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# **Nabiac Landcare**



As I see the devastating results of rain and flooding over the past week I've pretty much run out of words.

2025, wet one month, wetter the next! As I wrote last month's article, I was thinking, things usually start drying out in May. Ha! Needless to say the Nabiac Landcare team hasn't had much in bush time in the past month. Although this flood wasn't as bad as the last big one in Nabiac, there's a lot of mud and debris about our work areas.

Time at the moment is better spent helping those who need it, picking up plastics and other non-biodegradable wastes and looking for evidence of weeds like *maderia vine* ( $\rightarrow$ ) and ornamental taro that may have washed down stream and will colonise where they land. Look along the high water mark and where debris has collected behind barriers for some of these nasties.



If you're considering doing weed control in the bush at the moment, play it safe! Seriously, it's probably too wet to consider using poisons. Even pulling weeds is problematic because of soil disturbance. If you're pulling weeds, make sure roots and stems don't touch wet ground or the plant will simply regrow. I pulled fireweed just before the rain and it's growing in mid air!

Nabiac Landcare normally works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by a very yummy morning tea. Membership is only \$2.00 plus an occasional donation to the morning tea fund and new members are always welcome. Training, tools and safety gear are supplied by Midcoast Council. Give us a ring if you are interested.

Remember, even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area by removing weeds from your own backyard and removing fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. Most of all enjoy a walk in the local bush!







Our May 13<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Wallamba CWA Branch was held at the usual venue – the Community Church Hall, opposite the Showground and was attended by 9 members and a possible new member and our Special Guest, Mid North Coast CWA President *Lyn Moore*. A further 5 members tendered their apologies along with that of MNC CWA Publicity Officer *Pauline Cain*.

President *Margaret Weller* welcomed all and declared the meeting opened which was followed by the usual formalities including the National Anthem, the CWA Motto and CWA Prayer before all paused to remember the following - *Jan Whittaker* aged 87yrs - who previously owned the Kit and Kaboodle Restaurant in Nabiac, *Maureen Fleming* who had volunteered at the Nabiac Library and Op Shop who lost her battle with cancer, and *Phil Whittaker* a previous Education School Counsellor who had worked with member and *Cecily Scurr* of Bo Bo Creek and *Joan Forrester* (friends of member *Pam Muxlow*). Members also remember the passing of *Pope Francis* and Australian cricketer *Keith Stackpole*.

Member *Jill* provided the thought for this month's meeting which was *"Don't' ever sell your saddle, because life is a long, long ride!"* 

Business included a report on the selling of the CWA Cook Books at the Nabiac Nook and so far 5 have been sold.


We were give updates on the upcoming MNC CWA Ag & Environment and Handicraft Day to be hosted by Wallamba Branch on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> June that will be held at the Wallamba Showground Hall.

Our correspondence section included notification of a Hints Tips Cookery day to e held at Kempsey on 9<sup>th</sup> August and further details will be worked out at the June meeting.

Members sadly learnt that the Nambucca Heads CWA Branch had closed after 91 years and some of the members have transferred to Macksville Branch. Nambucca Heads Evening Branch is still operational.

Notification was received from *Ian Wall* – DET Ass. Principal Hearing Support seeking financial help for the North Coast 37<sup>th</sup> Deaf Camp for





Deaf and Hearing Impaired students camp at Bonville.

Treasurer *Jenny* presented her financial report which included the sale of the CWA Cook Books, and sale of items through the Nabiac Nook. It was passed that the Wallamba CWA branch apply for membership of the Nabiac Nook and we now await their approval.

Member *Jill Hammond* gave her Ag & Environment Report and referred to recent articles on Flora study of Salt Bush and Fauna study of Frogs which would help our members to gain a better understanding. Visitor *Lyn Moore* (MNC CWA President) spoke about Australian Cut flowers and her experiences when ordering flowers for the mother's funeral, in saying that they all came from overseas as had about 87% of flowers purchased for Valentine's Day with most coming from Israel. Areas south west of Sydney around Camden and Picton used to be market gardens with fruit vegetable and flowers going to NSW markets but sadly these areas and now housing estates.

There are a number of local flower farms in the district and it was suggested that we support them at all possible times with our purchases at the local markets, etc.

Member **Pam** gave her International report on Country of Study, Korea, and spoke about the Korean Flag, including a description, symbols and meaning. The Korean Flag is known as the Taegeukg and consists of the 3 components and was adopted as the country's flag in 1948.

The flag is a white background, a red and blue Taegeukgi in its centre accompanied by 4 black trigrams each in one corner, with the centre circle symbolises the harmony between ying (blue negative) and yang (red positive) forces.

