Nabiac Library will be offering another Tech Savvy Seniors One-on - One workshop sessions on Tuesday $22^{\rm nd}$ October.


Sessions available to book will be: 2:30-3:00pm, 3:00-3:30pm, 3:45-4:15pm and 4:15-4:45pm.


This free one-on-one session will be tailored to your individual need, helping you gain confidence and navigate the jargon of new technology.

This month's Nabiac Library focus is on our Australian section of the Library. We hope you may like to explore some of these fascinating insights into our geography, history and culture available in our local library.


A fascinating history of our NSW coast extending from Eden to Byron Bay, including all the waterways and inlets and their



Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade – believe it or not –

has no control over the weather, whether we have a no fire rating day, a high fire rating day or even a day of total fire ban. We are just like the rest of the community. We have to take what comes along. That's why we need to have a good understanding of what's what. What conditions are likely to produce what outcomes, and how we can best manage those outcomes.

Spring has sprung, the grass has ris, It's a sign!! It's a sign to know what this is.

It's a sign that you need to become familiar with. You need to understand it. You need to know where to find these signs. You need to



have a *written* Bush Fire Survival Plan that has taken into consideration every one of the Ratings on this sign. There are four simple steps to developing or updating your Survival Plan.

- **Discuss** what to do if a bush fire threatens your home.
- Prepare your home and get it ready for bush fire season.
- ♦ Know the bush fire alert levels.
- Keep all the bush fire information numbers, websites and smart phone Apps handy.

The recent NSW RFS Get Ready Campaign was the ideal time to become more familiar with all the above and to get some help to prepare your Survival Plan. Unfortunately the repairs being carried out on our Fire Station, meant we weren't in a position to hold our community information day on the main Get Ready Weekend. The Bush Fire Danger Period in the Mid Coast District commenced on 1st September, 2024.

Fire Permits are required from that date.

You can now apply for a free permit online via the NSW RFS website.

Go to rfs.nsw.gov.au/fire-information/BFDP



By following the links, you can start the application process which will notify your local Fire Permit Officer (FPO) of your intention to burn. Or, you can call your FPO directly if you know who they are and have their contact number. If you aren't sure who to contact, please call the Mid Coast Fire Control Centre on 1300 643 262.

Spring is also the time many people make the most of the great conditions to plant, prune and prepare their gardens. Here's a few things to consider when making your choices for a spectacular garden with a reduced bush fire risk.

- Choose a species which is less fire prone than others. Australian
 Natives have a high oil content, and while they are spectacular in
 the garden, they are also very spectacular when they are on fire.
- Keep trees and shrubs away from the house and ensure the lower branches are regularly pruned.
- Fire is less likely to take hold through a circular garden bed than long thin beds.
- If you are designing a completely new section of the yard, remember that paths can be useful for more than just walking on – they can be like mini firebreaks.
- Mulching has many benefits, but the down side is that mulches such as bark mulch and straw, are very fire friendly.
- Lawns should be low and luscious. Lizards thrive in long grass, and so does fire.

Jill provided our monthly thought which was "If your life was a story, would you enjoy reading it". Pam to supply October's thought.



TICK PREVENTION IS ESSENTIAL ALL YEAR IN THE MANNING VALLEY

In the Manning Valley, we consistently see cases of deadly tick paralysis in all twelve months of the year.

It is a myth that tick paralysis is only a problem in the hotter months. We commonly see cases of tick paralysis in pets whose preventative treatment has been forgotten or has deliberately lapsed, even if only by a week or less in some cases! It is heartbreaking when animals



are severely affected by a preventable disease. Many of our patients requires supplemental oxygen for 24-48 hours to survive. Our hospital has piped oxygen to all treatment areas, so we can maintain multiple tick patients from prolonged periods on oxygen therapy.

