

Nabiac Landcare

Christmas is coming and the local bush is heating up. It's only a couple weeks before the Nabiac Land care volunteers take a short break. Small weeds are getting hard to pull and other weeds are starting to stress from the dry weather and therefore less likely to respond successfully to herbicides. Our goal is to finish clearing weeds along the reserve edge between Cowper and Stuart Streets before we take our break. This task has been made more difficult by people dumping 'fill', lawn clippings and other debris along the edge and on top of the weeds. This hasn't

killed the garden escapees, honeysuckle and false bromeliad (Callisia fragrans), that are present. The callisia is particularly tough to control since it has thick waxy leaves and stems that prevent water loss and it grows anywhere from deep shade to full sun. It makes a great house plant...keep it there!



The rehabilitation of the section of the Lilypilly Bend reserve between Cowper and Stuart Streets and Woosters Creek has been our major project for the past several years. This area will need careful follow-up to contain regrowth of privet, camphor laurel and bamboo. Areas that were addressed early in this project are beginning to be colonised by native ground covers and grasses.

I recently had the opportunity to attend a ground habitat workshop at a Dyers Crossing property. Ecologist, *Joel Stibbard*, from the Biodiversity Conservation Trust spoke about the diversity of animals that need good ground habitat to survive and strategies to improve their habitats. Many of these animals are nocturnal and wildlife camera 'traps' are being used to monitor populations.

We also had an opportunity to explore an area that is being

developed as a wildlife corridor on the property. A shallow, almost treeless erosion gully has been re-shaped, planted with trees and fenced. We explored the idea of using woody debris in the corridor to enhance habitat, provide cover, mitigate erosion by slowing water flow and trap sediments and seeds.

The take away for me on the day was

- * fallen logs, debris piles are good
- layers of vegetation...big trees, shrubs, ground covers...are good
- * diversity of species is good
- * slowing water movement over the ground is good
- * messy makes good habitat!

Nabiac Landcare normally works each Wednesday (weather permitting) 8-9am to 11am, followed by a very yummy morning tea. New members are always welcome. We'll teach you to identify the weeds and the natives. You don't have to work every week if you join us. We can find a job for anyone of any level of fitness.

Even if you can't help in the bush, you can do your bit for our lovely area. If you have a garden remove fruit and seeds from exotic plants that the birds and wind will spread. When you prune, compost your prunings or use your green bin. Over the fence or across the road in the bush shouldn't be an option. Most of all enjoy a quiet walk in the local bush!

WALLAMBA LANDCARE GROUP Bush Tucker Teas.

The last gathering of the year was held at Candlarah Farm, in Firefly, on 17th November. Around 19 people came along.



The group thoroughly enjoyed the presentation by *Nardja Carter* of Black Apple Dreaming, from Biripi country. With over two decades of experience in indigenous Australian plants, as an Education Ranger for National Parks and Wildlife, Nardja is passionate about sharing the availability and benefits of bush foods.

It's still a niche market and often expensive, so Nardja continues to promote native Aussie

plants both in restaurants and for everyday use.

We were guided through seven types of teas, learning about the flavours and benefits of each one, including: Quandong which has a peachy flavour and is tasty in chutney; Gumbi Gumbi, which has an average



flavour, but is good source of antioxidants and is nice with honey or agave; Lemon Myrtle, which has antimicrobial properties. Its cleansing compounds make it perfect for a healthy tea;


Wattleseed, with its distinct appealing flavour has a wide range of uses including in cakes, detox, a coffee replacement.

Strawberry gum which has a sweet flavour with a eucalyptus kick, great for making ice blocks in summer; Rosella, which is tart but good for reducing blood pressure. We were advised not to use this when pregnant. It was introduced to Australia around 5,000 years ago and is good mixed with orange peel and sugar.

We learned about Kunzea, which has pretty flowers and is typically used in creams for eczema and arthritis remedies.

Nardja explained that it'd be great to grow these if we are looking to





add variety. It is much sought after from overseas.

It was inspiring to learn, taste and chat about the different teas. We had a poke around the garden and spotted lemon Myrtle, dianella, lomandra and a finger lime which has produced two finger limes in its life! It's suggested that we try to grow 2 or more finger limes together for more fruiting.

It was fun to share some bush tucker inspired culinary delights. Here are *Robyn's* wattleseed scones, topped with Kiwi fruit.

Creating plates for BBQs out of Bangalow palm pods, using dianella leaves as a whistle, and creating natural material artworks for children were also discussed.



Nardja said she wasn't sure if the whistle actually worked to deter snakes or was just used to distract kids for a while to give the adults a break!

We ran out of time

but would love to have heard more of Nardja's stories and knowledge.

We were pleased to welcome *Joel Dunn*, our local LandCare Coordinator, and some new faces too.

