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Nabiac Village Futures Group News

Great to see the town creek getting some attention.

This has been a long project and from my dodgy memory half a lifetime ago, the councils of the day have been approached for something to be done. Our small gathering, the Village Futures Group (VFG), has been instrumental in carrying forward this project. We have a very good ongoing relationship with Council and we are well looked after, with foot paths, parking issues and speed restrictions in the village under discussion.

This is an expensive undertaking and to get to this stage Council has had to obtain various grants, create volumes of plans, deal with unknown government departments, private landowners and secure contractors. Wet weather is not helping the job so we ask the locals to be patient as work continues.

The plan has always been to beautify the area and when complete (according to the plans) the base and sides of the creek will consist of blue metal rocks and picnic table areas on both sides. Stormwater from the Old Bank Centre area must also be married into the area.

I noticed the foreman with a 2 m rod trying to find some bottom following the work by the excavator. Not much luck there.

The work brings back memories of this writer who grew up in the house adjacent to and across the creek from the bake house. Many happy hours were spent here with brothers and friends "fishing" and "water sports". We lived here again when married and raised three young tearaways.

The clean out resembles in many ways what the area looked like some 70+ years ago. Great stuff.

True Crime

They say that "Truth is stranger than fiction". If you are a fan of Crime Fiction you may like to check out the "True Crime" section of our Library. You may be surprised at the selection of books that investigate 'cold case' crimes in Australia dating back to the Depression years right up to Gary Jubelin describing his years as a homicide detective investigating the mysteries of the Bowraville children and William Tyrell in his book "I Catch Killers: the life and many deaths of a homicide detective." Come in and peruse this small but illuminating section of our Library giving us an insight into True Crime in Australia across the decades.

Authors by another name:

- Do you have a favourite author? Do they also write under a pseudonym or another name? Nora Roberts (born Eleanor Marie Robertson) has a wealth of romance, suspense and fantasy novels that span countries and decades. She also writes under the name of JD Robb featuring the characters of Eve Dallas and Rourke in her futuristic series titled 'Death In.....'.
- What about JK Rowling, who is the well known author of the Harry Potter series of books? Her real name is Joanne Kathleen Rowling. However, she chose to write under the pseudonym JK Rowling in the hope that her Harry Potter books would also attract male readers. She has also written a series of Crime Fiction novels called the Cormoran Strike series under the name of Robert Galbraith. Interesting? Might be worth checking out!
- Stephen King decided to also write books under the name Richard Bachman when his publishers told him they couldn't sell more than one Stephen King book a year.
- Jayne Anne Krentz writes contemporary romantic suspense, but uses the name Amanda Quick for her historical romance suspense novels and uses the name Jayne Castle when penning paranormal romantic suspense.
- Emily Rodda is a well-known Australian children's author, best known for her Deltora Quest series, the Rowan of Rin series and the Rondo trilogy. These books are a great read, even for adults; particularly the Rondo trilogy. However, she also writes adult crime fiction using her real name Jennifer Rowe.

To finish we bring a blast from the past! This one is interesting and it links back to our earlier biographies. Who would have thought?

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Currer, Ellis, & Acton Bell: Real Names: Charlotte, Emily, & Anne Brontë

In 19th-century England, women were not permitted to publish poetry, so the Brontë sisters created the pen names of Currer, Ellis, and Acton Bell. Each male pseudonym matched the corresponding sisters' names, helping them publish their first anthology of poetry in 1846. Initially, Emily's *Wuthering Heights* and Charlotte's *Jane Eyre* were both published under their male names. It wasn't until the Brontë sisters travelled to London to meet their publisher in person were their true identities revealed and, fortunately, they were given the credit they deserved.

There are many other authors who write under a pseudonym or a variety of other names. Maybe you can tell us of your discoveries. We would love to hear from you. Just pop into Nabiac Library, located in the Showground at Nabiac and tell us your findings.

School and Hall.




skaters. Nabiac Preschool have allocated considerable funds for young people to paint murals at the Skatepark but they can't access the area due to swampy, smelly mud.