Tick paralysis is fatal if left untreated and unfortunately not all animals treated for tick paralysis can be saved, especially when they present to us late in the disease course with severe difficulty breathing. The treatment for tick paralysis reverses any tick toxin that remains in the bloodstream, but where the toxin has already bound to the animal's muscles, causing paralysis and breathing difficulties, in these cases the animals have to metabolise the toxin themselves – it cannot be reversed with tick antiserum - so it is very important to have your pet treated as soon as they show signs of paralysis (incoordination, weakness or wobbliness in the back legs) as this will neutralise any circulating toxin that is yet to bind and make the animal's symptoms worse. Early recognition of symptoms and treatment gives pets the best chance of survival. We often warn owners that patients tend to get a little bit worse before they get

better, even after treatment, so early Veterinary attention is critical.

Signs to look out for include:

This will be lifesaving for many dogs, because in this area it isn't <u>if</u> your dog will get a paralysis tick, it is <u>when</u>, and it can be very easy when life is busy to forget to keep their tick prevention up to date. The weeks can pass very quickly, even for the most diligent of pet owners.

The long-acting injection is suitable for administration to dogs and puppies from six months of age and takes 3 days to exert its full effect. Unfortunately, it is not yet available for cats, however there are some very effective preventatives available for cats such as Bravecto spot-on.

"There are no fees, men just pay for their meal and a drink once a month," says Dave Robinson, Regional Host for New England, Mid and Coffs Coast. "It's all about connection. Having deeper conversations as opposed to just pub or sports banter; creating a trusted place to get stuff off your chest; and making men's health and wellbeing a real priority."

There are three Tables close by for local men and all have seats available. "It's a great opportunity for men new to the area to meet people," says Hallidays Point member Tom Eckersley. "We're all from different backgrounds, some are retired, some aren't, but we're all interested in having some good conversations, developing a social network and providing support for one another."

Men join a Men's Table for all sorts of reasons - some are having a rough time and need somewhere to be able to talk without judgement, others are looking to widen their social circle, and some are transitioning through a change in life circumstances.

"It can be really helpful to hear other men are going through similar things and sometimes a bit of peer support can be powerful," explains Dave.

Health Action Group Calls for Service Upgrades

Bulahdelah, Forster and Gloucester health servicing needs were on the Manning Great Lakes Community Health Action Group's radar in talks held on Tuesday 27th August.

The Action Group Committee was invited to attend a meeting at Forster with members of the State Government's Select Panel whose brief is to investigate the recommendations brought down by the 2021 Inquiry into Health Service Access and Delivery in Rural, Regional and Remote NSW. The Panel is chaired by Dr Joe McGirr, the Independent Member for Wagga. Tanya Thompson, our local member for Myall Lakes and part of the Select Panel, was also in attendance.

"The meeting allowed us to demonstrate that our current crisis has deepened. Some time was devoted to providing suggestions to seek quick solutions to tide the community over in the meantime until the hospital redevelopment can be completed," action group President, Eddie Wood, explained.

Later in the day, the Committee met at Taree with Dr Ramsay Awad, Executive Director of Infrastructure, Planning and Sustainability of Hunter New England Local Health District, to discuss proposed content to the draft Clinical Services Plan for our area. That discussion included the provisioning of a Multi-Purpose Service at Bulahdelah and an Urgent Care Centre at Forster. Attention was also drawn to the reduced services provided at Gloucester Hospital.

"It was a very fruitful discussion where not only the issues surrounding service gaps at Taree and what needs to be included to remedy that situation, but also the needs of our neighbouring towns were highlighted," Mr Wood said. "We have been working closely with the Bulahdelah Committee and a plan of action to progress their cause is on the table," Mr Wood added. "It was a refreshing approach from the Hunter New England Local Health District to welcome community input."

For Stage 3 completion of the Manning Hospital Redevelopment to happen immediately after completion of Stage 2, that needs to be supported by a Clinical Services Plan that covers the service elements to be provided within the Stage 3 development.

"The health district is on board with us on that so it's crucial that the community and Mid Coast Council continue to support our efforts to push for the additional funds to be allocated in State Government budget appropriation for 2025-26 to fund Stage 3 completion," Mr Wood explained.

