambulance folk needed assistance at one time, BUT thankfully and unsurprisingly, no bush fires.



The Bush Fire Danger Period will have come to an end by the time you read this. As from Friday 1st April there will be no need for a Fire Permit before you light up. Not having to get a permit is the only thing that has changed. There is still the requirement to make sure your fire is in a well prepared clear and safe area, and to have firefighting equipment and water at the ready.

A minimum of **24 hours notice** of your intention to light up must be given to your neighbours and your local fire authority. On-line notification can be made at any time of the day or night by visiting **www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify**.

Fill in your details and you will receive a confirmation notice straight away.

Calling Mid Coast Fire Control Centre on 1300 643 262 and letting them know what you are up to, is an option for those without internet access.

Please be very mindful of the frequent and rather sudden changing weather conditions if you are lighting up.

Amongst the **March Minimbah Matters** was a presentation of National Emergency Medals to Members for their service during the 2019-20 bush-fires. A message from His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Retd), Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia reads, in part

"The intensity of the fires, and the devastation they caused will long be scarred into our nation's memory. In the midst of the danger and tragedy we also witnessed the best of Australia – individuals helping loved ones and strangers alike.

As a recipient of the National Emergency Medal, know that your fellow Australians are grateful for your service."


Mark Johnson, Melanie Moore, Jennifer Power and Chris Power also received the honour.


Yay, the Nabiac Show went ahead, and it was a cracker.

We all overcame the morning rain, and it was a very successful day.












Our congratulations to the Show Committee and their many and varied helpers.



WANTED DEAD OR ALIVE!

Be On the Look Out for

AFRICAN OLIVE

I mentioned to one of our MidCoast weed officers that we've found a few young African Olive trees at the Bullock Wharf reserve, well that caught his attention! African Olive is considered a major threat to biodiversity in areas where it establishes including the central Hunter and southwest Sydney regions.

Sooooo... It is time for a 'scavenger hunt'. I'm not sure what the prize will be but I'm sure that I can arrange one for the person who finds the mature African olive tree that is fruiting in our area. The fruits are probably beginning to colour up now. The culprit is probably located within a 1 km radius of the Bullock Wharf reserve and birds bring the seeds into the reserve. That means that it could be on either side of the Wallamba River. It also means there could be seedlings popping up in gardens and bush land in the area.

African Olive, *Olea europaea subsp. cuspidate* is a long-lived evergreen shrub or tree usually growing to heights and widths of 5–10 m. Bark is pale to dark grey developing a rough texture with age. It forms a dense canopy when mature.

The upper surface of the leaves is glossy grey green and the underside is silver, green to brown with a distinctive hooked tip. Common edible olives have silver grey leaves.

White flowers appear in spring on branchlets in leaf axils (where leaves join the stem). This is unlike privet whose flowers and fruits appear at the end of stems.

Fruit is oval shaped (like a very small olive), initially green maturing over autumn and winter to purple or black. African Olive produces thousands of seeds.

Control methods include preventing seeding ie pruning and hand pulling small plants. Large plants need to be treated carefully by cut & paint, stem injection or basal bark spray as per directions. Burning, cutting down or incorrectly poisoning trees may cause suckering.



The play equipment has been popular and its great to see local children and visiting children using it.





TOWN CREEK REVIVAL FOR NABIAC



Federal Government funding of \$250,000 will reduce the flood risk for Nabiac's town centre, restore Town Creek, deliver a new public picnic area for the town and shade sails in Memorial Park.

The funding will see the planting of native species of trees along a 125-metre section of Town Creek north of Clarkson Street, the removal of invasive vegetation and construction of a rock-lined low-flow channel to reduce flood impact.

I joined MidCoast Council representatives in town to see plans for the upgrades.

We are prioritising work to mitigate flooding in local communities to avoid the devastation we have seen elsewhere and have experienced in our own region in recent years.

At the same time, this project will improve the charm of Nabiac's village by beautifying the banks of Town Creek, installing a new picnic area on the southern side of Clarkson Street and some long awaited shade sails over the children's playground in Memorial Park.

The work is expected to take about 12 weeks to complete, finishing up at the ed of June 2022.





