flowers are blooming early, the fireweed is rampant and hay fever season has begun early! I must admit that warm sunshine and dry laundry sure beats those cold, wet days we experienced this past winter.

Our members numbers at working bees has been sadly depleted recently and we would love to have some new participants. Although we work most Wednesdays, you don't have to commit to working every week. A few hours in the bush, morning tea and a chat are good for the soul and pulling a few weeds is a great way to release those murderous tendencies. Training and tools are provided. It's a great way to learn more about our local native plants and weeds. If you don't care to use poisons, there are plenty of weeds out there to hand pull and dig.

On the weed front-privet is starting to bud up. If you've got time, try to control it now. It's actively growing and you will avoid trying to control it when it's blooming and activating your hay fever! I've noticed lots of privet seedlings popping up in the areas we've cleared of mature plants. It's really important to get on top of seedlings early, otherwise you may create an even denser stand of young privet that completes with any natives regenerating.

Another garden escapee to control now is Yellow Bells, Tecoma stans. If you have it, get on to it now. See NSWweedwise for control information. My guess is that it will flower early this season.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind

will spread. Most of all enjoy a walk in the local bush! If you're interested in joining us, having a look at our projects or just having a chat, give me a ring on 6554 3196.

MINIMBAH MATTERS



Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade's first Minimbah Matters appeared in the Across the Fence in July 2007, when we let our community know of our exciting news – construction of our new Fire Station had commenced. Seventeen years later and we can now let you know that the damage repairs are well under way. The damage to the Station was caused by the hail storm that swept down Minimbah Road on Boxing Day last year. Soon we should be as good as new!

The Bush Fire Danger Period in the Mid Coast District commenced on 1st September, 2024. Fire Permits are required from that date.

Fire permits are important to make sure that fire is used safely. When you have a permit, it tells you the rules for starting and keeping a fire, and it also informs firefighters when you are burning things on your property. That helps to prevent firefighters making unnecessary visits to a well-controlled legal fire.

So, what's new?

You can now apply for a free permit online via the NSW RFS website. Go to rfs.nsw.gov.au/fire-information/BFDP



There you will find helpful and accurate upto-date information regarding the Bush Fire Danger Period and Fire Permits. By following the links, you can start the application process which will notify your local Fire Permit Officer of your intention to burn. It is a very user-friendly site.

What remains the same?

An RFS Fire Permit Officer will inspect your proposed burn pile/ area, give you some advice and handy hints regarding safe burning, and issue the Permit.





- It is your fire and therefore your responsibility.
- Before lighting any fire, ensure that:
 - → You have sufficient equipment and personnel to make sure it can be contained and controlled within the specified area (usually your boundaries)
 - → It does not contain toxic materials such as rubber tyres, plastics, paint etc., and
 - → It must not cause an air pollution problem by producing excessive amounts of smoke.
- At least 24 hours prior to lighting up you are required by law to give advice to your immediate neighbours and the RFS.
- You must also check:
 - → Whether a No Burn day has been declared
 - → Whether a Total Fire Ban is in force
 - → The expected weather conditions.

Not everyone has the advantage of using the online facility, therefore for those amongst us that know who your Fire Permit Officer (FPO) is and have their contact number, you are still able to make the direct approach. If you aren't sure who to contact, a call to the

Mid Coast Fire Control Centre on 1300 643 262 is advised. Just tell them we sent you, and they will answer all your questions. They will also know that you read Minimbah Matters.

Welcome to Deb's Gardening,



My gardening used to consist of the 3 Ms – Mulched, maintained and manicured. Now it has turned upside

down to the 3 Ws- Weeds, weigh-down, and worry. In the past month I have spent a total of 1 hour in the garden. Time and weather have been a factor. I still have a paint brush in my hand with no end in sight, the builders are finishing off some part of the build and it needs to be primed and 2 coats of paint. The positive side is that at least it is getting closer to completion.

One of my favourite gardening shows that I religiously watch on TV is Gardening Australia on the ABC, however in winter they have a break as winter is a slow time in the garden and I guess that they don't have many stories for the winter season. But as I look around my garden there are so many jobs to do that if I don't get to them soon, I am too late. Such as the pear tree, it needs a good prune, and the best time to prune deciduous fruit trees is late winter - The red hot pokers need to be cut back before they come back to life - The dahlia bulbs all need digging up because I am going to give a lot away and want to relocate them and the best time to dig up dahlias is when they are dormant in the winter time - The salvias should have been cut back already to remove spent flowers and re-proportion the top heavy plants - the roses are waiting to be pruned and it's also time to start sowing next seasons vegies such as tomatoes, capsicums and egg plants and raise them up in my seed trays. I am exhausted just typing this and noting the jobs that need doing. My plan was now that the weather is getting warmer and the days getting longer, is to spend just 1 hour every afternoon and try to attack the garden and get back to a M word and to cut back on painting time. But in my head I tell myself that I will just finish painting this wall or this roof and before I know it I have ran out of puff and hours. Then not to mention the clean up time, if only I didn't have to clean up paint brushes after a day's work!