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MINIMBAH MATTERS

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade may be soggy and muddy like most others in the District, but we are still working towards a busy Bush Fire Danger Period starting at the beginning of September. All the rain over the warmer months has led to a bumper crop of grass and undergrowth, none of which is in fear of being slashed or cleared because the ground is far too wet to venture onto it with any machinery. The ground is absolutely saturated and we are still getting the rain but no warmth to go with it, so, soggy and sodden it remains.

> Therefore, what we can do is Live Bush Fire Ready.

At a Brigade level this means training: Two of our Members have just completed their Advanced Firefighter course and our newest Member is well under way with her Bush Firefighter course. It also means keeping our firefighting equipment and personal protective equipment (PPE) in good working order.

At a New South Wales Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) level, it's about enabling us to achieve both.

One of the Commissioner's priorities is to equip our Members with better respiratory PPE for use during firefighting – appropriate respiratory protection equipment that is evidence-based, fit-for-purpose and supported by research.

Following testing and evaluation by NSW RFS Members and an open market tender process, new respiratory options for all firefighting appliances across the state have been rolled out. This project has been partly funded by the Brigades Donations Fund – money donated by our grateful communities.

Minimbah Brigade has received our issue of both half-face and full-face reusable respirators with canisters, and made ourselves familiar with them at our last meeting. These respirators provide the required level of protection for bush firefighting, and the ABEK P3 canister was selected as it provides protection from hazards found in bush fires, structure fires and car fires.

An interesting incident at a local service station during May gives some insight into the many and varied types of call-outs the RFS Brigades attend. A customer mistakenly filled their 4x4 fuel tank with petrol rather than diesel. Ramifications not good. While trying to rectify the mistake without causing too much damage to the vehicle, fuel was spilled - lots of fuel was spilled! Safety protocols meant the service station was closed down during a very busy truck stopping time, the contaminated area was attended to

by two Brigades and a Group Officer, and we all lived happily ever after.

We live with bush fires, Live Bush Fire Ready.

Yes, just like all our other equipment, they do come with instructions!! By the way we are really good at fighting fires.

Especially at the moment we are looking for a guy or a gal to help on a Wednesday morning in the Shed. It's only 3-4 hours and your help would greatly appreciated.



allamba CWA almost had a full complement of members for their May, 2022 meeting which was held at the usual venue and all were welcomed by President *Margaret Weller* who declared the meeting opened at 10.00am.

Fourteen members were present with 3 members sending apologies.

Following the opening formalities the members paused to remember the passing of *Penny Britton's* partner John Baker's mother and local resident James (Jim) Denley and UK TV actor Dennis Waterman and the people killed during the on going conflict in Ukraine.

Pam Muxlow brought along the thought for this month's meeting and it was very fitting during the current World conflicts and it was "When the power of love overcomes the love of power, the World will know PEACE". A quote from the late Mahatma Gandhi.

There was a change to the minutes relating to the size of the measurement for the squares needed to make up rugs for the flood victims of Lismore and the North Coast. I got my inches and millimetres muddle up – they are to be *6 inches* square and not 10 inches square.

There were only a couple of items of correspondence and one was advising the Branch of the Liquor Licence application from the Nabiac FoodWorks business. The ladies discussed the issue and decided the branch wouldn't take any action on it leaving it up to the individual members if they wished to.

Unfortunately Penny didn't make it to State Conference as our Branch International Officer but was able to view it via Zoom and told us that the 2023 Country of Study is to be *LATIVIA* – which is located in the Baltic Sea region and it's capital is RIGA. It has a population of 2 million people and its flag is red and white. It is only small by comparison to some surrounding countries but will be very interesting to study.

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Nabiac Landcare

The Nabiac Landcare team has moved back to the Lilypilly Bend reserve to conduct follow-up weeding. Unfortunately, the weeds haven't drowned with all the rain and are growing well. The edges of the reserve are, as usual, the weediest thanks to birds and wind moving the seeds and a few uncaring people who have dumped their garden rubbish.