The Wallamba Watershed's History - Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, 1945 by Bob Mann

DYERS CROSSING - JULY, 1945: On Wednesday evening last a large gathering of people met at Dyers Crossing to make a farewell presentation to the Rev. R.V. Hanington and his wife who are leaving the district at an early date. The Rev Hanington has been the Church of England Rector in the Parish for the past $\bar{7}$ years and recently received news of his transfer to Brancton*. The evening was pleasantly spent in card playing and renditions of musical numbers. Mr S. Walsh obliged with several humorous songs. They were loudly applauded and Mr Hanington gave two enjoyable recitations. Speakers included Messrs A. Schuberg, W. Finch, N. C. Suters, L. Stevens and J. Harris. All these gentlemen expressed the genuine regret felt by the people of the parish in the departure of Rev. Hanington of the latter's great friendliness and sincerity and how he had strived hard to improve the finances of the parish. In this he had met with well earned success and he had the satisfaction of knowing that he was leaving with the finances of the church in a sound condition. A very interesting speech was that of Mr J. Harris, the oldest parishioner in the district now over 80 years of age. He praised the sterling qualities of Rev Hanington and assured him that he would be sadly missed. Mrs. R. Fraser made a presentation to Mrs Hanington and on behalf of the Wallamba people Mr. L. Stevens presented Rev Hanington with a very fine travelling case. In reply Rev Hanington thanked the people from the bottom of his heart for their kind thoughts and a most useful present which he would always treasure highly. He went on to say how his stay on the Wallamba River was the longest one he had made so far and he judged it the happiest period of his life. The people had give him that co-operation for which he had hoped and had been behind him in all church work. He had received notice of transfer with very mixed feelings. He had lived so long in this area that it became hard indeed to sever his happy connection with the place and leave for another. The work of the church would go on, he pointed out, and even though there were changes in Rectors and he urged the people to give the new Rector the support they had given him

NABIAC - July, 1945: The monthly meeting of the Nabiac Branch of the P.P.U was held at Darawank on the 9th of July and was organised by Mr D. Hancock. President of the Wallamba District Junior Farmers Club was a representative and enthusiastic gathering of farmers of the Wallamba. Nine members from Nabiac were conveyed to the Darawank Hall per car by Mr H. Bryan and Mr G. Paterson. Mr S Bowers occupied the chair. Mr R. Milliken, on behalf of the Darawank members, extended a kindly welcome to their Nabiac friends and appreciated their action in transporting one meeting a quarter to Darawank. Mr Bowers thanked Mr Milliken and stressed the importance of farmers supporting the Union. When the usual business

came on ideas were brought forward and lively discussion followed the suggestions. Three motions were carried to be placed on the agenda proper for the forthcoming district conference to be held at Wauchope during the last week in August. The secretary was instructed to bring several matters under th notice of the Manning Shire Council and to thank the councillors for their attention to past requests. It was decided to hold the next meeting at Failford during August. At 10..o'clock the billy was boiled and the ladies of Darawank passed around refreshments which was enjoyed by all. Mr. W. Digby moved a hearty vote of thanks to the ladies which was carried by acclamation and an enjoyable evening terminated.

NABIAC: PEACE CELEBRATIONS - AUGUST, 1945: Nabiac celebrated the declaration of peace with good enthusiasm when at 2pm a march was made to the memorial in the park. There Mr R. Campbell guided the proceedings and spoke of the sacrifice made by those who have gone from us. Not only in this war, but also in the previous one. Two minutes silence was observed in memory of those members of the service who will not return. Wreaths were placed on the monument by a number of representatives of local and patriotic bodies. National hymns were heartily sung by the large company present. The address was given by the Rev. R.C. Pereria. He said we feel convinced that the Divine presence has attended the efforts of the Allies during the dark years just passed, therefore we do well to remember God in this hour of joy and triumph. When V.E. DAY was celebrated there was a restraint in our rejoicing because of the knowledge that our task was not completed. Now we can throw ourselves into the celebrations in the most hearty manner. Today there is one cause for sorrow, that is the fact that so many of our men won't be coming home. To those whose sorrow we give our tenderest sympathy and commend them to the compassion of a loving God. Now we commence an area of peace. The only way in which this peace can be made real and eternal is by winning the love and goodwill of those who in the past have been our enemies, so the task which it requires most skill and goodness lies before us.

At 7pm on Wednesday a very large company of all denominations gathered in the Methodist Church where half an hour was spent in singing thanks giving hymns Most hearty was the spirit in which the hymns were sung. Afterwards many expressions of appreciation for the session were given. Following the singing in the church a bonfire was a great attraction to the young and old. Then followed a gala night in the Agricultural Hall. This was deemed so good that is was repeated o Thursday night.

