

July has been a quite unforgettable month for our town and indeed all the coastal areas around us! Consistent heavy rain caused Nabiac's Town Creek to overflow, flooding nearby shops and testing the survival of recently completed restoration work on the Creek banks.

Michelle, from Vintage Magnolia, has been keenly watching the project and sent some feedback - "Seating and bins being very well utilised several times a day from my observations. The much improved creek area and surrounds gives the visitors to our village a more positive experience and impression and instils a greater sense of pride

in our residents and shopkeepers alike. Seating would benefit from some shade awning."

Other feedback included an appreciation of the quality of the tables and seats — they were expensive but good quality "you get what you pay for". Another commenter appreciated the design of the seating saying that the seats are easier for older folks to access than the other seats where legs have to be lifted over in order to sit at the table.

General opinion seems to be that the plants survived "better than expected".

It was great to see Council staff attending to slight damage to the Lomandra plants and the matting. Thanks also to Council staff for the paint job on the tables and seats in the Memorial Park.


The Workshop covers information about fire ecology and how to prepare a Property Bushfire Management Plan.

MINIMBAH MATTERS

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade has been in the same boat (no pun intended) as the rest of the community when it comes to the weather over the past few weeks.

Wednesday 6th July was an exceptionally "interesting" time. Late afternoon/early evening saw both bridges on Minimbah Road under water and impassable. Our Fire Station had water through it and "an Olympic-size swimming pool" out the front. Unfortunately, we were unable to get to the station and respond to the calls for help we received, and appreciate that other Brigades could help out. Thank you.

Did you know?

- For the 24-hour period ending 7am on 7th July, 2022, the Minimbah area generally, had 13 inches of rain. That's 325mm in modern speak. Some areas close to the rivers received more.
- When the first bridge on Minimbah Road is under water, the water on the road at the eastern side of the bridge is much deeper than it is on the bridge itself.
- The second little bridge on Minimbah Road is considerably lower than the road approaching it, and in times of flood it traditionally has large vegetation strewn across it and the guide posts on either side are not visible. That's a pretty good indication that the water is at least a metre deep and flowing swiftly.
- If it's flooded Forget it.

 Rather than risking getting caught in flood waters, a sleepover at a friend's house could be a good idea.

Be safe, not sorry.

A few days after our *swimming pool* had receded and became just mud, and we had cleaned out the Station, it was business as usual. Not firefighting as such, but training. On many Wednesday or Saturday mornings you may hear sirens coming from our Station. No need for alarm on your part. It's just us honing our skills and carrying-out some over-run training and truck maintenance. An over-run is when, usually due to a sudden change of strong wind direction, the truck and crew are in danger of flames engulfing them. It is very noisy, visibility is practically zero, and it is very scary.

A series of three blasts from the fire truck horn!? It may not mean much to you but it does to us – certainly when we are on the fireground. With all lights flashing, with three blasts from the fire truck horn, the truck driver can signal to the crew members who are fighting the fire, to drop everything and get back into the truck ... now!

We don't take this lightly – it has happened to us in the past.

On the other hand, if you get a wave and a quick toot from the truck as you are driving past our station, that's just us giving you a friendly g'day.



Locally, water has been a bigger problem than fire, but further afield, fire has taken its toll.

Since the start of June, there have been more than 400 house fires across NSW, with over half the properties not having a working smoke alarm. In Sydney just this week, a home with no smoke alarms was destroyed by fire and three lives lost. Figures released by the Authorities state that "46% of the homes damaged by fire this winter have not had working smoke alarms, and one in five homes had no smoke alarm at all."

Be safe, not sorry.

You can't smell smoke when you're asleep, but your smoke alarm can. Keep your family safe this winter; always keep items a metre from the heater and please make sure you have a working smoke alarm.

We are in the 21st century, but for varying reasons, not everyone has access to, or the funds to provide, heating to their home. Recently six people were rushed to hospital with suspected carbon monoxide poisoning after using a charcoal barbecue inside their granny flat. They were trying to stay warm.

Carbon monoxide gas can kill without warning.

Never use barbecues or outdoor heaters inside your home as they produce carbon monoxide,

a poisonous gas you can't see, taste or smell.