We are continuing primary weeding of larger weeds in the area between the ends of Cowper and Stuart Streets. Don't be surprised if the area looks a bit shell-shocked, it will improve.

The Landcare sponsored walk through the Wharf and Lilypilly Bend Reserves on 4th May was well attended. It was great for the Nabiac Landcare team to be able to show what we've accomplished and to have it recognized by the presenters. Weed removal techniques were demonstrated, some weeds were pulled, plants identified and a few lovely little greenhood orchids were observed.

Weed-wise nothing really exciting is happening, no nasty new weeds, just working on the usual suspects.

- Cassia has had an unusually long flowering season and is setting lots of seeds. If you want to keep cassia in your garden now is the time to prune it and dispose of the seeds responsibly.
- Mother of millions is just starting to flower, put it on your to-do list.
- We still haven't found the parent African Olive in the area. The local weed guys say to widen the search! A reward still applies!

There are a few weeds of note in the wider area:

Tropical Soda Apple (TSA) (Solanum viaum) is a notifiable weed

under the Biosecurity Act. Midcoast Council, LLS, the DPI and Landcare are all very concerned with its spread. If you haven't heard of TSA and you have more than a town block or spend any time in the bush, look it up at ... NSW WeedWise Follow the biosecurity regulations if you bring new cattle on to your property. I've been told that cows will risk its many long prickles to wrap their tongues around its sweet, seedy, golf ball sized yellow fruit. They can then deposit the seeds up to a week later in neat, pre-fertilized cow pats. If you read my




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articles, you know the drift—juicy fruit—also spread by birds, foxes, etc. It can also float down creeks during flooding. If you think you've seen TSA look it up! If you're not sure, contact the local weeds biosecurity team on 7955 7777.

A new weed in the local area for the gardeners is called **Plume Poppy (Bocconia frutescens)**. This garden escapee showed up in the Rainbow Flat area after the bush fires and has spread rapidly. Bocconia is fast growing and has attractive large leaves. It's hard to kill, sets lots of seeds that are attractive to birds and it rapidly colonizes open and disturbed areas. It took the weed team a bit of detective work to find out what it was but alarm bells went off when

it was identified. It is a serious invasive weed in parts of the Hawaiian Islands.

There is another Plume Poppy on plant nursery lists so it is essential to check the botanical name. Its spread in the local area highlights the danger of introducing plants to a new climactic zone. If you think you've seen this Plume Poppy, contact the local weeds biosecurity team on 7955 7777.

Nabiac Landcare normally works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by a very yummy morning tea. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. Most of all enjoy the local bush!

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


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

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Come on you gardening ladies, plant something and see if it works!

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Antioxidants.

We've all heard of antioxidants, right? Have you wondered what they are? Why they are good for us and where to find them?



The scoop. Antioxidants & free radicals: Antioxidants are molecules in our bodies. which protect cells by inhibiting damage from free radicals. Free radicals are atoms. which can cause cell damage, leading to premature ageing and disease. We need a balance of antioxidants and free radicals. Our immune cells use free-radicals to combat pathogens. Damage, such as oxidative stress from excess free radicals, can be caused by toxins,

including pesticides in food, herbicides, fake fragrances in body products, cleaning products and scented candles. Cell damage means less healthy cells to carry nutrients around our body.

A balance of antioxidants helps to reduce inflammation in the body, decreasing the risk of a range of chronic illnesses including dementia, heart disease, arthritis cancer and asthma.



Good News!

Vitamins C, E, and carotenoids are 3 powerful antioxidants which are gained from certain healthy foods. Many of these foods are right under our nose! We just need to reach out and choose them. From our local cafes and grocery stores in Nabiac and our fabulous Nabiac Farmer's Market. Vitamin C is found in many fruits: Kiwi,

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orange, mandarin, berries, Kakadu plums, finger limes, mangoes, capsicum, tomatoes, raw parsley, kale, and microgreens. Many veggies are rich in vitamin C too, however since they are usually cooked, some of their vitamin C will be depleted. These include a cruciferous veg such as Brussels Sprouts, and potatoes.

