It is disappointing to notice an increase in the dumping of garden plants and debris; if you don't want something in your garden...we don't want it in the local bushland. If something doesn't fit in your green bin do the right thing and take it to the tip.

I had the privilege to be invited to the launch of the new (4th) edition of the booklet, *Garden Escapees and other weeds of bushland and reserves*. This book contains lots of photos, hints for identification and directions for controlling weeds, mainly those that escape from ornamental gardens. The book has been produced by the MidCoast Council and is a credit to the team who put it together, especially *Terry Inkson* and the council weed officers. A limited number of copies are available at the council offices and it is also available to download from the MidCoast Council website. The great thing about the electronic copy is that there are live links to references.

The Weed of the Month...it's out there looking beautiful at the moment covered in a shawl like display of white flowers....and stirring up my hay fever. Ligustrum sinesis, small (narrow) leaf privet! If you don't know privet, just take a drive along the Wallambah Rd., it's

blooming in almost every fence and creek line. I think this is the 'best' I've ever seen privet blooming and by Christmas it will be covered in ripe juicy seeds for water and the birds to spread. Please, remember where your privet is and when the rain stops do the local environment a favour and get rid of it by your favourite weed control method. Consult Weedwise for further information. 
International Games Week has turned into International Games Month. We will have our games available in the library during that time for anyone to come in and play.

Hazel & Paul Cotton. Cottonwood Farm.



Their fresh produce market stall is bursting at the seams with goodness. They have an interesting story, in which life on the land has always played a part...

For over thirty years Paul and Hazel have lived and worked on their beautiful 100-acre property in Coolongolook. Originally bought as a freshwater crayfish farm, the business morphed into a wholesale manufacturing business,

selling timber products nationwide and employing local staff.

In their spare time, Hazel and Paul also bred, trained, and worked draught horses, sometimes using them to plough the ground before planting. All parties involved agreed the tractor was preferable! Paul's first love (apart from Hazel) has always been in farming. In fact, the couple met on a pig farm in the UK where Paul (aged seventeen) was working, and Hazel (fifteen) kept her first pony.



Paul started growing chemical-free vegetables in 2015, after retiring. He was inspired by his father's experience of feeding a family of six after the second world war. This was during a time when food was scarce in the UK and rationing was still a reality.

From humble beginnings with a wheelbarrow, created from converted farm implements and an umbrella, Paul and Hazel's stall at local markets has grown to be one of the largest, stocking seasonal, freshly dug, and hand-picked vegetables.

Their property boasts a wide of quality produce, including Dutch Cream potatoes, Jerusalem Artichokes, and the best sweet corn on the coast. Also, ginger, garlic, daikon, beetroot, spinach, cabbage,





onions, spring onions, broad beans, snow peas, lettuce and cucumber. The list goes on! ... Zucchini, pak-choy, mandarins, lemons, and finger limes.

Paul is always searching for something different to try and has currently planted twelve different pumpkin varieties.



Both Hazel and Paul are passionate about leaving as small a footprint as possible on the environment. They compete with every conceivable form of wildlife, who also appreciate the tasty buffet provided, how ever all Cottonwood Farm produce is chemical free. Paul is always happy to advise and help those who aspire to grow their own fresh veggies and Hazel usually has a recipe

or two to share.

The Wallamba Watershed's History – Another in a series of historical articles gleaned from the archives of the "Manning River Times" - 1902 - 1903

Wallamba River Agricultural & Horticultural Association: July, 1902:-A meeting of the above was held in the School of Arts on Thursday night last. Mr Hugh McKinnon (President) in the chair. The Secretary, Mr Jas Gleeson, read correspondence from the Lands Department acknowledging the receipt of half the survey fees in connection with the grant of 8 acres made by that Department for the use of the association. Trustees were then appointed for the land and the Secretary was instructed to apply at once for a special grant for clearing it. The following gentlemen were appointed to canvas the district to enrol members, namely Messrs Jas Gleeson, H. McKinnon, T. Startin, H. Weller and Jas Busteed, snr. It was the general opinion that the first show should be held in the School of Arts, that the new recreation be used for the stock parade and that the show take place about February or March next. On the motion of Mr Jas. Logan the Secretary was instructed to obtain members cards and hand some to each of the canvassers. Mr Logan wished the Chairman to explain how the members fee came to be lowered to 5/- for men and 2/6 for the ladies. Mr McKinnon explained that the previous motion had been duly rescinded and the lower fee submitted and that it was carried almost unanimously at the last meeting. He was of the opinion that this would induce many more to join and make the association a greater one. The meeting was then adjourned to the Thursday before the full moon in October.