For advice on any suspected or confirmed carbon monoxide poisoning, call the

Poisons Information Centre on 13 11 26. In an emergency, dial triple zero (000).

Don't laugh – this is serious. In a month's time (1st September) the Mid Coast District is due to commence the Bushfire Danger Period, and there will be the requirement to get a free Fire Permit from the NSW Rural Fire Service before you light up any fires. COVID VACCINATIONS

COVID-19 vaccinations are still available at Nabiac Pharmacy. We use the **Moderna** booster. It needs to be four months since you last booster or three months since a COVID infection has ended.

We are providing these through the week and appointments are needed. It is safe and effective at reducing the worse of an infection.

COVID ANTIVIRAL TREATMENTS

COVID-19 is currently circulating highly in the community. There are now specialised anti-viral treatments available to help minimise the impact of a COVID-19 infection, and give people the best chance of recovering. The likelihood of contracting COVID-19 in the future is significant for most people.

The medication needs to be started as soon as possible and within **five** days of infection. The sooner, the better.

If you are in an at risk category it is important to contact your doctor **IMMEDIATELY** after testing positive to a Rapid Antigen Test. They will advise you further on what to do. If you cannot reach your doctor

At risk categories include all people over the age of 70 who test positive.

COVID-19 antiviral medications are also being given after a positive Rapid Antigen Test to; people over 50 with two risk factors, indigenous people over 30 with two risk factors, people over 18 who are immunocompromised.

Risk factors include;

- 1. Having a disability
- 2. Having neurological conditions
- 3. Respiratory conditions including COPD and asthma
- 4. Heart failure, coronary artery disease and cardiomyopathies
- 5. Obesity (BMI>30kg/m2)
- 6. Diabetes Type I or II
- 7. Kidney or liver impairment



Terrence George Wallis

"Terry"
29-7-1937 to 3-7-2022
84years

Terry was born in Nabiac, the second eldest of 5 siblings.

He is survived by his eldest brother, Owen and his youngest, William (Bill).

His only sister, Beulah, died in 1964, aged 23, and David died in 2018.

Terry lived all of his life in Nabiac, in Dibbs Street, going to school there and then working for his father in the family's Bakery.

On his father's death in 1973, he and his brother David, took over the Bakery business and continued until they sold it in the mid 1980's.

He then became a mail contractor in the Blackhead - Diamond Beach area until his retirement.

Terry remained single all of his life enjoying his many passions and interests - Cricket, Golf, Tennis, Surfing, Fishing, Darts, Cards, Gardening (vegetables), Horseracing and Crosswords.

In his early days he played cricket for Nabiac and was a competent batsman and spin bowler. He was a member of the Krambach Golf Club for 40 years and had great success there and served on the Committee in various positions.

He loved growing his vegies and what he couldn't eat he gave away.

He loved playing cards, euchre, with many thousands of hours spent doing so over the years with his brothers, cousin Rod and others.

He worked at the bakery every Saturday morning and played euchre with Rod and his Uncle Jeff there.

His other passion was having a bet on the horses and many a race meeting was attended by him, in his youth, with his cousin Rod. This interest continued right up until his death, as his brother Owen resided only 2 rooms away in the Nursing home, and he put Terry's bets on via his computer.

Unfortunately, due to ill health, he had to give up golf 10/15 years ago. In 2015 his health problems necessitated the sale of his home in Nabiac and he entered Estia Nursing Home in Taree. At the same time he suffered renal problems, requiring dialysis 3 times a week.

In the 6/7 years he lived in the nursing home, his brother David and David's wife, Georgina, attended to his needs. David's death hit him hard as they both lived and worked all of their lives in Nabiac.

As mentioned, although remaining single, he never wanted for family or company as David and "Georgie" raised 6 children at Nabiac and he was involved in their lives. Also at various times he had family residing at his house. His Uncle Mick, Aunty Jane and brother Owen.

In the end his body had had enough and he succumbed on Sunday 3rd July, 2022, just before his birthday.

Rest in Peace Terry

Terry's brother, "Bill" wrote this eulogy and knowing Terry myself for 45 years, (he was Paul's cousin) I will always remember him as a beautiful, gentle gentleman and picture him sitting on the front verandah of his house doing crosswords and listening to the races on his transistor radio Ed.