Vitamin C is important for collagen production, healthy gums, iron absorption, and immune health. Most of our immune cells are stored along the gut lining, so looking after your gut with healthy foods is also super important!

Vit C is water soluble. It is not stored in the body, and we need some every day.

Vitamin E is important for many roles including heart health, brain, skin & eyes, and key for a strong immune system.

is found in nuts, seeds, and greens such as spinach and beetroot greens. Almonds & sunflower seeds are the richest source. Preferably choose non-GMO-organic, Aussie produce.

Goose meat, octopus, salmon, eggs, and avocados are also good sources. Vitamin E is fat soluble, so is stored in the body.



Carotenoids are a group of antioxidants founds mainly in orange, red and yellow vegetables, egg yolk. There are around 600 carotenoids. Health benefits include reducing risk of certain cancers and maintaining good eye health.

Sources include yams, carrots, capsicum, tomato, mangoes, beetroot, winter squash, pumpkin, dark leafy greens, and pumpkin seeds.

Antioxidant foods:

- * Dark leafy greens: broccoli, kale & spinach & fresh herbs
- * Orange, yellow & red: sweet potato, carrots, pumpkin, orange, strawberry, mango, squash, tomato & capsicum (*nightshades may affect people with inflammatory or allergy issues more later!)
- * Pink & purple: purple cabbage, berries, beetroot, goji berries
- * Fresh wild-caught fish: salmon, oysters, trout
- * Consume cold extra virgin olive oil, first cold pressed
- * Occasional, good quality dark chocolate
- * Spices & more: Clove, turmeric + black pepper, cinnamon, ginger, garlic

On a more pleasing note are the Australian Swimming Championships in Adelaide and several names have popped out. Zac Stubblety-Cook is another and he set a World Record in Adelaide this week. There are several other swimmers as well who are still young but coming on well.

Now, I don't know if this issue has registered with you or not but if I were to mention "LIV Golf", what would you say? Well, let me bring you up to speed. First off, when you fill your car with petrol, where do you think a good deal of your money goes? It goes to Saudi Arabia, that's where because they've been fortunate enough to find themselves sitting on million upon millions of litres of oil, from which our petrol is made. For starters they approached Jack Nicklaus twice with an offer of over \$US100 million to be one of the faces but he turned it down saying he'd been one of those who set up the PGA so he couldn't rat on them.

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They then turned to Greg Norman and he took on the position of CEO and is being paid a ship-load of money. When they heard about it, the PGA said it will ban "for life" any player who switched to the "LIV" but there are questions being raised if they can do that. Oh, LIV? It's the format the players will compete under, a 54-hole event (as opposed to 72) and if you express 54 in Roman numerals, you get LIV.

It is said there were 170 entries for the first event and 19 of those were in the World's top 100. There will be 48 players in the event and those who have signed up are Phil Mickelson, Lee Westwood, Sergio Garcia and Martin Kaymer and who knows, Greg might suit up as well, given it's his tournament and the Brits recently refused him permission to play in the British Open, again. It will be an 8-event tour this year, 10 next year and 14 in 2024. The first match is at the Centurion Golf Club, London in early June and the final (worth \$50 million) will be played at The Donald's Trump National Doran Miami course.

A lot of people are upset over this because: of the way the Saudi's treated (literally carved up) journalist Jamal Khashoggi; Greg Norman's involvement and his description of Jamal's death by his employer Mohammed bin Salman by saying, "Look, we all make mistakes"; the lure of the money; and generally because it upsets the established tour system now in place. Reason - the Supreme Court overturned a Federal law that restricted sports betting to just 4 states; and Tom Brady has just signed a 10 year, \$US375 million contract to be a lead analyst at Fox Sports when he does retire. 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The Wallamba Watershed's History – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, 1946 by Bob Mann

WALLAMBA JUNIOR FARMERS SHOW—MARCH, 1946: A very successful show was held at Nabiac on Saturday last by the combined Junior Farmer Clubs of the Wallamba. The day was fine, just light showers falling at the end of the day but this did not interfere with the show. The sum of £22 was taken at the gate and about £100 in all. The stalls brought in £48 and the luncheon booth £22. A donation of two face towels by Mr D. Hancock realised £7.10.00 and a cake by Mrs C. Riley £1.08.00. The exhibits were very fine especially the young stock.

