# **Nabiac Landcare**

The flowers are blooming, every thing in the bush and garden is lush with spring warmth and moisture and the bees are buzzing. We've heard the first Koel and Channel-billed Cuckoo of the season, summer is on it's way. Let's for a moment forget about the mud, weeds and mozzies and enjoy!

The Nabiac Landcare team is continuing to do follow-up weeding at Lily Pilly Bend. If it looks like some trees are dying in the LPB area, they are! We're having a blitz on camphor laurels.

The weed I'd like to introduce this month is the Honey Locust (Gleditsia triacanthos). Honey Locust is a deciduous tree introduced to Australia from North America as a source of fodder and a garden plant. The flowers are sweet and the seed pods are attractive to animals that consume them and spread



the seeds. Seeds can be swept downstream and set up new infestations. It prefers moist, fertile creek and river flats but it's tough and will grow just about anywhere. Locally, I've seen it in the Dyers Crossing area. Once you come in contact with the massive branched thorns that grow from its trunk, you will never forget it! Those thorns are also a hazard for wildlife, livestock and tractor tyres. Honey Locust can be tricky to kill so consult <a href="NSW WeedWise">NSW WeedWise</a> or contact your local weeds officer for advice.

Crofton Weed (Ageratina adenophora) is beginning to flower. The best time for chemical control is late summer and autumn so if you've missed that control window, slashing or mowing is an option to slow it's growth and prevent the plants setting

thousands of seeds that will blow away in the wind. If you're doing a bit of hand removal cut off the flowers and don't rest the remains on bare dirt—I think crofton weed calls that transplanting!


All financial members are welcome to attend. Please note that the members payment of fees are due (\$2 per member) by  $30^{\text{th}}$  September 2022.

# **Tick Paralysis: A Guide for Pet Owners**


Throughout August and September Wingham & Valley Vets have been seeing increasing numbers of tick paralysis cases in cats, dogs and calves. These cases are coming in from all over the Manning Valley and are occurring exclusively in animals that are not on a regular effective tick prevention product. This also included one case in a severely affected cat that was housed only indoors, 100% of the time! The paralysis tick must have been carried inside on the owners' clothing, which was extremely unlucky, but happily, despite having very severe symptoms on presentation, the cat responded to intensive care, 48 hours of supplemental oxygen and treatment with tick antiserum.

Often, the owners of the tick patients are unaware that tick paralysis can occur during the cooler Winter months and early Spring, and so are shocked and upset that their pet has become unwell. Tick paralysis can and does occur all year round in this area and so it is very important to have your pet on an effective preventative product throughout the year because unfortunately, emergency treatment is not always successful, especially when animals present late in the disease course, once their breathing is affected by the tick toxin.

Symptoms of tick paralysis include incoordination or weakness of the hindlegs resulting in a wobbly gait or inability to rise, regurgitation (which is often reported to us as vomiting), changes in meow or bark and difficulty breathing. The tick toxin causes paralysis of the muscles – often, but not always, the legs are affected first and then the paralysis ascends until it paralyses the lungs, eventually causing death. When a pet displays symptoms of tick paralysis, prompt removal of the tick and treatment with the tick antiserum (which works by neutralising any free toxin in the blood steam) is essential to halt the progression of the disease. After treatment and because of the way the toxin works, most animals' symptoms will get slightly worse before the tick antiserum starts to improve them and so it is very important to treat animals early in the disease course, when symptoms are first noticed, ideally before their breathing becomes affected.

Some severely affected cases that come in with difficulty breathing and poor blood oxygenation need to be put on supplemental oxygen in intensive care and so it is always preferable to administer the serum before symptoms progress this far, to maximise the chances of survival.

If your pet exhibits any of the above symptoms DO NOT WAIT. They



should be examined by a Vet urgently so they can have the tick antiserum as early in the disease course as possible.

Paralysis ticks can be identified by looking at the legs. A paralysis tick (*Ixodes Holocyclus*) will have two pale legs and two brown legs on either side of its' head – other ticks



will have all brown legs. It is particularly important to tick search pets every day, focusing on the head, neck, ears and fore-quarters as the majority of paralysis ticks can be found there. If you find a paralysis tick, pull it straight off and put it in a jar for your Veterinarian to identify.

The two main preventative products Wingham & Valley Vets recommend and use on their own pets are Nexgard and Bravecto, since they are very well tolerated by pets and are highly effective at preventing tick paralysis.