The Writers Comment: Despite the enthusiasm shown by the early pioneers to stage an Agricultural Show on the Wallamba, the very first show didn't take place until the year 1912. What interrupted the plans for staging a show we will never know. The staging of an Agricultural show would have been covered by the newspapers of the day but sadly all the newspapers published between July, 1902 and 1912 are missing from the records at the Taree library. Many problems could have prevented the staging of a show such as raising funds for the erection of the show building and lack of support by the community, but sadly it's a part of the Wallamba history that no one



can answer. (Bob Mann)

Dairying On the Wallamba. November, 1903: Co-Operative Butter Factory. At the meeting in St Clair's Hall, Wallamba River on Saturday afternoon last, re the erection of a co-operative butter factory, there was a large attendance. Mr R. Hanna was voted to the chair. Mr. W. Deer, J.P., was elected Secretary pro-term. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. The share lists, which had been out during the past week, were then handed in and read. The total number of £1 shares promised to be taken up being about 900. The question of the site of the factory was then discussed. Mr J.J. Gallagher proposed and Mr Deer seconded "That the factory be erected at Dyers Crossing". Mr H. McKinnon, J.P. moved an amendment which was seconded by Mr J. Logan "That it be erected at Bullock Wharf, Nabiac." Messrs W. Deer and S. Wright spoke in favour of the Dyers Crossing site. They each dwelt on it being the most central as well as a good site with plenty of good water and thousands of acres of splendid country within a short radius, only waiting to be turned into use for dairying. Mr H. McKinnon with some good sound arguments supported the Bullock Wharf site. Mr. J. Breckenridge, J.P., also gave some interesting facts on the preservation of butter during its transit from the factory to the wharf and the disadvantages that would ensue from having to carry it from an inland factory to the steamer. The question was then put to the meeting when the voting was Dyers Crossing - 37 and for Bullock Wharf - 17. Canvassers were then appointed to try and bring the share list up to about (?) before any further steps could be taken. Factory News: Manning River Times May, 1904: The recently formed Upper Wallamba Dairy Company has accepted Mr Milligan's tender of £350 for the erection of the factory at Dyers Crossing. The building which will be constructed of hardwood and pine with a concrete floor is to be completed in 17 weeks time.

Manning River Times - October 19th, 1904 Factory Completed: The upper Wallamba Dairy Company's butter factory at Dyers Crossing was completed last week by Mr Milligan, the contractor. The factory was opened on Tuesday the 3rd January, 1905 before a crowd of 400 to 500 people.





Essential items for the grooming kit

Keeping your horse groomed and maintained is an important part of horse ownership and husbandry. Keeping your kit stocked with all the essentials will make caring for your horse much easier (and more enjoyable!)

Hoof pick: As the saying goes "no hoof, no horse", that's why this tool should be number one in everyone's grooming kit and the first task undertaken when grooming your horse. It's important to clean your horse's hooves out daily to remove any unwanted dirt and debris. This also provides you with the perfect opportunity to make sure they're injury free and fit for riding. When cleaning your horse's hooves be sure to check for issues such as cracks, stone bruises, puncture wounds, abscesses, thrush, seedy toe and white line disease. Hoof picks come in many different shapes and styles. Our top choice is a pick with a brush on the end to help clean away excess dirt so you can get a good look at your horse's hooves

Hoof oil: Hoof oil is another import item to keep on hand. Generally oiling your horse's hooves doesn't need to be done every day, aim for 2-3 times per week depending on the weather. Hoof oil helps maintain the hooves' natural moisture, meaning when the weather is dry oil will keep moisture locked in and when the weather is wet it will keep excess moisture out.

Body brush: A body brush is one of the most important brushes used for horse grooming. As the name suggest this brush is designed to be used all over the horse's body. The body brush has short soft bristles making it ideal for full body use.

Curry comb: A curry comb is your go to tool for removing dirt and excess hair. Curry combs are usually made from rubber and have short teeth that work wonders for removing unwanted dirt and debris. The curry comb is often the first brush used on the horse to loosen excess hair and caked on mud. Curry combs are also great for giving your horse a body massage.