I went into the vegie patch to pick broccoli and noticed that the peas are disappearing and stems broken off. I think it's the birds that are annihilating my pea patch. I am surprised that they can find them with all the weeds growing up around them but they are. I am so devastated because I love pea time.

I have also noticed that the mulberry trees are waking up and the berries are starting to form. I have both the black mulberry and white mulberry tree and the past 2 years I have hardly had any berries from them because the birds have eaten them all. The trees are about 7 years old now and getting a decent size about them but it occurred to me that previously I used to get enough berries to make loads of jam and plenty to eat and give away, so why are birds eating them all now. Then I remembered that I used the old wives tale method and hung tinsel and old CDs in the tree, hence why maybe I got more berries back then. I took the tinsel down a few years back



because the tinsel was fading and braking but I never thought to put it back up, so maybe the old wives tale worked. Which made me think that there are a lot of old wives tales or myths that I use in the garden.

One being – "Talking to plants or paying music makes them grow better". When I had my tomato farm I always had the music blaring in the hot houses because I read that it works and the music is always playing here at home and blaring out into the garden. They do say that classical and jazz works better but not my favourite genre of music. Apparently a Japanese scientist did ground breaking research with water, providing proof that thoughts and feelings do in fact affect physical reality. Positive influences create positive effects. Since humans are over 50% water and plants are over 90% water (along with other great reasons). More positivity could help us all. Plus, when we sing or talk we exhale carbon dioxide which plants use to help grow so that helps too.

Another myth - peeing on the ground around lemon trees is good for it (in moderation) - I make the other half take is leak when he is outside and pee on all the citrus trees. Urine is high in nitrogen, phosphorous, potassium and other essential plant minerals that promote healthy growth! A natural and cheap fertiliser! Don't worry, urine is actually sterile so it is quite safe as long as those doing the peeing are healthy and not on any special medication or antibiotics.

Crushed egg shells is another myth and old wives tales that I have been using for ages. Egg shells are filled with calcium, which can benefit our plants and soils. I crush the egg shells and scatter around the plant when they are being planted, it helps deter snails and slugs because they don't like going over the grit.

Gathering herbs by the light of the moon. Some herbs, pollinated by moths, have their oils at night to attract night insects. So if you need it at its strongest, pick it at night.

Red sky at night, sailors delight. A red sky appears when dust and small particles are trapped in the atmosphere by high pressure. This scatters blue light leaving only red light to give the sky its notable appearance. A red sky at sunset means high pressure is moving in from the west, so therefore the next day will be dry and pleasant.

A good one is when you are stung by an insect such as a bee or wasp, grab an onion, cut a slice and rub it on the sting. In a few minutes the sting will be gone. I have used this old wives tale for years and it definitely works.

It's time for me to think about getting out into the garden.

we made after moving to our 100-acre property back in 2010. The opportunities for learning and broadening knowledge have shaped our journey with the land.

There is not a "one size fits all" approach when it comes to managing your land and I've enjoyed meeting a great network of people, experts and other landowners, and discovering our own methods for our property.

Our Dyers Crossing LandCare group has enjoyed a couple of interesting field days during winter.

Back in July, we met at Sonja & Kevin's beautiful 2000-acre beef cattle property in Krambach.



We gained insights into the methods they have used to make decisions, understand weeds, observe animals, and manage pasture holistically, using *Allan Savory's* methods.

We learned about the nutrients and growing cycles of various grasses and weeds. Thank you Sonja & Kevin!

Recently, we met at Paperbach Farm, hosted by vegetable farmers Bec & Dan. Some of you may know them from their veggie stall at Nabiac Farmers' Market.



We learned about various methods they were using.

Insights included: growing comfrey to make compost tea, which is then added via the irrigation. Putting a small pool for the ducks

under each fruit tree in turn, then pouring it out onto the nearby tree and moving it along; great way to fertilize. Thank you Bec & Dan!

Upcoming field days: I'm excited to be attending the field day on drought resilient farming at Yeo Farm in Bulahdelah in September. (I think it's booked up – but head to Limestone Permaculture's website and find this event there.)

I am hosting a workshop with Greg Burch "The Soil Connection", on Sunday 15th September. We'll look at natural methods to improve our health, through the health of our soil, plants and animals. 