<u>LIFEBLOOD WELCOMES FIRST UK 'MAD COW' BLOOD DONORS</u>

People who lived in the United Kingdom during the 'mad cow disease'* outbreak can donate blood in Australia from today, potentially contributing up to 58,000 additional donations each year.

Australian Red Cross Lifeblood Executive Director of Donor Services, Cath Stone, said Lifeblood hoped to welcome around 18,000 additional donors as the change comes into effect.

"It's taken some time; however, we're so pleased our comprehensive review of the evidence and our risk modelling has found this rule is no longer required. It means that from today, we're thrilled to welcome these newly eligible donors to our centres around the nation," Ms Stone said.

"Our teams are in the process of contacting donors who have previously been unable to donate due to this rule. We're fortunate to have one of the safest blood supplies in the world, and we're continuing our focus to make it easier for all Australians to donate, while ensuring our blood supply remains safe for patients".

Since December 2000, those who had spent a total of six months or more in the UK between 1980 and 1996 were prevented from donating blood.


This was a precautionary measure in response to the UK outbreak of mad cow disease* and concerns about the risk of acquiring human variant Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease (vCJD), a fatal disease with an incubation period of many years and no screening test to identify carriers.

The recommendation by Lifeblood to remove the rule was approved by the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) <u>following an indepth risk assessment.</u>

Modelling performed by Lifeblood and UNSW Sydney's Kirby Institute, funded under the NHMRC's** Partnerships Projects scheme, demonstrated the ability to remove this rule while continuing to ensure that Australia's blood supply will remain one of the safest in the world.

The Kirby Institute's Scientia Professor John Kaldor said, "This excellent outcome demonstrates the value of careful risk analyses, to ensure that restrictions on blood donor eligibility achieve the right balance between safety and sufficiency in the blood supply."



The Wallamba Watershed's History — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times, 1918 & Northern Champion, by Bob Mann

Bab has supplied an article from his archives as there is nothing in the newspaper archives relevant from 1946

NABIAC: At a meeting of the A & H Society held on Saturday 10th August, 1918, Mr *W.J. McLay* received life membership for his valuable service given to the society from the time of his inaugural to his unavoidable departure from the locality. *Note*: Mr McLay was the treasurer of the Society and a bank officer who had received a transfer to another locality

OCTOBER, 1918: MR NOBLE RESIGNS: Mr Harry Noble, the manager of the Dyes Crossing factory has resigned to take up management of the butter factory at Tuncurry

NABIAC, NOVEMBER, 1918: A heavy thunderstorm passed over Nabiac district on Tuesday night. The thunder and lightning was very heavy and a fierce gale accompanied the disturbance. Trees and limbs were scattered about the roads and motor men had to pick their way through fallen limbs.

KRAMBACH, DECEMBER, 1918: KRAMBACH TURF CLUB. The general meeting of the Krambach Turf Club was held in the Krambach Hall on Wednesday 4th inst. About 20 members were present and a good meeting was held with the President, Mr *A. Saxby*, in the Chair. It was decided by resolution to make next year a short one for members and to finish with the regular racing year on July 31st, 1919, the membership to stand on the old mark 10s10d for gentlemen and half price for ladies. Twenty seven members were nominated to fill the eight positions on the committee for 1919. The club finances were considered very satisfactory as the ledge showed over £70 to credit. Mr *Tom Gallagher* was again elected Secretary for the coming year and was heartily thanked by the club for the very successful service he had rendered whilst in office.

NABIAC SHOW MEETING: At a show meeting held on January 11th, 1919 a cheque for five guineas was received from Mr *T. Miles* and

Northern Champion, January, 1919: Mr *N. Weber*, who was once a teacher at Koribar, is on a visit to his wife's relations at Darawank. He is now the teacher at Delroy near Mudgee.