If you are concerned your pet may have symptoms of tick paralysis, Wingham & Valley Vets offer a 24-hour emergency service to ensure prompt Veterinary treatment is always available.

# **MINIMBAH MATTERS**

Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade would like to publicly congratulate our newly qualified bushfire fighter who just happens to be a lady - not just a female; but a lady. This now means that with four active female fire fighters in our Brigade, we have the capacity to send out an "all-girl" crew because amongst them, our ladies have Crew Leader, Truck Driver and Bushfire Fighter qualifications. Now that's not bad.

If you happen to see the "all-girl" Minimbah crew out and about, please relax in the knowledge that they are all qualified and know what they are doing. There's no such thing as a "girlie fire".

Now, just in case you are thinking of letting your pile burn escape so you can get a visit by our special crew .... don't. Don't even think about it. Don't let it happen. There are costly rules and laws designed to discourage this.

It is your fire, and therefore your responsibility. It must not escape your property.

#### DO YOU HAVE A BURNING DESIRE?

Given that it is now the Bush Fire Danger Period, we have upped **our** level of precaution when it comes to fires being lit in the open. We need you to up **yours.** 

First of all, you must prepare the area around your proposed burn, and the pile itself, to a controllable standard and you must get a **free Fire Permit.** 

Regardless of the time of year, you are **required by law to give at least 24 hours' notice** of your intention to burn, to your neighbours (be they across the fence, across the road or across the river) and to your local NSW Rural Fire Service office. This can be done online at **www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify** or if you don't have the means to go down that track, you can call **Mid Coast Fire Control Centre on 1300 643 262.** It is a very simple thing to do but is extremely important to us. It saves time, resources and possibly your property or life. It is

not just a public relations exercise.

Fire Permits will be suspended on days when the Fire Danger Rating is High or above, or when a Total Fire Ban or No Burn Day has been declared.

These ratings do not indicate that there is a fire. They indicate the level of risk if a fire were to occur.



When preparing the piles you wish to burn, bigger is not necessarily better. Far from it. Long and low is the way to go, so don't go reaching for the stars.

It is not wise to pile up trees or branches that are large as they take a long time to burn. This may keep you up at night because a responsible adult is required to be in attendance while the fire is burning. Green vegetation such as grass and weeds, do not belong on a fire, but woody weeds such as Lantana are more than welcome. In fact, that is about the only place they are welcome.

You will need to show that you have the means (preparation, personnel and equipment) of controlling and the capacity to contain your fire.

Once you are satisfied your fire is out and there is no risk of it reigniting, you may leave it and go to bed, but a check first thing in the morning, or even during the night, would really put your mind, and our minds, at rest. Our advice is .... follow the advice of the Permit Issuing Officer (PIO). They can, and will, advise you on the rules, regulations and recommendations relevant to your proposed hurn.





**The Wallamba Watershed's History** – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" - 1900 - 1902

THE UPPER WALLAMBA - APRIL, 1900: There is not much news of importance in our midst at present. The weather has been very dry until yesterday when 1½ inches of rain fell. It is thought that we shall have a dry and severe winter, which already seems to be upon us. The chief topic here, like all other places, are the plague and the war and the latest news is always anxiously looked for, especially the "extras" furnished from your office. Mr J.J. Gallaher, auctioneer, disposed of Mr J. Wards household effects last Saturday at satisfactory prices, everything being sold but five horses and those, I think, were disposed of privately. Easter Monday passed by unnoticed except for the cricket match. Morpeth v the Wallamba at Nabiac, of which you have had an account. The local military corps, of which such a lot was said, seems to have died the death that most new moves do in this district. The same things seem to have happened on the Manning for we hear nothing fresh about the movement there. Mrs George Monk of Brown's Creek met with a painful accident last Tuesday. While standing near the fire she was overcome by a fainting fit, falling into the fire. The scrams of her children were heard by her husband who happened to be near at hand and he immediately rushed to the house and prevented what would have been in all probability have proved a distressing fatality. As it was Mrs Monk was severely burnt about the face and hands, but I am pleased to say that she is progressing favourably. Mrs Helm of Brown's Creek is able to move about again after a severe illness. She is, I think, the oldest lady on this river being 88 years of age.

