Nabiac Landcare

Is it Spring? The bush says, yes! The birds are singing, yes! The leeches, ticks and mossies say, 'yes! Yum!' I spent an entertaining ten minutes teasing a leech yesterday. I saw it, before it got me. If you can overcome the yuck factor, leeches are fascinating creatures.

Our landcare team is thrilled that *Bill* (one of our unstoppable volunteers) is closer to winning the battle against the running bamboo at the Stuart St end of the Lilypilly Bend Reserve. I'm sure we will have two to three years of follow up work before we can declare victory. The mantra of bush regenerators is follow up, follow up, and then follow up.

Now that the weather is getting warmer, *Roger*, our camphor laurel drill specialist, is getting back to his attack on this menace. If you have camphor laurels on you property please consider removing them and maintain a watch for seedlings. One mature camphor laurel paddock tree can infest the local bush with thousands of seedlings.

The North Coast Weed Control calendar highlights two garden escapees to control in September. Both of these plants can form dense thickets in the bush that inhibit the growth of native species.

Micky Mouse Bush(Ochna serrulata) is a hardy old favourite in Nabiac gardens. Its yellow flowers appear in spring and then the sepals turn an attractive red colour. The seeds sitting on this ring of red slowly change from green to ripe black in December. Then the birds spread them to local bush land. Various chemical control methods are



outlined in NSWWeedwise. Small plants can be dug out, large plants—borrow a backhoe!

Large-leaved <u>Cotoneaster</u> (Cotoneaster glaucophyllus) is also an old fashioned, long lived tough garden plant that produces large numbers of red fruit. The fruit contains cyanogenic glyucosides that can form

cyanide in the stomach, especially of ruminants (cattle and sheep). It also contains an unknown substance that is toxic to dogs. Birds and foxes spread the seed when ripe. Hand pulling seedlings is an option. For chemical control consult NSWWeedwise on line.



The Weeds Australia website is another valuable resource to help





identify and manage problem weeds (link: Weeds Australia).

It's Spring, the mud is drying up. It's time to enjoy a quiet walk in your garden and in the local bush!

Nabiac Landcare normally works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by a very yummy morning tea. New members are always welcome. We'll teach you to identify the weeds and the natives. You don't have to work every week if you join us. We can find a job for anyone of any level of fitness.

USA singer *Ozzie Osbourne* member of "Black Sabbath" at the age of 76 years.



MINIMBAH MATTERS



Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade would like to apologise for any confusion caused by last month's Early Warning of the upcoming Bush Fire Danger Period (BFDP). We are only human. At the time of publishing, the information was correct, but due to ongoing "inclement" weather conditions the Rural Fire Service, in conjunction with all fire agencies, sought permission to temporarily vary the start of the BFDP in our District this year. The Bush Fire Management Committee has agreed to the variation.

The Bush Fire Danger Period in the Mid Coast District will commence on 1st October, 2025.

Fire Permits are required from that date

FIRE PERMIT



Fire Permits are Free of charge and are available through the New South Wales Rural Fire Service. They do come with terms and conditions, some of which may have changed this year, and they will be explained to you when the permit is issued. Go online to

rfs.nsw.gov.au/fire-information/BFDP to apply for your

free Fire Permit and follow the prompts.

Remember, all year round, to give at least 24 hours notice of your intention to burn to your neighbours and the NSW Rural Fire Service.

If you are unsure of what is required, who your local Fire Permit Officer is, or how big your burn piles etc. can be, this information is only a phone call away. 





CHANGES TO BLOOD AND PLASMA DONATION RULES ANNOUNCED FOR CANCER SURVIVORS

People who have fully recovered from many cancers can now donate blood and plasma in Australia 12 months after finishing treatment under a rule change announced today by Australian Red Cross Lifeblood.



Those who have had cancer will no

longer have to wait five years to donate, provided they have written confirmation from their doctor that they are in remission and meet all other health criteria. Those who have had blood cancers will continue to be unable to donate.