NABIAC - SEPTEMBER, 1945: Mr and Mrs E. McMaster have received word that their son Mr W. McMaster, who has been a prisoner, is well.

DYERS CROSSING - OCTOBER, 1945: Miss June Milligan, the daughter of Mr and Mrs Merve Milligan, aged 12 years of Dyers Crossing fell while playing last Friday and fractured her right leg. The ambulance conveyed the patient to the MRD Hospital

Spotting & Treating Equine Hoof Thrush

Have you heard of equine thrush? Thrush is a fungal infection of the frog, which is found in the central and lateral grooves. It can be identified by the presence of black, rotting flesh and an extremely foul smell. In severe cases, the infection may penetrate the horny tissues and the sensitive structures of the hoof, which can lead to lameness.

The main cause of thrush is unhygienic living conditions, for example when horses are kept in poorly managed stables that are not thoroughly mucked out daily. Horses can also develop thrush when they're kept in dirty yards and paddocks, or in wet, muddy paddocks that are contaminated. Dirty, uncleaned feet, and lack of frog pressure due to incorrect shoeing or trimming can also lead to the development of thrush.

The most apparent sign that a horse has thrush is usually the odour that occurs when picking out the feet and a general foul smell coming from the horse's hooves. The infected areas of the hoof will be black in colour and will easily break or crumble when scraped. When picking out the hooves around thrush areas, the differences between healthy and infected areas can be seen when healthy white-grey frog tissue is surrounding a dark, smelly area. You will also find an increased amount of moisture and a black discharge in the frog grooves.

Most horses do not become lame if infected with thrush. However, if left untreated, the bacteria may migrate deeper into the sensitive parts of the hoof, which will result in lameness.

Treating thrush firstly involves improving the horse's living conditions and the hygiene of stables, yards, and paddocks.

Secondly, you need to kill and eradicate the invading bacteria. Treat thrush in horses with a germ-killing product, such as iodine, betadine, or a bleach-water mix, diluted 50-50. Do be aware with bleach that if the infection is severe and has reached the sensitive tissue bleach will be too harsh. You can soak your horse's hooves in these products using a sponge to thoroughly cover infected area, or fill a bucket with an inch of your chosen solution then place each of the horse's hooves in the bucket for a few minutes at a time.

To get deep into the crevices of the frog where the infection will be hiding make your own cotton swab by wrapping cotton tightly around the end of a hoof pick and soak in your chosen solution. Make sure to thoroughly clean the sides of the frog and any cracks and crevices. Repeat the process daily until the issue is resolved.

Rotting frog tissue should be pared back and dead flesh removed by your farrier to allow the flesh underneath to begin repairing.

It is important to be aware that some horses are more predisposed to getting thrush than others and the best course of action for these horses is to treat them weekly as a preventative measure.

Iodine and betadine are both available at Mustang & Co Saddlery & Rural, alongside a large range of equine and livestock medical supplies.

Lyn's Larder

The weather is getting cooler and so I thought a nice homemade soup would go down better than a can of bought soup.

CHICKEN SOUP with a difference. This easy recipe is perfect for a quick lunch or dinner. Red capsicum, corn and a sprinkling of fresh greens bring colour and texture to a simple chicken soup base, and adding a little sherry makes it taste just that bit more special. With seeded bread rolls it makes a tasty light meal

INGREDIENTS

1 litre Boiling water

Chicken stock cubes, crumbled

Red capsicum, seeded and cut into fine strips

125 g Frozen corn

250 g Skinless chicken breast fillets, cut into short 1cm wide strips

2 cup Young broccoli florets or pieces of broccolini (120g)

2 tbsp Medium sherry

Snipped fresh chives (15g) 1/4 cup 1/4 cup Chopped fresh tarragon (15g)

Pepper (both to taste)

METHOD

Pour the water into a large saucepan & add the stock cubes and whisk over a high heat until the stock boils.

Add the capsicum strips and corn & bring back to the boil, then add the chicken strips and immediately reduce the heat to low.

Cover and simmer gently for 5 minutes.

Uncover the pan and bring the soup back to the boil.

Sprinkle the broccoli or broccolini into the soup, but do not stir them in. Leave them to cook on the surface of the soup, uncovered, for 3-4 minutes or until just tender.

Take the pan off the heat.

Stir in the sherry, chives, tarragon and seasoning to taste. Serve at once.