The next gathering will be in February 2026.

hall. It was an absolute pleasure meeting Alison she was engaging, supportive, and took a genuine interest in our community and our hall.


We greatly appreciated her valuable insights into our Grant applications,



Nabiac Sports Courts Redevelopment



Earlier this year we announced that Wallamba Netball Club (WNC), with assistance from Nabiac Memorial Neighbourhood Centre (NMNC), was successful in obtaining a Federal Government Grant to redevelop the courts (which had been assessed by MidCoast Council (MCC) as 'end of life'). The redevelopment will include:

- New playing surface marked for tennis, netball and pickle ball;
- New clubhouse
- New fencing
- New state of the art lighting system with hinged poles (for easy access when maintenance is required).

The project is being managed by a Steering Committee comprising of representatives of WNC, NMNC and MCC.

Since the announcement, much has been happening in the background to get all of the ducks in a row. We have now hit the point where work is commencing and changes will be noticeable. So, what has happened:

- A site survey was completed by Zenith Surveying
- a Geotech survey was completed by Regional Geotechnical

- Solutions, essential to ensure the new facility is properly built
- plans for the new clubhouse were drawn by Jamie Brislane of Cinz and JB 3D Drafting and Design, after consultation with the principal user groups as to requirements
- testing of the materials in the clubhouse was undertaken by HTS Group Northern from Taree (Trevor Grieves) with HTS then removing the external cladding, the eaves and two interior
- the residual clubhouse demolished with most of the materials being recycled
- new power pole and sub board installed, the work being done by Matt from Caiban Electrical.

Contracts have been signed with:

- Scott McCloy of McCloy Enterprises to remove the existing concrete surface with the work being done in two stages firstly the concrete at the clubhouse end then, slightly later, the rest of the surface
- a local builder for the construction of the clubhouse
- Dynamic Sports Facilities Australia (DSFA) of Bowral for the court surface, footings and fencing
- Precision Sports Lighting (Brisbane) for the new lighting system.

All going well in the meantime, construction of the new clubhouse is

scheduled to commence on 13 January 2026. Stay tuned for

further updates, with pictures, as the work progresses.



CANINE CRUCIATE LIGAMENT DISEASE



Cruciate ligament disease is the most common orthopaedic condition that we diagnose and treat in dogs. The cranial cruciate ligament is a ligament inside the knee that strengthens and stabilises the knee joint during movement. Unfortunately, disease of this cruciate ligament is common in dogs and we would see a case of cruciate disease weekly at Wingham & Valley Vets. Rather than a sudden trauma being the cause of the problem (as is common in humans), usually in dogs the cause is a gradual and progressive weakening and deterioration of the ligament, which leads to long-term pain and arthritis. Treatment (surgery) for dogs with this problem is very successful, providing good long-term comfort and function.

What are the Symptoms of Cruciate Ligament Disease?

A lameness (or limp) developing in the hindlimb can be suggestive of cruciate disease. This can be either sudden or gradual in onset. The limp can be either mild or severe, depending on the case. If both hindlimbs are affected, a dog may have trouble lifting themselves from a lying or sitting position and may be stiff or less able to jump and be active. If your dog is limping, they should be examined by a Veterinarian as soon as possible, as untreated cruciate disease leads to irreversible arthritis and long term pain. It is best to diagnose and surgically treat cruciate disease as early as possible in the disease course, so dogs can



have the best long term outcome and avoid arthritis setting in. It is not recommended to adopt a wait and see approach to cruciate disease – early treatment results in significantly better patient outcomes. Radiographs (x-rays) help confirm the diagnosis and plan the surgery. If your dog has been limping for some time, and has already

developed arthritis secondary to cruciate disease, it can still be beneficial to surgically repair the joint, as this has been shown to significantly improve long term function and comfort.

Treating Cruciate Disease: TPLO Surgery

Wingham & Valley Vets offer two types of surgery to treat cruciate ligament disease. One is the de Angelis surgery, which provides external support around the joint using a heavy gauge suture that mimics the role of the cruciate ligament, however this surgery is only feasible in small dogs. Most commonly we recommend a surgery called the Tibial Plateau Levelling Osteotomy, or TPLO. This surgery permanently changes the angle of the stifle joint to treat a partially or fully ruptured cranial cruciate ligament. During a TPLO surgery, the angle of the top of the tibia (or shin bone) is made more flat to improve the overall stability of the stifle (knee joint) when the dog is bearing weight on the leg. A semi-circular cut is made in the top of the tibia, and the top section of the tibia is rotated and levelled. The cut bone is stabilised with a bone plate and screws, to hold the top of the tibia in its new position. Once the bone is healed (usually 6-8 weeks post-surgery), the procedure is complete. This surgery has a very high success rate for treating cruciate ligament disease. We are very proactive about providing good pain relief before, during and immediately after surgery, and as a result, many dogs are



comfortable and bearing weight on the leg within 48 hours after surgery. If your dog has a chronic hindlimb limp it is strongly recommended their cruciate ligament be assessed by a Veterinarian. 