A recent survey by the Kirby Institute, UNSW revealed that over half (54%) of the population believed having cancer made people ineligible to give blood for life. Another 28% of the population were unsure, highlighting a large misconception that could be hindering donations.

Lifeblood Executive Director, Cath Stone, said the change would provide a greater opportunity for those who have had cancer to safely give blood and plasma while strengthening Australia's blood supply at a time of record-high demand.

"Cancer patients are the largest users of blood in Australia; they need 11,000 donations each week. Many cancer survivors have relied on blood transfusions and plasma medicines during chemotherapy or surgery, and we know many are eager to give back," Cath said.

Lifeblood research found that the current five-year wait can be safely reduced to 12 months, with international evidence showing it's not necessary for donor or patient safety. Large-scale studies have confirmed that cancer is not transmissible through blood transfusion. As with all changes to blood donation rules, this change has been approved by the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA). "Cancer diagnoses usually increase with age and our older donors often have more time to donate.

"Our current five-year wait-time disproportionately affects them being able to give back when it's safe to do so," Cath added.


On average, more than 5,000 potential donors are asked to wait to donate every year due to a cancer diagnosis, a number that has been increasing every year. Donors are less likely to return after long wait-

All donors will continue to undergo standard health checks and complete a detailed questionnaire. Only those who are well and meet all eligibility criteria will be able to donate.

Cath said that it was likely that many Australians didn't realise the role blood donation played in supporting people with cancer.

"As we see the number of cancer diagnoses increasing, we're also seeing an increase in the demand for blood to help cancer patients through their treatment. Supporting people with cancer is one of the greatest reasons to donate," she added.

Backgrounder - how blood is used to support cancer patients

- Cancer patients are the nation's largest users of blood, with a third of all blood collected used to treat cancer and blood diseases (11,000 donations needed every week)
- If you've ever donated blood, plasma or platelets, there's a reasonable chance that your donation went to help a cancer
- Cancer patients often need many blood transfusions over many months or years
- A patient with acute leukaemia can use up to 9 bags of platelets each month, with four donors needed to make each bag of platelets
- It is estimated that more than 450 Australians will be diagnosed with blood cancer every day
- This number is projected to double by 2035, meaning the number of blood donations needed to treat them will also need to double

How blood can be used to treat cancer

Chemotherapy can deplete the body of platelets, an important clotting component in blood that is relied on by cancer patients to prevent internal bleeding. These patients also need red cell transfusions whilst their bone marrow recovers.

Surgery to remove cancer may also result in the need for red cell transfusions. Plasma also has important proteins in it that can help stop bleeding.

Cancer has a big impact on the immune system and makes patients vulnerable to infections. Plasma has important antibodies that help the body fight the cancer and possible infections.

Patients who have a stem-cell transplant often need extra transfusions of blood or platelets to make their bodies strong enough to survive the transplant. Plasma is used after transplants.

Donated blood is used for:

34% goes to people with cancer and blood diseases

19% goes to people with other causes of anaemia


18% goes to surgical patients (including open heart surgery and burns)

13% other medical problems (e.g. heart, stomach and kidney disease)

10% goes to orthopaedic patients (including fractures)

4% goes to pregnant women, new mothers

2% goes to trauma patients, including road accidents

MIDCOAST Funding awarded for landfill projects

MidCoast Council has been awarded \$600,000 in grants from the NSW Environmental Protection Agency.

The funding will see an equal split of \$300,000 go towards the Taree landfill remediation project which is currently at tender and the Tuncurry landfill remediation project with works now commenced on the site.

MidCoast Council's Director of Liveable Communities, Paul De Szell, said the works will reduce long term risks, protect surrounding waterways and ecosystems and ensure compliance with environmental protection licences.

"Council's Waste Services Department will continue to progress these projects as part of our commitment to delivering safe, compliant, and environmentally responsible waste management infrastructure for our community," he said.

MidCoast Council has confirmed a three-year sponsorship with Bowls NSW to host the Women's State Carnival from 2026 - 2028.