*Merle* spoke on her role as Handicraft Officer and encouraged members to start working on their projects for next year's State Conference and would like entries by February 2026 ready for judging at the MNC CWA group competition in March as the 2026 Conference to be held at Forster.

Thanks to Member *Colleen* who brought in a 'Where's Wally' beanie to be added to the 'mystery raffle' prize to be raffled at our MNC CWA Group Handicraft & A & E Day come 17<sup>th</sup> June.

Margaret presented her Cookery report saying all schedule entries were on their way to State Conference at Wagga for judging and advised us she had submitted her prize winning light fruit cake and tomato jam from MNC CW to go to State Conference – fingers crossed we might have a State winner amongst our ranks.

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Jill gave us her Cultural report speaking about her need for a walker, or rollator, since her health problems and she had done some research on its origins and discovered that the rollator - a wheeled walker - was invented in 1978 by Aina Wifailk, a Swedish polio sufferer with the aim of providing a more comfortable and convenient mobility aid for individuals with limited mobility.

Mother's Day was also discussed as it was on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> May and members spoke about their families - what a range of children, grand-children and great grandchildren our members share.

In general business it was voted that the branch would support the Deaf Camp with a donation of \$100.

Catering for the upcoming MNC CWA Handicraft and A & E Day o June 17<sup>th</sup> was discussed and members will provide a light morning tea of bun loaf, scones and some gluten free biscuits.

Lunch will be a choice of three soups with bread sticks and dessert of apple slice and slices, tea and coffee.

The raffle has been worked out and set up will take the day before. The meeting was then closed by President Margaret and members enjoyed the usual goodie.

We have a colour scanner. Bring in your old photos & scan them to an external hard drive or DVD.

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
### MINIMBAH MATTERS



Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade has, believe it or not, NSW RURAL FIRE SERVICE no bushfire news to report and currently you do not need a Fire Permit before you light up. Whoda thought?

As ambitious as it may seem, the RFS has started their "Planning to burn" campaign for the upcoming Bush Fire Danger Period, which is scheduled to begin in our area on 1<sup>st</sup> September. Given the current weather-related circumstances, it may be seen as a little ray of sunshine, although we do admit that it is difficult to comprehend right now.

We will remind you again in a few months' time.



A couple of things more appropriate to mention though:

- Having your chimney cleaned at the beginning of each season a very smart idea.
- If you have lost plants through drowning, when replacing them consider some more fire resilient species. We have had fire and flood over the last few years, so a hot dry summer may be on the horizon. Plants are the primary source of fuel for a bush fire. Not all native plants are highly flammable, but some do have a high oil content. Give a thought to preferred plants such as:
  - ♦ Succulents
  - Plants with low oil and resin content
  - ♦ Trees and shrubs with smooth bark
  - ♦ Plants with broad and fleshy leaves

 $\diamond~$  Plants with salt in their foliage – silvery-grey leafed plants With gardens in mind, we leave you with this thought.

Frogs have it made – They get to eat what bugs them!!



May this season bring you back to yourself, with warmth, wonder, and the courage to follow your own rhythm.

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

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

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
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## WALLAMBA LANDCARE GROUP NEWS

The meet-up in May at Robyn & Stewart's beautiful property was excellent. The sun shone, so we enjoyed sitting outside to enjoy a lovely Autumn Day and shared

some delicious food.

We discussed soil health, issues arising due to the rain, and ways to improve pastures.

We have started a swap & share table to be a feature of each meeting for those with excess produce/plants to share.

It was great to gain insights from experienced, successful farmers, experts in growing veggies and soil aficionados within our local group.

#### Ideas included:

- Treating buffalo fly by attaching strips of fabric to a frame which the cattle have to move through, so the fabric brushes the flies off, together with a treatment. There are also a variety of buffalo fly pour-ons to try when you don't enjoy successful control. The serious buffalo fly problem this season emphasises the importance of maintaining healthy populations of dung beetles.
- Putting a piece of copper pipe into water troughs to address inadequacy of this mineral in our soils.
- The value of mulching versus slashing (when the paddocks dry out a bit!) for improved more breakdown of litter.
- Managing land holistically/strip grazing to impact the soil and rest pasture species



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- Missing a strip when mulching, to allow flowers & seeds to develop (would depend on types of pasture)
- Using green manure crops to encourage diverse soil biology via a variety of root systems and to add nutrients
- Encourage more trees to improve biodiversity, ground litter and to use up excess moisture. Consider introducing areas of fodder trees & shrubs across or adjacent to paddocks, including deciduous for the leaf drop. In our area Paperbarks (Melaleuca) are great for shade, shelter, and biodiversity.
- The role of bacteria and mycorrhizal network under the ground. Add soil biology in some form every few years, where there is little evidence of litter breakdown and low soil carbon (organic matter).
- Syntropic agriculture builds natural systems to support agricultural production.