A Nabiac Mill - Northern Champion March, 1919: Nabiac and district justly pride themselves on having such a fine sawmill and an enterprising owner at the head of navigation on the Wallamba River. At the new Bullock Wharf stands this mill in a prominent position. Yeas ago it was owned by Mr Fred Phillips, but was accidentally burnt down, then Messrs Eb and Arthur Everingham took up the proposition with determination to succeed. After two and a half years of uphill work Mr Eb Everingham became the sole proprietor and owner. Later he took his son Lyle into the firm so it now stands E. L. Everingham & Son who have worked together successfully for 11 years. The mill employs at least 15 hands with Mr Jas Dunn as foreman. In connection with the mill is the historic log punt "Highland Maid" which was built by Mr L. Steinmetz of Taree at Mitchells Island. Since then the boat has been remodelled and every new appliance fitted in order to facilitate her varied work. She is one of the finest boats afloat for her work and is under the command of Captain Woodward and his brother. All the machinery of the mill is the latest. For instance one sees the newly installed friction gear and roller which are all worked by steam and no hand work at all. All the laborious work has been done away with while modern appliances bring their increased production and efficiency to labour. All this has doubled the output. The mill executes local as well as city orders. By common sense economy and skilled management Mr Everingham and son have built up a sawmill which is a model of its kind. Visitors frequently visit the mill and express surprise at the business like methods and declare the mill master piece of skill and industry.

system is designed

- Feed by weight not volume and always feed the recommended amount for you horse's weight/ workload
- Don't feed more than 2kg of grain at once as this can cause stomach issue, such as ulcers
- A complete feed does not always meet the required intake of vitamins and minerals if there's a deficiency in the horse or the pasture is depleting them of something (for example horses on high oxalate grasses may need extra calcium added to their diet), therefore it is important to keep it all balanced. Programs such as FeedXL can help you calculate and balance your horse's diet
- Oil is a great way to add extra calories without adding extra hard feed
- Be careful to not overfeed your horse, this can cause issues and will for the most part be a waste of your money as it will pass straight through the horse



Welcome to Deb's Gardening,

I woke up the other morning and looked out the lounge room window to a scene from Alfred Hitchcock's 'Birds'.


Satin Bower birds everywhere; on the lawn, in the vegetable garden. My immediate thoughts were "Oh my god, my veggies". Sure enough they had stripped all the leaves from the cabbages, broccoli, lettuce and kale. They hadn't touched the peas or carrots yet. So off I went and started to net the vegetable beds, hoping that I will still get some food from the destruction. I take that back that they have gotten into the peas.

I went for a quick trip up to Coffs Harbour and I noted that all the blueberry farmers had their whole farms netted for birds. Does it come down to a point that to grow your own vegetables, one has to net the whole vegetable garden to get a productive crop. In saying that, Blueberry farmers are Monoculture farmers, so netting would be an important factor.

Satin Bower birds feed mostly on fruits throughout the year and in the summer breeding season they eat a large number of insects. During the winter they eat mainly leaves. They also like nectar of native flowers. I have learnt that the Satin Bower birds travel in a flock of a 100 birds, hence the Alfred Hitchcock scene. It seems that I will have a Satin Bower bird explosion in the winter period when they like to feast on leaves, and being an organic garden with no pesticides or chemicals, it Satin Bower bird heaven.

When I look around the garden, what else is there that I have for them to eat other than vegetables? Not a lot. Yes I have a fruit and nut orchard but mainly citrus fruiting now and they have been eating the fallen fruit. The rest of the orchard is either dormant, lost its leaves or finished fruiting. I have planted a few grevilleas and bottle brushes and flowering gum trees, which are just starting to flower, plus ornamental flowering shrubs and annual flowers but only a few of each. It looks like I will be paying a visit to a local nursery and start getting more native species in, which has always been the plan because I am a big believer in biodiversity which, of course, is the opposite to monoculture. Biodiversity is finding the proper mix of plants and animals that complement, protect and improve the environment around them.

I always encourage birds to the garden as there are so many reasons for having birds in the garden; they help with flower pollination, birds are a natural pest control, and they can assist with the garden's weed control. Birds enhance the biodiversity of the garden. I just wasn't


prepared for a bird explosion.

Regional flights, including the Taree to Sydney route, have been subsidised by the Federal Government Regional Airline Network Support program, which provided financial support to airlines maintaining connections with regional locations.