The sponsorship agreement continues on from the success of the 2025 State Carnival which saw record participation numbers with over 1,000 female bowlers taking to the greens across more than 10 bowling clubs in the Barrington Coast region.

The Women's State Carnival is the largest all-female bowls participation event in the country, with a long history spanning over 90 years. MidCoast Council Mayor, Claire Pontin, says entering into the 3-year partnership is a coup for the region, delivering significant economic and tourism benefits.

"We're excited to work with Bowls NSW on delivering this premier sporting event, and look forward to welcoming bowlers from across the state and beyond.

"It's a great opportunity for the local community to engage, not only through participation but as volunteers, spectators, supporters and hosts to participating family and friends", Mayor Pontin said.

As well as seeing an expected \$7.67million economic injection as a result of the three year partnership, the region will welcome more than 3,700 visitors - equating to 15,076 bed nights.

Bowls NSW CEO Tim Rowe welcomed the sponsorship announcement that will see the event stay in the Barrington Coast region for the next three years.



Pelican Boardwalk extension to begin

Works to extend the much-loved Memorial Drive Pelican Boardwalk in Forster will begin on Thursday 28 August.

The new 120-metre section of suspended boardwalk over Wallis Lake will extend the scenic walk along the Forster foreshore.

"This exciting new over-water experience will be accessible to people of all ages and abilities and will provide an excellent vantage point for water activities and other major events throughout the year," said Liam Bulley, Executive Manager Public Spaces.

The project, awarded to GPM Marine Constructions, is expected to be completed by late November 2025, weather permitting.

Access to parts of John Holland Park, the gravel car park on Point Road at Tuncurry boat ramp and the Memorial Drive foreshore area will be restricted during the works. Some parts of the boardwalk will be closed for water access at times during construction.

Contractors will manage the works to maximise access in the area. As part of the works, a new kayak launching system will be added to the lower platform off the boardwalk.

"The kayak launching system has been designed to improve access to the Breckenridge Channel for swimmers, kayakers and paddle boarders, improving safety and accessibility for all," said Mr Bulley.

Welcome to Deb's Gardening

Spring has sprung; what bought that to my attention was the swallows are back and my kelpie dog spends hours chasing them, which is great because he is being entertained and getting plenty of exercise and that in turns stops them from building their nest in our car port.

There was a nice break in the weather, the sun shone and for a winters day the temperature was perfect for gardening. So this month I have done some gardening and it felt so good to be back out there with my hands in the soil and my thoughts in mother earth. I managed a lot in those few days of gardening. I started in one garden bed and moved my way around to each garden bed and ended in the vegetable garden.

I thought to myself that I should start in the vegetable garden first but sitting on my deck and looking at the garden bed in front of me that has shrubs and dahlias, it was calling out for attention more, so than any other part of the garden. The dahlias had died down, the salvias needed a good hair cut and weeds were flowering everywhere and needed to be pulled out before going to seed. It's a big garden bed with well over 50 dahlias, lots of shrubs and salvias and a large hibiscus plant in the middle. I had to divide some of the dahlia tubers and replant them into spaces because they have lifted out of the ground, hence there will be an even bigger display in the summer.

But while weeding and digging them up I noticed lots of tunnels and dahlia tubers eaten; I have rats in the garden again. I also have an issue with rats tunnelling in under the fence in the vegetable garden and tunnelling under my asparagus bed. Which makes me hope that they are the bush rats native to Australia as I am happy to leave and let them tunnel their way around the garden bed, not so the vegetable garden, but if they are the common rats that I hate, I may have to set up bait stations to eradicate as they tend to carry diseases. I have never seen them so it is hard to know what they are but if I do see one... The key differences between a bush rat and a common (or black) rat lies in their size, tail length, and fur. Bush rats are smaller, have a shorter, furrier tail, and a more rounded head, while common rats are larger, have a longer, relatively hairless tails, and a more pointed face plus common rats are introduced. Bush rats are nocturnal, rarely seen and live a shy and solitary life. They are even beneficial to their ecosystem, performing crucial roles such as pollinating plants, dispersing seeds, controlling insect populations and aerating soil through burrowing. They even serve as a vital food source for native predators and, on doing a Google search, native Australian bush rats keep invasive species like the black rat at bay. I



