
Various officers were also reminded that their end of year reports are due by the end of September.

Ag & Environment Officer *Jill Hammond* referred to the August CWA Journal report about Eenee Nappies, designed in Tasmania, a plastic free new nappy brand this is the first compostable disposable nappy available. They are using Australian cotton, are biodegradable and come in sizes from newborn babies to adults - all agreed that is definitely a product to promote within our communities.

Penny gave a report on how 'frog saunas' are helping save the endangered green and golden bell frog, with them being set up in the brick pit quarry next to the Olympic Park. An amazing invention by Macquarie University Environmentalist, Dr *Anthony Waddle*. Penny also spoke on the soft plastic recycling centre that has been established in Kundle Kundle by IQ Renew. It is said to be the largest soft plastic recycling centre in Australia & possibly in the Southern hemisphere, as it expands its operations. We can now take our soft plastics to the supermarket again.

International officer *Pam* spoke on an article she had read in the local "Manning River Times" newspaper and also talked about the ongoing conflict between North and South Korea, and Nth Korea leader Kim Jong-un supervised firing of new air defence missiles to test their combat capability.

It's spring in the bush and the garden! My nose is experiencing a dizzying array of scents. Unfortunately, I had my first sniff of privet blossom for the season as well! I fear it will be a 'great' season for privet and just about every weed on our list. Seedlings are popping up everywhere. Some of them are good.

The Nabiac Landcare team has had a good month working at the Lilly Pilly Bend reserve, especially doing follow up weeding along Woosters Creek.

We were also happy to welcome back Chris Scott and his team of workers, who tackled some of the heavy stuff at the Clarkson Street end of the reserve. They also pulled many, many camphor laurel seedlings from the south end of Bullock Wharf reserve. We have been very fortunate again this year that the MidCoast Council has allocated some of the environmental levy funds to pay this team and assist in managing the weed problems in the reserve.

On a much less happy note...vandals are at it again! Someone must have a new hatchet. Near the Farnell Street entrance to the reserve, at least 20 trees have been hacked down. These were living trees...not someone's attempt to cut firewood. This is so disappointing to the volunteers who work each week and to members of the public who have also seen the damage.

Which weeds to control this month? Dare I say ...all of them.

especially if you are using chemicals because the weeds are definitely actively growing.

The real key to weed management is to stop reproduction. Removal of the larger plants that produce seeds will help stop the cycle, then the follow up removal of smaller plants and seedlings before they reach maturity will help ensure elimination or at least containment of a problem weed.

Knowing your enemy is the first step in any successful war. So...observe, identify and then research the best way to win. Once you've started it's follow up, follow up.....

Nabiac Landcare normally works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by a very yummy morning tea. New members are always welcome. We'll teach you to identify the weeds and the natives. You don't have to work every week if you join us. We can find a job for anyone of any level of fitness.

Even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area. If you have a garden remove fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. When you prune, compost your prunings or use your green bin. Over the fence or across the road in the bush shouldn't be an option. Most of all enjoy a quiet walk in the


Lifetime Membership of the Minimbah Rural Fire Brigade was awarded to Jo on 9th April 2016.



heatstroke and third-degree sunburn. It sure is true that you can have too much of a good thing!

So I must give these precautions.

Avoid peak sunlight times: usually between 10am - 2pm. The morning sun and the afternoon sun is the best time to be outside and expose our eyes and skin (the fatty parts of skin: upper arms, thighs, the tummy).

Be sun safe during those peak times - Hats, long-sleeved clothes, keeping hydrated with water.

And when it comes to sunscreen, well, it's a controversial topic... due to some products and ingredients being recalled and found to be toxic, respectively, I cannot in my heart recommend all sunscreens. To be on the safe side, I will recommended natural, low-tox, mineral-based sunscreens such as Zinc oxide, as opposed to chemicalbased sunscreens. Local health food shops like Go Vita in Taree and Forster stock some wonderful and safe natural sunscreens. Chemist Warehouse and Priceline and other pharmacies may also stock clean brands, such as WOTNOTS, MooGoo and Eco Baby sunscreens.



Our Grey Ghosts—on the road AGAIN!

To Tamworth, again, this time via Hexham and the Golden Highway. About the same distance and time, without the hill at Nowendoc. Good run. Tamworth is worth a visit on so many levels. The urban population is around 52,000 with a massive industrial base to service the huge agricultural and mining sector. Very little that can't be manufactured or repaired here. In many ways, self contained. At 400m (1,300ft) it's not the coldest area in New England area but temps were still around plus 1s and 2s at nights. Beef cattle are fat and the area is in great shape feed wise. No dairy farms here.

Our job here is done so head NNW & up to the top of the Moonbi Range @ 1,300m.(D-max, 3rd gear auto, easy). This is a 6km climb on this section of the New England Range which is of course part of the Great Dividing Range.

We bob along the top for some 100ks so no mountains are visible. Still on the New England Highway, we pass Bendemeer, Uralla and turn at Armidale onto the Waterfall Way.