There is a focus on self-help skills and emotional regulation as these are the top requests of kindergarten

teachers relating to school readiness requirements. Numerous studies indicate that time spent in nature improves children's ability utilise calming techniques when faced with stressful situations. It promotes positive wellbeing, improves focus, impulse control and reduces dependence on electronic devices as children become more connected to the natural world. Nature connection builds self confidence, trust and empathy, which are also core values of the experienced facilitators, it's also a lot of fun!

I love beetroot and have enjoyed a good crop in the veggie patch this year. It has grown well amongst the flowers.


In September, I attended the Drought resilience field day at Yeo Farm which was packed with useful ideas and information.

Our Grey Ghosts have been on the road again!

"We leave for the Murray on Thursday" she said. "What?" So we did.

Two couples leave Nabiac, meeting three other couples on the way to Mildura for a 4 day trip on a 20metre houseboat.

Through the tunnel at Sydney which saves a lot of trouble but not sure about being charged about \$40, being the same rate as a semitrailer because of our van.

Camp the first night at Jugiong along with many others. Great place with lots of like minded folk but plenty of room, leave early and call at Gundagai to visit the truck Museum and plenty of horror stories of the old Hume Highway which was, in many ways, an embarrassment to be called as such. Call at Tarcutta and the truckies Honour Wall where those who are no longer with us are honoured. Very moving and so many young people lost in accidents.

Backtrack a bit and meet the Murrumbidgee for the first time on the Sturt Highway.

The headwaters of the Murrumbidgee (3rd longest river in the country at 1,458 kms) begin in the Snowy mountains around Cooma to where it meets the Murray near Balranald. In years past a very busy river as paddle wheelers travelled as far as Wagga Wagga some 1,200 kms from the Murray. This all came to an end, of course, with the construction of the railways in the early 1900's. Onto Darlington Point where we meet another couple and camp beside the Murrumbidgee.

Spring Fair here so spend some time (and \$). Not really looking forward to the 240 kms to Balranald via the Hay Plains, still following the river but it must be done. Whilst not boring the scenery changes with Hay the only town of significance on the trip.

Wild flowers are in abundance and the horizon seems a hundred kms away. Country is as flat as a plate, not a hill to be seen and covered with stunted saltbush less than a metre high with the occasional gidgee scrub perhaps 4m. Camp tonight at Balranald and a couple of hours will see us in Mildura on Sunday to board the houseboat on Monday.

Park the vans in a paid secure facility and meet at the houseboat business. Quick lesson to our two recruits how to avoid other craft and away we go. 20m long, 40 tons with a 2nd deck above where the hot tub sits and 5 self contained cabins, twin Mercury's on the back

and about 9kts. Doesn't sound much but it takes a while to respond to the helm so a lot of zig zagging going on.

Staggering at the number of similar craft, private and commercial and this is just one small section of the Murray's 2,500 kms length. Some enormous house boats here much larger than us but also in the \$10k per WEEK range.

The border between NSW and Victoria is the river with NSW "owning" the river and evidently includes some land on the Vic side, but all shared by many agreements.

Down river and we are shown how to navigate lock 11 by the boat owners rep. Most locks will accommodate boats about 40 m and raised (or lowered) about 4m.

South as far as Wentworth where the Darling meets the Murray. The Darling, nearly 1,500 kms long, was once trafficable as far as Bourke by paddle wheelers in years past.

Camp at night tied up at banks with suitable trees to anchor with.

Back upstream and do the lock thing on our own, Captain Garry doing a great job (but don't forget the deck crew), travel past our starting point at Mildura to Trentham winery for an expensive cheese platter. Down stream again and tie up for the night at the Gol Gol pub wharf and go ashore for our last night pub dinner. Windy here and had some calls from the business re our ability to handle the conditions as the boat is similar to a large sail and wants to follow the wind, but our captain saw us through although another boat tried several times to dock between us and another and bumped the other boat with minor damage.