NABIAC – OCTOBER, 1902: The annual meeting of the Wallamba River Progress Association Committee was held on Thursday night last in the School of Arts, Nabiac. Mr E. Gorton, J.P. was elected President (unopposed) for the ensuing year. Messrs Hugh McKinnon, J.P., John Breckenridge, J.P. and Chas Wooster, Vice-Presidents. Mr Thos Startin was elected Hon. Secretary and Mr John Beisler, Treasurer. On the motion of Mr Hugh McKinnon, it was resolved to

ask for the establishment of a tri weekly mail service from Booral via Bulahdelah, Coolongolook and Nabiac, to Taree. Mr John Breckenridge brought up the matter of an application for a Government building for a Court House and Police Station, when it was resolved that the present Police Station and Court House are adequate for the requirements of Nabiac for some time to come. Mr Hugh McKinnon proposed that the Minister for Works be asked to grant a sum of money for the erection of a bridge over the Wallamba River near the crossing. Carried. Mr James Harly was washed over the crossing on Monday last, and he and his horse narrowly escaped being drowned. The crossing was flooded at the time. Some time ago Mr Arthur Beisler was washed over with his horse and cart, so that it is time that some further move was made towards getting a bridge. Over 8 inches of rain have fallen at Nabiac during the last fortnight and grass is abundant. The creeks and waterholes have all had a good washing out and are now full of water. The opening of Mr F. Phlillips new store created quite a stir on Saturday last. This building is an ornament to Bullock Wharf and it is hoped that Mr Phlillips will be well repaid for his enterprise. His beautiful shop front of glass, artistically decorated, is quite a new departure here. The S S Commonwealth now comes to Bullock Wharf every week.

# $\frac{A \text{GRICULTURAL AND HORTICULTURAL ASSOCIATION AT NABIAC,}}{\text{June, } 1902}$

A large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the Nabiac School of Arts on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> June for the purpose of forming an Agricultural and Horticultural Association on the Wallamba. Mr H. McKinnon, J.P., occupied the chair. Judging by the attendance from all parts of the district and the enthusiastic manner in which the movement has been taken up, it may be taken for granted that the establishment of an A & H Association on the Wallamba has now become an assured fact. On the motion of Mr James Milliken, seconded by Mr J. Logan, the following resolution was unanimously agreed to. "That this meeting is of opinion that the time has now arrived when an Agricultural Association should be formed in this district." A considerable amount of discussion took place as to the amount that should be charged for membership. A fee of 10 shillings was eventually agreed upon. Messrs H. McKinnon, Jas Gleeson and Chas Wooster were appointed to choose a site for the showground and to make application to have the land dedicated for that purpose. A large committee was appointed to canvass the district for members and it was decided to meet again at an early date to report progress. About 30 members were enrolled at the meeting.



# Our Grey Ghosts have been on the move again

ollowing an earlier trip out west last month we go again. The trip over Thunderbolts Way was slow in the rain and mist, stop at Nowendoc for morning tea to find the small shop that has been there forever has closed. Onto Tamworth and spend some quality time with the Fallowfield's. Some oldies may remember Frank and Ans when they lived in Bunyah.

Heading south and the country looks great but as is the case on the coast not possible to do any farm work. Late planting of canola in places as there is a green tinge in the yellow crop. South again and have some detours due to flooding around Spring Ridge and spent two nights in Gilgandra. More canola in various stages of growth. On again with more flooded roads and boxed in a bit at Trangie where we camp in a very wet and rustic caravan park. Namoi Cotton has 12 gins in NSW, the Trangie facility at the moment has perhaps 1,000 bales stacked by the roadside.

We meet up with Sue and Garry Turney from Nabiac who have entered their vehicle in a National Chevrolet meet in Forbes. Some fine weather at last but aware of the wet at home with the swap meet on the same w/end.

Stop at Parkes to pick up some stuff and head onto Forbes. Great day here and some 140 very expensive as well as unique Chevrolets. Good atmosphere and fierce attachment to the brand, mention Ford at

By ourselves again and attempt to travel by the shortest route to Leeton. Nup, roads awash or considered too dangerous so the long way round again. One could wear out a steering box on the Newell Highway we are on. It is a continual weaving and stressful due to the dangerous surfaces. Would have thought that the RMS would have had a bit of a go at helping western road users keeping this vital roadway between Melbourne and Brisbane in better shape. No evidence of any repairs being done.

Stop overnight at Rankins Springs, 300 souls here and one of the nicest shower/toilet blocks we have seen, a small dot on the Mid Western Highway but not worth the \$25 as the power was out.

