Nabiac Landcare

The Nabiac Landcare team is still on their summer break but we will be back in the local bush on the first Wednesday in February. I have a feeling that we might be taking it a bit slow for a few weeks....the recent rain plus heat will give us very muggy working conditions.

I haven't had a chance to get far into our reserves since the last bout of rain, wind and flood but I did notice some trees down and that Maderia Vine is growing at an alarming rate. Yes, it's a great season for weeds but also should give the plantings we did last year a great boost.

On the weed front, I have noticed some isolated patches of yellow showing up along our roads. I wasn't able to stop, but from the colour I would guess either some early flowering Easter cassia (Senna pendula var. glabrata) or Winter senna *aka* Arsenic bush (Senna septemtrionalis). I don't know why winter senna is called arsenic bush but it is considered to be toxic to livestock.


Now is also the time to control blackberry if you have a problem with it on your patch. I secretly admire it's ability to send out canes (up to several metres long) that root at the tips when they touch moist ground, hence, very rapidly cover a large amount of ground.



Blackberry isn't simple to control and is best attacked by a multi-pronged approach using both physical and chemical means. Consult NSWWeedwise NSW WeedWise for appropriate control measures. Birds and fruit eating animal spread the seed as well. They seem to have much more success accessing the berries than I do!

Whether you are a town gardener, have a small bush block or have serious agricultural pursuits be on the lookout for plants that you haven't seen before or weeds that have suddenly seemed to 'take-off'. The combination of drought (and fire) followed by successive wet seasons (with flooding), winters with fewer heavy frosts and a much wetter than average spring last year all contribute to allowing new problem weeds to emerge. Don't forget to identify before you 'exterminate' it could be a valuable native plant taking advantage of the conditions as well.

The Hunter Local Land Services (LLS) is offering a session on Brush and

Bush Management. Representatives from their 'Land Management, Private Native Forestry and Natural Capital teams will be available to answer questions and go through critical decision-making on what can and can't be done. Search for Hunter Local Land Services on Facebook for more information or contact *Julie Emerson* on 0477 954 302.

Nabiac Landcare normally works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by a very yummy morning tea. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear are supplied by Midcoast Council. Give us a ring if you are interested.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. Most of all enjoy a walk in the local bush!





Bovine Ephemeral Fever (BEF) Season Is Here



Bovine Ephemeral Fever (BEF), also known as "three-day sickness," is an infectious disease that affects cattle, causing fever, lameness, and general lethargy. In NSW, BEF typically occurs between January and April, coinciding with the peak mosquito activity. As an arbovirus, BEF is transmitted by biting insects, with mosquitoes being the primary vectors in this area. While BEF usually results in temporary illness lasting about 36 hours, it can have significant economic impacts, particularly in livestock production, leading to decreased milk production and, in some cases, abortion due to the high fever.



Although BEF can affect cattle of all ages, it is most commonly observed in animals between 1 and 5 years old. Bulls and fat cows tend to show more severe symptoms and may lose condition rapidly, taking longer to regain body

weight. Bulls may also experience temporary infertility lasting 3 to 6 months due to the high fever. In general, most cattle recover quickly and completely, but a small proportion may suffer long-term effects such as paralysis if they remain down for extended periods. In some particularly bad three-day sickness seasons, producers have lost multiple cattle to the illness. Cows that have had BEF in previous seasons often have immunity, which can last for several years or even for life, although older cattle may lose this immunity over time.

The main clinical signs of BEF include:

- High Fever: Often exceeding 40°C
- Lameness: Shifting lameness, generally affecting more than one leg due to joint and muscle pain. Heavily conditioned cattle may suffer more and may spend more time lying down.
- Reduced Appetite and weight loss
- Lethargy
- Nasal Discharge:

While there is no specific antiviral treatment for BEF, supportive management is crucial to avoid stock becoming recumbent for extended periods, as it can be difficult for them to recover once they are down for a long time. Supportive treatments may include:

- Anti-inflammatory and Pain Relief: A single dose of meloxicam can provide relief for up to 3 days.
- Nursing Care: For cattle that are down, nursing care is essential. This includes rolling the animals several times daily to prevent muscle and nerve damage, and provision of shade, food and water.

Vaccination is the most effective way to prevent BEF. Cattle can be vaccinated starting at 6 months of age, with an initial dose administered before the season begins. A booster dose is given between 2 weeks and 6 months after the first dose, with annual boosters to maintain immunity. Vaccination programs are typically timed to coincide with the onset of the season, ensuring cattle are protected before mosquito activity peaks. Ideally, farmers should have already commenced vaccinating valuable stock to protect them against BEF - especially Bulls. We are currently placing orders for BEF vaccine. 