will, however, find where they are getting in the vegetable garden again because they are eating the carrots. Tunnelling in the vegetable garden is an ongoing concern - I am forever finding tunnels. Another Google search suggested using peppermint oil as a repellent so I shall pour some down a tunnel in the vegetable garden and block up the hole on the outside of the fence and see if I have any luck preventing them from entering the vegetable garden.

With all the rain this year I have only lost a few plants. Most of my garden beds are raised but the English lavender and Correas haven't survived, obviously they haven't liked having wet feet for so long. The rest of the garden is fine and surviving the big wet. I believe that the rain is not over with spring being wetter than average, so BOM said, but who knows, it is what it is. I planted a lot of plants with drought tolerance in mind; it now seems to be a turn around to plant wet tolerant plants. When I get to make new garden beds once the renovations are over I may have to raise the new garden beds higher. Gardening is always evolving.

As I said, it was good to be out in the garden again and gardening without pain. I was diagnosed with De Quervains Tenosynovits and living with the pain in my hand for the past eight months. It was brought on by repetitive strain from painting the house. I have been seeing a physio which did not help that and in the end he suggested having steroids, not what I wanted to hear but the pain has been difficult to live with that in the end I surrendered to the fact. First I had to have an ultra sound which I had 2 weeks ago and would you believe, I am cured, no more pain, and I got out of having to be injected with steroids. It was either the fact that I started to rub emu oil into my hand as a hand cream or the ultra sound stimulated the repairing of the sheath, probable the later. So the moral of the story is that if any reader is diagnosed with De Quervains Tenosynovits, go and get an ultra sound and rub emu oil into your hand and it will heal in no time.

My hand has healed just in time because this time next month I will be teeing off on a few golf courses in Portugal and Spain and living the dream. I have justified it all by the money that I saved painting my house myself, that that money can pay for a well deserved golfing holiday. I haven't been able to play locally for various reasons; also the courses have been too wet and have been closed most of the time. So not only do I get to have a holiday and play golf but I believe the courses over in Portugal and Spain all have magnificent gardens and landscaping. So it will be the best of both worlds.

- * Stall holders pegged down their marquees in anticipation and many had to take down their marquees early as wind gusts picked up.








- * The two coffee vendors were constantly busy. The bread, much of the meat and fresh produce was sold out just after 11am.

VEGETABLE CURRY

Something for those who don't eat a lot of meat

INGREDIENTS

3 tsp Unsalted Margarine

1 lge Brown Onion, finely chopped

2 cloves Garlic, crushed
2 tsp Curry Powder
½ tsp Ground Cinnamon
2 cups Chicken Stock, low salt
½ cup Long grain Rice
1 ripe Tomato, cored and chopped

2 med Carrots, peeled and diced
1 cup Chick Peas, cooked and drained

½ cup Raisins

1½ cups Tiny Cauliflower flowerets
1 cup Green Peas, fresh or frozen
1 cup Low fat Natural Yoghurt
1½ cup Cucumber, grated

1/8 tsp Pepper 2 tsp Lemon Juice 2 tblesp Parsley, chopped

METHOD

- Melt margarine in a large, heavy saucepan over a moderate heat; add the onion and cook, uncovered 5 minutes or until soft. Add garlic, curry powder and cinnamon; cook 2 minutes more, stirring often
- Stir in the chicken stock, rice, tomato and carrots; bring to a simmer. Add the chick peas and raisins: cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Add the cauliflower and peas, cover and cook another 10 minutes.
- Meanwhile, prepare the yoghurt sauce. In a small bowl, combine the yoghurt, cucumber and pepper and put aside.
- 4 Stir the lemon juice into the curry and spoon the curry onto a platter, garnish with parsley.