Good morning,

Thank you for your customer request regarding Wallanbah Road. The section that is currently being resurfaced between Failford and Tuncurry is not a council road but actually state road controlled and maintained by Transport NSW.

Wallanbah Road is part of an asphalt resurfacing program being delivered by contractors who use specialised equipment for this type of work. Resurfacing is a preventative treatment that reseals the road surface, helping to protect the pavement underneath from water damage and significantly delaying the need for full reconstruction which can be up to 20 times more costly. By contrast, the section of Wallanbah Road between Tipperary Road and Mimi Creek Road has deteriorated beyond the point where resurfacing would be effective and now requires full reconstruction."

There are three segments of Wallanbah Road in particular that currently sit high in our list of priority works. This **10-year plan** is currently under review with a lga-wide condition assessment and will be finalised in early 2026

I hope this information has been helpful.

Welcome to Deb's Gardening

umpty Dumpty Construction Company has been at it again, well that's what I call myself when I have to erect any sort of construction or put anything together. I am pretty useless at it. I decided this year to erect a tunnel with netting to protect my tomatoes and capsicums, my capsicums failed last year because of pests. I had a successful crop of tomatoes last year because I netted. This year the tomatoes and capsicums are planted on the outside of the vegetable garden in the raised concrete beds and along the outside of the fence. Because I crop rotate there has been no Solanaceae plants grown along the outside or in the concrete tanks for some time. So it was the perfect spot this year to plant my crop.

Tomatoes and capsicums are in the Solanaceae family, commonly known as the nightshade family. This family includes many edible plants like potatoes and eggplants as well as some toxic plants like tobacco and belladonna.

So as I looked at the layout of the concrete tanks and the position of the fence I decided to build one big tunnel and net the whole lot. I bought 9m x 6m strong netting online last year which keeps fruit fly out as well. I now have them all protected under this makeshift tunnel that I have to keep propping back up because, like I said, Humpty Dumpty construction company has been at it again.

My only small problem is I built it after I came back from my trip overseas and I planted the tomatoes and capsicums before I left. I meant to build it just after planting but I never had the chance. The fruit had already formed on the tomatoes before I left - moths and white butterflies had already laid their eggs and then I go and net them all and wonder why I have moths and white butterflies inside my net and wholly rotten fruit. Luckily it was only on the first lot of flowers so the pests aren't affecting any further fruit.

That is now under control, the moths and white butterflies are squashed, the effected fruit have been picked and composted and I am now just starting to pick my first lot of tomatoes. The capsicum is still at the early stage and it will be a while till I start picking them. I planted roma and round tomatoes, mainly for sundried and cooking, and cherry, grape roma for salads. I also planted basil in amongst the tomatoes to enhance the flavour of the tomatoes and marigolds which will be dug back into the soil to deter nematodes.

Botanically, both tomatoes and capsicums are a fruit because they develop from the flower of a plant and contain seeds. However, in a culinary sense, they are both used as vegetables due to their savory flavour.

Tomatoes and capsicums are both self pollinating and don't require insects to pollinate the flower, however they do require some sort of vibration to release the pollen from the stigma. We have had a lot of windy days which helps release the pollen but on still days I give the plants a shake mostly in the morning or early afternoons to help release the pollen.

Tomatoes and capsicums are heavy feeders, so every 3 weeks they get a liquid fertilise from my brewed tea, which is the weeds that have been soaked in water for many weeks and a dose of Seasol. The bottom leaves are pruned and a few laterals are pinched out to help with air flow to stop fungal disease occurring. I actually enjoy going through my dodgy door into my netted tunnel and having a wonder. I noticed a couple of white fly in there and I have been monitoring them, then the next thing I see is a couple of hover fly which are predators for white fly. Even though it's all netted there is always some sort of insect flying around but nothing to worry about, so far Mother Nature is doing her thing. I just hope my Humpty Dumpty tunnel keeps upright till the end of the season.

The rest of the vegetable garden is producing lots of vegetables. I picked a big basket of beans and they have been blanched and frozen, with a succession of beans planted and just starting to flower. The corn has successfully germinated. I am now picking zucchini and plenty of salad greens, like rocket, frilly lettuce, endive, sorrel and baby spinach. I have to start making beetroot relish soon because there is plenty of beetroots ready and the next lot just starting to germinate. Watermelon and pumpkin are spreading out their laterals and flowering. Lebanese cucumbers starting to climb. And what I am excited about is I am going to have a nice row of sunflowers this year which I haven't had much luck in the past. I covered the seeds this year with sawdust thinking that maybe the scent of the sawdust will deter any pest from eating the seeds and it worked.