DISASTER RECOVERY SUPPORT EXTENDED TO THE MID COAST REGION



Tanya Thompson, Member for Myall Lakes has announced that residents in the Mid Coast Local Government Area (LGA), affected by the severe thunderstorms and intense rainfall from 15th January 2025, can now access disaster recovery support. This follows the inclusion of the Mid Coast LGA in the expanded Natural Disaster Declaration.

The announcement brings relief to the Mid Coast community, ensuring access to assistance measures under the Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA). These measures include:

- Support for eligible residents to help meet immediate needs like emergency accommodation.
- Grants for low income, uninsured residents to replace lost essential household items to maintain a basic standard of living.
- Grants for low income, uninsured residents to undertake essential structural repairs to restore their homes to a safe and habitable condition.
- Support for affected local councils and other agencies to help with the costs of cleaning up, keeping the community safe and restoring damaged essential public assets.
- Concessional interest rate loans for small businesses, primary producers, and non-profit organisations and grants to sporting and recreation clubs to repair or replace damaged or destroyed property.
- Freight subsidies for primary producers to help transport livestock and fodder.

Mrs Thompson advocated for the inclusion of the Mid Coast region in the expanded declaration.

"Severe storms can have devastating impacts, on homes, businesses, and our communities.

"Ensuring the Mid Coast was included in this disaster recovery declaration was essential to provide our residents and council with the resources they need to get back on their feet.

"I encourage those impacted to explore the available support and reach out for assistance," said Mrs Thompson.

ANOTHER STEP CLOSER ON STAGE TWO REDEVELOPMENT OF MANNING BASE HOSPITAL

Tanya Thompson, Member for Myall Lakes, is pleased to announce that the detailed design for Stage 2 of the Manning Base Hospital Redevelopment has been completed. The Review of Environmental Factors (REF) for the initial demolition works is now on public exhibition until midnight on Monday, 17th February 2025.

"The enabling works, which involve the demolition of the administration building, facility management unit, mortuary, and old fever ward, along with the relocation of two bulk oxygen tanks, are an exciting first step towards the construction of a new and improved hospital for our community," said Mrs Thompson.

These essential works will prepare for improved inpatient accommodation and better connectivity across the hospital campus, ensuring that the Manning Base Hospital meets the growing needs of the Myall Lakes Electorate.

"The community has been eagerly anticipating this redevelopment, as have I. This step provides further certainty that the project is moving forward," Mrs Thompson added.

The redevelopment project, part of the \$180 million Lower Mid North Coast Health Service project, is designed to enhance health services across the region, including the Forster-Tuncurry health facility. Mrs Thompson has requested a meeting with Minister Park in early February to discuss updates on the Forster site.

"The planning and design stages, though time-consuming, are critical in ensuring the redevelopment is tailored to our community's unique needs," Mrs Thompson explained.

"As the works are being conducted on the existing hospital site, it is important to stage them in a way that does not compromise the daily operations of our hard working staff and clinicians."

Community engagement is a crucial part of the process. Feedback received during the public exhibition period will be instrumental in finalising the design details before demolition works commence later this year.

"I encourage all residents to review the Review of Environmental Factors and share their feedback. This is an opportunity for the community to have their voices heard and contribute to the shaping of our future health services," said Mrs Thompson.

PETITION PRESSURE TO SAVE REGIONAL RAIL JOBS

The NSW Nationals has launched a petition to stop the Minns Labor Government from axing the state's only regional rail service provider along with more than 100 jobs.

The decision is part of the latest wage offer made to the Rail Tram & Bus Union (RTBU) and would provide an additional one per cent increase to Sydney train drivers.

Member for Myall Lakes, Tanya Thompson said there's no clarity around what impact the merging of NSW Trains and Sydney Trains will have on the community.

"This offer will mean direct job losses, and it will be non-union members and people in the regions who will be targeted, not union members in the city," Mrs Thompson said

"These workers are going home to their families not knowing if they will still have a job, so we need as many people as possible to sign this petition, to let the Government know this is simply not acceptable.

"Our residents deserve certainty and stability like everybody else. They deserve the right to be able to put food on the table and to not have their livelihoods taken away as collateral damage."

Shadow Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Dave Layzell said the Premier and his Ministers have completely lost control of the negotiations, and the regions shouldn't have to pay the price

"Our rail network operates very differently than what happens in the city and NSW Trains plays an important role in ensuring it runs smoothly," Mr Layzell said.