THE WALLAMBA DISTRICT AGRICULTURAL & HORTICULTURAL ASSOCIATION: At a second meeting of the Association a considerable amount of correspondence was read by the Secretary. 1. From the N.S.W. Council of Agriculture Society re affiliations fees for the current of the War. It was decided to point out that this association had been in recess for five years and to ask that the account be amended accordingly. 2. From Mr Harry Abbot of Dyers Crossing conveying his sincere thanks for the committees letter of sympathy in his illness and good wishes for the success of the forthcoming show.

3. Mr Harry Johns was granted the sole rights to the boxing tend. 4. A number of ladies and gentlemen wrote accepting position as judges in different sections. Any vacancies which exist will, it is hopeful, be filled without delay.

It was decided to apply to the transport board for a special issue of petrol coupons for show purposes. It was decided to offer the publican's booth to Mr *Thomas*, licensee of the local hotel. The President and Secretary to interview Mr Thomas. A comprehensive and vigorous programme of advertising, both over the air and in the local press, has been drawn up so patrons will be fully informed of special features of the show, the first since the termination of the war.



Inward correspondence included the following. From Mr T. Cornell advising that Mr Arthur Tate of Gloucester had donated a set of stock draft horse shoes to the winner of the champion stock draft. From Mr



R.H Thomas re publicans booth. Owing to the strike supplies of beer were unprocurable at present. If the position changes in the interval it may be possible to carry on the publican's booth. From Nabiac Talkies asking permission to erect a small shed to house their reserve power plant and offering to supply the committee with current for the lighting of the hall if the present supply should be interrupted at any time. Permission to erect the shed was granted and the Secretary was directed to convey the thanks of the committee for the offer of the current. From the Liquid Fuel Board intimating that 100 gallons of petrol had been granted to the Association for use on show purposes. From Sir Earle Page accepting eh Associations invitation to open the show. Particulars of the function will be announced later through the press. From the Deputy Director of Rationing granting 50 lbs of sugar and six pounds of tea for use in the luncheon rooms. A request for butter was refused. From the Hon Treasurer Mr R. W. McEwan tendering his resignation from the Office. The Secretary was instructed to forward Mr McEwan a letter thanking him for the committee's appreciation for the work he has done for the Association and to congratulate him on his promotion in the bank service. Subsequently Mr P. Brown, accountant at the local E.S. & A Bank, was appointed to succeed Mr McEwan in the office of honorary treasurer. The sub committee of the show recommended adding a novice stock draft in the programme in response to a unanimous request from the competitors. The recommendation was adopted and in response to an appeal by Mr Horace Dear the prize money for the event was subscribed in the hall Details for information of competitions will be announced later. Incidentally the committee has secured an example yarding of steers for both days. The following were appointed to act as Ring Protest Sub-Committee. Messes R. Milliken, J. Nixon, G. Nixon, J. Milliken and P. McKeogh. Messrs J.W. Greaves and Sons, local butchers, will supply the fat bullock for the weight guessing competition which will be under the control of Mr Vince Greaves. Particulars of Mr J. Paterson's special prize of £3.03.00 will be announced later. The recent rains have caused much damage to the roads in the locality and it was decided to ask the Manning Shire Council to offer some relief before the show. Also to ask for the release of galvanised plain and barbed wire for repairing flood damage to fences. A working bee will be held on Thursday 11^{th} inst. Buses will run from the principal centres and particulars of times and roads will be announced through the press.

Announcements for the Grand Ball on the second night have been finalised and devotees can look forward to an event that promises to be the best ever in a long list of nights of good fellowship and good company.

