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
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MINIMBAH MATTERS




The monthly mediation took place on the 28th November and it looks like Yoga may well be a regular at the gallery too.

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

report. A number of payments were ratified including CWA Levy, Hall Hire, End of Year school Presentation prized to Nabiac, Krambach and Coolongolook PS, and 2025 Wallamba Show prizes.

Handicraft Officer Merle thanked everyone for some great pincushions for the Group handicraft project but said more would be welcome. Thanks also to member Jill for a lovely rug to go into the over 80's class and hope that Margaret might also have some knitting as well. The 8 items for group was also discussed and Merle is hoping for a good showing in the competition.

This year's featured topics in the Agriculture and Environment Segment is FROGS, and Jill showed off a book from the local library which gave some interesting facts on them including the fact that frog's eardrums are on the outside of their head - they are the bumps behind the eyes and that each frog has it's own unique frog call. Beth gave an overview of the symbolism of frogs, many cultures have long considered frogs to be good luck symbols. Frogs have been around for a long time and have survived multiple extinctions and some massive changes to conditions over a few hundred million years on earth. They are an amphibians which comes from the Greek term for two lives. Beth ended her presentation by saying that if a frog lives in your area, then it means that there is a healthy balance of life because these other insects are also present – they eat living things.

Margaret hadn't realized she was elected as Cookery Officer and didn't have a report. Our great cook Jean brought along an article on processor cakes to share with members and are ideal for people who want to speed up the normal mixing process. The recipes used a metal mixing blade and had a few varieties to try, lemon ginger cake, coffee and walnut cake, honey gingerbread and fairy cakes.

Pam gave her first international report on our new country of Study, South Korea, and the information came from and old encyclopaedia giving some details on the area, the name being a corruption of Korya, the name given to a Korean Kingdom that flourish from 935AD until 1392. South Korea is known as Han Look – Land of the Morning Calm and North Korea is Chosun. The main religions are Buddhism, Confucianism and Taoism. The South Korean capital is Seoul and the chief seaports are Busan and Inchon with South. Korea having over





5,541 klms of railway and more than 635 klms of roads.

Jill gave us some culture with a newspaper article to share with members "Why I'm a fan of the cuddle cap"

Nabiac Landcare

The Nabiac Landcare team is continuing to do weed control in the Lilypilly Bend reserve. The two objectives at the moment are to continue the control of camphor laurels and larger privets by drill and poison and the hand removal of smaller weeds at the Stewart Street end of the reserve and a follow-up patrol along Woosters Creek.

We are concentrating on hand removal of Crofton weed before it flowers and sets seed. Crofton weed (Ageratina adenophora) has become a major issue along the creek following our mild, wet winter. It rapidly forms dense mats that smother any smaller native ground covers and grasses such as basket grass (Oplismenus spps). We are choosing not to spray Crofton weed because with the concentrations needed for effect control the risk of damage to surrounding plants is high.

We have also been monitoring the spread of the smut fungus we introduced to the reserves with the help of the CSIRO to control white flowered trad aka wandering jew (Tradenscantia fluminensis). In some area the smut has been very effective. The trad looks sick and is allowing other more favourable species to spread. In other areas results are not so good.

Walking through infected area and then into healthy infestations may help its spread. Sort of reverse biosecurity measures.

My weed for the month is **broad leaf privet** (Ligustrum lucidus). This garden escapee is a rather attractive small tree until you have to smell its flowers or deal with it in the bush. It has creamy flowers in terminal sprays followed by blue-black berries that are attractive to the birds that help spread it. At the moment it is highly visible on the left as you approach the Martin Bridge going into Taree and in surrounding gardens from the top Aldi car park. Check out Weedwise for control. NSW WeedWise

We'll be taking our summer break soon and returning to the bush around Nabiac in early February. Consider adding 'join Nabiac Landcare' to your New Years resolution list.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. Most of all enjoy a walk in the local bush!