"Labor created this industrial chaos and getting rid of yet another dedicated regional department and dozens of jobs is not the way to solve things

"I also want to know where the Minister for Regional Transport and Roads is in all of this, and why she isn't standing up for the jobs of regional workers like she should be."

GARIBALDI BISCUITS

I hear them mentioned on English TV shows and have never know what they were & found this recipe. Haven't tried it yet, but!

INGREDIENTS

110 g Dried Currants 2 tbsp Brandy 1½ cups Plain Flour ½ cup Caster Sugar

80g Cold, unsalted Butter, chopped

80 ml Milk (approximately)
1 tsp Ground Cinnamon
1 Egg, lightly beaten

METHOD

- Combine currants and brandy in a small bowl; stand 30 minutes. Drain, discard the brandy.
- Meanwhile, sift flour and half the sugar into medium bowl; rub in butter until mixture is crumbly. Stir in enough milk to make a firm dough. Turn dough onto a floured surface; knead gently until smooth. Wrap in plastic and refrigerate for 30 minutes.
- 3. Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F. Grease an oven tray
- 4. Combine remaining sugar and cinnamon in a small bowl.
- 5. Divide the dough in half. Roll one half between sheets of baking paper until 20cm x 30cm (8" x 12") rectangle; place on oven tray. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons of cinnamon sugar and currants. Roll remaining dough to the same size as first half of dough and place on top of currants.
- Using a rolling pin, roll slice while on tray until 5 mm (¼ inch) thick; trim edges. Mark into 24 rectangles. Brush top with egg; sprinkle with remaining cinnamon sugar.
- Bake about 25 minutes; stand 5 minutes. Using a sharp knife, cut int biscuits along marked lines.



Welcome to Deb's Gardening

I have always noticed that when the grey gums start to turn orange we are in for a lot of rain, and rain it did. It has been an interesting summer so far, the cicadas started the season off being that loud that I needed ear muffs to venture outside. The frogs have been croaking all night long most nights. It was hot and dry at the start of the season and now very wet and I was even cold for a few days last week. Not to forget to mention the monolepta beetle being in plague proportions.

I read that in both cases the cicadas and the monolepta beetle had the perfect weather conditions in recent years, such as warmer temperatures and increased humidity, which may have created ideal breeding conditions. In early December a swarm of monolepta beetle destroyed an orchard in Bootawa, lucky for me they only destroyed the flowers on my hibiscus tree and crepe myrtle.

One very windy day I looked out the window to my new finally renovated and freshly painted alfresco area wondering what was darkening my ceiling and going outside to investigate, looked up to plaque proportion monolepta beetles hiding from the wind. I am not one for using harsh chemicals or sprays but I had a can of fly spray in the cupboard and gave them a good spray. The perfect place to kill them! My other half saw them destroying the flowers on the hibiscus and wanted to buy a can of flea bomb to put under the tree but I showed him the little wrens and bees all around the tree that are beneficial to the garden so I wouldn't let him. There are still many around - now my grandchildren entertain themselves going around the garden with the fly swats, swatting them, as there are still many about.

As it is school holidays and I have had the grandkiddies for the holidays, one of our activities is searching for beneficial insects that they cannot harm, such as -

Lacewing: These nocturnal insects search for unsuspecting prey such as small grubs, aphids and mealybugs (amongst others) during the night. This is most distinguished by their large eyes which allow them excellent night vision. During the early morning and throughout the

day they can be encountered resting underneath densely foliaged plants such as hibiscus. Although they have large wings, they are weak flyers and can only manage to fly a few metres before requiring rest. They, in turn, are easily predated by small birds and reptiles if they move around too often during the day. Their young larvae, however, are wonderful daytime predators feasting on most small insects that plague roses and vegetables. They have the amazing ability to disguise themselves with plant debris which they attach on their backs on small spines. During the summer, the adults are highly attracted to the lights in our homes.

Aphid Midge: One of the good guys in the garden. The adult Aphid Midge looks very much like a fungal gnat but is a predator in the garden. Hiding under leaves through the day and emerging at night to reproduce. The female aphid midge can lay over a hundred eggs at a time, and these shiny orange eggs are carefully laid amongst a colony of aphids, so there is a sufficient food supply for her young. To make sure they get the most from the aphid colonies, the adult aphid midge feeds on the honeydew that the aphids produce.

