Nabiac Landcare

The Nabiac Landcare teams are currently working at Lilypilly Bend doing follow-up weeding. Progress has been slow because several of our members are off work with health issues. Oh, the joys of getting older!

Ground asparagus (A. aeopithicous), is a weed to watch out for at the moment, it is setting red berries on its feathery fronds. Asparagus is a scourge in the bush from here to the coast. It's roots and water tubers



form dense mats that rob the native vegetation of nutrients and moisture. If you want to keep asparagus in your garden, please cut off the fruit bearing fronds, bag them and place in your red bin. Better yet, remove the plant. You can cut out the crown (growing point) and leave the roots in the ground. They won't re-shoot. Do follow-up looking for those pesky seedlings that may come up from seed in the soil. NSW WeedWise

We've been finding **Chinese Tallow** tree (Triadica sebifera) seedlings at Lilypilly Bend, especially near the Cowper St. entrance. This popular deciduous tree has made its 'escape' and established in the bush up the North Coast. We would like to prevent that happening in this area. **NSW WeedWise**



A pesky vine that's blooming at the moment is **Black-eyed Susan** (Thunbergia alata). This vine is another garden escapee with pretty orange flowers with a black centre and bad manners when it leaves the garden. It mainly spreads by being dumped in the bush, wandering under the fence or being washed down stream during floods. If scrambling on the ground it roots at every node

that touches the ground; if climbing, it is very difficult to find the very fine stems. It is easy to hand remove if you are patient. <u>Black-eyed</u> <u>Susan (brisbane.qld.gov.au)</u>

At the moment bandicoots are a visitor to many gardens and the local bush—all those conical holes in the gardens and lawns are the result of its nocturnal search for grubs, tubers and fungi. We seem to have a population explosion recently with many gardeners having a bit of a love-hate relationship. Bandicoot numbers have taken a beating due predation by foxes and cats, loss of habitat and poor traffic sense. I'm not sure which species is common locally but research shows that one southern brown bandicoot can turn over 3.9 tonnes of soil in a year, helping spread beneficial fungi, increase nutrient turnover and improving water penetration into the soil.

A couple of projects operation locally at the moment may be of interest to readers with acreages.

The **Koala Paddock Tree Regeneration** project has an aim to help protect and encourage paddock trees and therefore support koalas and other native animals. For more information: Paddock Trees; Whats the big deal? | Mid Coast 2 Tops Landcare

The **Riparian Rehabilitation in the Manning Great Lakes** project from Hunter Local Land Services aims to help landholders improve riparian vegetation, riverbank stability, water quality and estuary health by providing technical advice and incentive funding for riparian improvement projects. Nabiac Landcare normally works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am. Membership is only \$2.00 and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear supplied. Give us a ring if you are interested.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. Most of all enjoy the local bush!

Nabiac Village Futures Group News

Further news regarding the Review of our Strategic Plan for Nabiac – we now have a date for a community meeting at the Showground to discuss priorities for our community – Wednesday 16th November – details to be announced as we get closer.

We're also planning to chat with people at the **September and October Farmers Markets**, so keep an eye out for us. Our vision for Nabiac since 2004 has been that it is a vibrant rural village, that is family friendly, with improved facilities for all ages. The Strategic Plan sets out how we will achieve this.

We'll be asking you to think about ideas for Nabiac.

A major priority for the Futures Group is the **reduction of accident risks around the Village Green area**. It's a small area with a lot happening and on busy days the risks increase. For some time we've been asking for a 40 k zone in this area and hopefully that will happen soon. We are also investigating options for additional parking and have asked MidCoast Council about possible use of the Crown Land block next to the police Station. Other measures to improve safety include installation of "ripple strips" on the Highway exit into Nabiac Street, as a warning to drivers that conditions are about to change.

Planning for outdoor recreation is our other major priority

A **shared pathway for bicycles and pedestrians,** connecting the School and our sporting and recreational facilities would make for a safer opportunity to all access facilities.