An hour plus to Leeton, Coastal wattle grows perhaps to 2m. On the roadway between RS and Leeton, wattle is sometimes 6 m tall and in full bloom. With self planted canola by the roadside also in bloom and the contrasting green Australian pine (casuarina equiseifolia) one is driving through an avenue of green and gold for, at times, many kms

In the 700 kms since Tamworth we are staggered at the amount of canola planted. Much at different times. Early plantings are now fence high and eye watering yellow, some times to the horizon. This is of course what we see from the roadway, one cannot imagine how much has been planted state wide.

Wheat is not as plentiful this year here and is in stark contrast in being half the height of canola but its vivid dark green. Problems may arise come harvest time for both if it's not possible to harvest due to the wet conditions. We passed many kms of crops in water.

Leeton, and we are in the Murrumbidgee Irrigation Area (MIA) Leeton was established as a result of the commissioning of the MIA in 1912 and the completion of the Burrinjuck Dam. It's extensive canals and drains providing some 190.000 hectares with irrigation for this important food bowl for our country.

12,000 folks here, very progressive; SunRice, Berri fruit juices, abattoirs at Yanco (with it's Agricultural College) walnuts and Southern Cotton are some of the companies that make the place hum.

Leave earlier than usual here but call in to chat with cousin John Weller at Wagga Wagga. John and Trish used to farm at Dyers

Onto Cowra where most would know was the infamous Japanese prison breakout on August 5 1944. Beautiful gardens and a must see if in the area

Leave Cowra and back on the coastal side of the range where the roads are only marginally better. Love the west but not the roads. These are catastrophic, bordering on the criminal. Potholes are never ending. 50 cm round and 10 cm deep are the norm. Struck several one couldn't see due to being in the shadow of the roadside trees. Both the van and truck will need a good look at when home.

Long day and 2,000kms since we started two weeks ago. The last night we are in Denman, the Hunter region is also waterlogged but looks great. Home by the time you read this.

I spoke on this subject several months ago and even had a discussion just an hour or so ago, with a friend who played rugby league as a youngster. We seemed to agree both the AFL and ARL games have speeded up as players have become fitter. Being fitter of course, is no barrier to taking a knock and it can be reasoned (with a deal of

justification) that with fitness and speed any clash - and let's be honest here and say it - collision, is going to be heavier and the risk of a concussion is very real.

What ever the leagues do you can bet it will alter the game and you can also bet there'll be many for it and just as many against it. Think of this. 



# Welcome to Deb's Gardening,

The vegetable garden is powering, providing me with plenty of vegetables for smoothies, salads and cooking.



Now that the weather is warming up, the broad beans are setting pods and ready to pick, I love picking them when they are young and popping them into the salad too. My mum cooked frozen store bought broad beans growing up, I thought they were disgusting and I never cooked them or served them to my kids growing up. It wasn't until I started growing my own, that I started loving them as there is no comparison to fresh home grown broad beans, they are easy to grow and a prolific crop. I had a few aphids when the plant was young but it didn't take long for the lady beetles to find them and do their job. Broad beans are best up against a fence and supported as they grow through the August winds, so a good support is needed.

I have sown the corn, cucumbers, pumpkins, watermelon and sunflowers in the egg cartons and they are ready to be planted into the ground. The corn is following the broccoli which was in one of my raised garden beds. The raised garden bed had no soil in it only layered organic matter such as, seedless weeds, cow and chicken manures, wood ash, pruning's and a layer of straw mulch which broke down and became beautiful compost for the broccoli. Once I pulled out the finished broccoli (which I didn't once spray for grubs because the broccoli grew strong and healthy and was able to fight off any pest and disease as the soil was full of nutrients for the plants to absorb. As the broccoli grew, the nasturtium self sowed around the raised bed and also helped with deterring the white butterflies) I added more chicken and cow manure and lightly forked it into an already rich wormed filled soil. Another layer of mulch added and it is now ready for the corn. I always plant a few rows at a time, staggering the corn until the bed is full. It guarantees a continuous crop of corn and plenty of surpluses which the whole corn, husk and all, go straight into the freezer. It freezes beautifully. My uncle told me to freeze corn that way and I have done ever since.

One of my cold compost bins has composted down already and is ready for the garden. Cold composting takes about 6 months to break down and I thought it would take forever for me to wait but before I know it, it is ready. I now have 3 composting bins around the garden for all my scraps and waste. With the other bins filled with water and weeds that have gone to seed brewing away, plus a bin of cow manure and water brewing, I have all the fertiliser I need for the garden.