Return our boat (un damaged) after doing some 110kms over some 4

The girls bought food beforehand and we had very little left on the last morning. Good housekeeping. Most slept in until the first up blew the warning horn (usually at 6.30) with the result some grumpy passengers for breakfast. Lot of fun with like minded folks.

Great trip, a lot of first time experiences and met a lot of interesting and nice fellow Australians. Recommend.

Welcome to Deb's Gardening

Since the weather has warmed up, I have been out in the garden and finally got parts of the garden under control and it didn't take me long at all. Life is so much easier when you have the right tools, a few hours on the whipper snipper and all the chickweed, radium and pimpernel weeds in the garden beds got cut down and that became my mulch. The faithful hedger made light work of the row of red hot pokers and camellias. The chainsaw sawed through the Hibiscus easily, which made the other half happy to see them go. I just had to get down on my knees and weed around a few plants and I was done. I have even been to the nursery and bought a few perennial plants to replace the hibiscus and plants that the builders trod on and killed. (Perennials are characterised by their ability to live and bloom for more than 2 years. They may die back or not, but the plants lives on to flower year after year).

The vegetable garden is ready to plant; I have pulled out most of the broccoli and cauliflower. The peas have been turned into the soil, compost, blood and bone and organic life pellets have been added and the beds are mulched. The tomatoes and capsicums are planted and protected with mulch. I am waiting a few more weeks to sow the corn, zucchini, pumpkin, watermelon and cucumber. The weather even though we have had warm days and nights, spring is unpredictable and a cold snap could happen so October is when I like to sow the seeds as they prefer a warm soil and there is a better chance for the seeds to germinate and less chance of a frost.

Other parts of the garden are still, what I will call in disaster mode - two big trenches have been dug from the house straight through some of the garden beds into the orchard to accommodate pipe works to a new tank and the new septic system that had to be installed. Hence losing more plants, fruit trees, steps that I put in, and leaving mounds of dirt everywhere. I wasn't prepared to see so much earth works that I keep repeating to myself "no mess, no progress" to keep me sane. I took photos of the garden of what it looks like today with all the trenches and mounds of dirt and posted them to my children as they love my garden. My daughter made the

comment "just as well you love to garden mum'.

The one benefit that has come out having the trenches dug is that my other half has been installing taps all throughout the garden. There are taps everywhere, so now to water the lawns in dry times I just need to have short hoses and sprinkler heads and both the garden beds and lawn will be getting watered at the same time. The other half had to drag big irrigation pipes and set up jet irrigation sprays that would hit the road and hit the house which was leaving water stains as we use dam water to water the garden. I won't need to rely on the other half to set up the irrigation to water the lawn any more.

Where building materials have been left on the ground, (and since removed) which smothered the lawn, all that has grown back is bindii, so much in fact that it will take me a month of Sundays to remove by hand which I have done in the past, and since time is of an essence at the moment I will be bringing out the big gun, and I don't mean Round-up. Studies show that direct contact with Roundup or glyphosate may cause health issues, including a greater risk of developing cancer called non- Hodgkin lymphoma, and other illnesses such as celiac disease, leaky-gut syndrome, even autism. Glyphosate is also reported to be acutely toxic to fish and birds and can kill beneficial insects and soil organisms that maintain ecological balance. It can also disrupt bee navigation. Homemade sprays work just as effectively and for me more environmentally friendly.

There are homemade and natural alternatives for herbicide that I use in the garden when the need arises and it's not very often that I need to use them but when I do they are so simple to make and just as effective.

Baking Soda - it is an incredible weed killer. Baking soda will suck the water of the weeds, causing the plant tissue to dry up and eventually die. I use it sometimes to sprinkle over pathways to the kill the weeds

Boiled water—Simply pour boiled water over the areas with heavy growth, and in between pavement cracks. The hot water may not always go to the roots but it dries up the weeds and the next day the weeds are dead.
