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Winter Feeding Tips

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As the season changes and the temperature begins to dip, many horses tend to drop weight. This winter weight loss comes down to two primary factors. Firstly, horses use more energy (burn more calories) in winter keeping themselves warm; Secondly, pasture quality and grass growth drops, which often means the grazing horse will not meet its daily roughage requirements.

With these factors in mind, there are a few simple diet adjustments that can be made to help your horse maintain optimum body condition during winter.

Preparation is key

Preparing yourself and your horse for the winter season is essential. For horses who struggle to maintain weight during winter, it's best to prepare them for this period during autumn. Throughout autumn gradually increase their feed intake until you reach the ideal winterfeeding amount. Doing this in autumn will help put extra weight on your horse before the winter period. Strive to keep your horse in a good body condition prior to the winter months as the extra body fat provides an additional insulating effect and will serve as an energy

The Autumn period is also a good time for horse owners to prepare for winter feeding, often hay prices increase during winter due to supply and demand strains. If you're able to buy in bulk and store, this is now the time to do so, to save yourself money and be prepared for winter. Having a clear winter feeding plan prepped before winter will come in very hand too – so get yours together now!

Top tips for winter feeding

There is no one winter diet that is better than the rest, however there are some very simple feeding principles to follow to help your horse maintain weight during winter. These are our top tips!

Roughage, roughage & more roughage!

Roughage is the most important component of a horse's diet. Often owners want to increase hard feeds during winter, however increasing hay will benefit the horse more.

The fibre in hay and other forages (pasture/ chaff/super fibres) is digested in your horse's hindgut via the process of bacterial fermentation. A by-product of this fermentation process is heat! By feeding extra forage you are topping up the calories (energy) your horse is burning to stay warm in winter, whilst also giving your horse's gut bacteria more fibre to ferment, which means they will generate more heat to help to keep warm.

Super fibre sources

This may sound like repetition, but fibre is your friend when it comes to keeping your horse warm from the inside out. Highly digestible super fibres, from soybean hulls and sugar beet-pulp are great, healthy filler feeds that add extra condition to the horse, whilst keeping the gut happy. Super fibre feeds include Benchmark Feed's Perfect Mash and Super Fibre Mash, Speedibeet and Maxisoy. Try adding one of these to your horse's diet during winter to help increase their fibre intake whilst also helping keep them feeling fuller for longer.

Add starch (safely)

The carbohydrates (starch and sugars) in grain feeds increase energy density in the diet and therefore contribute to weight gain. Grains are a great feed source for horses when fed properly. When feeding grains, it's always best to use micronized or extruded grain feeds, as they have a higher digestibility, allowing more nutrients to be absorbed, whilst also being kinder on the digestive system, which will help reduce the risk of grain caused gastric ulcers. Our top winter picks for grain-based feeds are Hygain TruCare, Mitavite Cool Vitality and Pryde's EasiConditioner.

When adding grain to the diet always remember to keep your horse's meal balanced. Stick to the ration of 30:70 grain to roughage and do not feed more than 2kgs of grain in a single feed. It should be noted that some horses can become more reactive on grain-based feeds, if this is the case for your horse, there are grain free feed options that may be more suitable for your horse, such as Pryde's EasiSport, Benchmark CoolAZ, and Johnson's Alfalfa Pellets.

Add some fat!

Adding oil to your horse's diet is a great way to safely increase the energy density of the diet. Oil has approximately 2.5 times more calories than grain on an equal weight basis. When adding oil to a feed you will find less grain is required for weight gain. Oil is a slowrelease energy, which means this energy source will not heat your horse up like some grain feeds can. Oils also have the added benefit of improving coat condition and shine. There are many different oils you can feed horses, including canola, rice bran, linseed, and fish oil. Linseed oils, such as Oi Raw Linseed Oil and Cen Oil are popular choices because these oils are higher in Omega 3 than other oils and have the Omega 3 to 6 ration closest to that of fresh pasture.