We envisage a pathway from the School, going around Farnell Street, into Nabiac Street and along to the Memorial Park. We would also like to see an improvement to the Showground Lane intersection and a pathway down to the Showground 'side' entry and the 'Aub Ferris' playing fields

A plan for the recreational facilities themselves is also important. Our tennis courts were first established on a waterlogged site 100 years ago. To keep them going and to provide other opportunities in this area is a priority for our Group. The Neighbourhood Centre has committed to paying the cost of a geotechnical report which is required for grant funding applications.



- The Mid Coast Local Government Area is now in the official Bush Fire Danger Period and that means you need a Permit to carry out any planned burns.
- Fire Danger Ratings are being simplified from 1st September with the introduction of the Australian Fire Danger Rating

The new Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) has been developed using the latest science, making it more accurate and more specific to your local area. It is being used Australia wide, so whether you're at home or traveling, you will see the same system being used.

The new Fire Danger Ratings will give you clear actions to take.



The new AFDRS calculates fire danger at a finer geographic scale than ever before so more accurate and relevant information can be provided to save property and lives. These ratings do not indicate that there is a fire. They indicate the level of risk if a fire were to occur.

The new ratings and what you need to do

 •Check your bush fire plan and ensure that your property is fire ready
- *If a fire starts, take immediate action. If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level go to a safer location well before the fire impacts
- Reconsider travel through bush fire risk areas



For your survival leave bush fire risk areas

- These are the most dangerous conditions for a fire
- Your life may depend on the decisions you make, even before there is a fire
 Stay safe by going to a safer location early in the morning or the night before
- . Homes cannot withstand fires in these conditions
- ·You may not be able to leave, and help may not be available

The new Fire Danger Ratings have four levels (instead of six) – Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic. Each level has clear calls to action, to make it easier for people to know what to do.

On days when there is minimal risk, the white bar (below the green moderate area) meaning "no rating" will be used. This is not to say

that fires cannot or will not start, but that the community does not need to actively anticipate a fire spreading in a fast or threatening way.



So, what are Fire Danger Ratings?

Good question. We are so glad you asked.

- Fire Danger Ratings describe the potential level of danger should a bush fire start. They do not indicate the chance of a fire occurring, although this is a common misconception.
- Ratings are calculated using a combination of weather forecasting and information about vegetation that could fuel a
- Fire Danger Ratings are important in Australia because bush fires can be extremely dangerous, and people need to be forewarned so that they can take action to protect themselves and their community.

You'll be able to check the daily fire danger for your area on www.rfs.nsw.gov.au

You can also use the Fires Near Me NSW smartphone app to check the fire danger for your area.

Speaking of Fire Permits

The NSW RFS issues Free Fire Permits for a designated period of time, once the proposed burn area/pile has been inspected and considered safe to light up, given the Fire Danger Rating is no higher than Moderate. It the FDR moves to High or above, even though your Permit may still be valid, it may well be suspended until conditions improve. This is a standard condition of the Permit. Other conditions of the Permit will include, but are not necessarily limited to, giving at least 24 hours' notice of your intention to light up to (1) all your neighbours and (2) your local fire authority.

Hello all and welcome to Spring!

The unusually high rainfall this year has a lot more pollens for hayfever than we are used to.

We highly recommend taking a non-sedating anti-histamine on a daily basis. These are available over the counter in small amounts or larger amounts that are even more affordable.

If using a tablet each day is not enough, then we suggest adding nasal sprays or eye drops as well. Each of these are safe and effective.

The other thing that has changed a lot with the rainfall is ticks. Unusually, ticks have been active all over winter and will only get worse. The best thing we can provide for this is "Tick TOX". It is a small spray that snap freezes the ticks before they can inject venom. After spraying them they pretty much just fall off and that's it!

46,000 children are in out-of-home care in Australia




'HOPE IN A SUITCASE AUSTRALIA INC.', a registered non-for- profit charity whose purpose/objective is to advance social or public welfare of children in our community by providing a free service which ensures all children entering, and/ or already living in out-of-home care (foster care) can receive a suitcase of

hope full of essential belongings to call their own.