Vinegar + salt + detergent - This recipe is what I will be using on the bindii. Mix 2 parts Epsom salt, 1 part white vinegar and a tablespoon of dishwashing liquid. The dish soap acts as a surfactant that reduces surface tension, letting the solution bead on the leaves instead of getting absorbed by the plant.

Vinegar is an inexpensive natural weed killer and any vinegar that contains 5% acetic acid can be used as the acetic acid is the active ingredient that breaks down the weeds cell wall and removes moisture. I simple mix it up and use a spray bottle. This herbicide recipe is most effective when you apply it on a sunny day or when there is direct sunlight. It will also kill grass and other plants, so if you do use this recipe only spray directly on the weeds.

Once the bindii have died and now that the weather is warmed up I will heavily sow the patch with lawn seed, keep the soil moist and soon enough I will have a lawn back.

NEW IN-HOME URGENT CARE SERVICE FOR AGED CARE RESIDENTS IN TAREE



Those living in Residential Aged Care Facilities (RACFs) in Taree, and surrounding areas will now have access to more personalised and timely healthcare thanks to a new Residential Aged Care (RAC) In-reach team.

Member for Myall Lakes Tanya Thompson said the service will bring expert care from a team of nurses, geriatricians, medical officers and physiotherapists directly to residents, reducing the need for hospital visits.

"I have been sounding the alarm about the stress and pressure the Manning Hospital and Myall Lakes health system is under especially after a concerning increase in emergency department presentations in the recent BHI data," said Mrs Thompson.

"The new RAC In-reach team is a step in the right direction to reduce the demand on emergency departments and ensure older members of our community can receive timely and personalised care in the comfort of their own home,

"With an aging population in the Myall Lakes, services like this are so important for better healthcare outcomes."

Available at no cost to patients, the service operates from 8am to 4pm, seven days a week, and will cover 65 RACFs across the region by November 2024.

The Cedar Party Creek Bridge detour will open at 5am on Monday 23 September, with the current bridge closing to traffic to allow work to begin on its replacement.

During construction of the new bridge over Cedar Party Creek at Wingham, the intersection of Wingham Road, Wynter and Combined Streets will be closed, and bridge traffic will follow a detour over a low-level bypass to the west of the current bridge.

The bypass will be open at all times unless water levels make it unsafe. If the bypass is closed due to flooding, flashing light signage will alert motorists. Temporary turnaround bays will be provided either side of the bypass to allow vehicles to turn around. If the bypass is closed, motorists will be required to use alternate routes, including Tinonee Road, Gloucester Road, and The Bucketts Way.

The bypass has been designed for vehicles up to 12.5m, with checking vehicles, semi-trailers, and B-doubles, able to pass each other by keeping left. Council will monitor the situation and impose restrictions on semi-trailer and B-double usage if circumstances require it.

The new bridge will bring many benefits to the Wingham community and commuters alike. It will be elevated to meet or exceed the 100-year flood level, and will provide a safer, more comfortable ride across Cedar Party Creek and into the town of Wingham. The project also includes a new roundabout at the Wingham Road, Wynter and Combined Streets intersection, which will allow for better traffic flow in the area.

"As the gateway to Wingham, the bridge is a vital regional road connecting communities and supporting local industry," said Mid-Coast Council's Director Infrastructure and Engineering Services, Robert Scott.

"We know the temporary lack of pedestrian access will cause an inconvenience for some in the community. Unfortunately, the bypass is not safe for foot traffic, and we don't have the budget to construct a temporary pedestrian crossing."

MidCoast Council manages the second-largest road network in NSW. With a relatively small rate-paying population across the area, the transport asset budget is stretched.

Road users should expect changed traffic conditions and are encouraged to slow down and take extra care when driving in or near the construction area.