Possibly if you prefer a little more flavour you might like to start by sautéing half of a thinly sliced onion before adding the water and then following the rest of the preparations.

Take part in a citizen science project

Schools and community groups are invited to take part in an exciting Science Week project, exploring MidCoast's beautiful creeks and rivers.

The MidCoast has secured one of 35 National Science Week grants. The grant will fund a special science project with MidCoast Council, the University of Canberra and the Manning River Turtle Group.

Using brand new eDNA technologies, the project will look at the ways native animals including the platypus, Australian bass and the Manning River turtle use our waterways.

Environmental DNA (or eDNA) sampling is an innovative scientific technique. It allows participants to engage in scientific field sampling and learn about biodiversity.

Clare Rourke, from the Manning River Turtle Group, said, "In May, we will hold a field-based workshop for participants where we will learn about eDNA sampling and how it is used. There will be talks on local wildlife. Participants will be given a kit to conduct their own sampling in a local creek or waterway of special interest to them."

University scientists will analyse the samples and the results will be revealed during a webinar in Science Week.

"It will be hands-on and fun. We hope participants gain a better understanding of the biodiversity of local creeks and rivers and a new appreciation of how special our environment is," Clare said.

MidCoast Council's Manager Natural Systems, Gerard Tuckerman added, "The project forms part of Council's effort to protect and improve the health and function of local catchments and waterways and we are pleased to be part of this positive event. If any school or community organisation is interested in participating, please contact us."

Call Council on 7955 7777 to express your interest. Places are limited and the deadline is **20**th **April**.

Dr Jess Tout from Charles Sturt University said, "My love of science and the environment has shaped my career as a researcher and university lecturer. This project allows me to share that passion with school students and people from a range of ages and backgrounds. It will encourage knowledge-gathering and stimulate a conversation about science participation, the environment and the value of healthy natural areas".

National Science Week is from $13^{th} - 21^{st}$ August 2022. This sounds like a great fun and informative project for one of our Landcare groups or possibly one of the schools to get involved in. Ed

Multi-million dollar Federal funding investment for medical, allied health student training in Taree

The Federal Coalition Government has announced an injection of \$32.9-million over three years into the University of Newcastle's Rural Health Multidisciplinary Training (RHMT) program which will train many more student doctors, nurses and other allied health professionals in Taree.

Funding for the Taree-based University of Newcastle's Rural Clinical School and University Department of Rural Health will support 18 local staff and significantly boost the region's health workforce.

The investment in medical, nursing and allied health in Taree builds on the Federal Coalition Government's \$7.5-million investment in expanding university and higher education through the Taree Universities Campus.

Making the funding announcement in Taree, Federal Minister for Regional Health and Member for Lyne Dr David Gillespie met with medical students at the university's High Street centre.

Dr Gillespie said by extending the health training program for a further three years, students were being supported in a range of career paths, as well as increasing health care access for local patients.

"In one year alone, the university's rural training facilities in Taree hosted more than 20 trainee doctors for 12-month training placements, considerably boosting the local medical workforce," Dr Gillespie said.

Service NSW. Updated COVID-19 advice on Self-isolation rules

There are changes to self-isolation rules that affect household contacts.

If a household contact tests positive to COVID-19, you **and** the COVID-positive person must **self-isolate for 7 days**. Have a test as soon as possible and again on day 6. If all tests are negative, you can leave isolation after 7 days.

You don't need to repeat self-isolation if another person in your household tests positive in the 14 days after you finish self-isolating. If another person in your household tests positive for COVID-19 more than 14 days after you've self-isolated, you'll have to self-isolate again for 7 days.

If you're unsure whether you need to self-isolate, you can <u>use this table</u> to assess your risk and know what to do if you've been exposed to someone with COVID-19. Go to w.gov.au/covid-19/management/people-exposed-to-covid

If you have a child aged 4 to 13 years who attends a primary school in NSW, you may be eligible for a **before and after school care voucher**. Each eligible household can receive a **\$500 voucher per child** to reduce the out-of-pocket costs of before and after school care.

The before and after school care voucher program is one of more than 70 NSW Government rebates and savings available.

SEATBELTS INSTALLED ON ALL SCHOOL BUSES IN REGIONAL AND RURAL NSW

Local students in the Myall Lakes will buckle up on every dedicated school bus thanks to the NSW Government's Rural and Regional Bus Seatbelt Program delivering seatbelts on 105 school buses.

Member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead said the program is delivering real outcomes for regional communities by making sure students can travel safely to and from school.