Our next field day is in on the 1<sup>st</sup> August at Wang Wauk. Details are coming soon.

Keeping with the winter theme, this sounds YUM. Also healthy & easy-(Readers Digest Great Recipes for Good Health)

#### INGREDIENTS

1.	Melt the margarine in a heavy 30 cm frying pan over moderately

   Add the onion,, celery and garlic to the pan: reduce the heat to moderate and cook, uncovered, until soft - about 5 minutes.
- Return the lamb to the pan and add the carrot, apple juice, curry powder cumin, coriander, cardamom and cayenne pepper. Cover and simmer over a low heat for 30 minutes or until the lamb is tender.
- 4. Add the apple and zucchini: cover and simmer until crisp-tender about 5 minutes longer.


Serve with boiled rice or mashed potatoes and greens of your choice.



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# Welcome to Deb's Gardening

Rain certainly called off play. I am not one for sitting around, I like to keep busy but there were days when I had cabin fever. It didn't help when knowing I was high,



dry and safe and friends' houses were going under. I sure felt useless for a while but the water receded and I have spent the past week helping out a friend recover on Dumaresq Island. The first thing that hits you is the mud (thank goodness for gum boots) mud in her house and into every nook and cranny, not to mention all her worldly possessions, mud covering her lawn and paddocks, plants that should be green were brown from mud, foot paths that were completely covered with thick mud. I went home each day covered in mud. Of course the priority was to empty her house and clean it out but on the odd occasion I had to hose off the mud from her plants that were in her garden beds around her house. It was like they were crying for help; they were being suffocated and unable to breathe...

If the mud wasn't so heavy and wet I would bag it up from the pile of mud that was scrapped up and dumped and bring it home to make new garden beds with it. Flood mud is sediment or sand and can be rich in nutrients and beneficial to the garden as long as it is not too thick. As a general rule it should be 50mm thick. There is potential for flood mud to be contaminated, if the flood mud has an unpleasant odour, appears to be impacted by chemicals (discolouration or oil sheen) or has asbestos fragments it should not be used on land or returned to the river but this mud smelt and looked like mud with no contamination.

Once mud dries it can turn has hard as concrete but by spreading a layer of gypsum, a good layer of mulch, turning it over with a fork for a quick result or let it break down and over a period of time you will have good friable soil. I noticed that there was some parts of her garden where the mud was starting to dry and big cracks were forming already.

If anything I will be interested to see the transformation of their paddocks and lawns and how it recovers from such a catastrophe. It's not as if they will be scraping the excess mud off the paddocks and lawn and spreading gypsum and a layer of mulch. It will be sometime before they can even access the paddocks without sinking knee deep in mud.

The one thing that I have been wary of while helping out is safety first! I have made sure we all had long sleeves, gloves at all times. It is so easy to get cuts and scratches while cleaning up as there could be soil- borne diseases like tetanus to catch. If anyone cut themselves



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
we quickly applied antiseptic. I am probably the clumsiest of all people. I had a fall cleaning up and landed in their mud filled garden, it was a soft landing, I learnt to take a change of clothes with me every time from then on. We all had a good laugh, which was needed in these trying times.

My friends breed cattle and the sad fact is, like a lot of cattle and dairy farmers in the Manning, they too have lost 75% of their heard and as we are coming into winter they had just sown rye grass for winter feed, which is now smothered in mud and won't be germinating. Again our cattle are high, dry and safe with plenty of feed but I can't dwell on the sad facts because I know they will be fine, being in the mix of it all, I have been seeing firsthand the help and support that they have been receiving from the community, friends, their family, SES, fire brigade, and other farmers. They are not alone which is so heart warming, it does restore your faith in the human kind.

As for my garden, I haven't gardened in it feels like ages, but well it can just wait, it's not that important at the moment. Eventually when the soil dries naturally and the time comes, I will add some organic fertilisers to the soil as I am sure with all that rain there was leaching of nutrients. The plants are all alive and healthy there is still colour in the garden from the camellias in flower, the deciduous trees changing into oranges and red and looking spectacular, even jonquils starting to flower. I have been picking a few greens for dinner; there is still fruit to pick from the orchard, flowers and foliage to bring inside to pop into a vase, what more can I ask for at this time. There are more important challenges to face and to help my friend get back on her feet. She is not an avid gardener like me and her garden is only small but I will make sure that her garden comes back to life and to give her joy to see a healthy garden again instead of mud, I know it will help with her healing. If only more people would realise how much a difference a garden, no matter how big or small, will make to a person's well being and mental state.

MidCoast Council's Director of Infrastructure and Engineering Services, Rob Scott, said at the very least there will be a like for like replacement funded through the Natural Disaster Recovery Arrangements.