A child often enters foster care with only a plastic bag of belongings, or less, and these bags are then dragged around with them to each placement. Sadly, for many kids, they will move multiple times. These children matter, these children are loved, and these children are just as worthy as any of us. Their belongings and lives are worth more than a plastic bag. These kids should be able to pack their lives into their very own suitcase with pride and a sense of hope.

HIASC aims to send them a message that they are loved, worthy, that they matter, and they are cared for by our community. To encourage self-care by providing a toothbrush, hairbrush, and clean underwear, even sanitary items for the older girls. A pair of Pyjamas or a change

PLASMA CAN BE GIVEN IN 18 DIFFERENT LIFE SAVING WAYS

- ♦ You can donate plasma by itself. It's a lot like giving blood, and just as rewarding.
- ♦ Around half of all donations in Australia today are actually plasma donations.
- ♦ Lifeblood needs to collect the equivalent of an additional four petrol tankers worth of plasma this year that's around 120,000 extra donations. (2020/2021)
- ♦ We need at least 15,000 additional plasma donors this year to support Australia's growing plasma needs. (Note This is a simplified version of this approved message: There are currently 182,000 plasma donors in Australia. We need at least 200,000 donors to support Australia's growing plasma needs.)
- Global demand for one plasma product, immunoglobulin (Ig), has been growing at around 7 per cent each year over the past decade.

Nuts contain all three macronutrients:

Protein, Fats & Carbohydrates, plus a range of micronutrients (vitamins & minerals). They are an excellent way to add nutrients to meals or replace meat, fish, or egg for a change.

Different nuts contain varying amounts of micronutrients (vitamins and minerals) such as B-group vitamins and other minerals such as magnesium,

manganese, and zinc.

They contain certain antioxidants too, which help to keep the body's cells healthy, reducing risk of chronic illnesses.

walnuts & flax meal.

Do you have trouble digesting nuts? Try these ideas:

- 1. Pair nuts with foods which contain enzymes to help break down nutrients and make them more bioavailable.
- 2. Soaking nuts will help break down phytates, making the nutrients more bioavailable.

The Wallamba Watershed's History — Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Wingham Chronicle & Manning Observer, July, 1898

FLOUR MILL AT KRAMBACH: As advertised, the meeting to consider the matter of forming the Flour Mill Company in connection with Mr J. Wright's sawmill at Fairview near Krambach, was held at Fairview on Saturday 25th June. In spite of the bad roads, flooded state of the rivers and etc., the attendance was large and representative and evinced warm sympathy with the movement. Mr W. Deer, JP, occupied the chair and Mr S.G. Wright acted as secretary. The minutes of the previous meeting was read and confirmed. Messrs M Busteed, H. Mackoway and J. Newell, who at the previous meeting were appointed to canvass the district in the interest of the proposed company, now handed in their lists, when it was found that 477 applications had been made for the shares. A proposition was now made by Mr J.J. Gallagher and warmly supported by Mr Lowe and the chairman, that the capital be increased to £1,000. This was vigorously (objected to) by Messrs T. Startin and T.W. Edwards on the grounds of its manifest illegality and injustice to absent shareholders who had taken shares believing the required capital to be £500. After considerable discussion this motion was negatised (sic). It was then proposed by Mr T.W. Edwards, seconded by Mr T. Startin, that the Company be now declared formed. Capital £500, £1 shares, 5 shillings on application. On motion Mr S.G. Wright was appointed secretary at a nominal remuneration until the mill commences operation, when the amount of the secretary's salary will probably be settled definitely. After discussion it was decided that at all shareholders meetings the voting r be as follows:- Ten or a fraction of ten shares entitled the holder to one vote, 50 shares to five votes and each succeeding shares held by the same person one vote. Of 477 intending shareholders 404 paid their application fees, the remaining 73 are good. Now it only remains for the shareholders to work with energy and in harmony to make this Wallamba and Manning River Flour Mill Company a great success. The next meeting for the election of Directors will be advertised shortly. No less than 24

persons were nominated: why I cannot understand. It behoves share-holders to see that good men are elected to these positions. A vote of thanks was accorded to Messrs. H.W. Mackoway, M. Busteed and J. Newell, , for their praiseworthy in the task allotted to them.