Hoverflies: These small flying insects can be found on a global scale and have proven themselves worthy, time and time again. They come in a few colour forms yet the most common will have black and yellow markings on its rear that often resemble a wasp at first glance. This clever mimicry helps them to avoid being eaten themselves by a larger predator. Hoverfly larvae are fierce predators of small sapsucking insects such as aphids and thrips, plus they will also feast on small caterpillars. The adult insects are amazing pollinators in their own right as they scour nectar-rich blooms and are being further studied for this ability in the absence of honey bees.

Lady Beetle: These Australian native ladybird beetles are very efficient predators of many species of mealybug and soft scale insects. Larvae can be easily mistaken for mealybugs. Ladybird larvae have waxy, more cotton-like fluffy filaments. Adult beetles are about 4 mm long with an orange head and black wing covers. Adult beetles lay their eggs inside mealybugs and their larvae feed on mealybug eggs and young ones.

Praying Mantis: They are a solitary species that roam the garden. For

an insect of its size, they are highly intelligent and will often gaze back at humans with an inquisitive set of large alien-like eyes! Mantis will prey on any soft bodied insect such as caterpillars, beetle larvae, ants, small spiders, small butterflies and moths, aphids and mealybugs. The larger females produce an intriguing egg sack on plants that dry hard and brown of which up to one hundred tiny offspring emerge at the end of summer to begin their solitary lives from the get-go.

Wasps: Mention the word wasp to the grandkids and they want to run away. But not all wasps behave with evil intent; in fact, a vast majority of garden wasp species are amazing natural predators and are amongst the most fascinating of insect species in your backyard. All predatory wasps hunt tirelessly for their prey on many plant species for the widest assortment of prey.

Ladybird: Come in an assortment of colour from orange, red, yellow and even black and you can find them manly on plants that are attacked by aphids as this makes up a large part of their diet.

However in the case of the 28 spotted ladybird they eat more plant material and can be a bit of a pest.

They had fun with that activity and I was happy that there were a lot of beneficial insects to be seen. It means that I have a garden that is taking care of itself from nasty pests. In saying that I had pests attack the pear tree, I did not get one pear this year, the king parrots and bats had a feast as I didn't get to net them this season, time just seemed to go out the window again. Pests come in all sorts of sizes and birds and bats are one, apart from netting I have no prey such as a trained falcon to control them. The pet kelpie seemed to have slackened off and just watch them from the balcony. I think that my next activity with the grandkids is to make a scarecrow and see how that works in the orchard.



Travel Lighter

What do you think of as a new year begins ... resolutions for personal improvements ... time with family ... holidays ... the beach. Two of my teen grandsons are pleased to have holiday jobs.

We celebrate Australia Day and wonder what the year might bring. One thing is certain ... we can't know the future and this is just as well as we would be sure to worry.

In 1939 after the outbreak of war for Britain, King George V1 wanted to encourage citizens to put their trust in God. He quoted this poem -

"Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God That shall be to you better than light, and safer than a known way"

He didn't know what the new year would bring, but he trusted God to 'guide and uphold them in the days ahead'.

The image of God's hand appears in the Bible many times, eg. in Isaiah God called the people to trust Him as their Creator ... His hand laid the foundations of the earth and His right hand spread out the heavens, Isaiah 48:13; the psalmist claims that God's right hand upholds him, Psalm 63:8; and the New Testament says Jesus is seated at God's right hand, Mark 16:19. One of my favourites is Isaiah 49:16, Behold, I have inscribed you on the palms of my hands.

Whatever we face as we look toward the new year we can follow the encouragement of King George and the prophet Isaiah and put our trust in God.

If you want to travel lighter this year be encouraged to let go of any grudges you are holding as these will only weigh you down. It's a 'dog -eat-dog world, not a dog-forgive—dog world'.

Forgiveness is an 'unnatural' act – dolphins don't forgive sharks for



eating their playmates. Bitterness and hatred come naturally when we've been hurt ... forgiving is supernatural and requires the grace of God. Speaking personally, forgiving is one of the hardest things to do, but it is the pathway to healing ... it will add years to your life and restore relationships. It is not a weakness but rather gives power and strength. Holding onto grudges shortens your life by contributing to many physical and mental ills.

A man wished his brother could come to his wedding but 'they hadn't spoken in years' ... though he couldn't remember why. Drifting apart is the natural result of an unforgiving spirit whereas forgiveness 'opens the doors of a prison where you are both the prisoner and the jailor'.

The Lords Prayer says 'forgive us our trespasses as we forgive others'.