Giving Gifts

Toward the end of the 18th century the practice of giving gifts to family members became well established. Theologically, the feast day reminded Christians of God's gift of Jesus to humankind even as the coming of the Wise Men, or Magi, to Bethlehem suggested that Christmas was somehow related to giving gifts. The practice of giving gifts, which goes back to the 15th century, contributed to the view that Christmas was a secular holiday focused on family and friends. This was one reason why Puritans in Old and New

Price Increase of clothing as of 1st January 2025

I would like to advise all our loyal customers of an upcoming price increase for clothing at Nabiac Op Shop.

The Op Shop hasn't had a price increase for at least 8 years.

The time has come to make some small increases.

This is mainly due to increasing insurance and other costs.

We will still be the best and cheapest Op Shop in the area.




Still the scholars pass before me with their freckled features grave With a nickname fitting better than the name their mother's gave.

All sorts of interesting stuff to check out and the kid's love it as well. Be there.


Included in the mix is a Penny-farthing bicycle, an Austral stationary engine and a beautiful old Chevrolet car.



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Welcome to Deb's Gardening

e are now in the 11th month of a major renovation and the best thing about it is, (not including the fact that there will be a beautiful liveable house that I have dreamed about having at the end of it all, because I have lived in sheds and humpies most of my adult life. And this house, prior to the renovation, required umbrellas up and buckets around the house on raining days and watching the mouse scurry across the floors and listening to them having parties in the roof) the amount of plain cardboard boxes that you get. What a blessing they are and they are all being used in the garden. Since the reno has taking over my life, and yes I am still painting, the weeds were always getting on top of me but now down goes the cardboard boxes on top of the weeds. I have even gotten my new toy out, filling it up with mulch and then driving it around covering the boxes with the mulch, wallah, no more weeds. With all this rain it is the perfect time to do it as well with the soil nice and moist. I did go around prior to putting down the cardboard with fertiliser using pellets of organic life and blood and bone. I still haven't finished yet but there are still plenty of boxes waiting for me to continue.

The poor vegetable garden doesn't get much attention, thank goodness for self sowing. I let celery go to seed and now I am picking celery that has germinated throughout the vegetable garden. I also let a big zucchini, that I didn't pick last year, rot down in a garden bed. It has now germinated and I have 4 plants that looked like I planted them this season and I am picking them already. Beans that have self sown from last season and are now starting to climb the fence. Lettuce that I let go to seed and I noticed are germinating everywhere. Warrigal spinach germinating everywhere: Capsicum that are in their second season that I didn't cut back, which I should have, have fruit all over them. The Richmond green cucumbers, which were prolific last year, rotted down and looks like they will be prolific again this year. It pays to buy heritage seeds and let a few plants go to seed; you are always guaranteed to have true to form plants when they germinate the next season, and I didn't do a thing so I will be picking some vegetables this season. I have packets of corn, sunflowers, watermelon, Lebanese cucumbers, beetroot and carrot seeds waiting patiently for me to sow. It's on my to do list and I better do it soon especially with summer just around the corner.

The garlic is ready to harvest and waiting for me to dig up but the soil is so wet. It is better to have a dryer soil to dig up garlic. I make a long garlic plat and hang it up in a cool dry area. I have organically



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grown garlic that lasts the whole year. What is left over is next season's crop. The garlic lets me know when it is time to plant, as they start to sprout.

I did make sure I planted tomatoes at the start of the season and I have them netted with a good strong net to keep fruit fly and grubs out and already I am starting to pick cherry tomatoes. If there is one thing I make sure I do and that is to give the tomato and capsicum plants a dose of my home brew, which is weeds soaked in water and Seasol every three weeks. Tomatoes and capsicums are heavy feeders and do well with an extra dose of fertiliser throughout the growing season. There is plenty of fruit on the plants already and hopefully I have my new kitchen ready in a few weeks and I will be back making pickles and chutneys.

We have an outdoor dunny, that is set up close to the house, which we have had to use throughout the renovation; there are hoses and pipes surrounding it to flush, and it is impossible to mow. Hence the grass is growing tall around it and the old septic system. Our faith full Kelpie was sniffing there the other day and curled up amongst the long grass was a red belly black snake. Snakes don't worry me, it's rats and mice that do; snakes eat rats and mice so more snakes the better. Though I was a bit concerned it was too close to the house. So I now try to whipper snip more often around the house to keep the snakes away. Who knows what other snakes are curled up around the house hiding under building material.