Dairying On the Wallamba—Co-operative Butter Factory. Manning Chronicle and Manning River Observer - November 1903

CO-OPERATIVE BUTTER FACTORY: At the meeting in St Clair Hall, Wallamba River on Saturday afternoon last, re the erection of a Cooperative Butter Factory, there was a large attendance. Mr R. Hanna was voted to the chair. Mr W. Deer, JP, was elected secretary. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. The share lists, which had been out during the past week, were handed in and read - the total number of £1 shares promised to be taken up being about 900. The question of the site of the factory was then discussed. Mr J.J. Gallagher then proposed and Mr Deer seconded: That the factory be erected at Dyers Crossing. Mr H. McKinnon, JP, moved an amendment which was seconded by Mr *J. Logan*, that it be erected at Bullock Wharf, Nabiac. Messrs. W. Deer and S. Wright spoke in favour of the Dyers Crossing site. The each dwelt on it being the most central as well as a good site with plenty of good water and thousands of acres of splendid country within a short radius only waiting to be turned into use for dairying. Mr H. McKinnon, with some sound arguments, supported the Bullock Wharf site. Mr. J. Breckenridge, JP, also gave some interesting facts on the preservation of butter during its transit from the factory to the wharf and the disadvantages that would ensue from having to convey it from an inland factory to the steamer. The question was then put to the meeting when the voting was:- for Dyers Crossing - 37, for Bullock Wharf - 17.

Canvassers were then appointed to try and bring the share list up to about 1,400 before any further steps be taken.

Note:- the Upper Wallamba Dairy Company's butter factory building was completed by Mr H. Milligan in October, 1904 and was ready for the machinery to be fitted. The factory was opened on Tuesday the 3rd January, 1905 before a crowd of 400-500 people

Breeding season is here: get your mare's nutrition right from the start

Spring has sprung, which means breeding season is almost here. If you're planning to put your mare in foal this season now is the time to get her nutrition right to ensure she grows a strong, healthy foal. Don't over feed your mare

If your mare is holding too much weight leading up to breeding season you may need to consider decreasing the volume of hard feed given, however when doing this you must be mindful to ensure she is still reaching her daily vitamin and mineral requirements – this is where a balancer pellet could be the best choice for your mare.





Welcome to Deb's Gardening,

Spring is in the air; well it was for a brief moment and from what I have heard it is going to be another wet one. I have noticed the ant mounds starting to form again in the lawn, which is a sign of rain.



I also mentioned last month the issue with the Satin Bower Birds. Well they are still hanging around but not as many, and they have left the vegetable garden alone. The only crop I lost was the cauliflowers as they stripped the leaves too far back for the cauliflower to recover. I did get a few heads but they were spindle and bolted to seed quickly. So now the plan is to pull them out and prepare the beds ready for my tomatoes as I have not grown tomatoes in that bed. Just a reminder to make sure you rotate your crops, less chance for pest and diseases.

With spring fast approaching it is time to think about preparing the beds for not just tomatoes, but cucumbers, capsicum, corn, beans, pumpkins and potatoes. I will add some compost, blood and bone and old manure to the soil, cover it with a layer of sugar cane mulch and it can do its thing while I raise the seeds.

I am about to raise my seeds in the egg cartons again as they worked

beautifully for the winter vegies. I recently placed another lot of egg cartons into the soil with a follow up crop of raised carrots and beetroot, it is so easy. The carrots that I am picking now, which I raised in the egg cartons and were sown pretty close together are growing straight. I thought that they may strangle each other but they are doing well. Obviously I am thinning them out by picking the smaller ones and eating them first but all in all I am happy with raising carrots in the egg cartons, and there is no sign of the egg cartons, they have broken down into the soil.

This month I have also been busy in the orchard. The citrus fruit is nearly at a end with new buds about to form, so time to fertilise. I have been giving them the ash from the fireplace and blood and bone. I have also weeded and mulched under the trees suppressing any chance of weeds or grass. I pruned back the Red Hot Pokers and used that as mulch on some of the trees; it's basically whatever I can get my hands on.