"Student safety is our top priority and with the completion of this \$237 million program school students will now buckle up on their way to school," Mr Bromhead said.

"This program is about saving lives and we know that there is a higher degree of risk attached to school bus travel in rural and regional areas with buses frequently travelling and stopping on unsealed roads and roads outside urban areas.

"From 2016 to 2020 35 per cent of all bus passengers injured in crashes were children aged 5 to 16 years and one in four bus passengers injured were on a school bus.

"Many of the roads school buses travel have a speed limit of 80 km/h and above and it is crucial that we do not compromise the safety of our students as they travel to and from school."

In the Myall Lakes, 57 new buses had seatbelts installed and 48 existing school buses were retrofitted with seatbelts

Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Sam Farraway said the NSW Government had completed the NSW Rural and Regional Bus Seatbelt Program two years ahead of schedule.

"More than 200,000 students will be able to wear a seatbelt on school buses delivering a welcome boost in bus safety for school children right across regional NSW.

"The NSW Government invested \$237 million to help keep our kids safer on regional roads and today marks the successful completion of the program.

"Regional school buses frequently have to travel on unsealed roads and on roads outside urban areas with a speed limit of 80 km/h and above and now thanks to these seat-belted buses in service, we know our children with be safer."

Motorists are reminded to slow down to 40km/h when bus lights flash because this means a bus is picking up or dropping off children and that they may be about to cross the road.

The NSW Rural and Regional Bus Seatbelt Program delivered:

- Seatbelts on the entire fleet of almost 2,600 dedicated school buses in rural and regional NSW
- 1,145 new buses installed with seatbelts, and 883 existing school buses were retrofitted with seatbelts



Welcome to Deb's Gardening,

Rain, rain and more rain. It's not helping me to get into the vegie garden and autumn is the perfect time for gardening.



One rule about gardening is not to dig sodden soil. When I say dig I mean lightly fork in the fertilisers, I am a no dig gardener, I just want to incorporate the fertilisers into the soil lightly.

My garden beds are all raised so once the sun shines again it won't take long to dry out and I will be able to start to prepare the beds. I will be sowing all peas directly into the soil, so if the soil is too wet the peas seeds will rot; patience is a virtue when it comes to gardening.

I still need to get into the tomato patch as they are now well and truly finished. The capsicums I will be leaving in for a second year Capsicums are biannual and can be left in for 2 years, they just need to be cut back and pruned.

Another rule about vegetable gardening is crop rotation. For example, don't plant root plants into the same spot. I plan to plant carrots into the finished tomato patch as carrots don't like a heavy fertile soil and as the tomatoes are a heavy feeder they have used up most of the fertiliser which makes it perfect for the carrots. The onions will be planted into the bed were the Zucchinis have been. Some plants don't like being planted near one another; for example, I won't be planting the peas near the onion as peas and onions don't like each other. But I

can plant peas into the same spot as last year as peas are a nitrogen fixer and don't mind being planted in the same spot. I am still picking carrots, beetroot, salad greens, beans and cucumbers from the vegie patch so it is not a complete bare patch.

My garden consists of different design areas I have a formal garden section, a deciduous garden under planted with daffodils, a native garden and a cottage garden. I didn't mean to start out like that but it is an evolving garden and certain plants like certain soil types. Camellias and azaleas like an acid soil so that was how I designed the formal garden.

I am about to start another garden section. We had a big fig tree in the corner of the garden not far from the house (who ever planted it needed their head read); the roots are very invasive so down it came. I got given a load of soil which had no fertilisers added, which I spread over the roots about 8 months ago and of course weeds started growing. I wanted the roots to die and break down. I didn't know what I wanted to plant in this new garden so it sat there for awhile and I also didn't want to plant during the warm months. Now I am ready to get the garden started. I put down a layer of black plastic to kill the weeds and any seeds a while ago. This new garden like, I said, is in a corner and has a lovely outlook of the paddocks so I don't want to plant anything tall to disrupt the view. I took myself to a nursery and had a great time selecting plants; the new theme is a grass land. There are so many different varieties of native grasses all growing no bigger than a metre high, which is perfect. Plus I bought myself a feature plant, a Standard Acacia. These plants don't like any manures and heavy fertilisers so perfect to plant together.

It is important to know what soil type your plants need for them to succeed. So bring on the sunshine so I can get myself back out into the garden to get my exercise, therapy and increase my knowledge as gardening is always a learning kerb.