CREAMY CHICKEN & SWEET POTATO BAKE

A quick and easy meal

INGREDIENTS

1 kg Sweet potatoes, peeled, cut into 5mm slices

300ml Crème Fraiche
125ml Cooking Cream
2 Garlic cloves, crushed
1 tbsp Chopped fresh tarragon
200g BBQ Chicken meat, shredded
Green Shallots, chopped
105q Cheddar Cheese, grated

METHOD

Preheat oven to 200c (180c fan forced). Place the sweet potato in a large microwave safe bowl with 1/4 cup water. Cover with two sheets of plastic wrap and cook in the microwave on Hight for 8 minutes or until tender. Drain and set aside.

Meanwhile, lightly grease a 6cm high, $30 \times 20 \text{ cm}$ (base measurements) baking dish.

Combine the crème fraiche, cooking cream, garlic and tarragon in a jug. Season with salt and pepper.

Layer the sweet potato, chicken, shallots and 80g (1 cup) of the cheese in the prepared dish, pouring a little of the cream mixture between each layer. Pour the remaining cream mixture over the top. Scatter over the remaining cheese and bake for 30 - 35 minutes or until golden and the cheese is melted and bubbling. Set aside for 10 minutes before serving

A wife's eulogy at her husband's funeral:


"Norman needed a blood transfusion, but his blood type was not on record, so the doctors asked me if I knew what it was.



Father's Blessing

Have you been excited to discover the story behind a name you've known for ages? This was my experience after reading about George Cadbury. As a child the name Cadbury Bourneville cocoa meant a warm drink or something for cooking - I can still see the packet in the pantry. The story is that in the 1800's George Cadbury and his brother took over their father's failing enterprise and built the Cadbury chocolate business. George decided to build a new and better factory for his workers so moved to a rural site and, calling it Bourneville, built more than 300 homes, plus playgrounds, schools and churches. His workers were 'paid good wages and offered medical care' and improved conditions. This was the opposite to the usual factories of Victorian England which had 'high fatalities' and people living in poverty.

This came about because of his Quaker faith. Imagine how things could be different if God was in charge of our neighbourhoods and workplaces ... as in the Lords Prayer, 'Your Kingdom come, Your will be done' ... when He is, people flourish.

We recently celebrated Fathers Day. This began as a Christian holiday with the Coptic Church celebrating fatherhood from the fifth century on St Joseph's Day. The Catholic Church did the same from the 14th century. At the present time when the value of fatherhood is often diminished it's great to remember the value of fathers to their children. In Australia today 'close to one million children go to sleep without their father in the house' ... this is sobering and makes me cry. The cure for fatherlessness is ... 'intentional fathers simply showing up and getting involved'.

We need strong dads a child's idea of God comes from their father's influence. Our earthly fathers are an imperfect



representation of our Heavenly Father, they have been tasked with modelling the love, care, nurture and discipline of God! Often fathers (and mothers) do not see the results of their labour in this lifetime, some do not fulfil their task but this doesn't change God's plans. *Psalm 103:13* says a father's compassion on his children is like the Lord's compassion on those who fear Him. A father disciplines 'the son in whom he delights', *Proverbs 3:12*.

Fathers are blessed to be a blessing to their children. In the Old Testament fathers intentionally blessed their sons before they died ... eg. in *Genesis 27: 27-29* Isaac's blessing to Jacob included 'dew from heaven, fertile fields ... he was a farmer ... and respect from his relatives' as well as the words 'May those who bless you be blessed'. The blessing included laying hands on the child, a kiss and embrace of acceptance ... and praying for their success in life.

There is **A Fathers Blessing** which a father can use to bless his children ... it says among other things, You are special, you are a gift from God, I am proud of you, I rejoice over you.

Just as George Cadbury saw the need for help to families, organisations like Dads4Kids promote fatherhood and help men who might find fatherhood difficult. Their goal is 'to turn the tide of fatherlessness and focus on harm prevention'.

Even if your father was not a positive role model, God still wants to be your Heavenly Father, 1 John 3;1. On November19th the world will celebrate International Men's Day, but God can be your Father every day.