I have a favourite plant, the hydrangea. I got given a dark pink hydrangea when I started my garden about 7 years ago and planted it close to the water tank. I bought another and planted it next to it with the thought of surrounding both tanks with a row of hydrangeas. I required 6 plants per tank, which worked out to cost a bit, so I thought idiot, propagate them. So I took heaps of cutting from the original plant about 3 years ago and now my water tanks are full of beautiful hydrangeas. The interesting thing is that there are different soil types at each tank. One tank the blooms are now purple and blue and the heads are on the small size. The other tank the blooms are very pale pink with a hint of blue with very large heads.

The pH of the soil in which a hydrangea is planted affects the colour of its blooms:

Blue flowers: Hydrangeas produce blue flowers in acidic soil with a pH of 5.5 or lower. In acidic soil, aluminium is more available to the roots, which results in blue flowers.

Pink flowers: Hydrangeas produce pink flowers in neutral to alkaline soils with a pH of 6.5 or higher. In alkaline soil, aluminium availability decreases, which results in pink flowers.

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Purple flowers: Hydrangeas produce purple flowers in soil with a pH between 5.5 and 6.5.

Lower the pH

To encourage blue flowers, you can lower the pH of your soil by adding soil acidifier, an acidic organic mulch like pine needles or pine bark, or other soil amendments like potting mix, peat moss, perlite, compost, or manure.

Raise the pH

To encourage pink flowers, you can raise the pH of your soil by adding dolomitic lime or garden lime.

I have been hoping that the renovation would be finished by Christmas but it doesn't look like that will happen, close but not close enough. My family will be here for Christmas as the new deck is almost finished; I just have to paint it. And I will be cooking out of my new kitchen so lots to celebrate. I wish you all a very merry Christmas, stay safe and I hope all your dreams have come true, like mine

The best of all gifts around any Christmas tree - the presence of a happy family all wrapped up in each other.

Lyn's Larder

With Cherries in season this is a simple tart to make for Christmas (not sure if I have put this in before, but it is a Christmas bake!)

CLAFOUTIS

INGREDIENTS

1½ cups Milk
2 Eggs
1 cup Plain Flour
½ cup Castor Sugar
2 cups Dark Red Cherries

60g Butter 11/4 cups Cream

METHOD

- Make a smooth batter of the milk, eggs flour and ¼ cup of castor sugar. Add 30g melted butter and mix at a low speed with an electric blender or beat well., Set aside in the refrigerator.
- 2. Wash, stem and pit the cherries. Grease a 24cm (9½ in) shallow ovenproof dish with 30g of butter. Sprinkle the cherries with remaining castor sugar, mix and spread over the pie plate. Pour batter over the cherries
- Bake in a preheated hot oven for about 30 minutes, reducing heat to moderately slow for the last 10 minutes if necessary to prevent browning

Serve at once, sprinkled with castor sugar and accompanied by cream

SPICED CHRISTMAS COOKIES

INGREDIENTS

1cup Plain Flour ½cup Brown Sugar 1tsp Cinnamon ½tsp Mixed Spice

75g Unsalted Butter, chopped

¼ cup Golden Syrup

Pkt White Chocolate Writing Fudge for decorating

METHOD

- 1 Line 2 baking trays with non stick baking paper.
- 2 Sift flour, sugar and spices into a large bowl.

ROAST PORK WITH ROCKET, PINE NUT & FETTA STUFF-ING

(A change from Turkey and who can pass up good crackle?)

INGREDIENTS

11/2 cups Fresh White Breadcrumbs

1 pkt Rocket, trimmed & chopped (from supermarket)

50g Toasted Pine nuts

South Coast Persian Fetta, drained (oil & garlic reserved!)