But Mr Scott conceded it will take time.

"First off the bat, we need to do an assessment of what is left of the old bridge and that can't be done until the water level drops down," he said.

"From that we will get an idea of the extent of the damage. We don't know at this stage if it's salvageable, or if it needs to be completely replaced.

"Either way, it's unfortunately not something that will happen quickly. It is going to be some time before that connection is restored."

Mr Scott said the recovery arrangements are usually based on a like for like replacement.

"Our hands are usually tied here. It will depend on the condition of the remaining old bridge; at the very least we will get back to what was there."

In other good news, the Cedar Party Creek bridge bypass was reopened with little to no damage reported.

And the new bridge being built in place of the old Cedar Party Creek Bridge is on track for opening later this year despite the weather delays

# **Coastal Computing Solutions**

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#### THOUSANDS SUPPORT MID NORTH COAST FLOOD RECOVERY



Member for Myall Lakes, Tanya Thompson, has praised the more than 6,000 emergency personnel and volunteers supporting flood-affected communities across the Myall Lakes and Mid North Coast.

Mrs Thompson said over 4,000 people from NSW Government agencies, including the SES, RFS, Fire and Rescue NSW, and Transport for NSW, are working across the Great Lakes, Manning, and Gloucester areas.

"We have seen so many locals, emergency workers and even international crews rally together and lend a hand," Mrs Thompson said. "There's still a lot of work to go but crews are on the ground every day getting the job done."

Transport for NSW crews have repaired over 5,500 potholes and removed 1,500 tonnes of debris from main roads, including sections of the Pacific Highway. Waste removal teams have already cleared more than 10,000 cubic metres of flood-damaged material.

"Safe road access is critical to getting our region moving again," Mrs Thompson said. "I'm incredibly grateful to everyone working in these difficult conditions to make that happen."

NSW SES is also coordinating community volunteers, while NSW Maritime staff have conducted over 60 urgent tasks on waterways such as the Manning River, including evacuations and hazard assessments.

An extra 24 police officers have been deployed to help deter looting, and more than 8,400 property damage assessments have been completed. Over 1,000 buildings are currently uninhabitable, with some communities still isolated.

Mrs Thompson said our communities are turning up for each other day in and day out, and we need to ensure the government does the same.

"I will continue to stand with those affected and push the government for the short and long term support our communities need and deserve."

After completing eight months of foundational training at the Goulburn Police Academy, the probationary constables will report to their new stations from Monday, 5th May 2025, where they will undertake 12 months of on-the-job training while continuing their studies.



#### BOOST TO MANNING HOSPITAL BUT DELAYS TO OTHER HEALTH UPGRADES

Member for Myall Lakes Tanya Thompson is calling on the Minns Labor Government to prioritise overdue health infrastructure commitments, after funding was announced for minor upgrades at Manning Hospital.

The \$355,000 delivered under the Regional Health Minor Works Program, will convert a non-clinical area into a new three-bed inpatient unit, enable the relocation of the Chronic Care Service and refurbish the Nita Reed building to enhance rehabilitation services.

Mrs Thompson said it is a good start but more needs to be done to ensure health services in the region. "I will always welcome funding for my community, and this will help improve immediate service delivery at Manning Hospital," Mrs Thompson said.

"These works will be delivered alongside the \$180 million Lower Mid North Coast Health Service Project, which includes the Stage 2 redevelopment of Manning Hospital and an Urgent Care Centre in Forster.

"While it's a step in the right direction it falls short of addressing broader infrastructure gaps and staffing shortages that continue to impact our region. The real priority should be delivering the full Lower Mid North Coast Health Service Project as soon as possible and I will keep fighting for that."

#### Embedded batteries now accepted at your Community Recycling Centres

MidCoast Council is pleased to announce the expansion of its Community Recycling Centre (CRC) Battery Collection Program, which now includes the collection of embedded batteries. This update is part of the ongoing commitment to reduce waste and ensure that hazardous materials are properly disposed of.

Embedded batteries, which are often difficult to remove without the use of tools, can now be recycled through participating CRCs across the MidCoast region. These types of batteries are commonly found in products such as:

- Electric toothbrushes
- Vapes and e-cigarettes
- Bluetooth headphones

Laptops or tablets with sealed battery compartments This expansion complements the existing battery collection efforts across the region and provides a more sustainable way to dispose of potentially hazardous items that would otherwise end up in landfill or be placed in kerbside bins.

While all Waste Management Centres accept CRC materials the new official sites funded by the NSW EPA are located at **Taree**, **Tuncurry** and **Gloucester Waste Services Centres**.

The doctor was quite impressed. "Well you are certainly a dedicated outdoor enthusiast>"