The program was designed to support the aviation industry in the recovery from the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. This subsidy ceased on 30 June.

"The removal of the subsidy, along with rising fuel prices and declining passenger numbers, has resulted in a decision by FlyPelican to suspend flights out of Taree Airport," Council's Director of Liveable Communities, Paul De Szell explained.

"We are very supportive of FlyPelican, who have provided a reliable service to our community since January 2018, and will continue to work with them into the future in the hope of the service resuming should demand require it."

A small number of passengers who had pre-booked flights beyond Sunday have been personally contacted by FlyPelican and arrangements have been made for their travel.



SMALL BUSINESS FLOOD GRANT NOW OPEN

Small businesses and not-for-

profit (NFP) organisations affected by the June-July severe flooding and storms can now apply for up to \$50,000 in support through Service NSW.

Member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead said the grant would provide a much-needed lifeline to small businesses who have been hard hit by the floods across the 37 natural disaster-declared local government areas.

"These floods have had a devastating impact on our community and we are doing everything we can to ensure businesses and not-for-profits get back on their feet as quickly as possible," Mr Bromhead said.

"Small businesses are the backbone of our local community and this package is designed to provide immediate support to help business owners recover and keep their business going.

"Customer care specialists are available to assist if customers are having difficulty providing the necessary documentation or are not sure if they are eligible, and successful applicants should expect to see funds in their accounts within five business days of approval."

Mr Bromhead said the grant is jointly funded by the Australian and NSW governments and can go towards the clean-up, repairs, re-stocking and reopening.

"Payments of up to \$50,000 can go towards the cost of safety inspections, building repairs, cleaning equipment, materials needed to resume trade, disposing of debris and spoiled stock, or leasing temporary space," Mr Bromhead said.

"Some small businesses have been impacted by flooding four times in 18 months, which is why we're making sure the application process is as straightforward as possible so that support can flow quickly."

Fraudulent applications will not be tolerated. As evidenced during the flood financial support made available by the NSW Government earlier this year, fraud wastes valuable assessment time and delays the time it takes to pay applicants who genuinely need assistance.

NEW \$3 MILLION FORSTER-TUNCURRY GOLF FACILITY THE BEST BY PAR

Golfers are set to tee off at the newly-upgraded Forster-Tuncurry golf club, positioning the course as a major regional tourist destination.

Acting Premier Paul Toole said the \$3 million upgrades raise the course to a Group One standard to cater for current and future membership growth, club events and tournaments, helping to bolster local and regional golf tourism.

Member for Myall Lakes Stephen Bromhead said the project also includes a Golf Museum to help raise awareness of the game's history.

"This golf museum is the only one outside a metropolitan area displaying memorabilia provided by the Australian Golf Heritage Society," Mr Bromhead said.

CRIMINALISING COERCIVE CONTROL ONE STEP CLOSER

Coercive control is one step closer to being criminalised in the Myall Lakes, with the NSW Government taking the significant step of releasing a draft bill for public comment ahead of introduction to Parliament.

Coercive control is a form of domestic abuse that involves patterns of behaviour which have the cumulative effect of denying victim-survivors their autonomy and independence. This abuse can involve physical, sexual, psychological or financial abuse.

Member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead said the NSW Government is consulting on a public exposure draft bill to outlaw coercive control in intimate partner relationships, as part of its ongoing response to the Parliamentary Joint Select Committee on Coercive Control.

"It's important that people in the Myall Lakes have their say on these landmark reforms," Mr Bromhead said.

"Coercive control is complex, is insidious and causes untold harm for its victims."

The new law will create an offence to carry out repeated abusive behaviours to a current or former intimate partner, and will carry a sentence of up to seven years in jail.

Minister for Women's Safety and Minister for the Prevention of Domestic and Sexual Violence Natalie Ward, who chaired the Joint Select Committee on Coercive Control, said the Exposure Draft Bill also introduces a definition of 'domestic abuse' to the *Crimes (Domestic and Personal Violence) Act 2007*

NEW FESTIVAL COMING TO WALLIS LAKE

Residents in the Myall Lakes will get a chance to hook some of the State's world-class seafood after a series of festivals were launched under the NSW Government's Eat More Seafood Grants Program.