Simple & consistent

Winter is often a difficult and expensive season for horse owners but using these principles of winter feeding will help your horse maintain condition in winter. It is import with feeding horses to not over complicate your feed and stick to one complete feed to keep it balanced and remember to feed small meals often.

If you're having difficulty getting weight on your horse there could be an underlying issue, such as dental, parasitic, gastric ulcers, disease or illness, stress, or too little feed. Keep your horse's worming, medical and dental up to date and in most cases, unless there is a reason to limit your horse's feed intake (e.g., a metabolic syndrome), feed your horse at least 1.5% of their body weight per day.

Have just completed a 6 day classic car run with Taree Historic Car Club. This yearly event usually gathers about 40 people and 20+ cars of various makes, models and condition. This year we visited the Upper Hunter, renowned for wineries, horse studs and yes, coal mines. Attended a very unbiased and informative lecture on the coal industry. This was eye watering. Whatever your views on this industry, evidently the NSW budget receives at least 30% of it's funding from here in one form or another so without this we would be in parlous state. EARLY CHILDHOOD SUPPORT CENTRE WILL 'NURTURE GENERATIONS OF LOCAL FAMILIES'



Federal funding of \$3.2 million has been announced for construction to be completed on a new early childhood support centre for the MidCoast.

Building work is underway on the First Steps Count Child and Community Centre in Myall Avenue, Taree with a Federal funding commitment now allowing the project to be finished.

"This announcement is the result of an outstanding community collaboration and I am very happy to be delivering this news to everyone involved," Dr Gillespie said. "This will be a far-reaching and transformative service, nurturing generations of local families."

First Steps Count campaigner Rosemary Sinclair AO: "I am so grateful to Dr David and the Federal Government for getting behind this project. The centre will be offering many essential programs, child health screenings, supported playgroups, parenting support programs and health and wellbeing guidance for those in need. I could not be more proud of this coming to fruition; it will help so many in our community."

Taree Universities Campus will now have a permanent and much larger home after Lyne MP Dr David Gillespie announced \$5.5-million in Federal funding to secure the former Council Chambers and Administration building in Pulteney Street.

"This is a very big win for our region and another important milestone in the development of Taree Universities Campus," Dr Gillespie said.

"I started this process in 2018 which came out of our Vision 2030 Plan survey. From there we pulled together a steering committee, then we launched Taree Universities Campus as a project

and appointed a community board of eminent locals to oversee the new entity.

"After that we began putting together the plan and application for operational Federal funding which we secured. In just over a year, there are now more than 180 registered students studying through the campus."

In addition to providing a place for local university students to study, Taree Universities Campus provides pastoral, academic and industry support and has established formal partnerships with several universities to deliver online and face-to-face teaching and learning.

FREE FLU SHOTS FOR MYALL LAKES COMMUNITY IN JUNE

Mr Bromhead said the therapy dogs and their volunteer handlers will be on duty in the court's public waiting areas, bringing comfort to court users who are often experiencing some of the worst days of their lives.

LIGHTWEIGHT PLASTIC BAGS BANNED FROM 1st JUNE

The ban on lightweight plastic bags will officially come into force in the Myall Lakes from 1st June, in line with the first stage of the NSW Government's single-use plastics ban.

Member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead said the ban will help to prevent almost 2.7 billion items of plastic litter from entering the environment in NSW over the next 20 years.

From November the NSW Government is banning:

Single-use plastic straws, stirrers, cutlery, plates, bowls and cotton buds, expanded polystyrene food ware and cups

Rinse-off personal care products containing plastic microbeads.

The NRA is running a retailer education campaign, conducting store visits, and providing online webinars and resources to help businesses make the transition away from problematic single-use plastics.