An important job to do now that the weather is warming up is to mulch your pots. Mulching helps with water loss and helps regulate the soils temperature. I have used sugar cane mulch as I like the visual appeal.

One of my favourite flowering plants for a mass display is the Dahlia. My Dahlias are about to emerge from there dormancy. 4 years ago I planted 6 Dahlia seedlings and now they have taken over and are filling up the garden bed. Each year when they have died back I just lay down the dead die back and add a layer of mushroom compost and let it do its thing for the winter period. My son gave me a lot of large headed variety from his garden that I didn't have, so I have made a space and planted them. I pulled out an over grown 'Hot Lips salvia' to make way for the new dahlia bulbs and I found tunnels and burrows everywhere, they must belong to a bandicoot. I tried not to destroy them but the next day after I planted the bulbs they were all dug up. There is one unhappy marsupial in the garden.

I mentioned in my article last month about the bindies and digging them up by hand; well I found the best tool to get rid of them. I am an avid golfer; now that I am retired I play at least twice a week. I have come to practicing with my 7 iron and the bindies are the balls, it does a great job and I can tell when I hit them well, they fly through the air straight at the target. Another form of a good workout and I must say it has improved my game...



# Lyn's Larder

#### **CIDER & HONEY ROAST LEG OF LAMB**

Haven't tried it yet but on the list as it sounds delicious

#### INGREDIENTS

2kg Leg of Lamb 1tbsp Honey Sea salt flakes 1tsp Pears (660g) halved 2 lae 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cups Pear Cider (310mls) 3/4 cup Chicken Stock 6 med Potatoes 2tbsp Baby Carrots 1kg

# 399g **METHOD**

1. Preheat oven to 140°cC280°F

Green Beans

- Place lamb in a large oiled baking dish. Using a sharp knife, score skin at 2cm intervals; rub surface with oil, then salt. Add pears, cider and stock to dish. Cover, roast 3 hours
- 3. Remove dish from oven; add potatoes and drizzle lamb with honey. Roast, uncovered, further 2 hours
- Remove lamb from dish; cover to keep warm. Remove potatoes and pears from dish, set aside. Increase over to 220°C/425°F
   Pour pan juices from baking dish into medium saucepan; reserve
- 5. Pour pan juices from baking dish into medium saucepan; reserve 1/3 cup. Push pears through fine sieve into same pan; discard solids. Bring pear mixture to the boil; then boil, uncovered about 30 minutes or until reduced by half
- Meanwhile, return potatoes to baking dish with carrots and reserved pan juices; roast, uncovered about 30 minutes or until vegetables are tender
- 7. Boil, steam or microwave beans until tender drain.

Serve slice lamb with potatoes, carrots and beans, drizzle with sauce.

# Underground power coming to Whitbread Industrial Estate

Restart NSW will provide more than \$1.2 million to MidCoast Council to remove overhead power lines and install underground power between the Whitbread Industrial Estate and the Manning River. "By converting to underground wiring, there will be improved reliability, safety, capacity and vehicle access," said Council's Executive Manager Transport and Engineering, Peter Gesling.

The works will involve part of Whitbread Industrial Estate, between Elizabeth Avenue and River Street, Taree, including Whitbread Street, Macquarie Street, Wynter Street and Florence Street.

Work is expected to start early October and finish late December, weather permitting.

# GILLESPIE SUPPORTS INCENTIVES FOR PEN-SIONERS TO DOWNSIZE

Federal Member for Lyne Dr David Gillespie has spoken in support of legislation supporting pensioners who downsize their home.

The policy was announced by the Coalition in the lead up to the election and has been supported by both the Government and Opposition with the Social Services and Other Legislation Amendment (Incentivising Pensioners to Downsize) Bill 2022 now before Parliament.

"When people sell their primary residence, their own home, to downsize to a smaller unit or a smaller house, they have two years of exemption before they purchase their next primary residence, as opposed to the current situation where they will only get that leave pass for one year," Dr Gillespie told Parliament.

"Those existing arrangements mean that, in the current housing market, you really have to be very efficient and know what house you are going to buy pretty much before you sell your own home.

"With the housing shortages and the rampant, runaway market over the last two to three years, that has proved problematic. With a 24month window, there will be many more people that will take up the idea of downsizing.

'That means that bigger houses and bigger apartments that are available for young people will come on the market as a result, with potentially even more coming on the long-term rental market if investors buy properties to let them out—rental properties.