Member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead is encouraging all locals and visitors to get involved in March 2023 when the celebration comes to Wallis Lake.

"Hosting the event on Friday 24th & Saturday 25th March, 2023 will give our community a really exciting day to look forward to, while showcasing our gorgeous region" Mr Bromhead said.

RAPID ANTIGEN TESTS AVAILABLE TO VULNERA-BLE PEOPLE IN THE MYALL LAKES

The NSW Government will provide free Rapid Antigen Tests to vulnerable communities and expand its existing program to include those accessing tests through the Federal Government's Concessional Access Program, which is due to finish at the end of the month.

The expanded program would allow eligible Commonwealth Concession Card holders in NSW to access 10 Rapid Antigen Tests over three months up until 31 October 2022.

Member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead said the NSW Government is committed to making sure no one is left behind and ensuring vulnerable communities have the support they need through winter.

"These tests will be available at designated neighbourhood and community centres across the electorate including Forster Neigbourhood Centre, Tobwabba Aboriginal Medical Service, Manning Support Services in Taree, Community Resources Ltd in Tuncurry and Manning Valley Neighbourhood Services in Wingham," Mr Bromhead said.

'Thanks,' says the little girl.





Good Medicine

Stress

What do you think of stress? It's something that we all seem to experience at times ... and maybe think of in a negative way. But do you know that we actually need stress in our lives to prevent us being a vegetable! We are told it's not the stress itself but how we handle it that's important.

Have you heard of stress dots ... I hadn't. They are little pressure sensitive dots you place on your hand which change colour when adrenaline changes in your body, and show you if you're under stress.

Wouldn't it be great if we had an internal warning light or small beep 'which cautioned us when we were out of tune with God' or our focus was somewhere else? We do ... it's called tension! Becoming tense is a sure sign that we've taken our eyes off God and are looking at our circumstances instead.

We are 'staring at the problem rather than the solution. And when we do that we are going to get tense'. Stress can be God's way of saying 'get your focus in line: look at Me'. The Bible says 'You will keep in perfect peace all who trust in You, *Isaiah 26:3*.

When we have a problem we think we should DO something. Once when facing an upsetting situation I read the words in *Psalm 46:10* ... 'be still and know that I am God', and I couldn't see how that would help, but it turned out that it was the best thing TO do.

The choice we have is focus on our troubles or focus on the One who holds the solution.

You may have heard of the book called 'The Hiding Place' by Corrie Ten Boom. It tells the story of Corrie's family in Holland and their involvement with the Dutch underground during World War 2. Corrie and Bessie, two unmarried sisters in their fifties, hide Jews from the Nazis in a secret room built in their home. They are eventually caught and sent to women's concentration camps doing hard labour ... conditions are hellish and they see many atrocities. Ultimately Bessie doesn't survive the experience. Two things I remember from the story were *they thanked God for the fleas in their dormitory which



discouraged the guards from coming in ... so they were able to pray and read their hidden Bible to others and, *they had a tiny bottle of vitamin drops which they shared with other women and it didn't run out till they were freed.

Writing about this time Corrie says – 'The blacker the night around us grew, the brighter and truer and more beautiful burned the Word of God. If you look at the world, you'll be distressed. If you look within you'll be depressed. But if you look at God you'll be at rest.'

It's what you concentrate on that decides your amount of peace ... so when troubles come, focus on God's presence; He has promised He will never leave you.

ZUCCHINI & CORN FRITTATA

NGREDIENTS

8 Eggs 1/3 cup Milk

400g can Corn kernels, drained

Green spring onions, thinly sliced

1 cup Grated Tasty cheese
1 lge Zucchini, thinly sliced
50g Soft feta cheese, crumbled

METHOD

1. Lightly oil a round ovenproof dish (8 cup capacity)

- Whisk the eggs and milk in a large bowl until combined. Add corn, onions and half the Tasty cheese. Season with salt and pepper. Pour into prepared dish.
- Arrange zucchini in a single layer over the top. Sprinkle with the feta and remaining Tasty cheese.
- Cook in a moderate oven (180c) for about 30 minutes or until just set and top is golden brown. Allow to stand for 5 minutes.