Dandy brush: A dandy brush is an oval shaped brush with long, stiff bristles. A dandy brush is used for removing excess dirt, particularly dirt already loosened by the curry comb. The dandy brush is a useful tool for the horse's legs when mud is present. Avoid using this brush around your horse's face, as some horses do not like the feeling of the stiffer bristles on their face, ears and eyes.

Magic hair removal block: If you've never seen or heard of a magic block - it's time you did. This will be your best friend come spring when your horse begins to shed its winter coat. rugs and saddle cloths.

Mane and tail brush: The mane and tail brush, as the name suggests is used for grooming, detangling and maintaining your horse's mane and tail. This brush has bristles very similar to that of a human hairbrush. When brushing your horse's mane and tail be sure to start from the bottom and slowly inch your way up, that way you will not be breaking and ripping out their long, luscious locks.

Mail and tail comb: Again, this product is self-explanatory, the mane and tail comb is used for detangling and styling. Often additional to de-knotting, combs are used for parting the mane and tail for plating, braiding, and creating quarter marks.



Welcome to Deb's Gardening,

Well it is happening again. I was watching a report on TV and La Nina is back and the wet weather will be with us again till autumn next year. With so much rain flooding the state and our growing regions, this will affect the availability of food in the months to come. It is such a sad and depressing sight seeing so much flood and disaster that it breaks my heart and leaves me feeling hopeless.

With the expected food supply shortage and, of course, the rise in cost, I am thinking about growing my own grains to make my own bread and really be self sufficient. There are a number of different types of grains which are from the botanical family 'Poaceae' including wheat, oats, rice, corn (maize), bailey, sorghum, rye and

I have never grown grain before and after doing a bit of research it isn't that hard. (I grow sweet corn every year but I eat is as a cob or in salads. I've never thought to use it to make my own corn flour or thought of it as a grain food, I always thought of it as a vegetable). My only problem is the ground work. I would have to fence off another area to keep the wallabies out, as the vegetable garden is full and has no room for grains.

One of my biggest mistakes in the garden was planting an elderberry tree near the vegetable garden. I planted one at my tomato farm near a glass house and it grew nicely. I see them on the side of the road everywhere in a nice compact state. Here, at home, it became a monster and sent roots up through the garden beds. It grew four times the size of the one at the tomato farm. So with my trusty new battery charged chain saw, down it came last week. It has made a big difference to the space that it has given me room to extend the

vegetable garden down the slope into the orchard and with a new fence that could be the new grain area. Mmmmm food for thought.

I do intend to plant another Elderberry tree but plant it away from the garden because it has so many uses- The berries and flowers of the elderberry are packed with antioxidants and vitamins that may boost your immune system. They could help tame inflammation, lessen stress, and help protect your heart, too. Some experts recommend elderberry to help and ease cold and flu symptoms. Birds love them and it makes a lovely liquor and cordial, plus it is a lovely tree, it's just too invasive; at least the elderberry is easy to propagate.

I couldn't help myself yesterday when I was out and about. I had to go to the nursery and buy more annuals and shrubs to fill a few gaps. The weather man said that we are in for a week of warm weather and sunshine from tomorrow, hooray. With the weather warming up, as much as I would love to go out and plant them today, I have decided to let the plants harden off. Hardening off is the process allowing a plant to transition from a protected environment, such as a green house, to the harsh outdoor conditions of fluctuating spring temperatures and full sun exposure. I don't know how long they have been in the nursery for and being seedlings, if I plant them they may go into shock once the warm weather arrives. Hardening up plants means that you pop the pots and punnets in the sun, leave them for at least a week, water when they need it. Once you plant them, they will settle in the ground better and I won't get as many losses.

Member for Myall Lakes, Stephen Bromhead said the NSW Government's Start Strong funding guidelines outline how early childhood services across the state will support families in giving their child the best start to life through affordable preschool.

"With cost-of-living pressure being felt across Australia, it's the Liberals and Nationals in NSW that are committed to reducing stress through immediate fee relief," Mr Bromhead said.

"The NSW Government's Start Strong Program will improve the affordability of early childhood education for families in the Myall Lakes."