SNOW SAFETY WARNING FOR BARRINGTON TOPS – NO ACCESS FROM GLOUCESTER

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Welcome to Deb's Gardening,

This past month I have been brutal! Have you ever bought a plant home from the nursery, because you liked the look and description of the plant on the label and you thought that it would be perfect for the space that you had in mind? I planted this shrub, now for the life of me I can't remember its name but I think it was from the verbenaceae family. One of my defects- I have good intentions of learning the name of the plants, keeping the label and studying it but the plant gets planted and my good intentions go out the window, you think after planting so many plants in the few years that I have started my garden, I would of learnt. I am getting better, I have been keeping the labels but that's it. I remember that the description said that this plant is a shrub about 1.5m in height has white flowers with red berries that follow, sounds nice I thought. Well the plant took off, it flowered and I thought that's it, that's the flower, very insignificant, a bit disappointed but I let it do its thing. Well I had enough of that plant, it was sending out runners and starting to take over. It was supposed to be a small shrub. It's now cut down and on the compost heap. I found that some labels are misleading and don't tell you that the plant can be invasive, if you let them. That's not the first shrub that I have cut down because of a misleading label.

Autumn is a good time to start pruning, especially when most of the summer and autumn plants have finished flowering; time to remove any dead branches, and prune others to produce nice fresh growth. An important reminder to check yourself when you finish pruning, especially when you lob off a few branches off tall shrubs, as I have found a few ticks on me and even a leach.

I have all my winter vegetables in and growing - English spinach, peas, carrots, endive, lettuce, broad beans and the brassicas family (Kale, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and turnips). I have also planted onions amongst the brassicas. Onions are a good companion plant with brassicas, it helps deter white fly. Also white pansy's are a good companion plant for the vegie garden. The vegetable garden is mulched and the only thing I have to do now is give the plants a dose of liquid fertiliser every three weeks, just to help them along.

I made my liquid fertiliser with cow manure and weeds; let it steep in water, stir every now and again and just let it brew. When it comes time to use, you put a small amount in the bottom of your watering can and fill with water to resemble a week tea and pour on the plants. This

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helps the plant to build strong cell walls and root systems as the plants can access nutrients immediately.

As winter approaches my plan in the garden is to cut down the asparagus as it is dying back and fertilise it with a layer of old cow manure and straw. Spread horse manure on top of the soil of the hedge row. Horse manure can give new plants a jump start while providing essential nutrients for continual growth. It contains adequate amounts of organic matter and can be applied in various ways. I just layer in over the soil. The hedge row is 5 years old and I fertilise with horse manure once a year. Next to the hedge is a mulberry tree, it also gets fertilised with horse manure. Horse manure is slightly higher in nutritional value than cow or steer manure. The plants have definitely benefitted from it.

I have plenty of things to keep me busy, still loving retirement.

Forgiving

Have you ever been being hurt by someone? The answer to that is likely *yes* ... if you are human! Whether physical or emotional our natural reaction to this is anger and a desire to get even. This leads to resentment ... then bitterness ... hatred ... and even murder. You see where I'm leading.

We hear almost daily of these kinds of tragedies.

The main key to inner healing is to get free of resentment in our lives. We all know people who are bitter or hold a grudge about something that happened in the past ... perhaps even ourselves. However resentment is like a boomerang ... we throw it towards the person who hurt us and it returns back and hits us instead.

The physical and emotional results of resentment are wide – ranging and include heart disease, back pain, cancers ... as well as depression and exhaustion, to name just a few. The only answer to resentment and bitterness is forgiveness.

In the Lords prayer we say — forgive us our sins as we forgive others, but it's easy to pray that without thinking too much about it. The bible says if you forgive others, your heavenly Father will forgive you but if you do not, neither will your Father forgive you, *Matthew 6:14 - 15.* From the cross Jesus asked God to forgive his executioners.

There are many cases of people offering forgiveness after terrible tragedies. Remember the children hit by an intoxicated driver as they walked to a shop for ice creams ... and the parents forgave him.

Forgiveness is something you do for yourself, not the other person ... who might be happily going on with their life unaware of your feelings.

Speaking personally, forgiving someone is not easy, perhaps one of the hardest things in the world ... but also the most freeing. Even though I had read the bible verses I didn't really know what forgiveness meant till I had the opportunity to put it into practise. During