Egg, lightly beaten

2kg Fresh rolled Pork loin roast

1tbsp Olive oil 2tbsp Salt

METHOD

- 1. Preheat oven to 230°C 210°C fan
- Combine breadcrumbs, rocket and pine nuts in a large bowl. Chop the reserved garlic from the jar of fetta and add to breadcrumbs with fetta, reserved fetta oil and egg. Mix well.
- 3. Remove pork from netting (if netted) and lay flat on a clean board, skin side up. Using a sharp knife, score skin. Turn pork over and pound to flatten slightly. Arrange stuffing down the middle of the pork. Fold pork over stuffing to form a log encasing the stuffing and tie up roll with kitchen string.
- 4. Drizzle with oil and rub in salt all over the skin. Place on a rack in a baking pan and bake for 30 minutes. Reduce heat to 200°C 18°C fan. Bake for another 1hr 1½hrs until cooked through.
- 5. Cover loosely with foil and rest for 15 minutes before slicing. Serve with apple and fig compote or just apple sauce.

Using fingertips, rub in butter until mixture resembles coarse breadcrumbs. Add golden syrup; and mix to form a soft dough. Turn onto a lightly floured surface and knead for 1-2 minutes until dough is smooth. Cover with plastic wrap and chill for 30 minutes

- 3 Preheat oven to 180°C or 160°c fan. Roll dough on a lightly floured surface until 5mm thick. Using cookie cutters, cut shapes from dough. Place on prepared trays allowing room for spreading. Chill for 10 min.
- 4 Bake for 10 min, until pale golden. Cool on trays, Store in airtight container. Decorate with writing fudge just before serving. Can be decorated with icing sugar mix when cool before storing.

How to Give CPR to Yourself....Try to remain calm, and REMEMBER THIS...A possible lifesaver

This comes from Dr. Patrick Teefy, Cardiology Head at the Nuclear Medicine Institute University Hospital, London, Ontario.

- 1. Let's say it's 7:25 pm and you're going home (alone of course) after an unusually hard day on the job.
- 2. You're really tired, upset and frustrated.
- 3. Suddenly you start experiencing severe pain in your chest that starts to drag out into your arm and up into your jaw. You are only about five km from the hospital nearest your home.
- 4. Unfortunately you don't know if you'll be able to make it that far.
- 5. You have been trained in CPR but the guy that taught the course did not tell you how to perform it on yourself.
- 6. HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK WHEN ALONE?

Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack without help, the person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness.

7. However, these victims can help themselves by *coughing* repeatedly and very vigorously.

A deep breath should be taken before each cough and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest.

A breath and a cough must be repeated **about every two seconds** without let-up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again

8. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it to regain a normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get help or to a hospital.

9. Tell as many other people as possible about this. It could save their lives!

10. A cardiologist says: "If everyone who gets this email and kindly sends it to 10 people, you can bet that we'll save at least one life.

I received it as an email some years ago, but if you scan it you can forward it to others.



CERVICAL SCREENING CHECKS SAVE LIVES

Tanya Thompson, Member for Myall Lakes and Shadow Assistant Minister for Regional Health is encouraging residents to ensure they are up to date with their Cervical Screening Tests, after it was revealed more than 40 per cent of eligible people are falling behind.

Mrs Thompson said the campaign launched by the Cancer Institute of NSW is an important and timely one to remind people to put their health first.

"Cervical cancer is one of the most preventable cancers, which is why I am encouraging our community to check and make sure you have had your latest checks," said Mrs Thompson.

"The shocking truth is that more than 70 per cent of cases occur in people who have never been screened or are not up to date with their cervical cancer screening, and that should serve as a big wakeup call for everyone.

"This quick and simple procedure could save a life; you don't need a specialist; a quick visit to your regular doctor is all it takes."

Shadow Minister for Regional Health Gurmesh Singh said a Cervical Screening Test is needed every five years.

"Cervical cancer kills one in every three Australians who are diagnosed with the disease, and the best way to avoid that is to keep up to date with your checks so it can be caught as early as possible," Mr Singh said.

"We all have busy lives and it's easy to let these things fall by the wayside, so let this be a chance to book in your next appointment and remind your loved ones to do the same.