From January 2023, all NSW families will be eligible for:

- up to \$4,220 per year in fee relief for 3, 4 and 5-year-olds attending a community or mobile preschool,
- up to \$2,110 per year in fee relief for 4 and 5-year-olds attending preschool in a long day care setting on top of their Child Care Subsidy payment, and
- the equivalent of 5 days a fortnight of affordable preschool fee relief for all children in Department of Education preschools.

Minister for Education and Early Learning Sarah Mitchell said for the first time the NSW Government is extending fee-relief to NSW families whose children attend preschool in a long day care setting.

NO RELIEF IN BUDGET WITH SKYROCKETING ELEC-TRICTY PRICES

As the Albanese Labor Government continues to pursue it's Climate agenda, electricity costs are skyrocketing and there is no relief in Labor's first Budget to help households and businesses deal with the dramatic price shock.

\$50 MILLION BOOST TO TACKLE POTHOLES ON REGIONAL ROADS

The NSW Liberal and Nationals Government will invest \$50 million to help regional and rural councils fix the increasing number of potholes brought on by this year's extreme wet weather.

Member for Myall Lakes, **Stephen Bromhead** said under the new Fixing Local Roads Pothole Repair Round, MidCoast Council can apply for funding to help them address their highest priority pothole repairs.

"It is hard to drive anywhere on our road network without dodging potholes, which have been made worse by the wet weather we have experienced this year," Mr Bromhead said.

"Our Government has heard the calls for help loud and clear and fixing the hundreds of potholes caused by recent heavy rains and flooding is a priority.

"This additional support will help ease the pressure local councils are facing and boost the resources they can draw upon to repair their most damaged roads to improve safety and reduce wear and tear on vehicles."

Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Sam Farraway said NSW has had more than its fair share of natural disasters and extreme weather and that more than 135,000 potholes have been repaired on State roads in regional NSW since February.

"We certainly have plenty more potholes that still require attention, particularly on council-managed roads, which is why our Government is putting more money on the table for councils to repair potholes on the roads regional communities use every day," Mr Farraway said.

"This funding is available to help every regional council across the state to carry out emergency repairs and would fix roughly more than 420,000 potholes on their roads."

The new funding builds on the \$500 million invested by the NSW Government through the Fixing Local Roads program to help regional councils repair, maintain and seal local roads across the state.

communities and impact millions of Australian's household budgets," Dr Gillespie said.

"The stable diet at dinner of a piece of meat and four vegetables which has always been relatively healthy and affordable, is something just about all Australians would like to see continue."

Dr Gillespie said if Labor were serious about achieving a realistic path to net-zero carbon by 2050, they would include new nuclear technology in Australia's future energy mix.

"I was recently in Canada meeting with their authorities who have put all the regulatory framework and systems in place to build their first small modular reactor which will become operational by 2028.

"Small modular nuclear technology is here. It's economical, it provides affordable baseload power 24/7, it's compatible with the electricity grid and can be plugged into the locations where existing coal-fired power plants are being retired. Importantly, there is next to no emissions."

"While I support having solar and wind as part of our energy mix, Labor's plans for renewable energy will see tens of billions of dollars needed to create a new grid which will be an extra cost to all households. It's also above and beyond the cost of installing solar, wind and hatteries

Dr Gillespie said that even the union movement had expressed concern about a number of Labor's climate policies.

"I have spoken to several union leaders who are very concerned about the impact some of Labor's loose policy decisions will have on Australian workers, particularly in manufacturing and our primary industries," Dr Gillespie said.

COTTAGE & CELERY SEED LOAF

INGREDIENTS

2 cups Self raining flour

2 tsp Sugar 1 tsp Salt

1 tsp Celery seeds

1 cup Cheddar cheese - grated

1 small Onion, finely chopped

1 tbsp Butter

125 gm Cottage cheese

1½ cups Milk

1 [·] Egg

METHOD

- Sift flour, sugar and salt together into a bowl, stir in celery seed and grated cheese.
- Sauté onion in butter until soft and golden brown. Cool slightly, add cottage cheese, milk and beaten egg, mix well and pour in dry ingredients.
- Mix until dry ingredients are jus moistened, mixture will be lumpy.
- 4. Pour into greased and lined orange cake loaf pan (9x5x3cm).
- 5. Bake at 180°C for 50-60 minutes or until loaf tests baked.

This loaf is ideal for toasting.