My family came from the Hawkesbury River and farmed. A cousin still grows citrus by the river and opens up to the public to pick their own. Well you can imagine the seasons that he has had these last few years with the continuous flooding. This season was his worse as the citrus leaves have all turned yellow with minimum fruit. He did fertilise hoping they will come back. He got to the point that he had an agronomist test the soil thinking that it may be depleted but found out that the soil is fine, no deficiencies. We talked about root rot as the citrus have been sitting in water for so long and he is thinking along those lines too, so he has started a spray regime for fungal rot. He has hundreds of trees so he is hoping that they make a comeback but his last resort is to pull out and start again.

My heart went out to him as I know how hard farming is but farmers are a strong breed and he will bounce back. I guess one has to take the good with the bad, just as life itself.

Good Medicine

Where to Turn

When we have a problem or something happens in our life we usually turn somewhere for help and support ... family ... friends ... maybe even prayer. Where do you turn?

Prayer can be the last resort or the first place we go in trouble. We expect the Bible to talk about prayer and it does ... a lot. Prayer is helpful, comforting, and our way of communicating with God. We're admonished to not worry but instead pray about everything, *Philippians 4:6.*

A recent tragic accident of a child becoming paralysed as the result of a teenager jumping on her back in the water has generated emotional responses from around the world ... as people pray for a miracle for the girl and hope for her family, who are also praying for the teenager. Even a woman who doesn't believe in God says she is praying.

We don't have to wait for a problem to start praying. We can talk to God any time ... and He knows what we need before we ask, *Matt 6:8*. The Bible tells us to pray at all times, *1 Thessalonians 5:17 ...* and if we feel we can't pray the Holy Spirit will pray for us, *Romans 8:26*.

Universities and other organisations have conducted surveys on the **benefits** of prayer ... with interesting results.

• People who pray and go to church tend to 'be healthier and live longer'. *If you pray to forgive someone it helps you forgive others ... and forgiveness is associated with better health and life satisfaction. *Praying affects regions in your brain that improve self-control, which helps you attain goals. *People who attend church and value religion are 90% less likely to have depression than those who don't. *Those who've been in abusive relationships were helped, by prayer, to recover a positive self image and had less emotional pain. *Other benefits are less anxiety after an operation and reduction in the emotional affect of financial stress. In fact stress and anxiety levels generally plummet. *A survey on children's health states that kids who get involved in church do better in Maths and Reading; kids going to church just once a month are less likely to repeat: and teens whose faith is important get on better



with parents. *A Research on Aging study showed that people who live according to their religious beliefs were less likely to suffer from heart disease.

'That's pretty strong evidence in favour of prayer, wouldn't you say?'

All of these research reports were published by **non**-religious institutions.

Let's be encouraged by including daily prayer in our life to enrich every aspect of it.

LEMON-GARLIC CHICKEN

Lemon, wine and honey create the sweet & sour flavour in this delicious dish. Nice with rice and a green vegetable $\,$ - Serves 6

INGREDIENTS

6 Skinless, single chicken breast fillets (125 g ea)

MARINADE

8 tsp fresh Lemon juice

8 tsp White wine or low salt chicken stock

8 tsp Olive oil

2 cloves Garlic, crushed

1 tsp Honey

4 tsp fresh chopped or 1 tsp dried Oregano

1/8 tsp Black Pepper

Lemon slices and fresh oregano sprigs for garnish

METHOD

In a shallow glass dish, combine lemon juice, wine, 4 tsp olive oil, garlic, honey, oregano and pepper. Mix well

Add chicken to marinade, turning to coat. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 30 minutes.

Heat remaining oil in a large, heavy based fry pan to med/high. Add chicken to pan and fry for one minute, turn over and fry for one minute to seal. Reduce heat to medium and cook for 12 minutes, turning over after 6 minutes, or until cooked through.

Alternately, BBQ on a lightly oiled hotplate over medium heat for 8 minutes on each side or until cooked through, brushing with marinade.