The mangoes are growing in size, very excited about that. I have 6 big bunches of bananas on 3 banana plants - I never thought that would happen. So many pears forming which I must go and net or the king parrots will eat the lot.

Only weeks away until Christmas and time for me to think about the food menu, most of it will come from the garden. In our family Christmas time is celebrated with family, love and great food.

However, they are provided with safe areas (camps) to operate from, hot showers, electricity and all meals.

Camps operate wherever required. Quilpie in Qld has just closed and camps in all other states, including Tasmania, are at the moment closed. **Nabiac** is the one remaining camp operating and is camped at the soccer fields for at least two months, mainly fencing for those requiring assistance following the disastrous flood earlier in the year.

Operating on generous donations from many national businesses. For example, Isuzu has provided a super quiet 24 hour generator to provide the camp of some 15 caravans/motor homes with power as well as vehicles.

Bosch, electric fencing equipment, post drivers, borers drills etc. A retired mechanic at the camp at Nabiac, keeps equipment running

Materials, fencing wire posts etc are NOT provided by Blaze Aid, one can imagine what sort of problems that would create

They pass our place around 7.00 -730 each morning every day, at some camps 7 days a week when required.





VIRTUAL FENCING ON BUCKETTS WAY



Vehicle-detecting posts

that produce light and sound to deter wildlife from crossing the road are being installed at 25metre intervals along 4km of the the Bucketts Way near Tinonee with the aim of sparing more

koalas and other wildlife from vehicle strikes.

The first section of virtually fenced road is from the Bootawa Road / Bucketts Way intersection extending westward. Another 2km-section is also planned from the Gloucester Road / Bucketts Way intersection to BoBo Creek.

The virtual fencing complements the existing signage and awareness approach.

Virtual fencing is most effective when vehicles move at or under 80km per hour. Council does not have jurisdiction to change speed limits and is encouraging drivers to slow down on the Bucketts Way.

SECOND SAFETY TRIAL FOR LITTLE STREET FORSTER BOAT RAMP

Local boaties are reminded that Forster's Little Street boat ramp safety trial begins on Monday 1 December.

This is the second of a two-year trial designed to improve safety during busy summer months.

During December and January only **non-motorised** watercraft may use the boat ramp during daylight hours.

This year, a bollard will be in place on the ramp during daylight hours. It will be lowered so that motorised watercraft can access the ramp after sunset.

This is to provide a safer launching facility for non-motorised craft. It will also improve safety near the swimming baths, amenities and boat shed cafe nearby.

Local boat shed operators and businesses have been consulted on the trial.

During summer, the area is very busy with foot traffic crossing the boat ramp.

The boat ramp is often congested with vehicles launching boats and people using the ramp with kayaks and paddle boards. There is also limited parking in the nearby area for boats with trailers.

MidCoast Council rangers will track boat ramp operations during the trial.

The trial is a recommendation in the MidCoast Recreational Boating Infrastructure Plan. The Plan identifies that this area has inadequate access for motorised watercraft during peak times.

Motorised craft users can access Wallis Lake boat ramps with larger parking facilities at:

Forster Marina

Tuncurry (Point Road)

Elizabeth Reserve (Forster Keys)

Pacific Palms (Recreation Club) and

Coomba Park foreshore.

Users of the facility will be able to provide feedback after the second trial finishes on 31 January 2026.

A review of both trials will take place in 2026. Council will consider community feedback from both trials and operational matters.

MYALL LAKES MP WELCOMES NEW BREAST SCREEN TECHNOLOGY, AND



CALLS FOR PERMANENT DEDICATED FACILITY IN THE ARFA

Myall Lakes MP Tanya Thompson has welcomed the rollout of cutting-edge machine reading breast screen technology, and has underlined the need for a permanent and dedicated screening facility in our area.

"This is great news for women's health. This technology was initially a 12-month trial, used to read images from women aged 50-59 and is now being rolled out to all women. It has significantly reduced call backs for extra tests and biopsies because it is more accurate," Mrs Thompson said.

"This means less unnecessary callbacks and less stress, without compromising on detection rates. A real win for women in regional areas who often need to travel for screenings.

"Now I am calling on the NSW Government to make screening available in this area permanently.

"A check with BreastScreen NSW is free, requires no referral, takes only 20 minutes, and all radiographers are female. There are women in our communities who are only comfortable accessing this free, dedicated, female-staffed service."

More than 75% of breast cancers occur in women over 50 and regular screening is the best way to find breast cancer early.



Extra - Ordinary

Events around the birth of Jesus which we celebrate at Christmas are described in the Bible as joyful ... glorious ... praising God ... good tidings, Luke 2:9-11. When God sent the angel to the shepherds, He was putting **extra** in front of **ordinary**.