This all sealed road has suffered, as many have, following the heavy rains. Multiple red light stops where work is happening in earnest. Regular travellers here, could possibly wear out several steering boxes due to the constant cornering involved. Via Wollomombi and past the turnoff to Ebor. We start to descend at last and begin to see mountains in the distance and valleys with planted stands of timber which act as wind breaks. Some dairy cattle here.

Could possibly looking at an English landscape which is probably why it is named the New England area.

Stands of towering grey gums searching for sunlight, arise from the gullies, a stark contrast from the shorter timbers west of the range. We camp at Dorrigo Showground and have only done some 250kms. Seems a lot more.

We get a call that our friend, *Frank Fallowfield* in Tamworth had passed away. There will be folks in that area who would remember Frank and *Ans*.

A meal at the RSL and are introduced to the bar staff, the kitchen crew and bingo caller and within ten minutes, the locals all know we come from Nabiac. Friendly it is and a great Chinese meal. An impressive display of Defence memorabilia on display, including a local VC winner who still lives in the area.

The obligatory visit to Dangar falls. As expected a lot of water here and impressive, good viewing platforms.

A must see is the rail steam collection. Not open to the public but visible through the chain wire fence. Dozens of carriages and wagons but particularly interesting are the steam engines, perhaps 25 dating from 1878. Supposedly privately owned and a troubled history and expensive court case has left it limbo which is sad. The largest collection in NSW. The track is closed so they are stuck there. (Dorrigo steam and railway museum)

Still on the Waterfall Way and leaving the Dorrigo escarpment we

are soon at the top of the 11km descent, a bendy and slow trip, not exceeding 40k/h, all well but the co-pilot is not enjoying it one bit her side, one could not see the bottom. Several stop signs as an enormous amount of roadwork is happening & large amounts of machinery in use. All well till nearly at the bottom and stationary, when a small truck with a large tractor on board, cut a corner and took the van mirror off the D max, thankfully missing the van. Pleased to get to the Showground at Bellingen to camp for a few days, although it's market day and camping is in short supply.

A couple of days here and as it's Fathers Day, I'm shouted lunch at the restored "Butter Factory" restaurant. Very pleasant and busy of course with several small private stalls selling their wares.

A short drive and don't want to turn right for home but have to, and camp at "a caravan park" about a third the price of the other one at Urunga. Clean but very basic. Meet up with my former Nabiac fire Captain, *Keith*, for lunch at the Bowling Club. He is not in good shape but positive.

Down a bit to Coffs harbour and come across evidence of the bypass. Massive roadworks and diversions, expect it be open next year. Find and visit the National Holden and National Cartoon Exhibition in a purpose built building in pleasant surroundings.

A very good display of about 20 of "Australians only Car". Very impressed though of the all Australian examples of cartoons. This is worth the \$15 entry fee alone. Huge amounts of very clever examples of their finest work. Really enjoyed that.

Toddle down the coast and camp at North Haven for a few days. Always has been a nice area, Laurieton is very busy, 7km from the highway and no Maccas just the locals doing their thing and it's working. Three reasonable op shops, auto accessories, Council Depot, Picture theatre (saw Downtown Abby) substantial industrial area. Nice place.

Unfortunately the fish Co-op burnt down some 12 months ago and whilst the site has been cleaned up, no progress on rebuilding, although they have opened a shop in North Haven which is busy. Across the river and you're in North Haven, where you can take a left and travel to Port Macquarie via Bonny Hills and Lake Cathie. We did a one day trip to Port, and staggered by the amount of subdivisions as you travel into Port from the highway service centre. Wouldn't want to live anywhere near here.

Back at the Haven and two substantial break walls line the river. Very well maintained and a fish cleaning table on the edge and a sign *don't swim here*. Sure enough two 3m grey nurse sharks are mooching around here. Across the water is Dunbogan, also very pleasant area with a new 1km walkway that follows the shoreline. Well worth the walk.

All rested up and breakfast at the surf club cafe overlooking the ocean. Very pleasant. Leave about 8am and receive reports that whales are in the bay southbound about 30minutes after we left. Ah well them's the breaks Good to be home though.

SPINACH & FETA MINI QUICHE

Something quick for a snack or entertaining

INGREDIENTS

3 Sheets Shortcrust Pastry, partly thawed

Tasty Cheese, grated ½ cup 125g Feta Cheers, crumbled

Baby Spinach, chopped roughly 120g

Eggs

2/3 cup Thickened Cream

METHOD

Preheat oven to 180°F. Lightly grease 1/3 cup capacity muffin tins or flat base patty pans

Using a round cuter big enough to line the muffin cups, cut 24 rounds from the pastry. Press into the tins. Using a fork, pierce the base 2-3 times. Bake 6-8 minutes until the pastry is a very light golden colour. Set aside to cool for 10 minutes.

Divide the tasty cheese and the Feta among the partially cooked pastry cases. Top with half the spinach.

Beat the eggs and cream together with a fork, until just combined (you don't want air bubbles), season well with salt and pepper.