Dr Gillespie said the new legislation also applies only the lower below-threshold deeming rate to the asset-test-exempt principal home sale proceeds when calculating deemed income.

"At the moment, with deeming-rate limits \$56,500 for singles and \$93,600 for couples combined, it will be a significant change. The 24 months mean that, while they are trying to find a house, they will get some reasonable income assistance—because they will have to rent somewhere in the meantime, with rents ridiculously expensive.

### \$46 MILLION TO PROVIDE FOOD WASTE RECYCLING TO TWO MILLION HOUSEHOLDS

More than two million households, including those in the Myall Lakes will soon be able to recycle their food waste and divert it from landfill through a new \$46 million grants program for councils.

Member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead said the GO FOGO (food organics and garden organics) program will revolutionise household waste services in the region and help NSW reach its target of netzero emissions from organic waste in landfill by 2030.

"Many residents in the Myall Lakes community are already playing an important role in reducing waste and recycling both at home and through programs like Return and Earn," Mr Bromhead said.

"These grants will help to divert FOGO waste from ending up in

landfill where it rots and generates damaging greenhouse gasses.

'FOGO waste collected through the new program can be processed into compost and used in large scale agriculture, parks or gardens where it can improve soil health and boost yields."

# Good Medicine

Do you believe in miracles? A certain elected prime minister stated he 'always did believe in miracles'.

If we look around miracles are everywhere if, as the bible says, we have eyes to see. The more we find out about nature the more amazing it is. What I think incredible is the world turning every day on it's axis in space ... what holds it there? I laid the foundations of the earth, Job 38:4.

In a book called "Miracles Still Happen" three people were in a small boat some distance from the beach in a storm and were struggling to row it against contrary winds, fearing it would overturn. Suddenly someone appeared in the water and took hold of the boat, saying 'we can't let anything happen to you' ... and started pulling them to shore. When they staggered out at the beach they looked around for the angel who'd rescued them but couldn't see anyone. They asked their friends who came running up if they saw the person who pulled them in but the friends said there was no one else, only the three of them. Another story relates to a plague of scours on a beef farm. Calves were getting sick and the family was trying desperately to dose the sick ones and keep them separated from the healthy as more kept getting sick. Some members of their church, including the pastor, came out and walked around the farm praying about the situation. In the meantime the carcass of one calf had been shoved aside in the barn due to lack of time to dispose of it. Two days after it died they went to pick it up and found the dead calf starting to move ... it had come back to life.

I recently read a book "Brother Andrew" written from the original "God's Smuggler" in the 1960's. It's the story of a Dutch boy, Andrew. At 17 he had been to war in the East Indies but been discharged with ankle injuries, so went from being a very fast runner to using a walking cane. At 20 he felt that his life was over. Eventually through a series of 'miracles' he felt called to go to Bible college in Scotland. It seemed everyone in Holland was poor and he was used to having no money. However he had the money for the first term and trusted God for the rest. This led to many adventures as God showed him how to live by faith. When he had to renew his visa by a certain day and didn't have the shilling for postage he found money on the footpath but



gave it to someone else. Just after that, the postman brought a letter with money in it ... more than enough for postage and such things as eg. new razor blades instead of reusing old ones sharpened on his arm

Later he felt led to smuggle Bibles into communist countries to Christians who had none. He packed them in his luggage and every crevice in the blue volkswagon ... another gift. When he arrived at the borders he prayed that God would 'make seeing eyes blind' just as blind eyes had been 'made to see' in the Bible. The volkswagon became known as the Miracle Car which they prayed for every day as they couldn't afford repairs. The roads were bad in Yugoslavia and cars were still rare in the 1950's ... travellers would stop to greet each other. One day a man introduced himself as a mechanic and offered to look at the car ... whereupon He stated it was mechanically impossible for the car to be running. So he pulled it to pieces and cleaned it. It did many more miles and later they replaced it. These are just a few stories in this book full of adventures.

In the Bible are many other miracle stories such as the axe head which floated, *2 Kings 6*. This amazed me the first time I read it. When Elisha the prophet took some young prophets to cut down trees a borrowed axe fell into the water. Elisha then threw in a stick at the place and the axe floated up and was retrieved. And there's the story of the sun standing still, Joshua 10, collaborated by science. But the most wonderful miracle in the Bible is that God sent His son to earth to die for us because He loved us, *John 3:16*.