"There are also options these days to either have your test done by a healthcare provider, or opt for a self-collection test, so you can choose what you are more comfortable with."

A Cervical Screening Test is recommended for eligible people aged 25 to 74 who have ever been sexually active, and is available at locations including medical centres, community health centres or sexual health clinics.

Boat ramp safety trial begins

Local boaties are reminded that the Little Street boat ramp safety trial begins this Sunday 1st December.



During December and January, only **non-**motorised watercraft may use the boat ramp during daylight hours.

This is to provide a safer launching facility for non-motorised craft. It will also improve safety near the swimming baths, amenities and boat shed cafe nearby.

Local boat shed operators and businesses have been consulted on the trial.

During summer, the area is very busy with foot traffic crossing the boat ramp.

The boat ramp is congested with vehicles launching boats and people using the ramp with kayaks and paddle boards. There is also limited parking in the nearby area for boats with trailers.

MidCoast Council rangers will monitor boat ramp operations during

The trial is a recommendation in the MidCoast Recreational Boating Infrastructure Plan. The Plan identifies that this area has restricted access for motorised watercraft during peak times. The aim is to allow safe pedestrian access around the amenities, café and baths.

Motorised craft users can access Wallis Lake boat ramps with larger parking facilities at:

- Forster Marina
- Tuncurry (Point Road)
- Elizabeth Reserve (Forster Keys)
- Pacific Palms (Recreation Club) and

Coomba Park foreshore.

An initial review of the trial will take place in March, 2025. Users of the facility will be able to provide feedback after the first part of the trial finishes on 31st January, 2025.

Beric will give a talk on Saturday 23rd November at 11am, where he will share his insights into the creative process. Come along and be inspired.


Sydney artist, *Laraine Deer*, is presenting her first exhibition in the MidCoast, titled *Landscapes from the Heart*.

Do we always appreciate the joy and significance of learning? ... Children might feel that school is good for seeing friends and playing sport. In poor countries, however, education is often considered by a child as a way to help their family out of poverty by achieving a personal goal such as becoming a doctor or nurse.

In past centuries education was often begun by Christians eg. -

- * Robert Raikes in Britain in 1780 who decided to give children a chance to read and write and learn about God. These children worked in squalor 6 days a week so he started a free school on Sunday, their day off, and called it Sunday School. Within fifty years there were '1.5 million children being taught by 160,000 volunteer teachers' with a vision to educate a generation ... now called one of the 'great educational volunteer triumphs of the world'.
- * St Cyril, the missionary who discovered the Slavic people had no alphabet so he created one for them, to enable them to read about Jesus in their own language. The alphabet is called Cyrillic, in his memory.

The Bible says the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, *Matthew 4:16* ... referring to Isaiah's prophecy about the coming of Jesus, which we celebrate at Christmas. Jesus is the source of enlightenment. Interestingly, the word 'university' began with those who believed that God created the universe, so His ways must be studied and known. The first universities were Christian, some still are. Martin Luther, while highlighting the New Testament, taught



that every person needs to be able to read and write 'so they can study the Scriptures' for themselves.

In America the first law calling for mass education in 1647 was aptly named 'The Old Deluder Satan Act' ... recognising Satan's goal of keeping us from knowing the bible; it's aim was stated that learning not be 'buried in the graves of our forefathers'. It's good to remember that God is the God of truth, and ignorance is the devil's tool. Many dictionaries, grammars and alphabets were assembled by missionaries ... can't imagine how they did this ... as well they discovered languages yet to be written. Translating the Bible continues to be an ongoing work of missionaries.

If you are literate it is hard to imagine life without reading and writing, literacy can be one of many blessings we enjoy. Many people live with a disability ... my daughter works with a blind person who is hearing impaired; she still does amazing things, like attend zoom meetings.

Christmas can be a time to count our blessings and remember the greatest of all blessings ... that immortal God became man by sending His son Jesus into the world to die for us, so we could become His children.

Have a blessed Christmas, remember the carols at Krambach on 21st.