Carefully pour the egg mixture into the pastry cases so that they are almost full. Poke a few extra bits of spinach into each cup. Return the quiche to the oven, bake 15,20 minutes until set







Welcome to Deb's Gardening

The countdown is on, 2 days and I am up, up and away. Spain and Portugal here I come. Hence I am busy organising myself and one of the things is to get my article in early. There is so much to do prior to going away and it doesn't help when the builder is back and needs me to paint boards prior to them going up - it is definitely easier to paint them prior but now, I have other things to do! I am on a mission.

I came to realise that my other half has never watered my pot plants, not once. I need him to water them while I am away, so I have made it easy for him. I have gathered them up and put all in one spot outside in the shade of the house and even close to a hose; if it rains while I am away he won't have to do it very often. I knew I had a few plants but when they are grouped together I have a collection, I am thinking they will just be in survival mode while I am away. I also need him to water my plant cuttings. That is one job I was hoping to get done prior to going away. Most of them have roots and need to be potted up or planted out but I do not like my chances of getting that done.

The vegetable garden is just about planted out. More carrots and beetroot seeds went in the other day and on the right moon phase (Waning). I needed to sow beans and I put them in at the same time; they should be sown at the waxing stage but I wanted to get them in, it just means that they may take longer to germinate. I have just finished eating my frozen beans from last season's and they were delicious. I sowed the beans following the broccoli crop, I have been picking plenty of broccoli but I didn't plant enough to freeze which is what I do every season, painting seemed to have gotten in the way.

I have had to give the garden a good watering; we could do with a bit of rain. There have been quite a few irrigation sprays that have needed to be replaced because it has been that long since I have used the irrigation system in the vegetable garden that a lot are either blocked or blown out. If only there were ones that didn't block but I haven't come across any yet.

Tomatoes, capsicums, sunflowers, pumpkins, watermelons and salad greens are all in. When I get back next month I will plant more tomatoes, you can never have enough tomatoes, which I will plant following the peas. I noticed a lot of self sown tomatoes germinating everywhere and as I only grow heritage tomatoes (heirloom) varieties of tomatoes whose seeds have been passed down for generations and are open pollinators that require weed and insects to pollinate,



which means you can save the seeds, plant them and expect them to grow into the same new plant. I did not save any seeds from the last crop and I planted a few different varieties from round to roma and cherry, so the self sown could be all cherry tomatoes and no round or roma. Sometimes it is just easier to buy heirloom tomatoes seedling from the nursery already established and ready to plant. One day I may get back into saving seeds once the house is finished and I have more time on my hands. Hopefully the house is finished before I get back as it is getting very close to being finished. Though I will still have plenty of painting to do!

The over grown ripe zucchinis that I buried at the end of last summer in their new resting place are starting to germinate, how easy was that. I just need to thin out the seeds and watch them grow.

I gave the other half a tour of what is in the garden for him to pick and eat while I am away. He wouldn't have a clue what is in the garden. The last time I went away for a couple of days he went to the shop and bought lettuce. I said 'why, there is plenty in the garden?', he said "I don't know what you have in there." hence the tour.

Most of the weeding is done, there are still pockets of weeds throughout some of the garden but it is mainly grass that has crept in to garden beds. The lawn close to the house where the grass died from materials laying around is now full of bindii. I have been reading up where lawn can handle an oversupply of iron quite well but some weeds like bindii can't. An organic home remedy for bindii is 2 table-spoons of iron sulphate mixed with 4 ½ litres of water. Spray the bindii with the solution and, all going to plan, the bindii should die off with-in 24 hours. Another home remedy is good old vinegar, 3 ½ litres of vinegar to 1 cup of salt and a bit of dish soap to help the mixture stick to the weed, spray directly. However if there are desirable plants and grass this mixture will kill them too. I have patches where it is just bindii so that won't be an issue. Once the bindii have died then it is a matter of throwing grass seed on keeping the water up until the seeds germinate.

Like I said, so much more to do in so little time! Now to go back and give the boards another coat of paint; give the garden final water before I head off; spray the bindii, not to mention back my bags.

So until next time,

Time is what we want most, but what we use worst.



New stallholder Beechwood House Flowers had a good first day.


Red Hill Avocados were popular with their seasonal produce. There were plenty of happy shoppers all round.

Wil guided us through the forest, sharing the results of a section of clearing lantana by hand; with the return of a vast range of native species, including apple berry, native cherry, acacias, lomandra and wombat vine. It was great that *Joel Dunn*, our local LandCare coordinator, could join us for this field-trip, and share insights into bush regeneration.

It was interesting and inspiring to see different results between clearing strategies, including hand-pulling, a small amount by vehicles, using animals (1 goat, 1 horse, 1 donkey). It was surprising to see further differences of species in a small

section which had been raked.

We learned snippets about the vast food forest, water management, and utilizing the fruits of the chicken's labour to break down weeds and green scraps, then catch the "fertiliser" on the low side of the chook run.




